

FOUR LEADERS RESUME WORK ON PEACE PLAN

Wilson, Clemenceau, Orlando and Lloyd George Solving Problems

CENSORSHIP WORKING MUST SIGN OR FIGHT

Information As to Progress Is Confined to Official Communiques

By Associated Press. PARIS, March 26.—The meeting of the league of nations commission of the peace conference, which was fixed for 3 o'clock this afternoon was postponed by a decision reached this morning until tonight. This action was taken to permit of an interrupted day sitting by President Wilson and Premiers Lloyd George, Clemenceau and Orlando, in effort to expedite the framing of the peace treaty.

By Associated Press. PARIS, March 26.—President Wilson and Premiers Lloyd George, Clemenceau and Orlando resumed at the Paris "White House" today their series of conferences which is expected to continue until the most important questions which have been delaying the work of the peace conference are cleared up. The differences of opinion which have developed since the return of Wilson to Paris are being considered fully and frankly and a determined effort is being made in the interest of an early peace to reach an agreement on broad lines.

Little information available. In the absence of official communiques the public has learned little about the meetings of the premiers and the President but there is reason to believe that negotiation for war damages was the serious problem they sought to solve. All the data on the British, French and American positions on this question was before them at the first meeting Tuesday. It is understood this showed agreement on virtually all features except the total amount upon which the experts were unable to agree. Even the textual draft of the reparations articles of the peace treaty are ready with a blank space waiting for the insertion of the amount.

French Question Next. After settling the reparations questions, the premiers and the President will consider the remaining main obstacle, the Franco-German frontier, along the Rhine. With these questions determined, the American delegation believed that a prompt conclusion of the peace treaty can be accomplished.

Possibility of concluding the treaty by the end of the present week is doubted owing to the extensive amount of drafting work after the main questions are settled in principle. The main drafts are steadily at work while the super-council is in session and each step of progress is followed immediately by the completion of the articles of the treaty.

The same process is being carried on with the draft of the covenant of the league of nations which in addition to being amended will be rewritten, so as to combine clearness with the dignity of notable state documents. Among several amendments to the league of nations covenant that President Wilson is disposed to accept, the "Latin clause" is one suggested by ex-President Taft.

LEAGUE OF NATIONS OR RUIN SAYS LONDON DAILY MAIL IN EDITORIAL

By Associated Press. LONDON, March 26.—In an editorial headed "League of Nations or Ruin," the Daily Mail says: "It would be folly to overlook the problems which must be solved. The most important of these is the American fear that the league of nations may involve some danger to the Monroe Doctrine. In actual fact the league will afford a fresh guarantee of that doctrine which at the date of its origin had the warm sympathy of our country and British diplomacy. There is no reason why a provision giving the sanction of the league to the principles of Monroe should not be inserted in the final constitution."

AMERICANS OPTIMISTIC OVER PROSPECT FOR FAVORABLE TERMS

ONE LEAGUE AND "I AM FOR IT" SAYS HITCHCOCK

For First Time in History Nations Seek to Avoid War, He Declares

MUST SIGN OR FIGHT

If League Is Not Formed War Will Be Resumed On a Larger Scale

By Associated Press. CHICAGO, March 26.—Declaring that there is only one league of nations constitution before the world and that people must accept it or nothing, Senator G. M. Hitchcock of Nebraska, formerly chairman of the committee on foreign relations, paused a moment in his speech to the Association of Commerce today and added: "I am for it."

"We need not deceive ourselves with foolish hopes that war will naturally cease," Senator Hitchcock said. "Experience has shown that they come whether nations are barbarians of civilized, Christian or pagan, educated or illiterate."

"They will continue in the future as they have in the past unless nations unite in a plan to avoid them. For the first time in history nations are making an effort to do this. Success or failure, it is of great importance to taxpayers. If the league is not formed the peace at Paris will be only a truce and every nation will resume war preparations on a bigger scale than ever. Taxes in the United States to cover these preparations would run into hundreds of millions of dollars a year. Most of this burden would be in the form of taxes on incomes and business profits."

"Prohibition has knocked out several hundred million dollars a year of government revenue and public sentiment is probably against any attempt to the old practice of raising the bulk of the revenue by taxes on the consumer, no matter how they are levied. This may be a cold blooded way of looking at the question, but I wish to make it plain that the Paris conference is not entirely academic but affects us all tremendously."

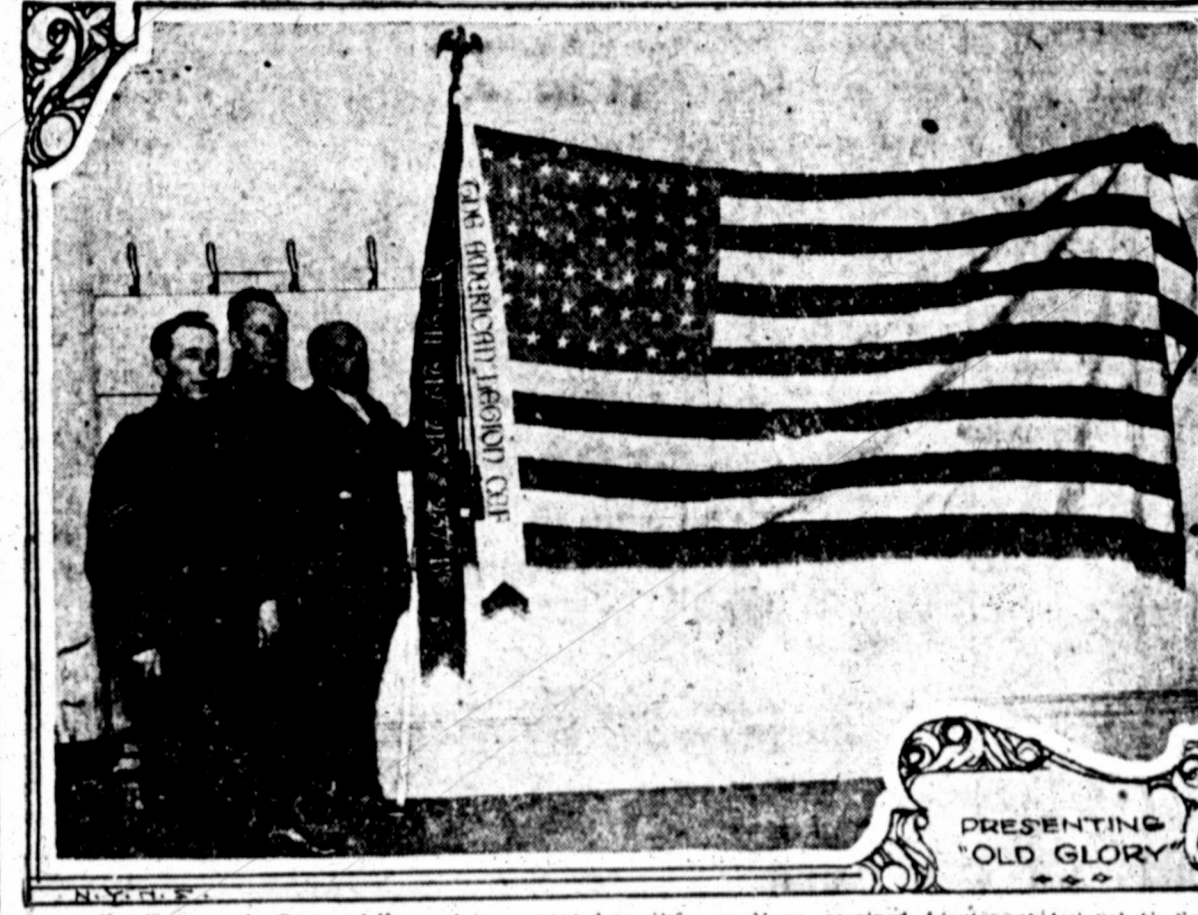
WOULD INCORPORATE SOVIET SYSTEM IN GERMAN GOVERNMENT

ALLIED TROOPS MAKING HEROIC FIGHT IN RUSSIA

WITH THE ALLIED FORCES IN NORTH RUSSIA, Monday, Mar. 24.—The bolsheviks are entrenching and reinforcing both their infantry and artillery at Bolshoi Ozera and are endeavoring to hold this important point in the line of the Allied communications between Obozerskaia and Ozeza. Yesterday the Americans and British attacked from the west side of the village and the Russians, supported by Americans and British attacked from the east along a road. Fighting under the most difficult conditions the Allied troops were unable to advance beyond the line of enemy machine guns, while the bolshevik artillery maintained a certain sweep of the winding high road through the woods. Struggling waist deep in the soft drifting snow of the forests, the forces striking from the east found a flank movement impracticable and were able to progress only at the rate of two thirds of a mile an hour. Today the Allied troops were bivouacked along the road on both sides of the village within good artillery range. The weather again has been extremely cold and the Americans and others who were living in igloo-like tents are finding their first opportunities to test these shelters. They are holding the line of Ozeza and Obozerskaia. Their big guns are moving up, drawn by American mules, which are steadily plodding ahead and conquering the steep icy hills and the deep drifts. The airplanes are equipped with runners instead of wheels for alighting on the snow, have bombed Bolshoi-Ozera.

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36TH INFANTRY MAY BE RETURNED BEFORE AUGUST 1

WASHINGTON, March 26.—Definitive information was today obtained of the War Department that the infantry regiments of the Thirty-sixth Division would be returned to the United States in July, unless conditions arise which make their continued stay in France necessary. The Ninetieth Division is still on priority for return in June.

WALTHY WOMAN IS FOUND MURDERED ON FARM NEAR BEAUMONT

BEAUMONT, TEXAS, March 26.—With her skull crushed and throat cut the body of Mrs. Brozire De Sedgwick, a wealthy real-estate agent, was found Tuesday at her home five miles from Beaumont. The body was covered by a neighbor woman who went to the house to purchase eggs. It is believed by officers Mrs. De Sedgwick had been dead three days. The house was in great disorder and blood was found on the walls and floors of two rooms indicating a hard struggle had taken place. The woman lived alone on the farm. She had been a resident of this county all of her life and owned considerable property.

FORTY UNDESIRABLES SENT TO ELLIS ISLAND ARE TO BE DEPORTED

RETURN OF EPIDEMIC FINDS ENGLAND SHORT OF MEDICAL SERVICE

The strain on the medical men who are trying to cope with the emergency is so severe that there is danger of many of them breaking down, especially in the south of England, where the epidemic is raging with unusual violence.

SEEK TO IMPEACH STATE WITNESS IN TRIAL AT BALLINGER

Edgar Hoover murder trial now in progress at Ballinger, undertook to impeach the state's main witness yesterday afternoon, when Mrs. P. M. Gates, a Methodist preacher testified that Miss Pearl Helms had come to him since testifying in the case and said that she had sworn falsely through revenge for the defendant. "Vengeance is mine. I will repay," she said. Helms was quoted to the woman said the preacher. In the early stages of the trial the state introduced Miss Helms, who swore that the defendant Helms told her that he expected to get rid of his wife one way or another and that his married life was not happy. Miss Helms also swore that Helms and his wife frequently quarreled while she was boarding with them.

AGREEMENT REACHED FOR SALE OF COPPER

WASHINGTON, March 26.—An agreement was announced today by the war department whereby to United Metal Selling Company, representing the copper producers will sell for the department approximately 100,000,000 pounds of copper and whatever copper-scrap the department may have to dispose of. Not less than 50,000,000 pounds of the copper producers each month for a period of ten months and then ten million pounds per month for a period of five months.

POLES SCORE VICTORY OVER THE BOLSHEVIKI

WARSAW, March 25.—The recent Polish victories over the bolshevik in the Pinsk and Grodno districts are officially reported by Polish headquarters here as follows: "The administration of the city of Grodno has been formally taken over by the Polish authorities. The bolshevik armies occupying the city and district of Pinsk have been beaten by the Poles. The bolsheviks in full flight left behind many cannon, machine guns, ammunition, locomotives, railway materials and a half million rubles."

SAYS RIGHT BANK OF RHINE MUST NOT BELONG TO PRUSSIA

PARIS, Tuesday, March 25.—"The right bank of the Rhine must not belong to Prussia," says Henri Franke, the foundation former minister of missions abroad in a bitter speech against what he charged was the "chamber of deputies" this afternoon. "The right bank of the Rhine," he declared, "must serve as a base for Prussian aggression against France. We ask this indispensable minimum and it is our right to ask it."

ONE AMERICAN OFFICER REMAINS IN BUDAPEST

The Reichspost of Vienna prints a dispatch from Budapest that Allied troops occupying Arad and Szegedin on the Maros and Tisza rivers respectively have been withdrawn. A Pressburg report received in Berlin says that martial law has been declared throughout Czech Slovakia as a result of events in Hungary.

DISCREDIT A RUMOR EUROPE ON VERGE OF FINANCIAL COLLAPSE

PARIS, Tuesday, March 25.—President rumors that all Europe is on the verge of a financial collapse are not justified by the facts, a prominent American financial expert said in a statement today. "Conditions were serious," he added, "but not panicky and would doubtless be relieved gravely when peace was signed and the embargoes lifted. He predicted that Europe would be stronger within a year than ever."

Great Britain with a war debt of 20,000,000,000, the financier added, was in a situation of affairs far more favorable with her debt and per capita wealth at the conclusion of the Napoleonic wars. The Allies owe Great Britain about nine billion and ten billion dollars. The financier estimated that only about four billion of the twenty billions of dollars invested abroad by Englishmen before the war had been divested of."

Discussing France, he said that the situation was unsatisfactory because the government does not levy a heavy enough taxation and consequently the most classes have more money than ever before while the government is nearly bankrupt. "If the taxation problem is faced fearlessly," he added, "France's hardest time will be over within six months."

The courage of Italy in levying heavier taxes than France, he continued, has inspired her but with the expansion of her present foreign credits, within six months the situation may become serious. "The financier declared that the condition of Belgium was not as bad as the Belgians imagined because she has the industries and population which would restore manufacturing rapidly."

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RACIAL MEDLEY IS FOUND IN COUNTRIES OF AUSTRIA-HUNGARY

## TEXAS CAVALRY MAY HAVE HEADQUARTERS IN WICHITA FALLS

PROPOSITION IS PRESENTED AT SPECIAL MEETING OF CHAMBER OF COMMERCE.

### RODEO PLANNED FOR CITY

Proposal of "Buck" Sanson Meets With Favor and Deal May Be Completed.

The 4th Texas Cavalry, United States National Guard, may within the near future locate its permanent headquarters in Wichita Falls—and within sixty days the citizens of Wichita Falls may have opportunity to see a real honest-to-goodness rodeo, with Leonard Stroud, world's champion rough rider, and other great riders of the West in action on a score of Ed McCarty's string of outlaw horses.

The word "may" is used in connection with the two statements made above, because plans for the location of the cavalry regiment headquarters here and the holding of a round-up show still are in tentative shape. At a special called session of the board of directors of the Chamber of Commerce this morning, both matters were discussed in detail and both received the endorsement of the board. Committees were appointed, and an effort will be made to obtain for this city both the permanent organization referred to and the round-up entertainment.

**Proposition is Presented.**

"Buck" Sanson, who managed the Fort Worth rodeo and Bryan Knuch, appeared before the chamber this morning and asked that the board endorse the proposition of a rodeo here to the extent of \$5,000; this money to be returned to the board from the first receipts of the show, and thereafter the Chamber of Commerce and the promoters of the show to split all profits that may accrue. It was explained that not only are all the great riders who participated in the Fort Worth show still in this territory, but Mr. Sanson has McCarty's string of Wyoming horses, the greatest string of bucking horses in the country, and also the pitching steeple that featured the Tarrant county rodeo.

"We came here originally," Sanson said, "because we understood there was a ball park and grandstand that could be used. We find that is a mistake, but if you men desire this show we're ready to go ahead and give a show, with a regular contest program, that will be the equal of any of the big round-up shows staged in Cheyenne, Tucuman, M. P. Fenner, Ore., or any other place. And if it meets with popular favor, there is no reason why it cannot be made an annual feature."

**Plan is Endorsed.**

Frank Kell earnestly supported the plan, assuring the members of the board that he personally would look for any representations made by Mr. Sanson and declaring that all the men who would participate in the rodeo are high class men, not the type usually associated with so-called "wild west shows."

"I know enough of 'Buck' Sanson," Mr. Kell said, "to know that he is trying up with a disreputable crowd or with a bankrupt crowd."

The chamber voted to endorse the project, and to guarantee the \$5,000 asked, with the understanding that the baseball committee will erect the grandstand required for the show. If the rodeo is staged here, it will run probably for three days during the second week of May.

**May Secure Cavalry.**

Col. W. C. Cope, assistant adjutant-general of Texas, Major E. W. Napier, of Wichita Falls, and Col. Will A. Miller, of Amarillo, presented to the board the plan for the possible location here of the 4th Texas Cavalry. Col. Cope declared that his only interest at the present time is to recruit the regiment to 75 percent of its peace basis strength, in order that it may be eligible to receive equipment, and he made no attempt to influence the board in favor of Wichita Falls as headquarters.

"Full equipment for the United States National Guard of Texas is now in the state warehouses," he said, "but it is necessary that various divisions be recruited to 75 percent before this equipment will be issued. If Wichita Falls obtains the headquarters for the 4th Cavalry, which is now located at Amarillo, it will mean approximately 450 men and 250 head of horses will be stationed here, as the headquarters provide for a headquarters troop, regimental band, supply troop and four line troops."

Major Napier stated that the financial needs of the regiment would include merely stables for 250 horses, and a drill ground of approximately 10 acres. An effort will be made to obtain a drill ground at Call Field.

The chamber voted to invite the regiment to make this city its headquarters, and a committee consisting of J. A. Kemp, W. S. Curlee and W. Gen. R. H. McMill, commander of the 2nd Brigade, Texas Cavalry, and Adjutant-General James A. Harley visit Wichita Falls and meet the committee named.

## CREATORE GRAND OPERA SINGERS TO APPEAR AT WICHITA THEATER SATURDAY MATINEE AND NIGHT

From the musical critic of the Dallas News, the great expectations aroused by the advance notices of the Creatore Grand Opera Company are more than fulfilled. The company gave its opening performance Monday night, singing "Aida" and 2,500 persons braved the storm to attend. The Dallas News critic says:

Curtain calls for the artists and the conductor were in order last night when the Creatore Grand Opera Co. gave Verdi's "Aida" at the Coliseum. An audience of over 2,500 braved the storm and applauded vigorously the first grand opera in the city has heard in two years. The production was smooth and balanced, and for a change this road company gave Dallas a set of scenery, costumes, and mise-en-scene fresh from the painter. The audience interrupted the orchestration at the beginning of the third act, when the curtain rose on the Nile scene, with a full moon whose beams actually rippled on the canvas waters below.

Maestro Creatore's company emphasizes the ensemble rather than the exploitation of one or two stars and was effective in all departments. A 30-piece orchestra occupied the pit and a well trained chorus of as many voices formed the background on the stage. In addition a comely corps of de ballets of six was added.

The audience gave the former band master a hand when he marched down the left aisle to take his place in the pit. Although directing an organization of an entirely different character from his band, he has not modified his antics from those which made him famous as a band leader. He gestures as prettily as ever. In impressing the tempo on his men he uses both his own lamp and those of neighboring musicians to rap his beat. He conducts his men with authority and secured desired results, especially in the triumphal scene. After the act he was dragged on the stage by some of his stars to receive applause. If manual designation does not prove effective he frequently calls them by name and tells them what to do.

**Principals Score Hit.**

Greek Evans, Joanne Gordon, Louise Darcee and Salvatore Scarietti were the principals and all scored in their roles. Greek Evans was a revelation. He is a massive man with a tremendous voice, and his impersonation of the fierce Ethiopian warrior, Amoruso, received several curtain calls after the third act. Louise Darcee, in the title role, deserves a distinguished service cross for pure grit. Yesterday afternoon she fell while crossing the wet street in front of the Union Station and sprained her entire right side. Though ordered to bed by her physician, she decided to sing when she heard that it was necessary to make another substitution in the cast. Throughout the performance she was attended by a nurse and a physician. Her physical injury did not impair the loveliness of her voice. Though not especially large, it is of crystalline clearness and great carrying power. Her pianissimo singing in her big aria of the third act, "Mia Patria," brought her much applause.

Salvatore Scarietti, the lyric tenor, who sings tonight in "Rigoletto," substituted at the last minute for Giuseppe Corrallo. The latter is troubled with laryngitis. This makes the second time in his long operatic career that M. Scarietti has sung the role of Rhadames. He was effective in this highly dramatic role, gaining much applause after his celebrated first act aria, "Celeste Aida." Though light in character, his voice possesses some ringing top notes.

Joanne Gordon, the Amneris, justified the extravagant notices of her appearances elsewhere. Gifted with

a powerful, clear mezzo-soprano and much natural dramatic talent, she was well equal to the exacting demands of her role as villainess. Her duet with Rhadames earned her much approval, as did her acting the bouffon scene.

Alfredo Valenti was a deeply ponderous Ramfis, and Virgilio de Witt invested the part of the King with becoming dignity. Amedeo Baladi made the most of his few lines as the messenger, and the light soprano of Elvira Arani was heard off stage to good advantage in Act I, as the priestess

like Canada and Australia may be admitted to the league which it is claimed would give Great Britain five votes to our one.

"Fifth it has been objected that Japan might insist on having the league settle the immigration question and through the league force us to admit Japanese.

"I feel that these objections will be brushed aside and that men will meet the big issue squarely. Our answer must be 'Yes' or 'No' and I am sure there is but one correct answer, and that is 'Yes.'"

"I believe that the people of the world will accept the league as it has been prepared in Paris, because they must realize the promises the nations make to each other will act as an effectual preventative of war."

"Second, the objection was made that the United States surrendered a part of its sovereignty by entering the league. It has now become evident that neither the United States nor any other nation surrenders anything as the league is not a government and has no sovereign powers."

"Third, objection has been made that the United States abandon the Monroe Doctrine. How can this doctrine be abandoned by joining a league which proposes to put a stop to aggressions by putting forces against every nation including those in America?"

"Fourth objection has been made that British self-governing colonies, league of nations never was possible before. A great change, however, has come over the world. In the past the world has been cursed by autocratic governments bent on conquest.

"This is the effort now being made at Paris. America leads. Her representatives are devoting their energies to securing for humanity the great boon of a world free from future wars. In this historic effort the leader is the American president, Woodrow Wilson."

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MOTOR TRUCKS MUST PAY A TAX ON MILEAGE

AUSTIN, TEX., March 26.—To meet the growing freight traffic by motor trucks on Texas roads and to make them bear their share of the expense of keeping up the highways upon which they operate, the legislature

passed a law which provides a new tax. This law provides that any person, firm or corporation operating a motor truck upon a public highway shall register the vehicle with the commissioners court of the county in which it operates and secure a permit to use the roads. The commissioners court is authorized to levy and collect a fee, not to exceed one-half cent per mile, based upon the

tonnage, mileage and gross receipts of the truck. Funds thus derived go to the county road and bridge fund.

### FIVE HUNDRED DELEGATES WORKING IN HARMONY

CHICAGO, March 26.—Five hundred delegates to the National Petroleum Congress which opened here Tuesday were virtually a unit on many of the specific matters concerning the industry. Fractional differences were not in evidence and it was said action was contemplated for this week's sessions to effect the following: Formation of a protest by the united branches of the industry against government control. Merging of the Independent Oil Men's Association and the American Petroleum League. Formal organization of the American Petroleum Institute, an outgrowth of the petroleum service committee, with A. C. Bedford of the Standard Oil Co. of New Jersey as president.

Harry A. Wheeler, in welcoming the delegates in behalf of Governor Lowden of Illinois, told the old men that they must determine whether private or government ownership of the oil industry should prevail. Resolutions favoring legislation to open government oil lands to the producer on a 12 per cent royalty basis were introduced by Max W. Ball, head of the Rocky Mountain division of the Roxana Petroleum Co. He declared 750,000,000 barrels of oil would be available in the Rocky mountain district and Alaska. Some delegates talked of higher prices for gasoline but others declared price fixing had no place in the session.

# Market Report

## COTTON MARKET

**NEW YORK, March 26.**—Unfavorable European political news caused continued nervousness in the cotton market early today and after opening unchanged to 14 points lower, new style months sold 30 to 50 points below Monday's closing. May declined to 23.55 and October to 19.50. Old style months were unsettled with May selling at 23.75 and October at 19.00.

There was some scattered buying of new crop deliveries on reports of cloudy weather with rain in the south and that the attention of the trade seemed to center on the foreign situation and the news over the holiday evidently created a less favorable view of export trade possibilities. Liverpool made a relatively steady showing but was a seller here during the early trading.

More favorable labor advices from England, reports that the peace conference was making more rapid progress than appeared on the surface and the outlook for unsettled weather in the south helped to check the early decline and caused rallies during the middle of the morning. There was some trade buying as covering. Business then became quiet and toward later in the morning were irregular.

There was no fresh news feature during the afternoon but Liverpool was a moderate seller and a renewal of local pressure caused prices off with May selling down to 23.50 and October to 19.45, or about 40 to 50 points under Monday's closing.

Cotton closed steady.

**New Orleans Cotton.**

**NEW ORLEANS, March 26.**—Rains to the belt caused a rise of one to two points in the price of cotton on the opening today but the market soon felt heavy selling, stimulated by the unfavorable political news from abroad and broke sharply. **CONTINUOUS MEETINGS TO FACILITATE PEACE PLANS**

**By Associated Press.** March 26.—In President Wilson's study at the Paris "White House" occurred today the first gathering of premiers under the aegis proposed by the President that continuous meetings be held until great questions which have been obstructing the early conclusion of the peace treaty should be resolved. It marked the initial step by this super-conference in taking direction of affairs and in meeting apprehension due to the revolution blazing up in eastern Europe.

Mr. Wilson and the premiers spent a large part of the day on the questions of Central Europe, which was also an early disposal of this problem was expected when the meeting began.

The Russian situation, particularly in relation to the political upheaval in Hungary, was considered at today's conference, and it was understood that boundary questions would also be taken up.

Consider Hungarian Revolt.

During the day the Hungarian revolt and its effect in bringing bolshevism into Central Europe, was also without doubt, examined, as experts had prepared a huge map showing the vast extent of bolshevik authority which now embraces virtually half of Europe. On this map heavy red lines mark the outer limits of bolshevik authority with red arrows showing the main areas of advance westward.

This line around Russia takes in Hungary and shows bolshevik infection in parts of Ukraine, Lithuania and other independent sections of Russia.

The premiers also had access to reports showing the extent of disorder in all sections of eastern Europe, including private reports on a grave character concerning regions in the southeastern part of the continent and around Odessa which have not as yet been made public.

**RIOTS IN EGYPT RESULT IN MURDER OF MANY NATIVES**

**By Associated Press.** CAIRO, EGYPT, March 26.—(Via Montreal).—The official report of the riots in Egypt show that 2,000 houses in villages were sacked. On March 14 several British soldiers were murdered and a mob sacked and burned the stations at El Rekkah and El Mastah. On March 15 the express from Cairo was pillaged and several trains were wrecked. An employee of the state railway was murdered.

On March 16 the mob raided the police station at Minet Camp and released prisoners. It then attacked the station and the military picket was obliged to fire. Thirty natives were killed and 19 wounded. Several thousand natives attacked the station tank and 22 natives were killed and wounded.

The disorders in Cairo were checked with the least possible employment of force. Altogether 69 natives were killed and eight wounded here.

**MILNER SAYS THE WORLD IS FAR FROM ESTABLISHED PEACE**

**By Associated Press.** LONDON, Tuesday, March 25.—In the house of lords tonight Viscount Milner, the secretary for the colonies said that in his opinion the country was still far from a certain and well-established peace. Therefore, he declared, the army and navy estimates could not be reduced.

Colonel Roosevelt was with his regiment in every battle until July of last year, when he was wounded by a machine gun bullet in the leg. **By Associated Press.** LONDON, March 26.—(Via Montreal).—The troops of the Kolchak government, who pierced the bolshevik front on a thirty-mile sector on March 11, continued their progress and the position of the bolsheviks is precarious, according to Reuter dispatch from Omsk. The Kolchak army has completed the capture of Osa and is driving the bolshevik army westward in three directions and has taken a large number of prisoners and annihilated three bolshevik regiments.

# NINETIETH DIVISION'S RECORD IS NOTABLE BY THE FACT THAT IT NEVER GAVE AN INCH OF GROUND

## General Allen Praises Brilliant Combat Record of Ninetieth Division

Headquarters Ninetieth Division, American Expeditionary Forces, France.

November 21, 1918.

MEMORANDUM:  
TO THE OFFICERS AND MEN OF THE NINETIETH DIVISION.  
Having served with you throughout your period of organization, training and fighting—from the arrival of the first recruit at Camp Travis to the last shot at STENAY and BAALON when the armistice became effective—I am now constrained by instructions from General Headquarters, American Expeditionary Forces, to leave you when you are headed toward Germany as part of the Army of Occupation. This separation has given me so much pain that renunciation of the Corps Command persisted in my mind.

Your superb comportment everywhere in France, as well as your unsurpassed war exploits, have won for you a designation in the Army of Occupation; your wonderful fighting ability and your superior manhood have won for you a place in my heart that will remain with me for all time.

The fathers and mothers who have produced men such as you, who know not battle straggling nor retreat under any circumstances, must be thrilled when they learn your stories. The states to which you and they belong possess the prime essentials of prosperity and greatness.

The soul of the Ninetieth Division will remain a sacred inspiration to me wherever I be.

The 90th division, composed almost entirely of Texas and Oklahoma men, went through the great European conflict with a record that was never surpassed, and seldom equaled by any of its comrade organizations. Not once during the great final drive into the heart of the Hindenburg line did the Texas lands hesitate and in no instance do records show where one foot of ground was given to the foe in the desperate, last stand to stem the tide of defeat.

These facts comprise the gist of a communication written by Major Ike Ashburn from Berncastelle, Germany. Major Ashburn was a former publicity director for A. and C. College and is well known in Texas as a newspaper man. He recounts incidents during the great campaign in which the 90th division played no prominent a role. He skeletonizes the operations of the organization from the time the division first went into action until the day hostilities were suspended. One of the outstanding features of his letter is the fact that never was the 90th division assigned to a task but that it didn't accomplish the desires of the higher staff as desired.

The 90th division left Camp Travis for overseas service on June 6, 1918. Major Ashburn's communication is as follows:

"It's a far cry from Texas and Oklahoma to the army of occupation, which spreads itself along the Rhine and Moselle rivers, 'outposting' civilization, as the doughboys say, but nevertheless, newspapers from these two states have been filtering through to the 90th division of late.

From this angle it would seem that but little has been said and less is known concerning the activities of

the 90th division since it left Camp Travis early in last June for overseas service. For that reason below is given, in general, a brief outline of the services of this division, which now with the 1st, 2nd, 3rd, 4th, 32nd, 42nd and its sister and splendid division, the 89th, comprise the army of occupation of Germany.

The headquarters of the 90th division are at Berncastelle, on the Moselle, about 80 kilometers southwest of Sobern. The division is scattered over a large area, occupying 70 towns, most of which are between Berncastelle and the Rhine and Dan. Headquarters of the 359th infantry is about 60 kilometers from the Rhine, and is perhaps the most advanced post of the 90th.

Men of the Texas-Oklahoma division are being given leave to visit Coblenz, and a feature of their entertainment there is a boat ride along the historic Rhine.

Left Camp June 6.  
But back to the brief review of the

division. As is generally known, units began leaving Camp Travis on June 6, 1918 for Camp Mills, where full equipment was supplied, sailing lists completed, and other necessary details for overseas duty completed. Practically all of the units sailed for Liverpool, and passed through England, though some sailed direct to French ports. In Liverpool the 358th infantry paraded on July 4 before Lieutenant General Campbell of the English forces, and the lord mayor of that city. The 358th infantry paraded in Southampton on that date. Tremendous ovations were given these troops, as well as all troops by the English.

Through Southampton to La Havre, and then to Training Area No. 14, a new area, in the department of Cote d'Or, the division next passed, division headquarters were established at Aigny-le-Duc, a picturesque French town near Dijon. The 16th field artillery brigade was sent to the artillery training area near Bourdeaux. In these areas, the troops underwent a period of intensive training for six weeks. On the completion of this training, the division moved to the front near Toul, relieving the 1st division. The first unit to go in took over a sector on the night of August 19-20. The division sector extended from Pons-Mousson westward to Limey. Aggressive patrolling by night gave the division possession of No Man's Land, and that land soon became 'Yankee Land.' Artillery was moving up and concentrating back of the line, moves always being made at night, and positions camouflaged by day, and even the uninitiated doughboy knew that the feverish preparation meant something.

had seen less than a month's actual experience, but due to its splendid showing in the time and in the training area, it was chosen to participate in the American engagement. More than that, it was given a pivot position in the line. For some divisions, the St. Mihiel fight was nothing more than a parade or practice march, but so for the 90th. The men of this organization fought over a stubbornly contested ground. German official reports on the St. Mihiel battle state that heavy reinforcements were thrown in the sector attacked by the 90th, and that the defensive program carried out called for heavy resistance on the pivot to permit the safe withdrawal of troops in the pocket of the salient.

At 5 a. m. September 12, after an artillery preparation of four hours, the division assaulted. By 2 p. m. all objectives had been reached, in spite of detouring, dense woods, barbed wire, steel nets, concrete trenches and machine guns. At one point the infantry was held, but fire delivered by the 1st field artillery brigade broke the resistance. During the night of September 12-13 the infantry exploited the success. One by one the enemy positions were taken. Two regiments of hostile infantry, a hand to hand struggle ensued in which the enemy was routed. On the 14th the Norroy quarries and Bois de Preire were carried on and on the following day the advance continued till the Hindenburg line was reached. On the 23rd a raiding party penetrated that line, a feat accomplished, it is believed by only one other division during the St. Mihiel operations.

Continually Under Fire. Throughout the advance and the ensuing period of reorganization the enemy from positions on the Moselle maintained a heavy and continuous fire, which not only entailed our positions but came diagonally from the rear.

On October 10 the 90th division was relieved by the 7th division, and immediately embussed for the Verdun sector. Before the last elements arrived there it moved forward as a reserve of the 3rd corps. In the night of October 21 the division relieved the 5th division in Bois des Rappes. At 3 p. m. October 23, advancing in the midst of a tremendous artillery duel it took and held the towns of Bantheville and Bourrut and the high ground northwest of them.

During the next week the division improved its position, reaching the Bantheville-Aigreville road and holding it despite the hostile artillery fire which veterans of the division and some state was, during this period the most terrific they had ever experienced.

On November 1 at 5:30 a. m. after two hours' artillery preparation, the division again assaulted, encountering the best divisions of the German army. The fighting was desperate, the hostile artillerymen firing over open sights till surrounded. Our infantry was splendidly supported by the 15th field artillery brigade. When the infantry was held batteries galloped forward under machine gun fire and in spite of the losses literally blew the hostile positions off the map. By 9 p. m. the entire Freya line, including hill 243 and the town of Villers-devant-Dun, had been taken.

The division pressed the pursuit reaching the Meuse November 3 and taking Wissembourg. On November 5, November 9 it crossed the river and after a night march of 20 kilometers again attacked. By 4 p. m. November 10 Hanon was taken and our troops

were fighting in Stenay, from which the enemy were driven during the night.

The average advance made by the division at St. Mihiel was six kilometers, at Verdun 22. The division was under fire from August 2 to November 11, with the exception of seven days occupied in changing sectors; 75 days without a relief. During that time it went "over the top" in two major offensives and seven minor operations, not counting exploitations and pursuits, and was still advancing when halted by the armistice.

**Victory Spoils 5-p.**  
The division captured 25 pieces of heavy artillery, 125 light machine guns, 72 heavy machine guns, 903 rifles, and immense quantities of ammunition and stores. It also took prisoners, 32 officers and 1,844 men. Casualties amounted to 37 officers and 1,042 men killed; 62 officers and 1,257 men severely wounded; 122 officers and 4,671 men slightly wounded; 81 officers and 2,094 men gassed; 500 officers and 236 men missing. Of these gassed there were 17 deaths. Twelve hundred and four were evacuated.

**Never Withdraw Foot.**  
The 90th division never withdrew from a foot of ground it had been ordered to hold. It fulfilled every mission assigned in less than half the time allotted. It has had less than half a dozen "battle stragglers" charged against its record. Not only did it gain the objectives in every operation in which it took part, but it never failed to reach and pass the exploitation line.

At the conclusion of the armistice the 90th division was assigned with the 3rd corps (its comrade throughout the campaign) to the 7th corps of the 3rd army. As part of the 7th corps the division marched from Stenay, across Luxembourg to Rhinisch Prussia. The 7th corps having been designated as a reserve of the 3rd army, the 90th division shortly before Christmas settled into winter quarters along the Moselle river in the vicinity of Berncastelle where was rejoined by the 165th field artillery brigade.

**Command is Shifted.**  
From mobilization to the close of the campaign the division was commanded by Major General Henry T. Allen. Shortly after the conclusion of the armistice, General Allen was assigned to command the 8th army corps. Command of the division then passed to Brigadier General J. P. O'Neil, who continued in command during the march into Germany as part of the army of occupation. Major General Charles H. Martin now commands the division.

As a final tribute to the work of the division, the commanding general of

the 1st American army, authorized Major General Allen to publish to his troops the following statement:

"In a recent conversation with the commander in chief I told him that the 90th division was as good a division as the (three divisions, names not given), and that he had no better division in the army than the 90th."

**RAILROAD BUILDING IS IN PROGRESS IN MEXICO**

**EAGLE PASS, TEX.**—March 25.—The building of a railroad from Cuernavaca to Sierra Mojada, Mexico, to connect with the Chihuahua and Kansas district and which will eliminate the Villa infested territory and shorten the present route approximately five hundred miles is now under way.

This road is expected to develop the trans-continental route through Texas and Mexico by way of Eagle Pass.

Two thousand laborers are now at work and the construction is moving ahead rapidly.

### DECLARES RECENT EVENTS IN UKRAINE ARE DISASTROUS

SUCH IS STATEMENT OF WINSTON SPENCER CHURCHILL IN AN ADDRESS.

### FRENCH SUFFER THEREFROM

Points Out Features That Must Be Carefully Weighed to Reach Right Solution

By Associated Press. LONDON, Tuesday, March 27.—Discussing the situation in Russia today in the house of commons, Winston Spencer Churchill, secretary for war, said that events during the last two or three months in Ukraine had been extremely disastrous to the French. He said they had entered from the south and had gone some distance from the coast when they were encountered by superior force and encountered hostility from the people. The secretary pointed out that this latter feature was something which "must be carefully weighed as it showed the danger that might result from rash or ill-considered action."

Invasion is Threatened. Kherston and Nikolai have been taken, and Odessa is being defended by French, Greek and Russian forces against bolshevik attacks, he said. The position of the bolsheviks, near Odessa, he pointed out, has exposed Rumania to a very direct threat of invasion, which with the Hungarians advancing on the other side, has made the situation very difficult. In speaking of General Denekine's army, the secretary said that it was Great Britain's policy to give it support but not to involve any British troops. He said that General Denekine is "fighting desperately for his native land and for the world's civilization."

Encounter Bolsheviki. There is a British mission with General Denekine and medical supplies, munitions, instructors and technical advisers are being furnished. He said that General Denekine had suffered a severe reverse while advancing toward Novo Tscherkak but by striking back toward the Caspian he had successfully taken 30,000 prisoners. The British retain control of the Caspian but there is a bolshevik fleet at Astrakhan where the harbor is at present ice-bound. Small detachments of British troops marching toward the frontiers of India are holding back without serious fighting, bolshevik emissaries seeking to advance and spread disturbances there. Admiral Kolchak's armies in Siberia have done well in the northern sectors, although not so successful farther south, Mr. Churchill said, adding:

"The British have a handful of men there as a symbol and guarantee of the assembly of Admiral Kolchak. The government has supplied Admiral Kolchak's armies with a very large number of rifles, some cannon and other munitions by the way of the Siberian railway and is intended to continue this support by sending technical instructors and experts to Siberia."

### INTEREST MANIFESTED IN EARLY MEETING OF INDUSTRIAL CONGRESS

Special to The Times. DALLAS, March 25.—The program of the Texas Industrial Congress at its annual meeting in Dallas, Saturday, March 29, is one of unusual interest, and speakers of prominence, both from within and without the state, will take part.

Judge W. F. Ramsey, of the federal reserve bank, who has been directing the campaign in Texas for a reduction of the cotton acreage, will review the work accomplished, not only in Texas, but in all of the cotton growing states. Prof. J. C. Pridmore, an expert on soil fertility, of Shreveport, La., will illustrate his address on factors influencing farm profits with a series of charts, showing the importance of maintaining soil fertility. The Hon. C. O. Laney, a member of the Texas legislature, will present the subject of good roads, and give the reasons why Texas should support the proposition to issue \$75,000,000 in bonds for construction of good roads throughout the state. Mr. Laney will explain the method by which these roads are to be built at no additional increase in taxes. Prof. P. O. Holden is well known in Texas, as he conducted a profitable farming campaign in a number of counties in 1918. He will advocate the teaching of practical agriculture in the rural schools and community organization for rural school betterment. It is probable that the educational organizations of the state will extend an invitation to Prof. Holden to conduct a campaign in the near future for community betterment. The program should appeal to bankers, teachers and business men, generally, and the congress expects a large attendance.

### BANKS TO DISTRIBUTE ENVELOPES FOR SAVINGS

Special to The Times. DALLAS, TEX., March 26.—More than half a million envelope fillers, "The Savings Campaign of 1919" will be sent out within the next few weeks by the banks of the Eleventh Federal Reserve District. Orders for these fillers are coming in to district headquarters by the thousand in every mail.

The little pamphlet calls attention to the fact that the 1919 savings campaign is an all-American movement, for all ages and people in all walks of life. It stresses particularly the benefits to be derived from membership in saving societies. Many bankers are also informing Frank M. Smith, federal district director of the war loan organization, that they are organizing their customers that interest coupons on Liberty Loan Bonds be transferred into savings stamps as they become due. In this manner the interest money goes right on earning interest for the bondholders.

### PLAN TO COMBINE PEACE TREATIES OF CENTRAL POWERS

By Associated Press. PARIS, Tuesday, March 25.—It became known tonight that a serious effort was being made in the highest quarters to join together all the peace treaties with Germany, Austria, Turkey and Bulgaria, thus making one comprehensive treaty in which Germany would be particularly acceptable to Italy, which has resented the conclusion of terms with Germany in a document which failed to deal with Italy's interests in Austria.

The movement for a single treaty with all the four powers probably grows out of Premier Orlando's strong opposition to such omission in the first treaty of clauses dealing with Italy's interests. The plan has not yet been finally determined upon and it may meet with objections, but the tendency is toward its acceptance. It is stated that the fact that the United States is not at war with Turkey or Bulgaria has raised no objections to the plan. Should the plan be adopted, it is said that the four treaties could be linked together and completed by May 1.

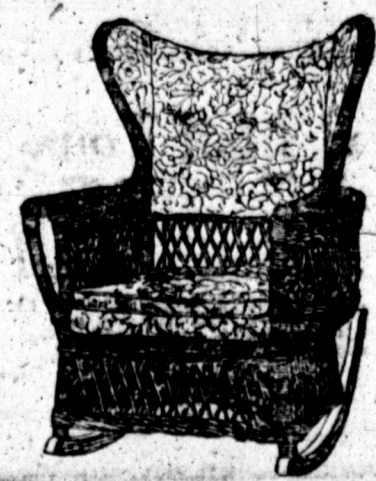

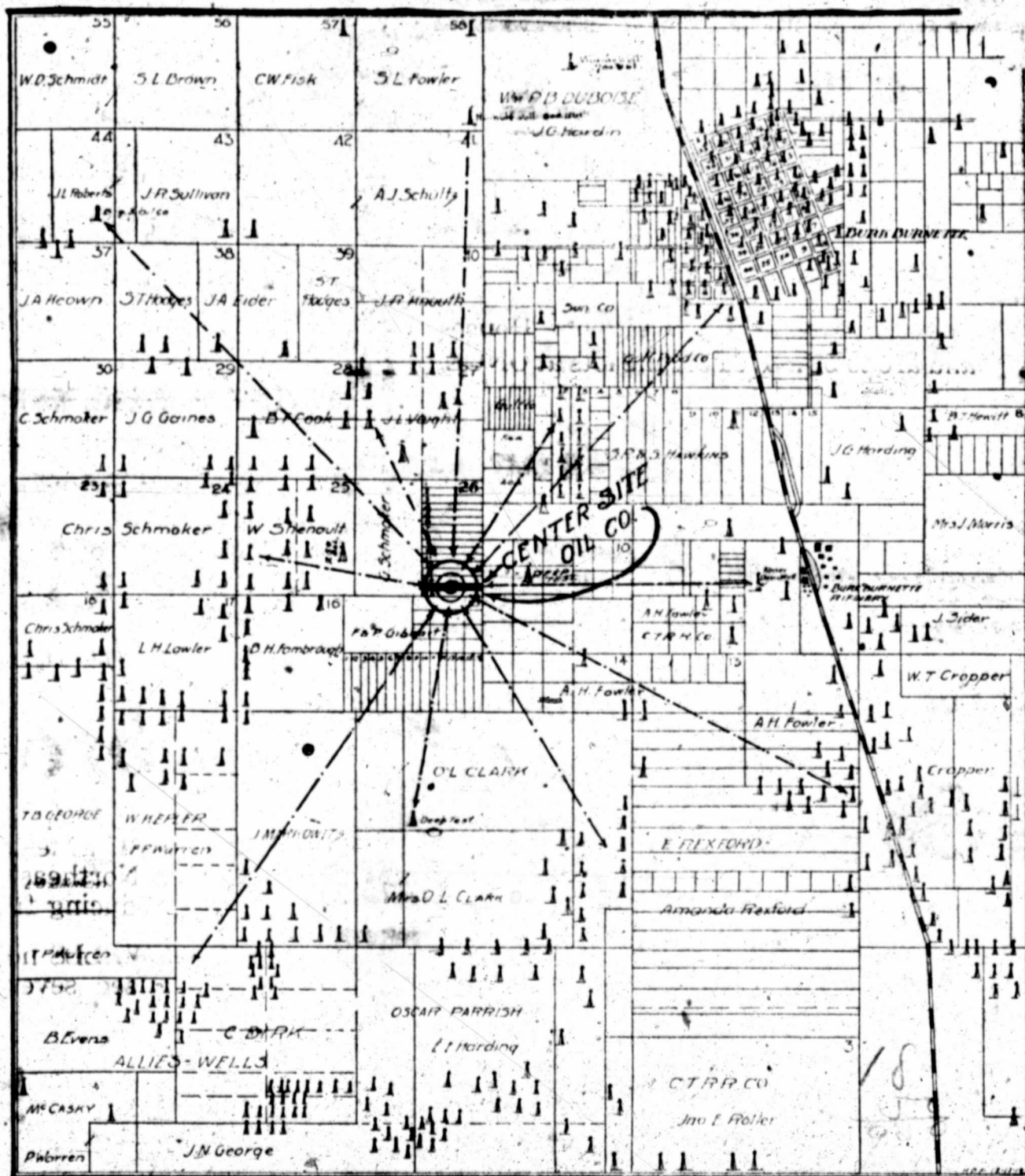

# OIL DEVELOPMENT

## OKLAHOMANS PLAN TO DRILL 25 TEST WELLS IN TEXAS

Special to The Times. SAN ANGELO, TEX., March 26.—The announcement that an Oklahoma oil company has appropriated \$3,500,000 for the sinking of 25 deep test wells in wildcat fields in West Texas, preparations for resuming drilling at one well near San Angelo and the spudding in of two others, one near Carlsbad and the other in Coke county, were features in oil development in this section last week.

T. M. Pulliam and Joseph A. Lipcomb, both of Tulsa, were in San Angelo Friday in the interest of the firm that will spend over three million dollars in operations west of Comanche county. They were in Miles and Ballinger counties.

The stage was set Monday for the resumption of drilling at the well of the Whiteside Oil & Gas Co. on the Door Key ranch, 16 miles south of town. A boiler was secured last week from the plant of the San Angelo Brick Manufacturing Co. and on Saturday had practically been bricked in. On Tuesday, three weeks ago, the 40-horsepower boiler blew up. The well now is 2,160 feet deep and indications for oil are said to be excellent.

The contract between the San Diego-Texas Oil Co. and T. J. Clegg provides that a well be spudded in on the Clegg ranch near Carlsbad by April 15. It is very likely, however, that work will be begun three weeks in advance of this date. William L. Frevort, president of the company, is now here from San Diego.

At the well of the Spellman Oil Co., of Dallas, on the Oscar Cain ranch, 2 1/4-inch casing has been lowered to the 2,535-foot level. An under-runner is due to arrive from Ohio and casing then will be set to 3,350 feet, where the limestone begins. Below that depth the hole is solid.

The Spellman company is now building a derrick on the Fayette Tankerley ranch, one mile east of Mertzon, on Possum hollow, a dry tributary of Spring creek, and drilling will likely begin within a week or ten days. H. M. Jones, who is superintending the Cain well, will be in charge.

Richardson No. 1, 12 miles southwest of Water Valley, in Sterling county, is being drilled by the Texas Petroleum Syndicate of Casper, Wyo., at about the 1800-foot level. This well, the first in Sterling county, from the standpoint of completeness in equipment, is considered one of the best in West Texas.

M. L. Ellis of Coleman on Saturday completed the rebuilding of the 34-foot derrick in Coke county for P. A. Bogue of Marion, Ind., and R. A. Purnett of Wichita, Kans., and the well likely will be spudded in with an 18- or 20-inch hole by April 1. A month ago a storm blew down the derrick just when the work was about to be started.

Negotiations between John W. Harris, representing the San Angelo Oil & Gas Co., and a North Texas man for the complete development of the 2465-foot well on the Harris place, three miles north of the city, were said Saturday to be on the verge of consummation.

The Wichita Falls Oil & Stock exchange, the oldest exchange in the city, is going out of business, and a deal is being closed today whereby the exchange rooms on Ohio avenue will be taken over by the Walkover Shoe company.

WHY COFFEE IS HIGHER There are several contributing reasons why coffee is higher. At the beginning of the war in Europe there was a large stock of coffee in Brazil—who produces eighty percent of the coffee of the World. Europe used two thirds of the World's coffee supply and America one third. After war was declared in Europe their markets were closed and America was Brazil's only outlet. So notwithstanding higher freight rates and production costs we were enabled to buy coffees at little advance over pre-war costs. After America entered the war the food administration restricted the importation of coffee and we were forced to use up the surplus usually carried here—and now Brazil is giving us just enough for our immediate wants—which together with the fact that Europe's Coffee pot was empty and must be replenished—puts Brazil in the saddle. Then the frosts last August so damaged the coffee trees that we are due to have a short crop for at least three years—so there seems no immediate prospect for cheaper coffee—YET COFFEE IS STILL THE CHEAPEST commodity that enters into human consumption—A pound makes thirty cups.
