

Kodiak, Alaska, Sept. 17, 1942

Dear Dad:

I suppose that by now Carmie has deceived a letter from me and you know where I am now. There is very little that I am permitted to tell you about the place, but I can tell you that it is much-yes, a darned lot-better than I was expecting. I had lots rather be here than in Norfolk, Va., and had about as soon be here as in Seattle ; however, both of those places are in the States and it wouldn't be nearly so much trouble to get to Friona if I were in either place.

I don't know whether there is any other way one can get to the States other than by boat, but if there is I sure hope they send me home that way. I've decided that I'm not much of a sailor. Boy, oh boy! I got sick on that boat ride up here. I've heard it said that a person has never been sick until he has been seasick. I sure believe it now. I thought I was going to die on that boat-didn't care much. I'm not completely over it yet. Once in a while I get a little dizzy and feel like I am still on the boat. It's all a joke about the fellows getting sick. I think about 90% of the fellows were sick, so we were all in the same fix.



Machinery Ration Board Sets Regular Meeting Schedule

The Parmer County Machinery Rationing Committee, consisting of Olan N. Schleuter, J. I. Gober, and Wilbur Charles, regular members, and Ford Welch, alternate member, met Saturday night, Sept. 25. At this meeting it was decided that Wednesday of each week from 2:00 P. M. until 5:00 P. M. would be the regular meeting date of theRationing Committee. The meeting place will be the AAA office in Farwell.

Under the machinery rationing regulations, farmers desiring to purchase any of the following equipment which is listed as Group A machinery are required to make application for a rationing certificate. If the committee approve the application. a permit for purchase of the machinery will be issued. Machinery classified in Group A includes beet lifters, beet loaders, combines, corn pickers, disc harrows, feed grinders, feriflizer spreaders, grain drills, grain elevators, hay balers, lime spreaders, manure spreaders, milk coolers, milking machines, pickup balers, potato diggers, shredders, tractors (including garden Tractors.)

Other machinery and equipment can be purchased by execuling certification of need with the dealer.
