WARSAW, Saturday, March 22.—"We have men and officers, but no uniforms, rifles, munitions or artillery," said General Pilsudski, provisional head of the Polish state...

CUMMINS HAS PLAN TO OPERATE THE RAILROADS

Favors Private Control Under Strict Government Supervision

SUBMITS A PROPOSAL

Idea Involves Three Suggestions As To the Best Course to Pursue

By Associated Press. WASHINGTON, I.A., March 27.—Private operation of railroads, "under strictest government control," was advocated by Albert H. Cummins, Iowa senior United States senator, in an address to the annual session of the legislature this afternoon.

Mr. Cummins who was the ranking republican member of the Senate interstate commerce committee in the last congress enumerated three principles previously cited by him, which he thought "should be accepted in the enactment of any fundamental legislation."

"I look upon transportation by rail ways as a governmental function," he continued, "whether the government has leased or operated the roads through a system of leases, or through the instrumentality of private corporations under public control, is entirely a matter of sound judgment and wise discretion."

The speaker cited figures to show the disparity in the earning capacity of the various railroads, "during 1915, 16, 17 ranging from a profit of a few to a net operating income of more than 10 per cent upon the investment."

"To increase rates so these weak roads, carry 25 per cent of the country's traffic, will become self-sustaining and able to finance themselves," he continued, "would give to the government which do 75 per cent of the business a volume which the commonest sense of justice forbids."

Referring to his first "principle," Senator Cummins said the return of capital invested should be guaranteed by the government as it highly desirable to remove for all time the demoralizing, corrupting struggle between the owners and representatives of railway property and the public.

In the third principle, that the railroads should be operated by private corporations rather than by the government, the senator said he favored this because "the government cannot operate the railroads either economically or efficiently."

ARRIVAL OF FOOD PUTS GERMANS IN BETTER HUMOR

BERLIN, Wednesday, March 26.—With the arrival of the first American food ship yesterday and the conference of German financial experts at Weimar today, preparatory to going to Versailles Sunday, Germany seems to feel that peace is nearer than at any other time. The feeling of depression which had been growing in every part of the country at the continued disorders and the increasing spasmic riots, faded at least slightly at the news that concrete results finally were at hand after much waiting. Peace has been long in coming, the blockade has been tight and the food relief has been slow in arriving so that in many sections of Germany there was a feeling almost akin to despair.

GERMAN MERCHANT SHIPS IN SEAWORTHY CONDITION

By Associated Press. PARIS, Tuesday, March 26.—The supreme economic council reports that the 38 German ships that have left German ports to be turned over to the Allied and associated powers are generally in a seaworthy condition. The vessels to be under British control are on their way to Liverpool, while those apportioned to the United States are sailing for Brest and Cherbourg. None of the ships is of less than 2,500 tons capacity. The larger ships will be used to repatriate American and Australian troops. The condition of the arrangement having been complied with, instructions have been issued to release foodstuffs for Germany which have been held up at Rotterdam. It is not expected the German vessels will land food in Germany before late in May, on their return trip from America.

SEEK TO ESTABLISH 48-HOUR WORKING WEEK IN ENGLAND

By Associated Press. LONDON, Wednesday, March 26.—Recommendations that a legal maximum working week of 48 hours, subject to variations in proper cases, with adequate safeguards be established that systematic overtime be discouraged and that legal time wage rates of universal applicability be fixed are made in the report of a committee appointed by the industrial conference which met in February at the request of Premier Lloyd George. The committee was charged with duty of considering the causes of labor unrest and inquiring into the question of wages and hours and was made up of sixty members evenly divided between the employers and representatives of trade unions. It is suggested that agreements for minimum time rates should be reached between employers and trades unions to be applicable to all employees in the same trade that the basis for negotiations between employers and workmen should be a full and frank acceptance of employees' organization as recognized organization to speak and act in behalf of their members and that all workmen should accept the jurisdiction of their respective organizations.

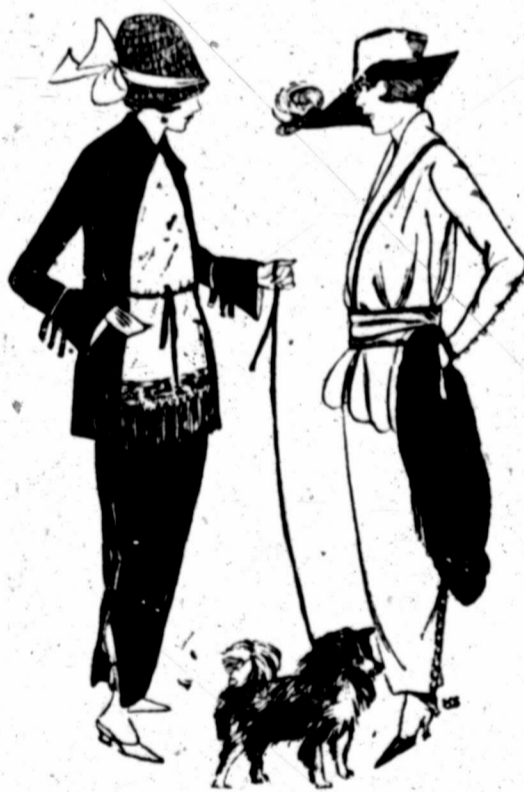

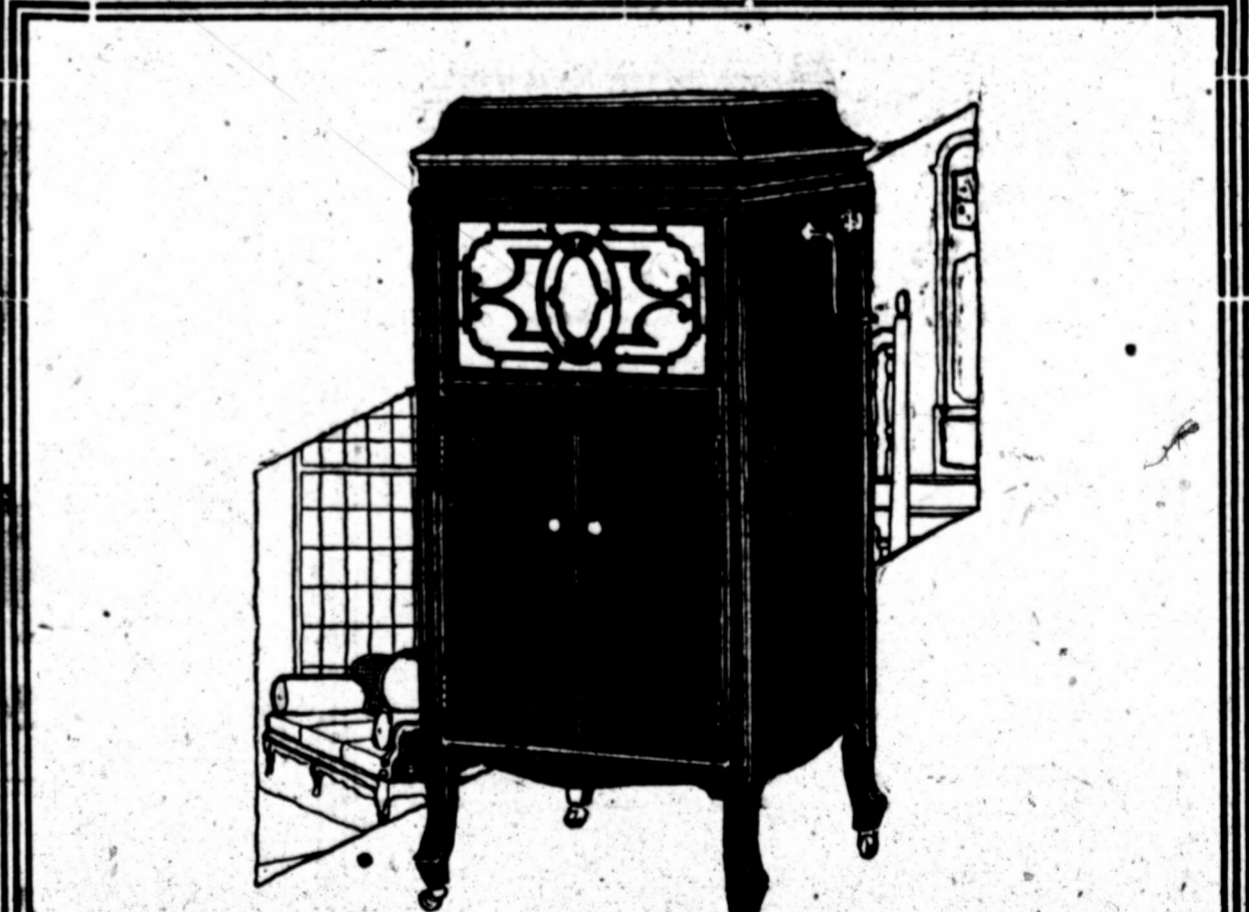

SUBSCRIPTIONS TO PARK ASSOCIATION VERY ENCOURAGING

MORE THAN \$3,000 IS PLEDGED SINCE MEETING HELD YESTERDAY MORNING.

PLAN TO PURCHASE ACREAGE

Number of Leading Business Men Have Interested Themselves in the Proposition.

More than \$3,000 was pledged this morning in subscriptions to the stock of the Wichita Falls Park association, organized at a meeting held yesterday in the Chamber of Commerce for the purpose of obtaining in this city an amusement and recreation park as a site for baseball, stock and poultry shows, circus attractions, carnivals and chautauquas. There is even a fighting chance that Wichita Falls may obtain a franchise in the Texas League before the summer is ended, and financial backing of a Class A ball club in this city was definitely promised today.

The present plans of the park association embrace the purchase of six acres from the acreage owned by Mayor Marlow on East Seventh street, across the railroad tracks; the grading and fencing of the six acres; the construction of a grandstand to cost \$10,000, and the laying of a first class ball field. Inasmuch as no more than four acres approximately will be required for the ball field, space will be available for other amusement enterprises, and there is every reason to believe the association will continue on a paying basis from the outset. In the past the only serious drawback to baseball in this city has been the distant location of the park, and there is no reason to believe that baseball will not pay if a park is so located that it can be reached in a short walk from the heart of the city; and the income to be derived from leasing the park to carnivals, shows, circuses, chautauquas and other amusement enterprises, plus the fact that stockholders will own the acreage, should make the association advantageous from the investment viewpoint.

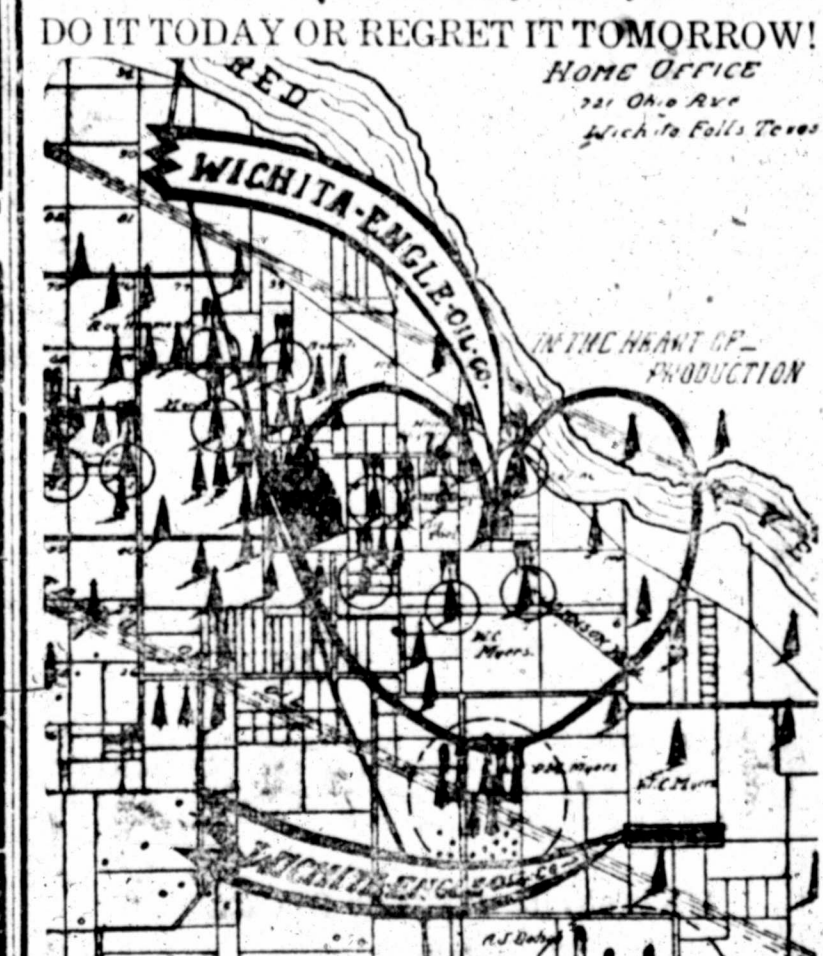

The market showed continued firmness during the early afternoon on further complaints of delayed farm work, Liverpool buying and covering which came largely from houses with Wall street connections. 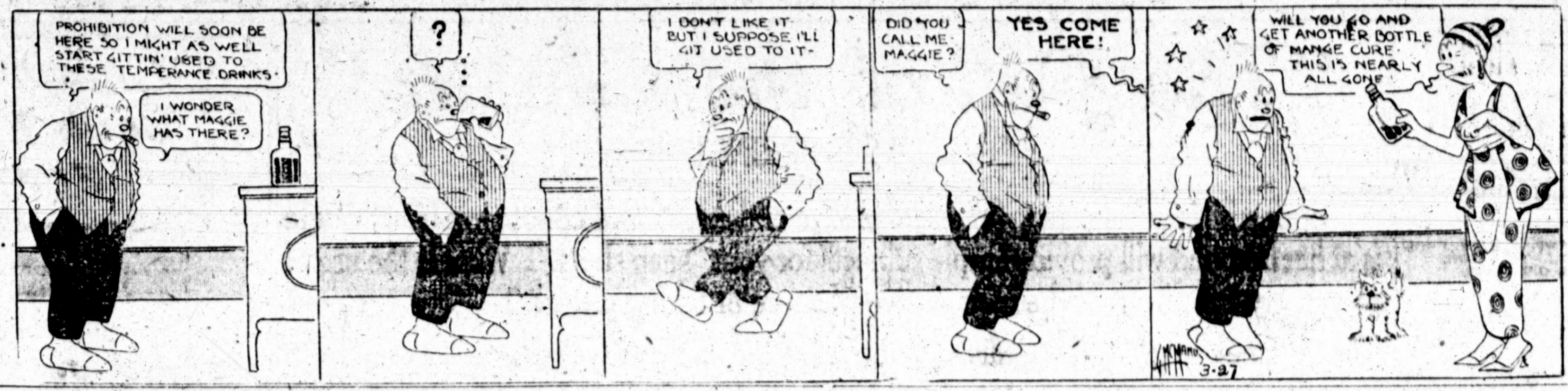

THREE TIMES AS MUCH WHEAT AS IN MARCH 1918

WASHINGTON, March 27.—Commercial stocks of wheat were three times as large on March 1 as a year ago, the department of agriculture estimated today on the basis of reports received from nearly 12,000 elevators, warehouses, grain mills and wholesalers. The total reported amounted to 197,277,000 bushels, which is 308 per cent of the 1918 stocks. Wheat held on farms and by many other commercial dealers is not included. Commercial stocks of rye were four times as large as a year ago, while more oats and barley also were on hand. The amount of corn held by the reporting firms was only 82 per cent of the amount given in 1918.

CORRESPONDENCE OF FORMER EMPEROR IS BEING MADE PUBLIC

COPENHAGEN, March 27.—The Deutsche Zeitung of Berlin has published a number of letters illustrating the attitude of the German emperor and the Crown Prince during the fateful days of last November, says a dispatch from the German capital. The emperor wrote to Frederick William November 9, the following: "My dear boy: After the court chamberlain informed me that it was impossible to guarantee my safety at main headquarters and that the troops were no longer trustworthy, I resolved, after a severe mental struggle, to leave my army, which had collapsed, and go to Holland. I advise you to stick to your post until the conclusion of an armistice. In Berlin two governments under the leadership of Ebert and Liebknecht are fighting against each other. I hope to see you again in happier times. Your fatherful, deeply afflicted father. (Signed) "Wilhelm." Request is Refused. The Crown Prince, on November 11, wrote to Premier Ebert asking permission to remain at his post so that he might bring his army back in a well disciplined and orderly manner. The government refused his request, whereupon the Crown Prince in a letter to Field Marshal Von Hindenburg, resigned his command, declaring that he acted under deep emotion and after a hard internal struggle against a course repugnant to his nature. In his letter the Crown Prince proceeded to justify his attitude against those representing him as a war instigator and reactionary. He declared he has always taken the standpoint

WHY COFFEE IS HIGHER

There are several contributing reasons why coffee is higher. At the beginning of the war in Europe there was a large stock of coffee in Brazil—who produces eighty percent of the coffee of the World. Europe used two thirds of the World's coffee supply and America one-third. After war was declared in Europe their markets were closed and America was Brazil's only outlet. So notwithstanding higher freight rates and production costs we were enabled to buy coffees at little advance over pre-war costs. After America entered the war the food administration restricted the importation of coffee and we were forced to use up the surplus usually carried here—and now Brazil is giving us just enough for our immediate wants—which together with the fact that Europe's coffee pot was empty and must be replenished—puts Brazil in the saddle. Then the frosts last August so damaged the coffee trees that we are due to have a short crop for at least three years—so there seems no immediate prospect for cheaper coffee—YET COFFEE IS STILL THE CHEAPEST commodity that enters into human consumption—A pound makes thirty cups.
