

ORDER INQUIRY INTO GRANT TO THE JAPANESE

United States Plans to Know More About Concession by Mexico

AMERICANS INVOLVED

Interested Also in Question of Japanese in Gaining Such a Foothold

WASHINGTON, March 31.—The American embassy at Mexico City was instructed today to make inquiries concerning the report that the Mexican government had granted agricultural concessions to Japanese in Lower California and to report the facts as quickly as possible.

No official information has reached the department about the concessions and surprise was occasioned by the dispatch from Mexico City yesterday quoting General Amador Aguirre, under secretary of development and agriculture, as saying they had been granted. The American government is interested both because of the apparent success of Japanese in obtaining a long sought foothold in Lower California and because the tract of land involved was donated to the Japanese by an American company, whose rights were declared forfeited by the Mexican government in 1917.

The land, valued at a million acres below the California border, was granted by the then President Diaz to the California and Mexican Land Company of Los Angeles.

When Diaz was deposed and the revolutionary period began, the American settlers were driven from the land by revolutionists. Limestone was stolen and several settlers were killed.

On April 10, 1917, the Mexican government declared the tract confiscated, according to General Aguirre, and then apparently the Mexican government opened negotiations with a Japanese syndicate.

Acting Secretary of State Phillips said today that the Los Angeles company proposed about two years ago to grant a Japanese corporation long term leases on a large portion, if not all of the tract.

When Senator Phelan of California recently informed the department that negotiations had been renewed, the company's attention was directed to the American government's attitude.

EUGENE V. DEBS IS DENIED REHEARING BY SUPREME COURT

WASHINGTON, March 31.—Eugene V. Debs' application for a re-hearing of his appeal from conviction was denied today by the supreme court.

In filing his motion for a re-hearing Debs, who claimed the court's opinion amounted to the trial of a person for an undisclosed "state of mind," that he had been denied the privilege of showing his motive in making the speech for which he was convicted and that the court had failed to decide all of the questions presented to it for review.

The prosecution resulted from statements made by Debs in a speech at Canton, Ohio, last June. The supreme court affirmed the conviction on March 10.

SPAIN IS ADOPTING DRASTIC MEASURES AGAINST STRIKERS

WASHINGTON, March 31.—Drastring measures adopted by the Spanish government against strikes were described in dispatch today to the state department. Guns from warships in the harbor have been mounted in Barcelona and a rigid newspaper censorship is maintained.

ATTORNEY GENERAL SUBMITS OPINION ON TEXT BOOK LAW

WASHINGTON, March 31.—The state superintendent of public instruction has no authority, under the free text book law, to supply any book not adopted and contracted for under the act of the thirty-fifth legislature, held the attorney general in an opinion today.

The opinion also held that it was the duty of the state superintendent to furnish all rights in granting the land, it will form a "little Japan" right on our borders.

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RANGER FORCE BILL IS SIGNED BY GOVERNOR

New Law Limits the Number And Increases the Pay of Men

OTHER BILLS SIGNED

Pipe Line and Oil Conservation Measures Are Included in List

AUSTIN, March 31.—The law reorganizing the state ranger force was signed by Governor Hobby today. The new regulations limit the force, except in cases of emergency, to seven hundred men and materially increase the salaries. More rigid restrictions for control of the men are also provided.

The Sterrett game law, which revises Texas game regulations to make them conform with those of the federal government and gives closer protection over game, was also signed by the governor today.

Provisions of other bills signed were: Providing that it shall be unlawful to sell after Jan. 1, 1920, a 2,000-pound capacity wagon with less than three-inch tires of a wagon of more than 4,000-pound capacity with less than four-inch tires; to prohibit waste of oil and gas in fields; providing that the state shall pay one-third of the value of cattle destroyed to eradicate cattle tuberculosis; providing compensation for assessing and collecting district taxes and limiting excess fees in counties of the state.

AMERICAN MAKES INQUIRY INTO ARREST OF KOREANS

TOKYO, Thursday, March 27.—The American consul general at Seoul made inquiry regarding the arrest of Koreans in the employ of Americans and charged with being connected with disturbances growing out of the independence movement in Korea.

THIRTEEN MEN ARE REPORTED ENTOMBED IN COLORADO MINE

TRINIDAD, COLO., March 31.—Thirteen men are reported entombed in the Empire mine of the Empire Coal Company near Agona, Colo., which was wrecked by an explosion of gas this morning.

Twenty-three out of 36 miners who were in the mine at the time of the explosion came out by a connecting shaft an hour after the explosion and reported that the men who had not been wrecked, was working and that conditions were good for the safety of the men entombed.

STRIKE SITUATION AT GERMAN MINES GROWING SERIOUS

COLOGNE, Saturday, March 29.—Reports from Essen and neighboring districts show a serious increase in the number of strikers among the coal miners. Today 30,000 men are out and 26 shafts are closed down.

The strike fever also is spreading to other fields. For instance, the Prussian-Hessian district of the Ruhr, which is the largest coal-producing district in Germany, has adopted a resolution threatening to cease work on all lines unless all their demands were conceded by April 10.

DISSOLUTION OF CORN PRODUCTS CO. ORDERED BY COURT

NEW YORK, March 31.—Dissolution of the Corn Products Refining Company, which is required to sell to competitors before 1920 all but three of its manufacturing plants, was ordered by Federal Judge Learned Hand today.

PARIS, March 31.—A small force of French troops stationed in the neutral zone between Hungary and Rumania has been attacked by Hungarian troops, 350 of the French being taken prisoner according to an official report received here.

PART OF A SCHOONER FOUND BY TRANSPORT ENROUTE FROM BREST

NEW YORK, March 31.—Part of an unidentified three-masted schooner, which apparently had been cut in two by the transport Mau, which docked here today from Brest with troops from the United States, was found by the Mau's navigating officer, and 18 men of the crew, launched a life boat and battled its way through the storm and heavy seas to the rail of the transport. The distress signal was still flying and a broken lifeboat was lashed to the deck house. It was assumed the crew had been washed overboard.

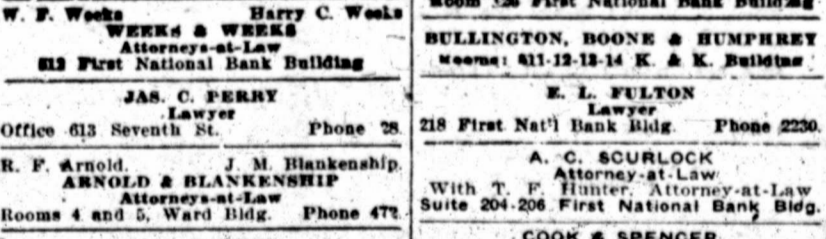

LOANS GOVERNMENT MONEY SECURED AS ROYALTY FROM OIL

Mrs. Cora B. Snyder, of Harkbarnett, made the record purchase of War Savings Stamps last week, R. E. Shepherd the chairman announced today. Mrs. Snyder bought the stamps for her two children, John and Lottie, and it represents an investment of some of her royalty money. For some years Mrs. Snyder, who is a widow, Mr. Shepherd states, has been making a living for herself and children, and like others who have benefited by the discovery of oil, found it hard sledding sometimes. However, since her "ship came in" she is giving the government the benefit of her good fortune, and is lending it some of her money, and incidentally making a good investment for her children. Mr. Shepherd considers that Mrs. Snyder's example might well be followed by others, as the Wichita county quota for 1919 War Savings Stamps has scarcely been started on, by sales to this date. Mrs. Lee, the woman's chairman, is keeping up the work with the schools, and in the War Savings Banks office has been sending out cards to those who made pledges in 1918 and paid them, asking them to renew their pledges, and in cases where the pledge in part remains unpaid the individual is asked to redeem the pledge in stamps of 1919 issue. The Eleven Federal district has a War Savings poster, "The War Saver," which contains news from the various War Savings Societies over the state, and in which there are many ideas of ways to save. New York's enthusiasm over the returned soldiers is beyond all description, said Mrs. Louise Salm, buyer for Baum and Gardner, who has just returned from New York, and who saw the parade of the Twenty-Seventh Division, which is said to have surpassed any parade of any description ever attempted in New York or any other part of the United States. Mrs. Salm characterized the parade as the most wonderful sight she had ever seen, and one which could never be forgotten. Five hundred thousand people were in New York from various parts of the country for the parade, according to figures gathered from the railroads, and the whole city was closed for the day and night, and the attention of all turned to the entertainment of the soldiers. Visitors to New York have the tragedy of the war brought to them in the most vivid manner, Mrs. Salm added, as here the wounded, maimed and blind soldiers are seen by the hundreds, as they are taken on airings from the various hospitals nearby. The West has not yet been touched with the realization of the after-effects of the war, as far as the return of the maimed men is concerned, as a wounded soldier is seldom seen, except where there are large recuperative hospitals, and even then the worst cases are not sent to the west. Organizations are doing their utmost for the returned soldier, Mrs. Salm stated, and New York is wide open to a man from overseas regardless of where he came from originally.

ASSOCIATIONS AND STOCK COMPANIES SUBJECT TO TAX

J. A. Calloway, a representative of the internal revenue department of the federal government, will be stationed at the City National bank for the next 10 or 15 days to assist corporations who made tentative returns before March 1 to complete these returns. Mr. Calloway says the new income tax law distinctly makes joint stock associations, such as a majority of the oil companies in operation here, liable for income tax and that they must file a report. Mr. Calloway has furnished a quotation from paragraph 7 of the law relating to tax on corporations, which says: "The term 'corporation' includes associations, joint-stock companies." Section 220 says: (a) That in lieu of the taxes imposed by Section 17 of the revenue act of 1916 as amended by the revenue act of 1917 and by Section 8 of the revenue act of 1917, there shall be levied, collected, and paid for each taxable year upon the net income of every corporation.

ABLE REPUBLICAN DEFENDS LEAGUE OF NATIONS.

Elihu Root has expressed his approval of a league of nations. He has given his approval in a letter addressed to Will H. Hays, republican national chairman. Mr. Root cites the efforts of the Grant, Arthur, Harrison, Cleveland, McKinley, Roosevelt and Taft administrations to advance the cause of arbitration and said that he could not, without protest, "see the judgment of these American statesmen, concurred in by generations of the wisest and best of our Allies, thus held for naught." He doubtless referred to the opposition of Senators Reed, Lodge and others who have been so loud in opposition to President Wilson's efforts.

Senator Root is regarded as one of the ablest men in America. His voice ought to have weight with the leaders in the republican party and save them from the error of making the league of nations a partisan issue and getting on the wrong side of the issue. The professionals in the republican party backed by the party press have seized upon the league of nations sponsored by the president as offering a point of attack. They have already gone a long way toward committing the party to opposition to the league. Unless big, broad-visioned men like Root speak out now these professionals and the party press will raise such a clamor as the republicans and some democrats in the Senate will mistake for the voice of the people and will prevent the ratification of a treaty of peace embracing provision for a league of nations. This would be disastrous for the world and for our country.

The great majority of the people will look on with equanimity and see republicans commit themselves to error in opposition to the league of nations. But if the party falls into this error its representatives have a majority in the United States senate, which might prevent the ratification of the peace treaty.

Senator Root's expression is therefore vastly more important than merely a piece of political counsel.

RUSSIA SHOULD HAVE RELIEF.

If anybody in Paris, London or Washington has proposed any measures that offer any promise of real relief for the Russian situation they have failed to receive attention.

The allies are apparently standing back and permitting a people who made greater sacrifices in lives than any other in the world war, to be murdered by the thousands and countless other thousands starved and outraged. The French revolution and the Armenian massacres are mild in comparison to what is happening in Russia. If reports are being believed, and there are good reasons for believing that the half cannot be told. The Times has faith in President Wilson, David Lloyd George and other allied leaders. It cannot believe that they have no plan for tangible and immediate relief for Russia. But what is it?

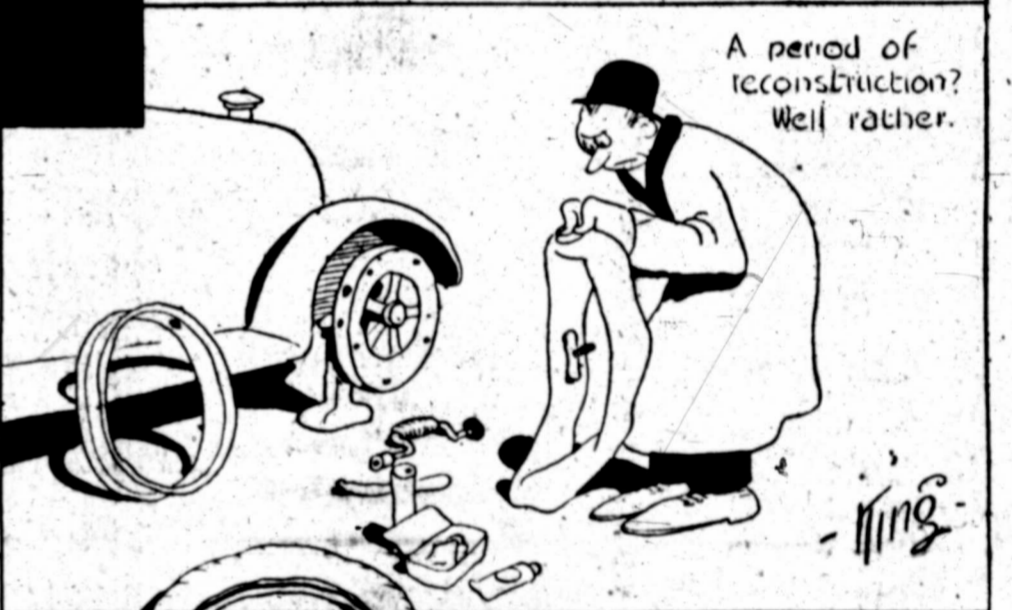
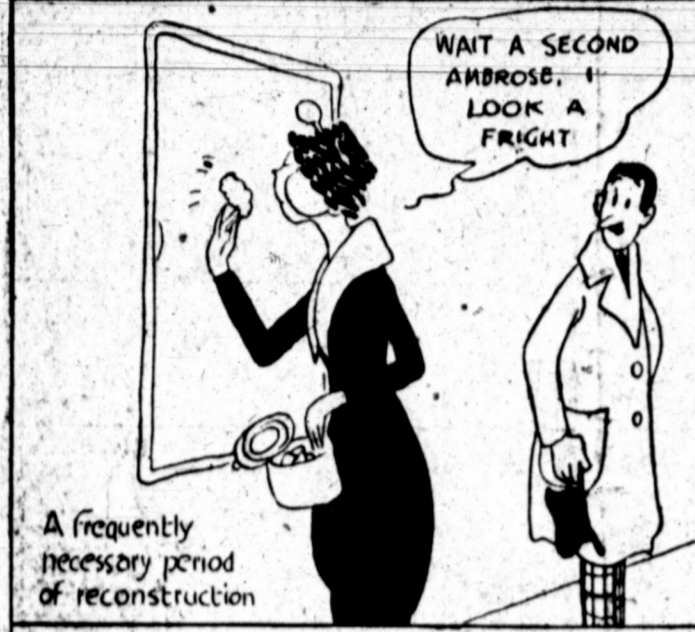

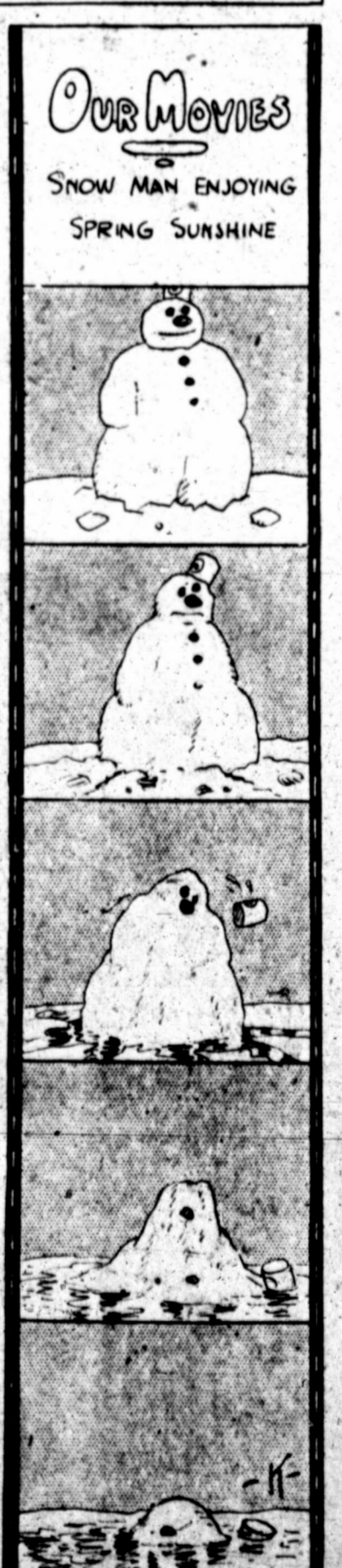

Snow and rain added to their troubles, and the government's action in putting motor lorries on the streets as a free mode of transport was very deeply appreciated by the public. The lorries ran from the suburbs to central points in the city and the neighborhood and served to relieve the pressure on the already overworked omnibuses and tram services.

RECORD IS BROKEN FOR AMENDMENTS PROPOSED

By Associated Press
AUSTIN, TEX., Mar. 31.—The record of twenty years in the number of constitutional amendments submitted to the voters was broken by the 36th session of the Texas Legislature.

Twelve resolutions proposing constitutional amendments were adopted, and in addition the people will vote upon whether or not a constitutional convention shall be called.

Four of the proposed amendments will be voted upon May 24, 1919. They are: Woman suffrage, prohibition, increasing the Governor's salary from \$4,000 to \$10,000 a year, and the extending of state credit for the purchase of homesteads.

Eight are to be voted upon November 4, 1919. They are: Abolishing of the fee system in payment of public officials, issuing by the state of \$15,000,000 in road bonds, allowing Galveston to issue \$5,000,000 in bonds for grade raising and seawall extension, divorcement of the University of Texas and the A. & M. College; raising the tax levied for Confederate pensions from five to seven cents on the \$100, removing the fifty-cent on the \$100 tax limit for school purposes, and allowing counties, cities and towns to levy 35c on the \$100 for city and county improvements and 30c for roads and bridges.

The calling of the constitutional convention is also to be voted upon November 4.

MINE WORKERS WILL NOT PARTICIPATE IN STRIKE FOR MOONEY

INDIANAPOLIS, IND., March 31.—The United Mine Workers of America will not participate in any general strike on July 4 in behalf of Thomas Mooney convicted of complicity in a bomb explosion in San Francisco in a preparedness day parade. Announcement that the executive board of the mine workers had decided against participation in such a strike was made here today through the United Mine Workers' Journal, the official publication of their union.

The executive board says that the convention of the international workers' defense league of San Francisco, held in Chicago, which issued the strike call, was not authorized by the American labor movement through the American Federation of Labor and the International Union of the United Mine Workers was not represented officially at the convention and is not bound by the action taken there. The membership of the mine workers organization can not participate in any such strike without violating the fundamental laws governing the union line abrogating the joint wage agreement under which miners now are working, the executive committee said.

GERMAN-AUSTRIA RAILROAD STRIKE NOT YET SETTLED

By Associated Press.
BRIS, March 31.—Reports that the railroad strike in German Austria has been settled are untrue, according to a Vienna dispatch to the Echo de Paris which was forwarded by way of Genoa. Negotiations between the strikers and Herr Renner, the chancellor, and Herr Deutsch, secretary for military affairs, have failed and the strike continues on the eastern and southern railroads, it is said.

Colonel Gary, of the British army, who is at Trieste, has offered to act as arbitrator but the strikers have been destroying railroad property and stopping the transportation of food. A council of railroad workers has been formed in Styria.

Chancellor Renner has implored the strikers to moderate their demands, pointing out that in case of complications, the entire troops will occupy the country. Employees of the western section of the Franz Joseph railroad have joined in the strike which prevails on the northern and northwestern systems. A British representative at Vienna is reported to have issued a proclamation to the public exhorting the people not to interrupt the movement of food supplies. The situation is reported to still be grave.

BELGIUM IS HAVING TROUBLE EXPPELLING ENEMY POPULATION

Associated Press Mail Correspondent.
BRUSSELS, March 31.—Despite the passing of a law providing for the expulsion of enemy subjects from Belgium, numerous German civilians are often seen walking the streets of this city and other large cities in Belgium at the present time. While the law went into effect more than a month ago, the Belgian government is experiencing as much difficulty in getting the enemy civilians out of the country as the allied soldiers had in expelling the enemy army from the trenches.

The Minister of Justice has found the undertaking a greater one than he had expected. In the Belgian Chamber yesterday, Deputy Lemonnier, who acted as Burgomaster of Brussels during the enforced absence of Burgomaster Max in Prussia last year until he was removed himself to Germany, asked Minister of Justice Vandervelde what measures he intended taking to expedite the undesirable beyond the Rhine. Deputy Lemonnier brought the minister's attention to the fact that several Germans were walking the streets of Brussels with impunity and that some of them had been recognized as being paid agents of the Kommandantur during the occupation.

Ministry Doing its Utmost.
Vandervelde said: "The Ministry of Justice is doing its utmost to rid the country of German civilians but the difficulties encountered are formidable. In times of peace undesirable are escorted to their frontier but since the signing of the armistice, the Allied Staff has refused absolutely to allow Germans to pass through the zone of occupation. Holland permits them to go through their country but not singly. Groups only are allowed in transit. At the present time one train of undesirable is being sent daily. Beginning February 23, two trains will leave for Holland daily carrying an average of 1200 Germans every day from Belgium.

An idea of the number of Germans in Belgium before the war and the still greater number who have elected to make it during the occu-

patation what they thought would be their permanent living place, may be gathered from the fact that trains are expected to leave for weeks and perhaps for months.

The case of German subjects who have resided in Belgium for long years, have married Belgian women and whose sons have fought against the Germans is particularly sad. Under the terms of the law they should be expelled along with the others as they have remained enemy. Vandervelde said however: "It is impossible for me to send that class of Germans out of the country."

AUSTRALIANS LEARN TO APPRECIATE THE AMERICAN SOLDIER

SYDNEY, AUSTRALIA, Mar.—Australians have learned to appreciate the value of the American soldier in the World War, according to the late Lieutenant Cecil Healy, of the Australian Expeditionary Force, an international swimming champion, killed last summer in France. Lieutenant Healy was one of the best swimmers in the world over the long and middle distance courses, competed at the Olympic games in Stockholm, in a letter to a friend he said:

"Until America arranged herself definitely on our side, I entertained strong misgivings as to what the ultimate issue would be, but when the United States declared war, the Teutons chances of obtaining world domination vanished forever in my estimation. I at once ventured to prophesy amongst my coteries of friends that it would be Yankee brains, Yankee wealth and resources alone that would enable us to stave off defeat.

"To any group of soldiers that I happened to come upon in our camp that were discussing the Yankees, I told that I had made one of a bunch of athletes who left Australia to compete against Americans at the Olympic Games. We were convinced, I assured them, that the Yanks were all talk as was supposed. But I explained that after we had had an opportunity of seeing for ourselves what they could do in the way of organization, and had seen evidence of their shrewd and business-like systems, and observed the fact that they were equipped with everything that brains could suggest and money buy; and moreover, had met them as men to man (in most instances receiving a sound trouncing at their hands) we began to regard them highly.

"Ultimately we returned to Australia with the firm impression that the Yank was about as worthy an adversary as would be met within any hemisphere." Lieutenant Healy was killed in the Australians' capture of Mont St. Quentin.

CANADIAN AVIATOR TO ENTER FLIGHT CONTEST

HALIFAX, N. S., March 31.—Colonel Ray Collishaw, a Canadian aviator, sailed on the steamer Olympic for England today to bring back an airplane with which to enter the transatlantic contest. He will attempt his flight from New Foundland early in May, accompanied by Major McKeever and a wireless operator.

Colonel Collishaw expects to accomplish the flight in 20 hours. His machine will be equipped with five motors of 400 horse power each, capable of carrying 30 people and remaining in the air for 30 hours.

The work of seeking the resting places of American heroes is being undertaken by the section of graves registration, which is directing its efforts so as to be able to designate the grave of every American should congress authorize the return of the bodies of the fallen.

tireless search for identification tags marks the task of the American graves registration section. They set out on their solemn mission equipped with pick, shovel and gas masks. Some times they pry down into the ground for the identity of the dead warrior; sometimes they ferret into the recesses of discarded dugouts and sometimes they clear away the brush of the forest to find some trace of the victims of battle.

Each cemetery where Americans have been buried is fully plotted on maps. The graves registration service is now extending every energy to complete the burying, marking, recording and classifying of the heroic Americans.

**TEXAS TWELFTH IN
WAR STAMP SALES
DURING JANUARY**

DALLAS, March 31.—Texas ranked twelfth of all the states in the union for sales of War Savings Stamps in January, according to official figures just received from Washington by Frank M. Smith, Federal District Director of the War Loan Organization. The states are ranked on a per capita basis, the Texas sales being 25 cents a person, a total of \$3,592,943.77. With the exception of North Carolina, Texas is ahead of every Southern state on the per capita basis. Other states portions of which are in the Eleventh Federal War Savings District, made the following records for January: Louisiana, \$793,128.34, or 42 cents per capita; Oklahoma, \$1,021,349.23, or 41 cents per capita; New Mexico, \$139,720.75, or 31 cents per capita.

Vermont led all states in the January report. Other states ahead of Texas on January sales were Montana, Utah, North Carolina, Idaho, South Dakota, Oregon, Colorado, Maine, Ohio and Iowa. With the exception of Ohio, all the larger states of the union were below Texas on the list.

Since the January report was compiled, the Eleventh District organization has made rapid strides and M. C. Smith is confident that Texas and the portions of Louisiana, Oklahoma and New Mexico in this district, will all show up even better in the months to come.

**SEAL FISHING FLEET
HAS LITTLE SUCCESS**

**COTTON PROFITS LESS
BY WAR CONDITIONS
THAN ANY GREAT CROP**

Special to The Times.
DALLAS, March 21.—"Considering the cost of production, cotton has profited less by war conditions than any other great crop," said Judge W. F. Ramsey, Federal Reserve Agent of the eleventh Federal Reserve District, in an address on "Making a Profitable Cotton Crop This Year," at the annual meeting of the Texas Industrial Congress.

"But for governmental regulations," declared Judge Ramsey, "which have prevented a free movement of cotton, prices would have been far greater than those which have prevailed for months, but it is folly to produce a cotton crop which the world is unable to buy, or the trade to absorb. Why should the farmer plant his fields to cotton, to a normal extent this year, when he is unable to secure a living price for what he raised last year?"

"In reducing the cotton acreage we are doing the world and the cotton trade no injustice, but are merely securing for ourselves a fair profit for our labor, and for both, increased food production."

"More than 4,000,000 bales of cotton,

which the world has not needed, and for which there is now no demand, have been carried over. This is more than one-third of the average cotton production of the country during the last three years. With this carry-over it seems inconceivable that the South will deliberately produce another bumper crop this year. Everyone understands the unsettled condition of trade in the old world; everyone must know the inability of European nations to take cotton freely, and that the consumption of cotton must from necessity be greatly restricted.

"The manufacturing regions of northern France and of all Belgium have been practically destroyed, and it will be many months before these looms can be operated. With Germany's trade and commerce gone, with the nation facing bankruptcy, and with the indisposition of the people of the world to take the output of her factories, Germany cannot possibly take or use cotton on the large scale of former years. In England labor conditions are unsettled and promises to become more acute. The men and women of Europe can postpone buying cotton goods until next week or next month, but they cannot put off the purchase of food supplies for a day."

"All of these considerations indicate a very restricted use of cotton goods, if we raise only the amount of cotton which can be profitably consumed, then we may look for fair prices, but it will not profit us to raise 15,000,000 bales this year with a drop in price below the cost of production, with bankruptcy and a prostration of the entire credit structure of the South as an inevitable result.

"We have thought and dreamed of cotton and cotton prosperity all our lives. We have declined to diversify our production. What we now need to do is to plant and cultivate every acre of tillable land, not all of it in cotton, but to a considerable extent in food and feed crops. The average farmer will find it just as profitable to diversify his crops."

MAER APPOINTED CHAIRMAN JEWISH WAR FUND DRIVE

W. Newton Maer has accepted the chairmanship of the Campaign for the Jewish War Relief Fund for Wichita county, and W. S. Curlee has accepted the post of treasurer for the drive. Joe Art, local member of the state committee, secured the promise of these two prominent men to serve in the campaign which begins April 7 and continues through April 12.

Thirty thousand dollars is expected from Wichita Falls and Wichita county, Mr. Art states, according to information he has received from the Sanger, the state chairman. An organization, similar to that used in previous drives for war funds, will be effected within the next week to raise the money in a systematic manner.

Governor Hobby has been asked to issue a proclamation requesting the general observance of the week beginning April 7, as Jewish War Relief week, according to Mr. Sanger. He also states that every minister in the state will be asked to read the proclamation from his pulpit on April 7. "Census" quota in relief work has been set at \$500,000.

IRRIGATION TO BE SUBJECT OF MEETING DURING THIS WEEK

Wichita Falls participation in the Wichita Valley Irrigation Project will be decided upon at a meeting to be called some time this week, according to J. A. Kemp, of this local preliminary organization committee. The date of the mass meeting will be announced as soon as V. L. Sullivan, the engineer of the project, informs the committee when he will be able to be present. Judge J. A. Kemp, who took a prominent part in the organization of the Pecos Valley Project, will accompany Mr. Sullivan, and will give his assistance in the organization.

Whether or not Wichita Falls will enter the project for the purpose of having the irrigation system furnish the water for use by the city will be discussed at length and action taken at the organization meeting. Mr. Sullivan stated in his preliminary report that the irrigation system could in addition to irrigating the big district mapped out, furnish an adequate water supply for a city many times the size of Wichita Falls, using the present water works system.


