DALLAS, TEX., April 8.—The Rev. Robert Cook Buckner, evangelist, au-hor and founder of Buckner's orphan nome here, died today, aged eighty six years. Dr. Buckner, minister of the gospel, evangelist, philanthropist, editor, business man and founder of the Buckner Orphan's Home of Dallas, was born at Madisonville, Tennessee, January 3, 1833. His father, Rev. Dan-iel Buckner, was a minister of the Paptist church, and it was under his influence that the youthful Robert Buckner inculcated his love of the

The Buckner Orphan's Home was ounded in Dallas in 1873. The first collection taken for this purpose amounting to only \$16, was taken at a convention of the Texas Baptist conference at Paris, shortly previous o the founding of the home. Since hat time the home has been added o constantly. At the present time t is one of the best equipped institutions of its kind in the South, having its own museum, separate dorming.

THREE THOUSAND REVENUE AGENTS

WASHINGTON, April. 9.—Three thousand internal revenue agents working in specially arranged zones throughout the United States will enthroughout the United States will enforce prohibition after July 1, according to plans announced today by the revenue bureau. Nerally 800 inspectors will be trained for the work to be added to the force of 2,283 revenue agents already available for police regulations and the machinery for enforcement will be in working order. agents already available for police

Work on the construction of the grandstand and the fence around the eight-acre park will be started at once, a baseball field will be laid out and decisive, important steps will be taken to complete within four blocks of the heart of the city a first-class amusement and athletic playground J. A. Kemp, U. P. Taylor, A. L. Huey, Miles O'Reilly, R. O. Harvey, W. Newton Maer, F. G. Swanson and Porter A. Total of \$22,500 Raised.

Up to date the committee has raised \$22,500 through the sale of stock in \$22,500 through the sale of stock in the new association, which was orig-inally incorporated at \$50,000 with the purpose of purchasing the entire 47 acres of the Marlow tract. As the larger plan proved impracticable at this time, the committee decided to obtain an acreage sufficient to guar-antee a good ball field, and leave ad-ditional space for circus grounds, chau-taugua meetings, round-up shows. tauqua meetings, round-up shows, carnivals and other amusement en-

terprises Mayor Marlow has agreed to let the association select eight acres from any portion of the tract most advanany portion of the tract most advantageous, the price being fixed at \$12,500. Huey, Taylor, Whaley and Lloyd Weaver, as a committee from the board of directors of the association, will make the selection tomorrow, and the contract for the building of the fence and grandstand will be let immediately. mediately.

The plans for the grandstand call for a stand that will seat 1,300 per-sons, with boxes seating 200 more, About \$1,000 worth of new lumber only will be needed, as the association has obtained at a very low figure the salvage of the old grandstand at the Wichita Lake baseball park. The stand will be constructed strongly throughout with 2x12 braces, and 8x8-uprights, bolted, no nails being used in the foundation work.

GREAT BRITAIN DOES NOT WAIT FOR ACTION BY MEXICAN CONGRESS

By Associated Press.

WASHINGTON, April 9.—The recent purchase by the British government of oil-properties in Mexico has been confirmed in official dispatches and it was learned that officials of the state department were much in-terested in the situation because of the apparent establishment by Great Britain of a new policy of outright ownership vested in the government of oil properties.

Great Britain, it was said today, had

not waited for action by the Mexican courts or by the new congress called to meet May 1, but had purchased the interests of her nationals which were involved in the question. These are the same properties involved in the dispute that led to the dispatch by the British, French and United States governments protesting against the "confiscatory" features of the Mexican constitution. This action was said by a high official today to indicate that England does not intend that the property acquired by British subjects in good faith and under the existing laws of Mexico at the time the interests were acquired, shall be "confiscated." Great Britain, this official said, is trying to secure all the availinterests of her nationals which were said, is trying to secure all the available oil producing lands throughout the world to insure carrying trade for her merchant marine and chear fuel for her navy and commercial ves

The British now-own about twenty per cent of the proved oil producing properties of Mexico, including the Cowdray and Dutch Shell interests,
