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Sweeps Oklahoma And North Texas

DALLAS, TEX., April 9.—Reports of fifteen deaths, many which had been confirmed, were received here today in fragmentary dispatches which told of a storm of unusual severity which passed over northern Texas and southern Oklahoma last night. The storm did great damage to telephone and telegraph wire and up to noon today it had been impossible to gather many details of damage done nor to verify the extent of deaths caused.

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15-Inch Snow on Denver

By Associated Press. CHILDRESS, TEX., April 9.—Traffic with all the Panhandle railroads is blocked today with the heaviest snow-storm of the year. From Cleardon north into Colorado 15 inches of snow covers the ground. The Denver and Fort Worth road has three trains in the snow at Amarillo. The turntable is filled and engines can not be taken out of the round house. A heavy wind is blowing and driving the snow so it will probably be twelve or eighteen inches deep here. From Cleardon north into Colorado south to Childress heavy rains fell last night and all creeks and rivers are bank full. The temperature is low and freezing weather is expected.

THREE THOUSAND REVENUE AGENTS TO WATCH BOOZE

WASHINGTON, April 9.—Three thousand internal revenue agents working in specially arranged zones throughout the United States will enforce prohibition after July 1, according to plans announced today by the revenue bureau. Nearly 800 inspectors will be trained for the work to be added to the force of 2,283 revenue agents already available for police regulations and the machinery for enforcement will be in working order before the date when absolute prohibition becomes effective.

This force of special agents will be distributed among the districts where law violation is threatened to the largest extent, and special attention will be paid to cities where revenue officials look for most persistent efforts to make whiskey illegally. In addition, the revenue authorities plan to cooperate with local police and to leave the great part of the enforcement work to these authorities in localities where the police appear efficient. Without such a plan, the force of only three thousand federal agents would be insufficient to police the entire country.

One aspect of liquor law violations has grown out of the hundreds of recipes for home manufacture of beer, ale, wines and even distilled liquors now being circulated in all parts of the country.

WORK HAS BEEN RESUMED ON A. & M. TARGET RANGE

By Associated Press. COLLEGE STATION, TEX., April 9.—Work has been resumed on the target range at the Texas A. & M. College, where the cadets will be given practice at target shooting at a range of 2,500 feet.

The range was begun nearly two years ago but owing to the scarcity of ammunition for the purpose, when every available shell was being used to fit soldiers for overseas duty or to furnish those in the front line trenches, construction on the range was abandoned.

Plenty of ammunition is available now however and the range will soon be ready for use.

PARK ASSOCIATION FOR WICHITA FALLS ORGANIZED TODAY

CAPITALIZATION FIXED AT \$25,000 AND A. L. HUEY IS ELECTED PRESIDENT

NAME BOARD OF DIRECTORS

Work on Construction of Grandstand and Fence Will Begin At Once.

A. L. Huey, prominent real estate man of this city, was elected president of the Wichita Falls Park Association this morning; a board of directors and other officers were named; the capitalization of the corporation was fixed at \$25,000; plans for a \$10,000 grandstand were approved and details were adjusted for the immediate purchase of eight acres of land from the Marlow tract on East Seventh street.

Work on the construction of the grandstand and the fence around the eight-acre park will be started at once, a baseball field will be laid out and decisive, important steps will be taken to complete within four blocks of the heart of the city a first-class amusement and athletic playground.

J. A. Kemp, P. Taylor, A. L. Huey, Miles O'Reilly, R. O. Harvey, W. Newton Maer, F. G. Swanson and Porter A. Whaley, composing the park committee of the Chamber of Commerce, "got down to brass tacks" this morning, destroyed earlier obstacles and took action that will bring positive results in a project that should prove of future value to the city.

Total of \$22,500 Raised.
Up to date the committee has raised \$22,500 through the sale of stock in the new association, which was originally incorporated at \$50,000 with the purpose of purchasing the entire 47 acres of the Marlow tract. As the larger plan proved impracticable at this time, the committee decided to obtain an acreage sufficient to guarantee a good ball field, and leave additional space for circus grounds, chauntauqua meetings, round-up shows, carnivals and other amusement enterprises.

Mayor Marlow has agreed to let the association select eight acres from any portion of the tract most advantageous, the park being fixed at \$12,500. Huey, Taylor, Whaley and Lloyd Weaver, as a committee from the board of directors of the association, will make the selection tomorrow, and the contract for the building of the fence and grandstand will be let immediately.

The plans for the grandstand call for a stand that will seat 1,300 persons, with boxes seating 200 more. About \$1,000 worth of new lumber only will be needed, as the association has obtained at a very low figure the salvage of the old grandstand at the Wichita Lake baseball park. The stand will be constructed strongly throughout, with 2x12 braces, and uprights, bolted, no nails being used in the foundation work.

CHAIRMAN BRITAIN IS SPEAKING AT LUNCHEON HELD TODAY.

CLUB PLEDGES ITS SUPPORT

Proposition Submitted to Bring Dallas Young Men's Chorus to the City.

The Wichita Club went on record at its luncheon today as pledging its support to the Fifth Liberty Loan and as standing ready to give its help to A. H. Britain, chairman for Wichita county in any manner possible.

Mr. Britain was called on to tell something of the plans for the drive. He said it was proposed to raise five million dollars; that four series of certificates would be issued which would appeal not only to the patriotism but to the commercialism of different classes of investors. While the rate of interest and other details had not been announced, it was understood that one series of certificates would appeal to the man who paid large salaries; this would be exempt from income taxes. Other series would appeal to other classes down to the small certificate bearing a comparatively high rate of interest for the man who paid no income tax at all.

He said that until the quota for the Eleventh federal reserve district was announced the quota for Wichita county would not be determined. R. E. Huff, following Mr. Britain, said that while Wichita county's quota had been raised with each succeeding bond issue because the people had done their part, this was a poor time to be doing it. Mr. Britain in his talk said that this was positively announced, that this would be the last loan.

Mr. Ardis, representing the Dallas Young Men's Male chorus proposed to bring the chorus to Wichita. He said that the chorus contained about 60 voices with soloists. He said the organization had undertaken to raise funds for a pipe organ in the Soldiers Memorial to be built at Dallas. The chorus would come to Wichita Falls for a guaranty of \$1,000. Upon a motion a committee was appointed to consider the proposal.

Bishop Moore of Dallas, a visitor at the luncheon, warmly endorsed the chorus. The bishop made a brief but much appreciated talk.

R. E. Johnson, chairman of the entertainment committee, announced that beginning next week some members of the club would be placed on the program for each week for the Soldiers Memorial.

BRING ON THE DOCTOR.

We have always been warned that one of the things to be feared in government ownership of railroads would be the tendency, believed inevitable, for political expediency to supplant sound business principles in the conduct and operation of the railroads.

We could almost wish that this were so. Wichita Falls has men who are not unacquainted with the ways of politics. If political influence had weight then Wichita Falls political influence might be exerted in securing better train service, both freight and passenger for Wichita Falls and to this entire section.

The present low estate of our train service cannot be laid at the door of government control either. It has been poor for years and has been growing worse and falling further and further short of any semblance of adequate service. On some of the branch lines pretending to give service in this section it is nothing short of a nuisance and an annoyance.

The submission of the nationwide prohibition amendment and its adoption into our national charter doesn't mean that the opinion of the people in this country is all one way on this question. In Chicago a few days ago "wet" and "dry" was placed on the ballot to determine the preferences of the voters. The majority expressing a "wet" preference, the good old kind including everything from whiskey and absinthe on down, was nearly two to one.

from their foundations at the site of the Victor Refining Company's plant about three and a half miles south of Burk Burnett. The damage to the houses, however, was slight and no one was injured. A number of tents were blown down and whipped to pieces.

A half hundred more derricks were blown down at Burk Burnett, of the ones untouched by the violent wind storm of Sunday night, which was the extent of additional damage at points in the county outside of Wichita Falls, according to telephone inquiries made of Burk Burnett, Electra and Iowa Park. All three places reported a heavy rain and wind and a violent electrical storm with resultant damage apparently negligible.

The wind again appears to have been stronger at Burk Burnett. At Electra no damage is reported (though the electric storm was accentuated there, and an inch of rain fell in a very short time. At Iowa Park, there was some wind, not a little rain and some little hail, but not enough to offer damage to the crops, according to information received from the office of the Iowa Park Herald. A hail storm as much feared by farmers at present, as it would do much damage to the wheat and other crops now up, and in splendid condition.

Market Report

COTTON MARKET

NEW YORK, April 9.—A continuation of yesterday's buying movement caused an opening advance of 8 to 30 points for new-style contracts in the cotton market here today. Steady cables and expectations of an unfavorable weekly weather report encouraged the advance but there was considerable reactionary sentiment and a renewal of scattered southern selling, which caused setbacks right after the call. May contracts sold off from 28.50 to 26.54 and October from 23.15 to 23.05 but offerings were held in check by the unfavorable showing of the weather map and the market showed a fairly steady, undertone, prices ruling some 4 to 15 points net higher during the early trading.

The weekly report of the weather bureau proved more bullish than expected and was the signal for realizing, but the market was firm during the middle of the morning on the unfavorable western forecast, with May selling at 26.55 and October 23.29, or 15 to 47 points above last night's closing figures. Offerings then increased and there were reactions which carried May off to 26.42 and October to 23.00 around mid-day.

The market was easier during the early afternoon under continued realizing and selling for a reaction. Spot interests were sellers of May against sales of later deliveries and that month was relatively weak, selling off to 25.80, or 70 points below last night's close. October declined to 22.65 or 27 points net lower.

Cotton closed barely steady.

New Orleans Cotton.

NEW ORLEANS, April 9.—Unfavorable weather in the belt and expectations of a better crop reports from the government put the price of cotton higher today in the first half hour of trading the new contracts rose eight to twenty-four points. Momentary sellers of May against sales of later deliveries and that month was off ten points at 25.10 but other positions were higher.

The trade considered that the crop returns from the government were even more unfavorable than expected and sufficient buying developed to put prices 24 to 42 points over yesterday's final. Realizing from the long side caused a reaction and at noon the advance amounted to only 5 to 18 points.

Cotton closed: Old steady at a decline of 24 to 25 points and new steady at a decline of 33 to 38 points.
