WASHINGTON, April 11.—Sailing of the transport Kaiserin Auguste Victoria from France with about 2,000 men including headquarters of the 14th field artillery brigade and the 14th field artillery complete, both of the 39th division (Louisiana, Arkansas and Mississippi national guards) was announced today by the war department. The vessel is due at New York April 18.

TRANSPORT ARRIVES AFTER LOSING PROPELLER

NEW YORK, April 10.—The transport Julia Luchenback carrying the 15th infantry complete and which reported by wireless she had lost a propeller at sea, arrived off Ambrose lightship today from Bordeaux.

SOCIALIZATION COMMITTEE OF GERMANY HAS RESIGNED

BERLIN, Wednesday, April 9.—The resignation of the whole socialization committee which has been rumored for some time was formally announced last night. This action was due, according to declarations made public in the Vorwaerts by Dr. Kautsky, independent socialist to the fact that from its birth, it had to combat obstructive tactics from the imperialist economic bureau; it was therefore unable, it is said, to make proper plans for the socialistic reconstruction of Germany.

NO APPROPRIATION FOR CONSTITUTIONAL CONVENTION CALL

AUSTIN, TEXAS, April 11.—No money has been appropriated to pay for the publishing of a proclamation calling the election to determine whether or not a constitutional convention shall be held, according to an opinion of the attorney general. A resolution adopted by the thirty-sixth legislature calls this election for the first Tuesday in November, at which time several constitutional amendments will be voted on, but the opinion is that there are no funds available for the calling of the election on the constitutional convention. It is expected that the matter will be strengthened out at the special session.

Order Release of More Than 10,000 of Enemy Aliens

WASHINGTON, April 11.—Putting into effect the policy of removing war time restrictions as far as possible on enemy aliens the department of justice has ordered the release from parole and cancellation of bonds of more than ten thousand of these aliens throughout the United States.

EMILIANO ZAPATA THE NOTED BANDIT HAS BEEN KILLED

MEXICO CITY, April 10.—(Thursday)—Emiliano Zapata, the bandit leader in southern Mexico has been killed, according to a news dispatch received here from Cuautlah, in the state of Morelos. The message says that a part of the fiftieth regiment serving under General Pablo Gonzalez of the Carranza army returned to Cuautlah, General Gonzalez' headquarters, tonight with the body of the rebel chief.

American and Russian Forces Rout Bolshevik

ARCHANGEL, April 10.—American and Russian forces yesterday afternoon routed the bolshevik position about Bolshole Ozerki, taking nine prisoners and two machine guns and destroying a block house.

TEXAS CHAMBER OF COMMERCE IN SESSION AT WACO

WACO, TEXAS, April 11.—The first annual meeting of the Texas chamber of commerce convened here this morning. President George W. Armstrong presiding. After calling the meeting to order, Mr. Armstrong in an address outlined the purposes of the order. Every commercial organization of importance in the state is represented.

SCHOOL BOND ELECTION IN CITY TOMORROW

Taxpayers of the Wichita Falls independent school district are to go to the polls tomorrow to vote on a school bond issue for \$100,000 additional school bonds. School finances have been discussed freely in the columns of the press and before various civic organizations and clubs, and everyone is familiar with the great need for money for the schools. Therefore the school board asks that every taxpayer come out and vote for the bonds. The board is confident that a majority will be secured for the bonds, but is anxious for as large a vote, and majority, as possible, as a large vote will make it easier to market the bonds.

BOLSHEVIKI STRIKE IN CITY OF ROME IS NOT A SUCCESS

ROME, Thursday, April 10.—The general strike of 24 hours called by the socialists for today in memory of the victims of "red week" in Berlin and also in honor of the birthday of Lenin, the Russian bolshevik premier was not a complete success. Several stores refused to close their doors and the streets were normally busy. The strike was confined to the shops and all means of urban transportation suspended operations.

SPARTANUS ARE ROUTED BY COUNTER DEMONSTRATION

ROME, April 10.—A group of men styled spartanists, carrying a red flag, attempted a demonstration here today but the people attacked the crowd and dispersed them. Several of the spartanists were hurt and others arrested. There ensued an enthusiastic demonstration in honor of the army and the victory of the Allies. Many cries were heard of "Long live the king!" "Long live our Italian flame!"

COLONEL FAIRFIELD ORDERED TO CAMP ZACHERY TAYLOR

FORT WORTH, TEX., April 11.—Colonel W. D. Fairfield, who has been in command of the sixty-first field artillery brigade, thirty-sixth division, since the death of General Stephens, has been ordered from Camp Bowie to camp Zachary Taylor. His command here has been demobilized.

HUNGARIAN ELECTION FOR SOVIET COUNCIL IS WITHOUT INCIDENT

BUDAPEST, Thursday, April 10.—The elections in Hungary for the creation of a soviet council, passed off without incident. The soviet organizations being formed in the country districts by means of this balloting. This whole process was carried out in the greatest order and the majority of the voters in many places not appearing to know why they were voting.

MONROE DOCTRINE IS GIVEN PROTECTION BY LEAGUE OF NATIONS

Story of Escape Of Mexican Party From Rebel Band

LAREDO, TEX., April 11.—The story of the attack by revolutionists led by Luis Caballero and Eugenio Lopez against a train on which Governor Andres Ozuna of Tamaulipas and his party were passengers was told in El Fervent, the Monterrey newspaper, which arrived here today. According to El Porvenir the Ozuna escort drove off the revolutionists, and finally reached Victoria in safety. There were 200 revolutionists in the party, the Monterrey paper said. They captured a freight train which preceded the Ozuna train, burned the cars and used the engine to tear up a long section of track, replacing the rails loosely so they appeared in good condition.

Ozuna's train was derailed by the loose rails and the rebels immediately fired. The escort disembarked and returned the fire, the fight lasting more than an hour, the attacking party finally retreating. General Carranza assembled troops at Santa Encaricia and took up the pursuit of the rebels. The Ozuna party reported their safe arrival in Victoria to Monterrey. The American consulate at Monterrey has reported General Gregorio Ozuna was taken to a hospital in Victoria badly wounded.

TEN SECTIONS OF THE COVENANT ARE PASSED

PARIS, April 11.—At the meeting of the commission on a League of Nations, ten sections of the covenant were considered and passed. The Japanese amendment was not reached and the actual text of the section exempting the Monroe Doctrine from the provisions of the covenant of the League of Nations was not yet available. American commissioners stated, however, that the doctrine was definitely named in the provision guaranteeing that it will not be affected by the terms of the covenant. Another meeting will be held tonight when it is hoped the work will be completed.

PRICE FIXING TO AWAIT A DECISION OF THE PRESIDENT

WASHINGTON, April 11.—The decision which President Wilson will be asked to make in the price fixing dispute between the industrial board of the department of commerce and the railroad administration will be whether the board shall go out of existence immediately or continue in existence until the President returns and a final policy is determined. Secretary Red field, Assistant Secretary Sweet, Solicitor Thurman and Chairman Beck today drafted a memorandum to the President which will put into final shape at another conference this afternoon. Until the President gives a decision the board will not undertake to continue its activities and no prices will be announced on lumber, brick, cement or other commodities under consideration.

REVOLUTIONARY MOVE CONTINUES TO SPREAD THROUGHOUT BAVARIA

NEW YORK, April 11.—Enriched by war work aliens are leaving this country at the rate of more than 1,000 a day, it was learned here today from customs officials who expressed fear that with the possibility that congress may increase the quota for the next four years, the United States will face a serious labor shortage instead of a condition of unemployment.

COPENHAGEN, April 11.—In a new spate of rioting at Dusseldorf Thursday twenty-five persons were killed and 25 wounded when government troops used tear gas to disperse a demonstration of the Lokai Anzeiger of Berlin says.

LARGE MAJORITY FOR LIGHT WINES AND BEER IN QUEBEC PROVINCE

MONTREAL, QUE., April 11.—With a large number of distant points in Quebec province yet to be heard from the "wet" majority registered in referendum yesterday in the province, cider and beer had increased to 110,000 this morning.

BUENOS AIRES PAPER DEFENDS THE BOLSHEVIKI

BUENOS AIRES, Thursday, April 10.—For the past ten days there has been published here a morning newspaper called Bandera Roja. The newspaper is carrying on a vigorous propaganda in favor of radical social ideas. It refers to the attacks of other newspapers against bolshevist methods as "an attack against us." It praises the soviet regime and attacks "capitalistic tyranny" in the Allied countries.

GEORGE QUINTARD DIES RESULT OF INJURIES

NEW YORK, April 11.—George Quintard, for ten years a spectacular figure on Broadway who specialized in the breeding and training of fox terriers, died today from injuries received by falling down a flight of steps leading to a roof garden.

No Foundation For Complaints at Censorship

WASHINGTON, April 11.—Lord Reading, the British ambassador, issued a statement today declaring there was no foundation for complaints reported from Paris that the British censorship of commercial cables had been used to promote British trade at the expense of American trade.

HARVEY WELL IN MAKING 8000 BUT CATCHES ON FIRE

Special to The Times. FORT WORTH, April 11.—A report from Comanche county states that the Harvey well of R. O. Harvey, two miles southeast of the Duke and Knowles, has come in for the biggest well in the field with a flow of 6,000 barrels and has caught fire. At the time the dispatch was filed there was little prospect of getting the flames under control.

A dividend of twenty-five percent was ordered paid, checks to be mailed out April 15. The stockholders instructed the officers of the company to pay dividends every thirty days from the earnings of the company.

DESDEMONA DISTRICT IS LATELY SHOWING UP MORE FAVORABLE

Special to The Times. EASTLAND, April 11.—Reports from the Desdemona district show many favorable indications for oil developments in that vicinity. The J. B. Foote well of the Magnolia Petroleum Company, not far from the Davis, which is considered dry, is making 35 barrels of oil between the six and eight inch casing at 2570 feet. It has been a heavy gusher. The Ode well of the Magnolia is making about 50 barrels but is not completed. It is just over the line in Eastland, near the Duke pool. The Thompson well of the Wax-

bachie Oil Co. is making 50 barrels and will be completed in a few days. The J. H. Mason well of The Sun Co. is showing for 20 barrels at 2850 feet and is making ten million feet of gas. Several other wells of the Duke group are showing some oil and gas, and altogether that field now begins to make a much better showing.

Extensive drilling operations are soon to start in Nolan county where Wichita Falls operators have large holdings in acreage. Frank Kelly of Guthrie, Okla., have the material on the ground for a cable test about eight miles south of Sweetwater near Trammel Lake. East of this location the Texarkana Co. has material on the ground for a cable test. The Nolan Oil and Gas Co. of which J. C. Strauss is manager has the material on the ground for a deep well. ROXANNA WELL IN YOUNG COUNTY HAS BOTH GAS AND OIL

The well of the Roxanna Petroleum company, and the North American Refinery of Oklahoma City, on the Lisle land, in Young county, is now expected to cause the next sensation in oil circles, after a three years job of drilling, and a more than six months fishing job. The well is now making a large quantity of gas, and showing not a little oil, with two strings of tools in the hole. According to Wichitans who have just come from the well the roar of the gas can be heard for some distance. The gas is being used to fire the boiler, and the excess gas is converted into casing head gasoline. A favorite joke with the oil men who visit the well is that "at least, the derrick is on top of the ground," as practically everything else in the vicinity has been lost in the hole. This is one of the most expensive wells that has been drilled in this entire section, and has also been a long time in drilling, but the Roxanna and North American Refinery companies have never lost confidence in their location, and believe that it will be only the matter of a short time until the well is brought in, and they also believe that it will be a phenomenal producer.

A. & M. TRAINING A NEWLY ORGANIZED BATTERY

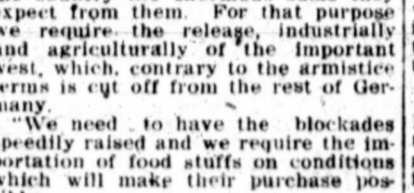

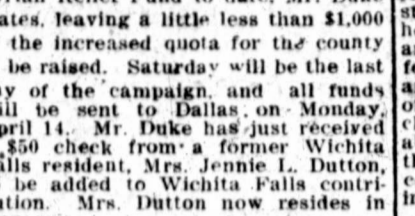

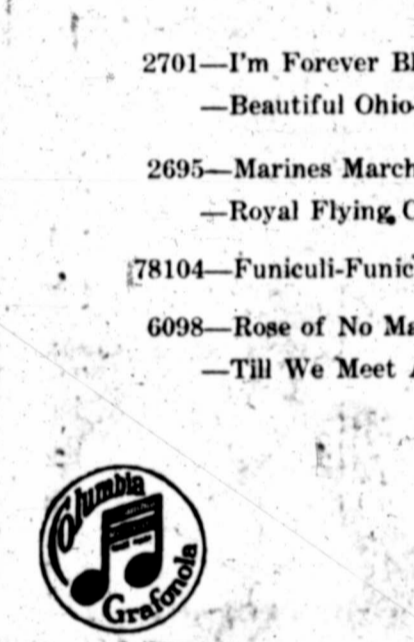
