

PLAN FOR MILLION DOLLAR GOOD ROADS BOND ELECTION FOR COUNTY IN NEXT MONTH

Matter Is Discussed at Meeting of Commissioners This Morning

PREPARING PETITION

Will be Presented at Another Meeting of the Court Next Monday.

An election to vote on a bond issue of \$1,000,000 for good roads in Wichita county will be held next month, if plans made today by prominent Wichita Falls citizens, co-operation with members of the county commissioners' court, materialize.

The directors of the Chamber of Commerce appeared before the commissioners' court this morning and laid the matter before County Judge J. P. Jones and his associates.

Several weeks ago the commissioners court took action toward causing the contracts made for spending on road improvements the bond issue of \$750,000.

The petition being drafted tonight will probably carry three or four questions on the ballot for the bond issue.

VICTORY LOAN QUOTA THREE-FOURTHS THAT OF THE FOURTH LOAN

WASHINGTON, April 14.—Quotas of most communities of the Victory Loan will be three-fourths of the quotas in the fourth loan, the treasury explained today, since \$4,500,000 total is three-fourths of the six billion quota of the fourth issue.

The fifth and last loan to the government, for which the campaign is due to begin Monday, April 21, will call for only three-quarters of the amount raised in the Fourth Liberty Loan, according to announcement of the treasury department.

Wichita county's quota is three-quarters of what it was for the fourth loan. It will be \$1,181,500, the fourth loan quota being \$1,575,000.

FIRST PAYMENT MUST BE MADE IN CASH OR EQUIVALENT BY MAY 1ST, 1921

Special to The Times. PARIS, April 14.—Germany under the peace pact must pay \$5,000,000,000 in cash or the equivalent in commodities before May 1, 1921. She must also issue immediately to the allied and associated governments \$20,000,000,000 of interest bearing bonds. The interest on the bonds until 1926 will be either two or three per cent and after that date will be five per cent, according to the present plan.

The bonds will be payable in installments during a period of 15 years. They probably will be kept in the control of a certain commission of the Allied and Associated governments so that they shall not be marketed in quantities to break the price.

Germany also must obligate herself to pay other amounts for damage done appropriate to her means, to be determined by a mixed commission of delegates of the Allied and associated governments and of Germany which shall report before May 1, 1921.

As to the affairs of the peace conference as a whole, they are shaping themselves to the convention, the status of nations has been definitely established concerning the Monroe doctrine the only one to be given a place in the covenant by the commission. The allied and Japanese, however, have both made reservations which entitle them to renew at a plenary session of the peace conference the questions involved in the amendment, so that the final decision will still open.

Indications are that the Germans will be given opportunity to make peace terms before the conference but that no extended discussion will be permitted, two weeks being stipulated as the outside limit for the work to be done during the present sessions. It is expected now will be attended by President Wilson, who is said by those close to him, to feel that the progress made toward concluding the peace is such that he will be able to remain for the Versailles meeting.

The chief question as regards the peace terms remaining to be settled, with the question during the present sessions, are probably have been disposed of virtually all their details, is that of the Rhine frontier. The council of four is likely mainly to occupy itself with the question during the present week, the debate probably centering about the French contention for security from a military standpoint. The French attitude being indicated as a determined one on this point.

It is understood also to have been argued, France's fears from a military standpoint of what might happen should there be another German attack that, in order to have a permanent peace, the League of Nations give in their sustained opposition to the Monroe Doctrine amendment to the league of nations covenant. Their argument was that if the Monroe Doctrine is given up, the League of Nations application the effect might be that the United States might be kept from again coming to France's help in the event of a future German subjugation.



PEACE TREATY REACHES FINAL NEGOTIATIONS

Commission Is Not Yet Entirely Out of Troubled Waters.

ENEMY TO DEAL WITH

Tentative Date for Peace Congress Between April 26 and May 14.

By Associated Press. PARIS, April 13.—The peace treaty and the league of nations have undoubtedly reached the final stage of negotiations, but it is not clear that they are out of troubled waters as they must pass the ordeal of a plenary session of the peace conference and then go before the Versailles congress where enemy powers will be represented.

The council of four is understood to have fixed for the peace congress tentative dates between April 26 and May 4 but no announcement has been made as to details so that Premier Lloyd George may have something to disclose when he addresses the British parliament next Wednesday.

President May Remain. The summoning of the George Washington by President Wilson led to the belief that his departure was imminent but intimate friends say that the progress which has been realized will permit Mr. Wilson to remain and take part in the congress.

The official summary of the revised covenant of the league of nations, issued yesterday shows that the Monroe doctrine amendment is in the document. Notwithstanding this, however, there appears to be strange and divergent views concerning the status of the amendment.

Give French Version. The Temps also gives a French version of the consideration of the Japanese amendment, saying that it prevailed, which is a serious mistake in view of the British-American official statement in which the Japanese concurred.

Discussion Is Spirited. Discussion of the Japanese amendment was equally spirited. The Japanese delegates have made it known that cables from Tokyo have shown feeling there was running high. There was virtually no opposition expressed to the Japanese demands except that of Premier William M. Hughes of Australia, which was so pronounced that it compelled Great Britain to withhold approval of the amendment thus preventing its adoption.

To Daylight If Necessary. It is going to last until the light is necessary to adopt this covenant. When this became known opposition subsided and the session was concluded. Colonel House said after war: "In a prolonged session it is the last 15 minutes which counts."

TERMS OF THE VICTORY LOAN ARE ANNOUNCED BY SECRETARY GLASS

By Associated Press. WASHINGTON, April 14.—Terms of the Victory Loan were announced Sunday by Secretary of the Treasury, Wm. C. Glass. Amount \$4,500,000,000, oversubscriptions to be rejected. Interest 4 1/2 per cent tax partial tax exempt notes, convertible into 3 1/2 per cent notes wholly tax exempt.

Maturity four years with the treasury reserving the privilege of redeeming the notes in three years. The 4 1/2 per cent notes to be issued later also may be converted subsequently back into 4 1/2 notes.

The size of the loan was much smaller than had been anticipated by most financial observers. It was for an issue of about \$6,000,000,000, particularly in view of Secretary Glass' past statement that the loan would be five or six billions.

"In fixing the terms of the issue," said Secretary Glass' announcement, "the Treasury had been guided largely by the desire to devise a security which will not only prove attractive to the people of the country, but the terms of which should insure a good financial market for the loan."

SUN IS TO FIGURE IN FORECASTS OF WEATHER. WASHINGTON, April 14.—Weather forecasts in the future may be based in part on observations of the sun. The Smithsonian Institute announced today that studies carried on in California and Mount Wilson, Calif., as to solar radiation and its effect on weather conditions had proven so satisfactory that the institution contemplated establishing three or four additional observing stations in widely separated, almost cloudless regions of the earth such as Egypt, India, South Africa and Australia.

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### PLAN A RAILROAD FROM COMANCHE THROUGH OIL BELT

T. J. O'Donnell, former resident of Wichita Falls where he was engaged in the paving contracting business now president of the Midland and Northwestern railroad, is promoting a railroad from Comanche to Newcastle and has received much encouragement and many pledges of support. The Fort Worth Record Sunday contained the following concerning Mr. O'Donnell's activities:

With the close of the war railroad building has come into notice again and with it comes Comanche's chance to secure another railroad, which, if built as proposed, will run in a northerly direction from Comanche to Newcastle via DeLeon, Desdemona, Ranger and Addo, connecting with the Cotton Belt at Comanche and the Katy at Newcastle, with the Comanche Enterprise. This road, when built, will open up direct connection for the North Texas, Ranger and Duke fields with the Gulf and with sufficient tonnage to make it a paying proposition from the first, as well as accommodating the large passenger traffic which will be diverted over its line from Midland to Seminole, DeLeon with the Katy and at Ranger with the Texas & Pacific.

T. J. O'Donnell, president of the Midland & Northwestern railroad, which extends from Midland to Seminole, and who proposes to build this road, was in Comanche on Wednesday and met with a number of leading business men of the city and placed his proposition before them in the form of a contract or agreement which, when signed by himself and the city of Comanche, will be effective. Provided Comanche raises a bonus of \$100,000, subscribers for at least \$25,000 worth of stock (which will entitle the city to one or more of the road's directors), and to furnish the necessary right of way for ten miles toward DeLeon.

A committee consisting of J. Burks, J. B. Chilton and M. Coleman was appointed to investigate the standing of Mr. O'Donnell as to his ability to build a railroad and after careful investigation they have found that he has built two roads, both under very adverse circumstances, the first one during the drought of 1912 from Slaton to LePesa, and the second one, the Midland & Northwestern, from Midland to Seminole, which he had started when

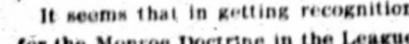

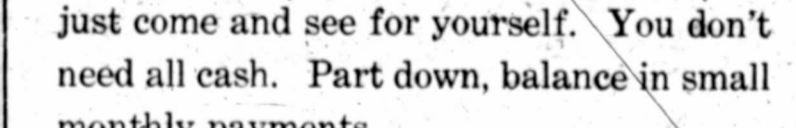

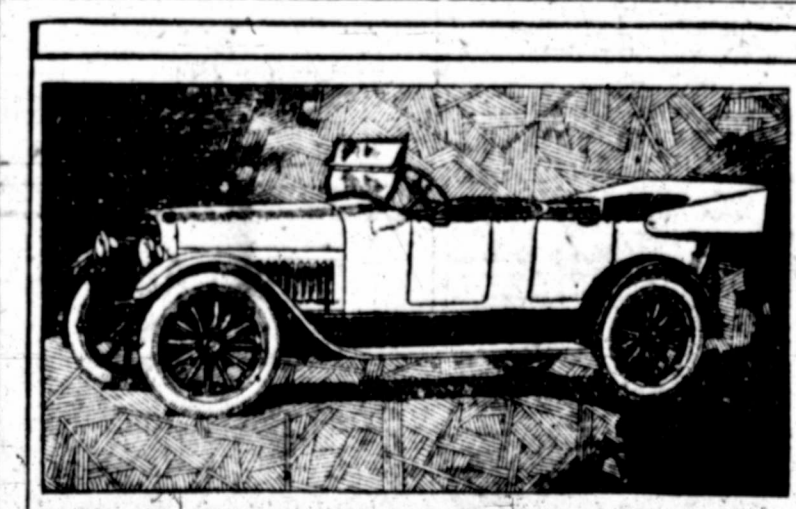

**OF INTEREST TO SPORT FANS**

**DISSOLUTION OF  
BASEBALL "COURT"  
MAY BE RESULT**

CHICAGO, April 13.—Dissolution of the National Baseball Commission, the "supreme court" of organized baseball, absolute severance of relations with the National Association of minor leagues and revision of the players' contracts eliminating the ten days and reserve clauses will be the probable result of the \$240,000 verdict granted the Baltimore club of the Federal League by a jury in the District of Columbia supreme court yesterday.

These revolutionary measures to safeguard baseball from all future legal attacks were forecast by Ban Johnson, president of the American League upon his return from Washington tonight. The American and National Leagues, together with their club owners and officials and certain officials of the defunct Federal League were defendants in the \$240,000 suit for damages brought under the Sherman Anti-Trust law.

President Johnson said that an appeal would be taken to the court, and if necessary to the supreme court of the United States.

"The verdict, of course, is a blow to baseball," President Johnson said, "but we are not particularly distressed as it was nothing more than we expected under the circumstances. We were bound to appeal, no matter what the amount of the damages involved was."

"We do not want to be charged with operating in restraint of trade; neither do we want the charge of conducting a monopoly hanging over us. We can see a ray of sunshine because of the fact that we can appeal. If the verdict had been brought in our favor, we would have been denied that privilege."

While declaring that he did not care to ridicule the justice of the court, President Johnson said that attorneys for the Baltimore club talked like "Lenine and Trotsky."

"You would have thought that we were on trial in Russia," the American League executive said. "We were charged with all manner of crimes. The attorneys for the plaintiff referred to me as the 'czar' of baseball and gave the impression that we were on the threshold of the penitentiary."

"Baseball has been conducted under the present system for forty years and has been persistent in its success of keeping the sport clean and retaining the dignity of the game. If we have been wrong in our operations, then, of course, we want to know about it."

"What methods the American and National Leagues could adopt to govern themselves would be among the early developments, President Johnson said. The leagues would be obliged to conduct their affairs independently and the National Commission would have to be abolished if the verdict is sustained.

**NATIONAL COMMISSION IS  
PREPARING A STATEMENT**

CINCINNATI, O., April 14.—August Herrmann, chairman of the National Baseball Commission, who returned from Washington today, when informed of President Johnson's propositions, said they might be the outcome of the Baltimore Federal League club suit, but that he did not believe it would be necessary to go as far as forecast by the American League president.

"The National Commission as a whole is preparing a statement and this will be ready in a couple of days. Pending the appeal of the verdict against us, baseball will be conducted as in the past," Mr. Herrmann said.

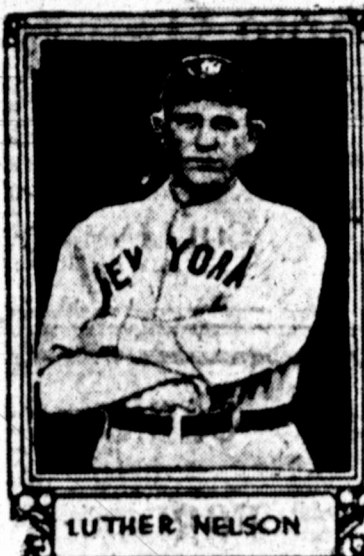

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Market Report

COTTON MARKET. NEW YORK, April 14.—Reports of increasing demand for cotton goods, both at home and abroad, were accompanied by a renewal of trading in the cotton market at the opening today. There was also buying for West coast and foreign account and after opening unchanged to 13 points higher, active new style months sold 10 to 17 points above Saturday's closing. This advance net southern selling, however, and after touching 26.55 for May and 22.85 for October, the market was irregular with new style positions showing moderate reactions. Old style months opened unchanged to 10 points lower on a very small volume of business. According to local spot interests, cotton is heading in this direction for delivery on March and very little is being prepared for tender out of the local stock but there was scattering near month liquidation later in the morning and was edged off to 26.35 by 10 o'clock. Later deliveries were influenced by an unfavorable western belt forecast but eased in sympathy with the near month, selling off to 22.75 for October, or within seven months in the latter part of the figures. Trading became very quiet on this reaction with the market showing no special feature around midday. Business remained quiet during the early afternoon but the declines seemed to meet support and the tone was very steady with May ruling around 26.50 and October 22.90, or about five to six points net higher. Cotton closed steady.

NEW ORLEANS Cotton. NEW ORLEANS, April 14.—A favorable opinion of political news caused moderate buying of cotton in the first half hour of business today when prices rose 16 to 31 points. The weather map indicated favorable conditions for planting but the market derived no selling power from this source. The market held its quiet but active trade in the trading up to noon widened its advance to 25 to 35 points. Price changes were sluggish in the early afternoon.
