

SEVERAL THOUSAND TROOPS INCLUDED IN ARRIVALS AND THOSE ENROUTE TO AMERICA

NEW YORK, April 21.—Six troop ships loaded to capacity with American officers and men—14,446 in all—arrived in time to celebrate Easter Sunday on home soil.

Two of the ships which arrived were the German liners Zeppelin and Waldersae, making their first trips since they were turned over to the United States.

The Zeppelin, flying the international flag as well as the Stars and Stripes, brought 1,650 men, including the 129th field artillery complete, and the 33rd ambulance company.

One of the Graf Waldersee were 1,741 officers and men, the majority being hospital units and including 316th ammunition train headquarters, headquarters motor and horse battalions, ordnance and medical detachments and companies A to G, a total of sixteen officers and 1,024 men.

The Great Northern brought 3,009 troops comprising the 110th ammunition train complete, 21st engineers and 115 men, 300 convalescent wounded and 18 casual companies.

The Santa Paula brought 2,134 officers and men, including 42nd base hospital, 216th supply train, headquarters and medical detachments and companies A to F, 113th transportation corps, second trench mortar battalion, headquarters and medical detachments and batteries A to D, 326th aero squadron, 64th aero supply squadron, 4th trench mortar battery, and convalescent companies.

Other units assigned to early convoy today included the 505th engineers service battalion, 301st field signal battalion, aviation ambulance company number 68.

MORE THAN A THOUSAND ARRIVE ON CHARLESTON

NEW YORK, April 21.—With 134 troops the cruiser Charleston arrived from Brest. Units included the 411th telegraph battalion complete, 41st field hospital, and 50th field hospital.

COMMUNISTS FAIL TO GAIN CONTROL OF GOVERNMENT

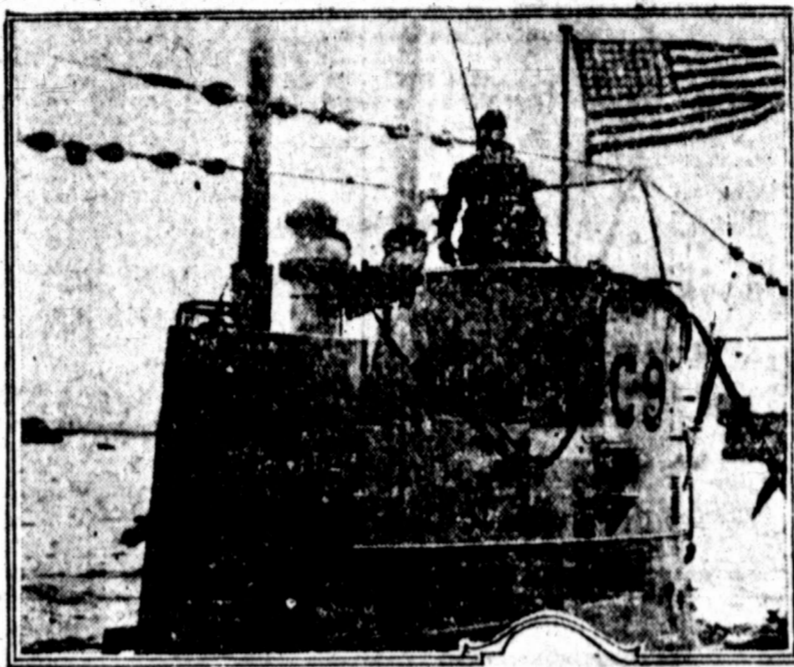

EXPRESS SURPRISE AT PERSONNEL OF GERMAN MISSION

PARIS, Sunday, April 20.—A statement issued this evening by the Havas News Bureau, a semi-official agency, says that surprise has been manifested over the fact that Germany did not select more important men for her peace delegation than Dr. Hans von Hainhausen, Herr Von Keller, Herr Ernst Schmidt, Herr Reimker and Herr Luders, and also that according to the German note they will have power only to receive the text of the terms and not sign the treaty.

SUPREME COURT PERMITS CITY TO RUN STREET CARS

WASHINGTON, April 21.—Federal court decrees dismissing injunction proceedings brought by the United Railroads of San Francisco to prevent the city from constructing and operating a municipally owned street car system on streets where the company already had tracks were upheld today by the supreme court. In dismissing the company's appeal, Justice Holmes rendered the opinion, said this action was taken by the court without prejudice so that the street railway company could institute damages proceedings if it desired.

BIRKHEAD IS CHAIRMAN OF VETERANS MEETING

SAN ANTONIO, TEX., April 21.—Tentative plans for a state wide World War Veterans Association were made here today at a meeting of leading men of the state. The meeting selected committees to report at two p. m. at a state convention of veterans at which a temporary organization will be effected. The temporary organization will select delegates to the national veterans convention at St. Louis in May and prepare for a state meeting to form permanent organization when the soldiers now in France return home.

Demand Delegation Authorized to 'Sign'

WASHINGTON, April 21.—This morning's newspapers in Germany's sending "couriers" instead of delegates of proper standing to Versailles nothing but evidence of bad faith and a transparent maneuver to gain time.

The Allied and associated governments are determined not to accept subordinate personages, and Germany will be immediately notified that she must send delegates equipped with full powers to conclude peace.

The Gaulois, indignant at what it describes as "the importance of Germany's soup de theatre," which it regards as a refusal to sign the treaty, says: "The next word will be with Marshal Foch."

WILL NOT AGREE TO PLANS OF THE ENTENTE

DANZIG, Thursday, April 17.—The German people's council for West Prussia has sent a declaration to the imperial state authorities stating that under no circumstances will the Germans of West Prussia agree to the proposed plans of the Entente to internationalize the lower Vistula or make Danzig and its vicinity a free state or place it under Polish sovereignty.

FORMER CHANCELLOR OF EMBASSY AT WASHINGTON

WASHINGTON, April 21.—Dr. Hans von Hainhausen, according to Paris advices, has been named as one of Germany's delegates to the peace conference, was formerly chancellor of the German embassy in Washington.

RUSSIAN EMBASSY HAS A PLAN FOR SOLVING PROBLEM

WASHINGTON, April 21.—The Russian embassy here made public today the outline of the plan presented to the peace conference by the Russian representatives at Paris to solve the Russian problem. It asks recognition as the de facto of all national authorities, who are inspired by democratic ideals and enjoy the support of the population pending the setting up of a federation of Russian states.

PERFECTED TREATY MAY NOT BE READY FRIDAY

PARIS, April 21.—Grave doubts were expressed today whether the perfected peace treaty would be presented to the German representatives the coming Friday. While the treaty will be communicated to them in substance, that it would be physically impossible to prepare the document in its complete, final form, in the four days remaining.

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The procedure of the council of four came as a surprise notwithstanding the fact that the news of the past week foreshadowed it and it is interpreted in cabinet circles and at the foreign office as final proof that the Entente is disinclined forthwith to enter into negotiations based on President Wilson's "fourteen points" and that the terms awaiting Germany are not and dried.

EMISSARIES WITHOUT AUTHORITY

The German emissaries will never have instructions to carry the peace document back to Berlin. The question whether the present government is to assume the responsibility of accepting or rejecting the terms or whether it will present them for a national referendum is a matter for conjecture. Official opinion is far from unanimous. The public platform of the declaration of a referendum and in favor of pre-emptory declaration of peace terms based on any other proposition based on Mr. Wilson's platform is the present temper of the German working men is anti-capitalistic and anti-imperialistic and the bourgeoisie is in full accord with the proletariat.

NOT FLIRTING WITH PLEBISCITE

The present government, it has been learned, is not flirting with the idea of a plebiscite, as it would such rather negotiate peace and set the country at work. It is also conscious that a peace settlement in which Germany has not had a voice would precipitate a storm of national resentment which no cabinet could weather.

CABINET FORMULATES REPLY TO INVITATION

BERLIN, Saturday, April 19.—The cabinet devoted less than half an hour to the formulation of its answers to the Entente's invitation to Versailles or the purpose of receiving a draft of the peace terms, the feeling of gloom prevails in official circles tonight and the Associated Press is told that there is no illusion as to obtaining any mitigation in the dictatorial peace awaiting Germany after the war.

Summary of International Situation and Progress of Peace Conference

will have the power merely to receive the peace terms and take them to Berlin. The German cabinet will then either accept or reject the terms, it is said, or submit them to the people.

DISPATCHES FROM PARIS, however, reflect a rather positive attitude on the part of the peace conference, which it is said will inform Germany that the men she sends to Versailles must have full powers to sign the treaty of peace. It is said that the first act of the meeting to be held April 25 will be to demand evidence from the Germans that they possess such powers.

BOLESHIVISM IS AGAIN ON THE BACK TRACK ON THE WESTERN UKRAINIAN FRONT, the strength of the soviet forces having apparently been concentrated in the effort to overrun the Crimea, which has been successful. The cities of Zhitomir and Proskuriv, in the Ukraine, have been retaken from the bolsheviks by forces commanded by Simon Petlura, the Ukrainian peasant leader. It is announced that ten thousand bolshevik soldiers have deserted on a body and have joined the Ukrainians.

IN NORTHERN RUSSIA bolshevik forces are in retreat and are being closely surrounded by British, American and Russian troops. The city of Vienna is in the hands of soviet adherents. It appears the transfer of authority there was brought about without great disorder or bloodshed. Munich probably still is held by soviet forces, but German government troops before the Bavarian capital have been reinforced by soldiers from Weuttemburg.

OPPOSED BY WILSON

Mr. Wilson has stoutly set against recognition of the treaty of London, upon which Italy's maximum territorial claims are based, and his absence from the meeting yesterday might have been caused by the fact that the Italians were invoking that convention in support of their territorial claims.

TWO HUNDRED MEN OBJECT TO PARADING WITH GOVERNOR

The news of Mr. Hearn's nomination was contained in a letter from a Knight of Columbus supervisor in Rome who described an audience granted by the pope to a company of American soldiers and sailors March 20. The pontiff in concluding the audience said: "It is with particular pleasure that I give this special benediction to the Knights of Columbus. They are well known to me. I have watched their work in the past with special interest and their deeds in recent difficult times are most praiseworthy. I impart from the bottom of my heart the benediction asked for."

CATTLE HAVE MANY SPLENDID QUALITIES UNKNOWN TO CATTLE

Special to The Times. AUSTIN, April 21.—Persons interested in the development of the catalo, or cross between buffalo and beef cattle, are awaiting with interest the announcement of Governor W. P. Hobby of Texas for the special session in the hope that legislation will be ordered for the state's taking control of the development of the animals. Colonel C. C. Goodnight of the Goodnight ranch in north Texas did the first experimenting in the crossing of buffalo with beef cattle in the effort to produce animals that eliminate some of the weak features of stock now raised for food. Animals so far produced, as pointed out a year ago, have the following good features: immunity from all diseases, especially blackleg. They thrive and do well on less food than any other cattle. They put on more flesh for the food eaten than any other cattle known. They do not carry the extra quantity of fat as in common cattle. By analysis their tallow is worth from three cents to four cents per pound as a better producer. They do not drift in storms. They live and produce at a much greater age and don't get as light in their old age as do common cattle. They will cut or dress 70 per cent gross weight off the range and they do not require as much range as the common cattle, the cows ranging in weight from 1100 to 1600 pounds. They do not run from heel flies, rise on their fore feet instead of their hind feet, which enables them to rise when much weaker, and they never lie down with back down a habit which causes much loss among range cattle, as any cowboy can assert. The meat by analysis is free from fiber, hence does not get as tough as beef. The oleo is entirely different from that of beef and does not injure the most delicate or sensitive stomach when taken as food. GERMAN TOWNS ARE OFFICIALLY NOTIFIED OF ARMY PROGRAM

BERLIN, Thursday, April 17.—Every German town and city which had its own garrison of which it has been proud for decades has been officially notified by the national assembly to disband the German army. The official notification, while referring to the creation of a new army in the future says its strength is entirely unknown at present and declares that it recognizes the cities will be injured economically by the withdrawal of the garrisons. They will, however, have to accustom themselves thereto, the message says, and the authorities will try to consider economic problems while regrouping army units.

HUGO HASSE DEMANDS THE SOCIALIZATION OF GREAT INDUSTRIES

By Associated Press. COPENHAGEN, April 21.—"When we secure power and are able to realize our ideals, the socialists will abandon their methods of terrorism, recognizing that these methods may suit Russia, but that they do not suit Germany," Hugo Hasse, German independent socialist leader, is quoted by the Berlin correspondent of the Exchange Telegraph Company. The correspondent who has just returned here from Berlin says Hasse told him that independent socialist party asked for the socialization of all the great services of the country, such as the coal mines, the iron and steel works, etc., "and so also with all the farms on great estates," he continues, "these to be worked and managed by workmen and peasants' councils." "With regard to the soviet system," Herr Hasse went on, "there is no difference of opinion, but the most of us want it realized in the following manner: Every factory or similar institution to select a special small council to control it, but to have great councils of workers formed throughout Germany, these to have a certain power of control over public insti-

tutions, courts of justice and so on together with the right to place bills before the parliament. If reforms proposed were rejected the councils would arrange to take a popular vote. Hasse said that he did not consider a reactionary coup impossible in Berlin, but that he was convinced that such control, if it were acquired, could not last more than a couple of months if indeed it endured as long as that.

DISTINGUISHED SERVICE MEDALS ARE AWARDED

By Associated Press. WASHINGTON, April 21.—General Pershing today informed the war department that he had awarded Distinguished Service Medals to Major Charles L. Joly and First Lieutenant William J. Schmitt, Paul Chapin and Carroll B. Reese for "exceptionally meritorious and distinguished service while serving with the expeditionary force." The Distinguished Service Medal was awarded posthumously to Major Alfred E. King who served as munitions officer of the fifth army corps.

FIND THAT COTTON RATE IS NOT REASONABLE

ACCUSE TEXAS MAN OF LONG AND VARIED CRIMINAL CAREER

Murray who was arrested at Texarkana, Ark., yesterday on charges of having swindled Houston, Texas, banks of \$11,000, is also accused of being the man who participated in a spectacular theft of gold from the steamer Humboldt south bound from Alaska in 1910 according to a detective agency which caused the arrest. The detectives also accuse him of swindling banks in Denver, Colo., and Tacoma, Washington, out of \$32,000, and banks in Atlanta, Ga., out of \$15,000. Murray, according to the agency, has been making his home in Dallas where he was engaged as a broker. He is married to a Texas girl, who formerly lived in Waco and they have a young son now living in Corsicana, where Mrs. Murray lived until she went recently to join her husband in Texarkana. Murray, who is also known as Murray, Frank Kimball, Joe A. Matthews and Charles Everett, was one of the three who obtained \$17,000 by the robbery on the Humbolt in 1910 while en route to Seattle, according to a

statement by the detective agency. He substituted a dummy box similar to the one containing the gold bullion stolen by a woman who diverted the attention of those in charge of the gold.

SOLDIER BRINGS SUIT FOR \$75,000 IN LOCAL COURT

ALLEGES INTEREST IN PRODUCTION ON BLOCK 6, WIGHAM.

HE ASKS FOR A RECEIVER

Former Wife and Four Others Are Made Defendants in the Suit.

Alleging that he has been damaged in the sum of \$75,000, J. B. Hewitt, a Baylor county doughtboy still in service, has brought suit in the 30th district court here against his former wife and four men of Wichita county. Hewitt's general charge is that while he has been absent on duty in the United States army the defendants have leased and drilled lands in the Burk Burnett field in which he claims an undivided one-half interest.

The complaint recites that Hewitt, while the husband of Maggie Hewitt, acquired ownership of lots 6 and 7, block 6, of the G. W. Wigham addition to Burk Burnett. On November 5, 1918, after Hewitt had been divorced, the complaint states that his former wife executed and delivered to Bernard M. Marin and Ben G. O'Neal a one-fifth interest in all the oil and gas under the property, and that on Nov. 29, 1918, she also transferred one-half of all the oil and gas interests, with drilling rights, to W. T. Willis and J. C. Davis.

CONTRACT FOR A DEEP TEST WELL NEAR HENRIETTA

HENRIETTA, TEXAS, April 17.—A contract was filed in the county clerk's office Tuesday which calls for a test well 4500 feet deep on one of 20 different tracts of land lying south, southeast and southwest of Henrietta, varying in distance from four to ten miles.

J. H. Daley and L. H. Edwards, out of town oil operators, are the parties of the first part, and W. E. Collier, F. B. Bevering and C. B. McDonald, well known local men, are the parties of the second part.

The three local men own in fee and hold by lease 20 tracts of land aggregating several hundred acres lying south, southeast and southwest of Henrietta, and they have entered into an agreement to transfer these lands, named in the contract to Daley and Edwards when they shall have put a well down 4500 feet on one of the tracts, or have found oil in paying quantities at a less depth. The particular tract upon which the well is to be drilled is not set out.

Daley & Edwards obligate themselves to form a corporation and obtain a charter to carry out the work in 30 days from March 29, and obligate the corporation they form to begin the well within 120 days from March 29, and to prosecute the drilling with due diligence.

Market Report

COTTON MARKET

NEW YORK, April 21.—The cotton market showed renewed strength and activity during today's early trading. Weather conditions over the eastern holidays were considered generally favorable and there was some irregularity at the start with May nine points lower and other new style months seven to 33 points higher. There was considerable southern selling here and scattered realizing of a somewhat less favorable view of progress in the peace conference but the offerings were readily absorbed by a broadening domestic and foreign trade demand with May selling up to 27.75 and October to 24.70 before the end of the first hour or 34 to 70 points net higher.

The mid-day reactions were followed by renewed firmness during the early afternoon with October relatively firm on buying by houses with western connections. That delivery sold up to 24.85, or 65 points above Thursday's closing while May tumbled around 27.80, or about 41 points net higher shortly after 2 o'clock. Southern selling here was accompanied by reports that Liverpool had been a heavy buyer of spots in the south.

The early advance extended to 27.80 for May and 24.74 for new style October, or 41 to 54 points above Thursday's closing figures. Realizing became heavy enough to check the movement at this level and there were reactions of 15 or 20 points from the best with the market becoming less active around mid-day.

New Orleans Cotton.
NEW ORLEANS, April 21.—Reports of a good demand for spots over the holidays and the sale of 4,000 bales in one line alone gave the cotton market a firm tone and a higher tendency as soon as it opened today. In the first half hour of business prices gained 41 to 54 points.

The executive committee of the association considers these matters of taxation, depletion, depreciation and property valuation the most important questions that are, or ever have been before the association for consideration and urges all members to withhold their returns until Judge Shea's committee has time to consider the manual and regulations and harmonize them with conditions in the mid-continent field, so that all returns may be made on the same basis. In unity there is strength. The time for filing tax returns has been extended to individual members of the association until June 15. Judge Shea's bulletin will be in hands of all members in ample time to prepare their returns in accordance therewith.

STATE LAND OIL LEASES COMMAND HEAVY PREMIUMS

OKLAHOMA CITY, April 21.—That oil development in Oklahoma is only in its infancy is indicated by the scramble for leases on school lands, which were sold Thursday by the commissioners of the land office. Mineral rights on lands in Jackson, Comanche, Cotton, Greer, Beckham, Kiowa, Cleveland, Kay, Oklahoma and Jefferson counties were sold at an aggregate premium of \$76,000, with a royalty reserved to the state of 12 1/2 per cent.
