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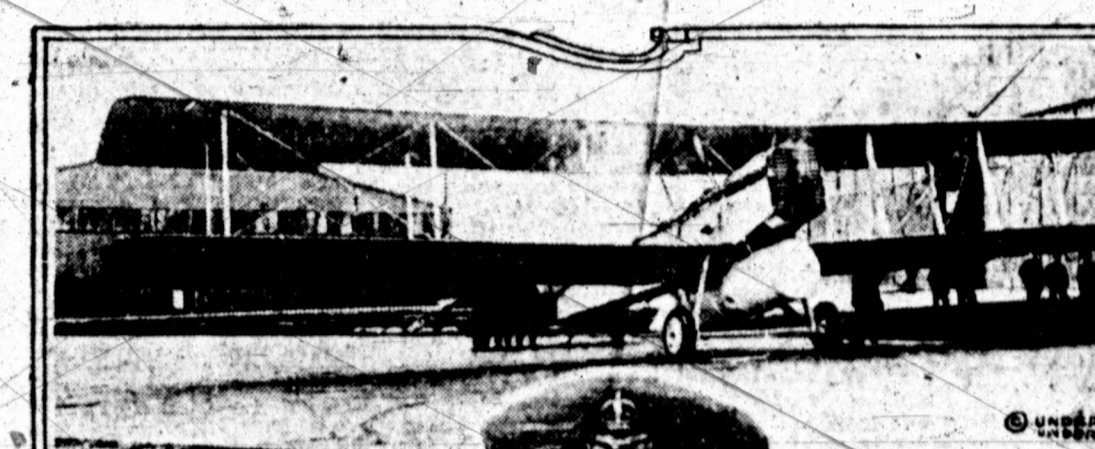

His assailants then carried off a trunk which is said to have contained \$50,000 and he was brought to a Waco sanitarium and is not expected to recover. Several arrests have been made.

ROME, May 2.—King Ferdinand of Rumania, accompanied by French generals, is about to enter Budapest, the capital of Hungary, at the head of his troops, a Bucharest dispatch to the Neue Freie Presse says.

NEW YORK, May 2.—Federal and police investigation of the nationwide bomb conspiracy to assassinate prominent men expressed opinion today that they had found a clue that might lead to the discovery of the conspirators, when the identity of the manufacturer of the peculiarly designed paper with which the boxes containing the deadly contrivances were covered. Their hope was further strengthened when they were informed of this manufacturer that not more than a few hundred sheets of the paper had left his stock and that he could furnish the police with a list of his patrons into whose possession the paper went in sample lots.

GALVESTON, Texas, May 2.—The collector of customs at this port has received a cablegram from the American consul at Vera Cruz confirming the report that the Gulf Fisheries schooner Cape Horn had been seized by Mexican authorities.

BUNKER REGULATIONS MODIFIED BY BOARDS

WASHINGTON, May 2.—Bunker regulations were further modified today by the war trade board to permit the issuance of time fuel licenses to all vessels regardless of flag, good until revoked, in the place of trip licenses issued heretofore.

NO SPECIAL RATES FOR FARM LABORERS

WASHINGTON, May 2.—Requests of Kansas agricultural organizations for reduced rail rates for farm laborers to induce them to assist in the wheat harvest have been denied by the railroad administration.

GERMANS PLAN TO ASSUME CONTROL OF THE RAILROADS

BRUSSELS, Thursday, May 1. (By Wireless to London.)—The constitutional committee of the national assembly at Weimar has adopted a resolution providing that the entire railway system of Germany be taken over by the government and held until April, 1921. The representatives of Bavaria were the only objectors to the measure.

TERMS DO NOT PLAN SINKING GERMAN SHIPS

Question Is Left Open for Later Decision by Allied Powers.

EXAMINE CREDENTIALS

Allies Not Disposed to Question the Present German Government.

PARIS, May 2.—The naval terms to be embodied in the peace treaty with Germany which finally have been completed, do not provide for the sinking of the largest German warships. The disposition of these vessels is left to be decided upon later by the allied and associated powers.

PARIS, May 2.—The "credentia" committee of the peace conference held a meeting today to examine the German credentials received at Versailles yesterday.

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REPUBLICANS FAVOR POLICY OF SILENCE ON PARIS COVENANT

WASHINGTON, May 2.—Senator Curtis of Kansas, Republican whip, who with Senator Lodge of Massachusetts, leader, only telegraphed all Republican senators asking them not to discuss the revised League of Nations covenant at the present conference could be held, said today replies had come from all but six senators who could not be located and that all agreed silence would be the best policy to follow for the present.

TREATY OF PEACE COMPRISES FROM 15 TO 20 CHAPTERS

PARIS, May 2.—The treaty of peace comprises from fifteen to twenty chapters, according to Marcel Hutin, of the Ego de Paris. The preamble is contained in the first chapter setting forth the reasons why the various contracting parties entered the war and mentioning the necessity for the League of Nations. The second chapter deals with the German frontiers and the third contains all clauses connected with alterations of frontiers resulting in changes in the sovereignty of territory.

PARIS, May 2.—Two hundred and fifty policemen were hurt, one sergeant who was staggered in the back being in a dangerous condition, during yesterday's May Day disorders, according to an announcement made by the prefecture of police at midnight.

PARIS, May 2.—The committee recommends that the premier resign his own magnificent speech in the chamber of deputies in 1917 condemning an exactly similar action by the ministry then in power.

PRESIDENT SAYS LABOR PROGRAM MOST GRATIFYING ACHIEVEMENT

WASHINGTON, May 2.—President Wilson cabled Secretary Hummel today that in his opinion the labor program adopted as part of the treaty of peace constitutes one of the most important achievements of the new day in which the interests of labor are to be systematically and intelligently safeguarded and promoted.

The houses are being built in various sections of the city, on lots purchased by the corporation. According to the plan of the corporation to furnish homes to be paid for on easy terms, none of the houses are over \$5,000 in cost. The ready cut houses which were shipped here as an experiment, while admirably adapted to emergency uses, and for factory and refinery purposes, were considered by the corporation not exactly available for the purpose of the corporation, and none others outside the first two have been contracted for.

This decoration was for the same act of heroism that won him the distinguished Service Cross awarded by the war department. The citation accompanying the cross and palm was in French with accompanying English translation, and recited the incident when Lieutenant Carrigan, after his company had gone through a barbed wire entanglement, saw one of his men caught in the wire and went back to

assist him, when a German sharp-shooter's bullet gave him the fatal wound. The citation repeats the words Lieutenant Carrigan uttered when his men rushed back to him, "Boys, they've got me, but you will get them." The cross is somewhat similar in appearance to the Distinguished Service Cross, and is hung on a red and green ribbon. The Palm is an additional honor, and is a small metal palm fastened to the ribbon.

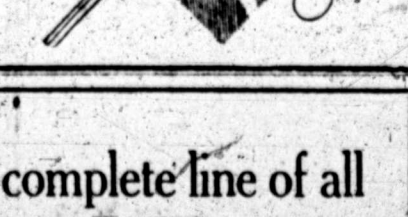

CHAMBER WISELY MAKES CORRECTION.

The United States Chamber of Commerce made a false step when it adopted a resolution urging President Wilson to hasten his return to America. This step was later retracted and eliminated. Its retention might have wrecked the usefulness of the chamber, which is doing a great and constructive work.

Outside of a number of politicians and a few business men without vision, the whole American people approve the efforts of President Wilson for the establishment of a League of Nations. They want him to stay in Europe until such a league is assured. They feel somehow that without the guidance and influence of the President and without the weight of the United States with him—the league might fail. Had it voiced the sentiment of America the chamber of commerce would have adopted a resolution urging President Wilson not to come home until a treaty of peace had been assured incorporating a League of Nations.

PROFIT SHARING.

The American Newspaper Publishers at their convention last week suggested profit sharing with employees as a means of promoting better relations between employers and employees.

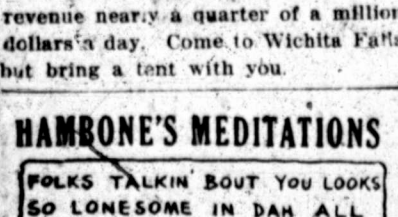
The United States chamber of Commerce this week made a similar recommendation. This action by these two representative organizations of business men is significant of the times. Almost everywhere there is a growing recognition of the rights of labor. Labor is taking its real place in a partnership with capital in industry. Profit sharing is no longer an experiment. Some of the biggest industries in the country are sharing profits with employees and are finding more profits to share.

RUSSIAN OUTLOOK BRIGHTER.

The bolsheviks have evacuated Petrograd. Lenin and Trotsky have asked for refuge in other countries. This is a rift in the dark clouds of tyranny, disorganization and outrage and murder that have overhung Russia. It is hoped that with its leaders in flight the bolshevik movement will quickly subside. Certainly the great masses of the Russian people will turn against the leaders of the movement as soon as they can dare.

RUSSIAN TROOPS RETURNING HOME FIND BIG CHANGE

Associated Press Mail Correspondent. With American Forces in North Russia, April.—Russian soldiers returning from Germany to their homes in northern Russia find their fatherland vastly changed since they went to war. Scores of these soldiers are passing through the Bolshevik lines and making their way to the American and other Allied outposts. They tell tales of pitiful sufferings from hunger in the villages through which they passed. One of them, F. Evispiert, of Archangel, thus describes his experiences when he returned from Germany: "At Petrograd, we were sent to barracks, where a Bolshevik commissioner started to read us the Soviet program. 'Give us first something to eat, and then read us your program, they cried. Then the commissioner gave up trying to read the program, saying we were not fit elements for propaganda, and he left us. Each of us received 25 rubles in advance on his salary. Famine was reigning in Petrograd. The first category (working people of Bolshevik sympathizers) received one pound of oats daily. The second category received one-half pound. The citizens grind the oats in coffee mills, to make flour for bread. For Christians two potatoes for each person. A slice of bread is sold for 25 rubles. There was no tobacco. People smoked cabbage and nettle. The situation at Vologda was the same as in Petrograd. It was famine and the population stood in line for bread sometimes for two days. There was no private commerce. The shops were empty. On his way from Vologda toward Archangel a commissar tried to coax Evispiert into serving in the Red Army, and his refusal sent him back to Vologda. A peasant hid him in a load of hay and carried him to his uncle's home in Torok. In the villages he passed through, he said, there was famine. The peasants cut straw, cooked it and made bread. Eventually after a long journey on foot through the snow Evispiert reached his home in Archangel. When such prisoners reach the territory of the Provisional Government of the North they are cared for as well as possible. Many of them voluntarily have joined the White Guard Army because of their hatred of the Bolsheviks. New directors elected include: Frank Kell, Wichita Falls, Texas. San Marino an Enduring Monument to the Ideals of President Wilson

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 29.—"Founded by a man whose parting prayer was that it never increase its territory by violence, San Marino, which has extended rights of citizenship to President Wilson, is an enduring monument to that ideal, while mighty Germany has been laid low by an exactly opposite ambition," says a bulletin from the National Geographic Society. "This tiny nation, 'our little ally,' is described by Alice Rhoe who wrote the communication on which the bulletin is based, as follows: 'The position of San Marino, 13 miles from Rimini, is singular. This little Republic, whose greatest length is 9 miles, is completely surrounded by Italy, who respects its autonomy, as have rulers of the past, with a few fleeting exceptions, since the pious Dalmatian stone-cutter left the mountain to his follows, free from every other man. 'That this little Republic, which today has 11,000 inhabitants and an area of 38 square miles, has maintained its independence, its freedom of liberty, in the midst of strife and bloodshed, of changing social conditions, for sixteen centuries, adds dignity to the unwavering belief of the trusting ones in the never-increasing protection of the saintly founder. 'The position of the mountain, far from the great Roman roads, the Via Flaminia and Via Aemilia; sufficient distance from the coast to be safe from maritime invasion; the stronghold impregnable to assault by medieval armies; the retiring and ostentatious peace-seeking character of the inhabitants; the comparative poverty of the country—all contributed to San Marino's being left alone. But there was an internal cause which existed in its institutions and its morality. 'In the life of the Republic today, the influence of the Dalmatian saint is strongly reflected. For a country to maintain the characteristics of its primitive founder is a social phenomenon of which possibly San Marino alone can boast. 'During the days of Christian persecutions, in the middle of the fourth century, Marino and Leo, two stone-cutters of Arbe, Dalmatia, crossed the Adriatic and came to Rimini. Their return, says tradition, was to aid Christians, condemned by pagan rulers, to reconstruct the walls of that city. 'The walls of Rimini having been finished, Leo and Marino looked longingly upon the solitude of the two mountains. As the hermits of the Thebaid, who flourished at this same period, they sought peace and solitude in those impenetrable heights. Hewing a bed from the rock and cultivating a little garden, Marino found all his material wants supplied. This rough bed and site of the garden are pointed out today by reverent peasants. 'A few slaves followed their former overseers in order to practice, undisturbed, their Christian faith.

"From neighboring fields and pastures and little settlements, came the weary and oppressed, seeking peace and the Christian faith upon the two mountains. Poor and simple people, their wants were easily satisfied. Soon two small villages or colonies sprang up about the little churches, taking the names of the two apostles. The influence of San Leo has been wiped out by the centuries, while that of San Marino exists today. 'Marino's desire was to found a free society, based upon liberty, justice, simplicity, charity, virtue, and, above all, a love of peace. When the good man came to die he called his followers about him and bequeathed to them his mountain, free from every other man.' His parting prayer was that they never seek enlargement of territory by violent means. War.

Commander of Ukrainian Troops Has a Plan to Check Bolsheviki Invasion

(Note: The subjoined article was written by an Associated Press correspondent who was sent to the Ukraine to ascertain the facts concerning the dispute over the Lemberg oil fields which has caused the fighting between the Poles and the Ukrainians. The correspondent crossed from the Polish to the Ukrainian lines and in doing so was fired upon by the Ukrainian troops. Difficulties in the way of forwarding his dispatches from the Ukraine were so great that it was necessary to employ the services of a courier from Vienna to Paris and the following article was forwarded in that manner.)

Associated Press Mail Correspondent. LEMBERG, Ukraine, May 2.—General Pavlenko, commander of the West Ukrainian army, suggests that the Entente Allies aid the Ukrainians

to fight the Bolsheviki and that they also settle the dispute between the Ukraine and Poland over the Lemberg oil fields.

"It would not be hard to defeat the Bolsheviki invaders of the Ukraine if the Allies helped us to organize our resources and also if the Allies settle the Lemberg oil field dispute, thus freeing the West Ukrainian army so that it might join forces with the army of General Krawuk in Greater Ukraine," said General Pavlenko to the Associated Press correspondent.

"I think this would be in the interest of the Allies. We would thus check the Bolsheviki invasion of Europe, restore order in the Ukraine which is a rich land and put our people to work growing wheat for Russia and also for Europe."

General Pavlenko is in command of the Ukrainian troops which have been fighting the Poles in the vicinity of Lemberg. He is a small wiry Russian with eyes deeply set—courteous, quiet but eloquent conversationalist. It is evident that he is liked by his staff which is housed in a former school building in Chodoroff. His task of holding together and organizing the West Ukrainian army is an arduous one but apparently does not weigh upon him too heavily.

"The Ukrainians were the first people to begin fighting Bolshevism," resumed the General. "This was long before the Allies thought of doing so and such is the irony of circumstances that the Allies are fighting Bolshevism."

"The people of Russian Ukraine had for a time a touch of the Bolsheviki disease but they now are cured of it as they are essentially small farmers and property owners. It speaks of Bolshevism as a disease since it must be regarded in that sense, like the influenza. It presents an attractive proposition to poor people harassed by a long war with special hopes for the future."

"If the Allies visit us in an open-minded spirit, they will realize that we too are fighting Bolshevism. If they will determine to help in this great fight morally and also with medicines and munitions we will be able to retake Greater Ukraine from Moscow which is bent upon holding all the territory that previously was Russian."

"I would not advise invasion of Russia by anybody as conditions will fight themselves when this mental disease has run its course. There is now no danger from Bolshevism in West Ukraine (as Eastern Galicia is now called) as there are relatively few factory workers. Peasants are never Bolsheviki."

"We have been blamed for the bombardment of Lemberg it is true, but we have no intention of doing other than destroying the Polish army's stores and the railway station. The Poles were seizing it as a military post and we were compelled to fire on it but this must not be repeated as we realize that the Poles are using this fact as a weapon to advertise as Bolsheviki."

"Nevertheless it is a fight to death in which we are engaged. Our soldiers, after four years of war, are ready again to fight because they are mostly sons of peasants and ordinary people who always have regarded the Poles as aristocratic oppressors. The whole Ukrainian people now is engaged in a fight to obtain independence. They may be defeated by the Poles and by the Bolsheviki, but they prefer death to submission."

"The Russian Ukraine attempted to obtain autonomy first from the Duma then from Premier Kerensky but failed. Then it asked Lenin (Premier of the Russian Soviet government) for permission to become one of the federated states of Russia; but Lenin rejected the plan.

"Now we want separation and complete independence. Our efforts toward this end for the past 18 months have been defeated partly by German occupation and partly by General Skoropadsky who was rallied the Russian refugee army officers and landowners. Now it is the Bolsheviki who are the invaders."

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# 36TH DIVISION BEGAN MOVING TO EMBARKATION ON SUNDAY AMID CHEERS OF 20,000 YANKS

The Thirty-sixth Division is now making its first move in the direction of home, moving to embarkation center having commenced on last Sunday. This splendid news was contained in a dispatch published in The Times of yesterday as coming from The Arrowhead, the official organ of the divisions, issued on April 31.

The Commanding General Service of Supplies has been directed this date to prepare the Thirty-sixth Division for return to the United States. "Twenty thousand soldiers in the Thirty-sixth Division," continues the story announcing the homecoming "went wild. At last it has come. Home and sweetheart, mother, dad and sister and brother. Home and the things they fought for. Home and the old, sweet life of the free and easy once more."

The big news broke at Divisional Headquarters Thursday with the receipt of a telegram from the S. O. S. (Service of Supplies) relayed through the First Army.

Since the coming of of the Champagne front, where they participated in the bloody Argonne Forest struggle, the units of the division have been scattered in villages through the States of Aube and Yonne, a majority of the regiments being stationed in Yonne. Headquarters of the division have been located at Cheney, eight miles from Tonnerre.

ORDINANCE PASSED BY COUNCIL PERMITTING RAISE IN WATER RATE.

### DISCUSS THE HOSPITAL BONDS

Traction Company Franchise Ordinance passed at the Second Reading.

The passing on its second reading of an ordinance repealing certain sections of the franchise under which the Wichita Falls Traction Co. operates.

Charter Committee.

The committee appointed to draft a new charter for the city consists of J. A. Kemp, R. E. Huff, A. H. Brisson, H. F. Weidon, J. F. Reed, J. A. Richolt and J. B. Marlow.

While no definite time was fixed last night by the council, early action by the committee was requested, in order that the new charter may come before the people for approval at an early election as possible.

The ordinance increasing the water company's rates was passed on its final reading, and the new rates will become effective in 60 days.

The increase amounts to 20 per cent all down the line. The matter has been hanging fire for some time, due, it is understood, to consideration of plans looking toward the purchase of the company by the city and the resultant municipal control of the water supply.

The vote on final passage of the ordinance last night was not unanimous, but the measure had enough

With reference to the traction company, the ordinance passed on its second reading last night grants the company the right to operate without paying or grading where new tracks are laid, and also exempts the company from the payment of the 2 per cent gross tax when the city reaches a population of 25,000. A gross tax of 2 per cent will be applied when the company's net earnings, exclusive of all taxes paid, amounts to 8 per cent on the amount of actual investment. An ordinance was passed on its first reading giving the Wichita Valley Railway Co. the right to construct a siding at the south ends of Scott, Laman and Texas streets, and on an amended ordinance also went through increasing to \$1,000 the denomination of the bonds recently voted for paving and city improvements. G. E. Zimmerman and J. P. Foly requested permission from the council to accept contracts from property owners for paving, under the supervision of the city engineer. The matter was referred to the street committee of the council. H. A. Waller received permission to construct a filling station at 902 Laman, and permission also granted to Charles Hill to move a filling station from 619 Ninth street to 814 Ninth.
