BILL IS INTRODUCED IN THE LEGISLATURE PROPOSING A DOUBLE PRIMARY SYSTEM

Is Taken Up in the House Today on Second Reading of the Measure.

NO FURTHER SUBJECTS

Governor Will Not Submit Other Issues Except on Request of a Majority.

AUSTIN, May 6.—Recommendation that the board of control bill be so amended as to make it become effective January 1, 1920, was made today in a message from Governor Hobbs to the legislature.

At a session to be convened in the meantime, continues the message, "I will again submit this subject so that the law may be amended to conform to the best judgment of your body."

The senate began consideration of the soldiers voting question by adopting the committee report on the McNealis bill, the author of the four amendments, which had been adopted by the house committee last night.

A bill proposing revision of the general election laws so as to provide a double primary system and to change the date of holding the election was taken up on second reading.

WASHINGTON, May 6.—Orders were issued by the War Department for the recruit of 8,000 men to serve as replacement troops for American soldiers now in Siberia.

Only men with previous military experience will be accepted. The enlistment for service both in Serbia and Europe has been extended to the Hawaiian Islands and the Panama canal zone.

UNIONISTS INDIGNANT

President Wilson and Premier Lloyd George Involved in the Comments.

LONDON, May 6.—The visit of representatives of American Irish societies to Ireland is creating great interest in Sinn Fein circles there and equal indignation in unionist quarters in England and Ireland.

There is considerable mystery about the whole affair and it is unknown whether Premier Lloyd George has been in communication with the visitors at all.

While, according to some dispatches from Ireland, the Sinn Feiners are greatly encouraged and believe the creation of an Irish republic is within sight, the Unionist press here is angrily calling for an explanation from Premier Lloyd George and criticizing President Wilson's alleged interference in British domestic affairs.

Fair, Frank Walker, all of Strawn. They were indicted here because Carpenter died in Fort Worth. He was shot and beaten near Strawn.

PLAN ECONOMIC ISOLATION IF GERMANS FAIL TO SIGN THE PEACE TERMS AS PRESENTED

SUMMARY OF TODAY'S INTERNATIONAL SITUATION

By Associated Press.—Preparations have virtually been completed for the presentation of the terms of peace to the German delegates at Versailles at 5 o'clock tomorrow afternoon.

Nothing Official Made Public

Nothing official has been made public as to the agreement under which Italy has consented to return her territories to France in the peace conference. A report reaching London, however, declares that it is proposed to make Fiume a neutral port for a period of two years, after which time it is to be turned over to Italy.

Proceeds with Organization

Meanwhile, the League of Nations has proceeded further with its organization. At the meeting of the organization committee yesterday, Stephen Pichon, the French foreign minister, was elected chairman of the provisional organization.

CHINESE DELEGATION APPEALS TO PRESIDENT

PARIS, May 6.—The Chinese delegation to the peace conference has appealed to President Wilson to intercede with the conference members to have China included among the powers permitted the presentation of the peace treaty to the Germans at Versailles tomorrow.

START FLIGHT FROM ENGLAND TO SPAIN

HARLATE, ENGLAND, May 6.—Major Dairley, of the British army, with two lieutenants and three mechanics, started from here at 7 o'clock this morning on a flight to Madrid in a four-engined Handley-Page plane.

TERMS ON WEDNESDAY

Will Be Delivered During the Afternoon Tomorrow, According to Plans.

PARIS, May 6.—The complete economic isolation of Germany is being considered by the council of foreign ministers of the peace conference as a measure to be adopted in the event that Germany refuses to sign the peace treaty.

BELIEVE TREATY WILL BE DISPOSED OF BY JUNE 1

PARIS, Monday, May 5.—It seems now to be quite possible that the peace treaty with Germany will be disposed of before June 1, a member of the American delegation said tonight.

President Wilson, in addition to attending the meeting of the council of three in the afternoon and going to Versailles to look over the arrangements for the meeting with the Germans there on Wednesday, visited the delegates to the peace conference with the entire American delegation.

NO COMPROMISE OF ADRIATIC PROBLEM

PARIS, Monday, May 5.—No actual compromise of the Adriatic problem has been arranged with the Italian delegates to the peace conference, now on their way back to Paris, so far as is known here tonight.

CERTAIN SACRIFICES TO BE MADE BY ITALIANS

PARIS, May 6.—The note sent by Premier Orlando to Paris on Sunday night from Rome, indicated an intention to treat with the other powers on the basis of a letter drawn up by Arthur J. Balfour, the British foreign secretary, which Premier Clemenceau and Lloyd George made him on the eve of his departure from Paris, according to "Pettinax" in the Echo de Paris today.

NEGRO KILLED, NINE INJURED IN BATTLE AT PLANO, TEXAS

PLANO, TEX., May 6.—Tom Embrey, a negro, after standing off citizens and officers for four hours from a barricade in his home, was shot and killed here shortly before noon today. Nine persons were wounded, one probably fatally by bullets fired by the negro.

WICHITA OVER THE QUOTA BY HALF MILLION

The Announcement Is Made by Chairman A. H. Britain of County Campaign.

THREE DAYS FOR CITY

Record Has Not Been Equalled by Any City or District of Similar Size.

Wichita Falls was over with her quota of the Victory Loan, \$1,175,400 before the close of the third day of the drive, and the entire county was over shortly afterward, with the exception of Electra. This welcome news was made public by Chairman A. H. Britain Monday night, when the informal rally was held after the arrival of the special train from Dallas, bearing the baby tank, some special Liberty Loan speakers and a band.

An excess over the quota of a half million dollars has been raised in the week since Wichita Falls and Iowa Park and Burk Burnett subscribed the quota. Electra has not yet made its report but Chairman Britain is sure that it has come up with the amount allotted. The final report from the county, including the women workers, will be ready by Wednesday, Mr. Britain added, and the full amount will be sent to the Eleventh Federal Reserve district.

Wichita Falls record in going over the quota in three days time has not been equalled by any city or district of similar size, and there are a number of cities that have not yet raised their quota, according to reports from the district committee. When the quota was reached the chairman and workers kept on, determined to make such a substantial oversubscription that Wichita county would again be in the lead of counties making oversubscriptions. So well did they work that the surplus has reached a half million, being approximately a 33 1/3 per cent oversubscription.

The special train went to Iowa Park and Electra this morning, leaving early in the morning, and not staging any special meeting, as had been expected. The tank was taken from the Stanton Garage, on Scott avenue, where it spent the night and with chairman Britain as the passenger in the gun turret drove through the streets back to the train and was loaded on the car.

Curtis O. Hancock, from Dallas, is in charge of the train and J. D. Farnell of Vernon, state representative, and Lucian W. Parrish, U. S. congressman from this district, are assisting him, in the tour through their district. There are several returned soldiers

with the train and the King Candy Co.'s band. The band gave a short program, and the three men made short talks, at an informal open air meeting held last night in front of the city hall. It was at this meeting that Mr. Britain made the announcement that on last Monday, April 28, Wichita Falls and Wichita county had more than completed their quota, and that by work since that time the quota has been oversubscribed \$500,000.

DISCLOSE PLANS FOR ABANDONMENT OF FLYING FIELDS

By Associated Press. WASHINGTON, May 6.—Orders for new airplanes soon will be placed by the war department to prevent collapse of the airplane manufacturing capacity built up during the war. The machines to be ordered will be of advanced types developed from war experience and designed by engineers working under conditions more favorable than those existing during the war.

Acting Secretary Crowell disclosed the department's plans in this respect Monday in explaining that it had decided to abandon Barron, Call, Caruthers, Love, Rich and Tallaferrero fields, Texas; Payne Field, Miss.; Gertner Field, Louisiana; Taylor Field, Alabama, and Eberis Field, Arkansas.

The ten fields to be abandoned are being used at present to store equipment the government having on hand more service machines than would be needed to supply any military establishment contemplated for peace.

To Concentrate Equipment.
This equipment is to be concentrated at fields to be retained which already have been announced. The ten fields then will be turned over to any other government department that might need them, or the buildings will be sold or salvaged.

Definite plans for the air service await action of congress as to the military policy. Acting Secretary Crowell said the department, however, was moving toward a broad constructive program, designed to cover not only military needs, but also relations between the government and civil enterprise for promotion of air navigation.

One element of air flight development is in progress in Paris where rules of the air, including standardization of signals, navigation marks, flying field and similar matters are being discussed by an international commission. The United States, Mr. Crowell said, will take an active part in this work.

AGED WOMAN ADMITS SHE KILLED PUBLISHER, ALLEGING AN ATTACK

By Associated Press. CHICAGO, May 6.—Mrs. Vera Trepagnier, 60 year old widow, who shot and killed Paul Vollard, a publisher, at his office yesterday, talked freely today of the shooting, the cause of which was a miniature of George Washington. "In my state men may be, gamble, cheat in business; but they do not lay hands on women,"

she said. "I cannot deny shooting Paul Vollard; he choked me. I do not remember firing, but I recall his saying, 'You've killed me.' His fingers relaxed from my throat and he fell before me. Then I grew faint and fell too. I had not meant to shoot him. He had robbed me, I felt, of the only dear thing left me. He had evaded me for two years."

She said she was born in Belfast, Ireland, the daughter of a shipbuilder, and came to America when a small girl. She married Ellis Trepagnier, a sugar planter of New Orleans, who died following the loss of his fortune. Friends obtained for her a position in Washington, where she met Vollard. She was reputed a connoisseur on art, and as she had studied art in her early days, she showed him the miniature, whose history he knew. He wanted the publisher's rights of reproduction and they reached an agreement as to royalties. Thereafter, she said, she could get no satisfaction from the publisher.

STATE BUYS \$10,800 OF VICTORY LOAN BONDS

By Associated Press. AUSTIN, May 6.—The state of Texas now owns \$2,250,000 in government bonds, the latest purchase being \$10,800 in the new Victory Loan, which was made with money out of the permanent fund of eleemosynary institutions.

The state holds a total of \$60,800 in Liberty bonds. The remaining \$2,200,000 is in treasury certificates which will mature in August and September of this year.

JAPAN PROPOSES TO RETURN SHANTUNG TO CHINESE CONTROL

PARIS, May 6.—The policy of Japan is to return the Shantung peninsula in full sovereignty to China retaining only the economic privileges granted Germany and the right to a settlement under the usual conditions at Tsing Tao, it was declared in a statement issued today by Baron Makino, head of the Japanese delegation at the peace conference, in explanation of Japan's position on the Shantung question. Regarding the railway which is to become a China-Japanese joint undertaking, Baron Makino said the owners would use special police only to assure the security of traffic and for no other purpose. The force would be composed of Chinese, such Japanese instructors as are select would be appointed by the Chinese government.

PRINCIPLES BEING APPLIED.

The statement by China's delegate to the effect that Japan has been appealed in the peace treaty at the expense of China, will excite sympathy from the American people, and if the statement is true it will lessen confidence in the League of Nations. President Wilson never did more to make the League of Nations a virtuous effective thing than he did when he issued his statement in reference to Italy's claim to Fiume. This statement resulted in Italy's delegates leaving the peace conference, but it gave notice to the world that secret understandings would not be upheld. Italy's delegates left the conference and the Italian parliament gave a vote of confidence to Premier Orlando but now the Italian delegates are returning to the peace conference and there will doubtless be some reaction in Italy that will lead to a settlement on the basis outlined by President Wilson. For President Wilson not to have challenged Italy's claims would have been to make the League of Nations merely a thing of empty words.

EXPECT CHANGE IN THE RUSSIAN SITUATION SOON

Is Predicted by Specialists of Conference Within the Next Few Weeks.

MOVEMENT IS DEFINED

General Udenitch and Troops Are Supported by Finnish Government.

By Associated Press.

PARIS, Monday, May 5.—Specialists on Russian subjects attached to various allied delegations at the peace conference expect decided changes in the Russian situation within the next few weeks.

The Finnish military movement which has been threatening Petrograd and which has been throuded with mystery is now well defined. General Udenitch and four thousand Russians operating with him have the support of the Finnish government and troops, and have recruited large numbers of Russian peasants, who have become tired of Bolshevik requisitions. General Udenitch has occupied Petros Avodk, Olonetz and Ladince Pole, east of Ladoga and thus controls the southern end of the Kola railway. The escape of the Bolsheviks operating against allied forces in the Kola peninsula has been made impossible and communication between the Moscow government and the Murman coast has been cut. Under the direction of General Udenitch and the leaders of the Finnish troops there the residents of the Karelia district are apparently preparing to launch a movement looking to their annexation to Finland. The Finnish give Finland the Kola railway and a northern outlet to the Arctic.

Unfavorable to Plan.

The Russian committee working for a united Russia here is decidedly unfavorable to such a step and is trying to block it. Many persons believe the entente powers are encouraging the Udenitch troops which are threatening Petrograd so seriously that the Bolsheviks are evacuating the city. If Udenitch should occupy Petrograd the re-occupying of the city by the Allies would be easy and the apparent abandonment of the Nansen plan of re-occupying Petrograd under neutral auspices is regarded as an indication that the entente expects the Bolsheviks soon to be forced to withdraw to Moscow.

Admiral Kolchak's Siberian army continues its movement westward toward the Volga and it is expected that it will reach the city in a few days. With Kolchak threatening the valley of the Volga and Udenitch menacing Petrograd, and with Kiev in the hands of anti-Bolshevik troops and with Kolchak's northern army moving rapidly toward the line of communication between Moscow and Archangel, the Bolshevik military situation is precarious.

Regarding the recommendation of M. Zinoff, the governor of Petrograd, Nikolai Lenine, the Russian Bolshevik premier, recently has been releasing virtually all political prisoners there in an effort to show that the government is becoming more tolerant.

ONE HUNDRED AND FIFTY ARE KILLED IN MUNICH FIGHTING

By Associated Press.

BERLIN, Monday, May 5.—One hundred and fifty persons were killed or executed during the fighting at Munich, according to an account of the fall of that city printed on the Lokal Anzeiger. Among the killed were Herr Toller, director of the soviet government, and Herr Sontheimer, a communist leader. Herr Seidl, who was said to have instigated the shooting of postages, was beaten to death by Warttemberg soldiers. It is said that the Tagelblatt states that five thousand arrests have been made in Munich, the prisoners including Dr. Leven, leader of the Bavarian independent socialists and Town Governor Weber.

CELEBRATE VICTORY OVER SOVIET GOVERNMENT

By Associated Press.

MUNICH, Monday, May 5.—All Munich celebrated the victory over the soviet government yesterday. The streets were crowded with people who cheered the passing troops or gave them refreshment. Captured Spartacists were hooted as they were escorted through the streets, bands played national airs outside the captured palace and the crowds sang patriotic anthems.

EIGHT PERSONS ARE KILLED AT COLUMBUS IN DOWNTOWN FIRE

By Associated Press.

COLUMBUS, O., May 6.—Eight persons are known to have been killed and a dozen or more were injured, several probably fatally in a fire which early today destroyed a six-story apartment house in the downtown section. Miraculous escapes, some by jumping from the fifth and sixth stories into life nets and the tossing of infants several stories into nets and an army of fire fighters made it the most spectacular fire this city has known in some time.

Identified dead are:

Mrs. Charles Speakman, Mrs. Carl Steigelwald, George Reifelder, Mrs. George Reifelder.

At four o'clock this morning police found the bodies of a man and woman on the fourth floor. Their names have not been ascertained.

They were suffocated and burned in bed.

Four small children of Mrs. Steigelwald are believed to have perished on the sixth floor from which their mother leaped to her death. They were unaccounted for. Numerous others have not been found by friends or the police and officers this morning expressed fear that half a dozen were trapped and burned to death. Miss Anna Bell Joyce, 38, cannot live, physicians say. She was taken from the building in a semi-conscious condition after the blaze was under control. That she was alive is attributed to her hanging across an open window. The lower part of her body was terribly burned. Others are in hospitals with broken limbs and burns which may prove fatal in several instances.

The fifty and sixth floors where the fire was the worst, fell in and search for bodies cannot be made until late in the day. It was on these floors that most of those unaccounted for were living.

HOME MOVEMENT OF TROOPS IN APRIL 10,000 MEN A DAY

By Associated Press.

WASHINGTON, May 6.—The homeward movement of the American troops from France approached ten thousand men a day in April, according to figures made public today by the war department. A total of 287,795 men embarked during the month as compared with an estimated possible maximum movement of 255,000. The speeding up of the "turn around" of the troops was said to have been responsible for the increase.

The figures show that the total estimated strength of the army on April 29, not including Marines, was 1,775,905, of whom 1,082,329 were in Europe, 108,097 at sea and 541,176 in the United States. The strength of the army in France on that date was 56 per cent of that on November 11. Enlistments reported since February 28, when voluntary recruiting resumed, totaled 23,387, of whom 6,017 asked for duty in France.

LOSS ON RAILROADS FOR THREE MONTHS IS 13 MILLIONS

By Associated Press.

WASHINGTON, May 6.—The government's loss in operating the railroads for the three months of this year was \$130,000,000, according to earning figures of the so-called class 1, or the larger roads, reported to the Interstate Commerce commission and compiled by the bureau of railroad economics. During this period the railroads earned for the government \$40,000,000, while the government was obligated under the railroad control act to pay the companies \$170,000,000. Operating revenues were reported as \$1,265,078,000, operating expenses as \$1,031,378,000, net revenues as \$23,221,000 and net operating income \$39,814,000.

WELL KNOWN PAINTER ESCAPES AUTHORITIES

BERLIN, Monday, May 5.—It has been ascertained that Prof. von Stuck, the widely known Bavarian painter and architect, escaped when the hostages held by the soviet authorities at Munich were executed.

HAVE AUTHORITY TO FORBID TRADING ON THE EXCHANGES

CHICAGO, May 6.—Julius H. Barnes, wheat administrator, said in an address today to the Chicago board of trade that the act establishing the food administration gave authority to control trading in foodstuffs on exchanges to the extent of prohibition of trading altogether. He said the act was still in effect, that his duty was imperative if demonstrated abuse should arise.

Mr. Barnes questioned frankly whether a fluctuation in corn prices, such as took place in Chicago yesterday—a rapid break of ten or twelve cents followed by quick reaction of five or six cents—was not a clear indication of speculation on so large a scale that it was overbalancing legitimate functions.

A conference will be called May 13, at New York between representatives of millers, bakers and grain traders and others at which certain trade agreements will be entered into, Mr. Barnes announced. He added that if the prices of flour did not sharply reflect the real situation in regard to supplies, the United States must shortly return to the 1917 food regulations which allowed only thirty days' supply to be held on hand. He did not want to do this, he said.

There was a touch of the dramatic in the appearance of Mr. Barnes in the quotations room off the trading floor, for yesterday was not the first time that an utterance of Mr. Barnes has upset the calculations of traders. The crowd was bullish yesterday and the buying had run the price to a new high record for the crop when there came from Minneapolis, Mr. Barnes' statement that wheat was to be imported in moderate quantities from Canada.

Prices dropped 10 to 12 cents and there were among Mr. Barnes' listeners today many who lost money on the slump. They regarded him as one who throws a monkey wrench into the machinery, although Mr. Barnes had given ample warning a week or so before that he would take just such action if speculation in flour was not curbed.

The speaker said he wished to make it clear that the wheat director has no authority in law to control maximum prices on wheat, but he must make effective absolutely the guaranteed producer price.

When Mr. Barnes concluded there was applause and then a rush back to the trading pits. The price was parvoous for a few minutes at first, dropping half a cent or so, and then after a little hesitation the price recovered and attained the best of the day.

The general opinion seemed that the bearish reference had been fully discounted by yesterday's decline.

OIL IS REPORTED AT 1800 FEET IN WELL NEAR PECOS

SPECIAL TO THE TIMES. FORT WORTH, TEXAS, May 6.—Alfred Timmally, president of the Sunshine Oil Corporation, has made an announcement that the Lura well, six miles north of Pecos, on Friday struck oil sand at 1800 feet and now stands 50 feet in oil of very high gravity. The drill is only a few inches in the sand and the well is shut down on account of boiler trouble.

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STAGE IS SET FOR PRESENTING PEACE TERMS

Premier Clemenceau, President and Premier Lloyd George at Head of Table

CLEMENCEAU TO SPEAK

Following Address Germans to Receive the Judgment of the Allied Nations

By Associated Press. VERSAILLES, Monday, May 5.—When the German delegation enters the dining room of the Hotel Trianon Wednesday afternoon to receive the text of the treaty of peace they will find the representative of the powers arrayed against Germany awaiting them at one of the great tables which have been placed in the room. Premier Clemenceau, President Wilson and Premier Lloyd George will stand at the head of the table. The Germans will not join the Allied delegates at this time but will be conducted to a smaller table standing by itself at the open end of the great horseshoe formed by the green covered tables arranged for the meeting. There they will listen to M. Clemenceau's opening address and receive the judgment of the allied and associated nations as formulated in the conditions as drawn up during the four months of deliberation by the conference.

President on Right. On Clemenceau's right will be President Wilson and the other American delegates, while on his left Premier Lloyd George and the British representatives will be grouped. Flanking the Americans will come the French delegation with Marshal Foch in the center. Next to these will be representatives of Italy, Belgium, Brazil, Greece, Portugal and Serbia. On the left side and seated below the delegates of Great Britain will be those of the British dominions, Japan, Poland, Rumania and Czecho-Slovakia. Two tables have been placed for the general secretaries of the inter-allied conference directly behind Pres-

ident Wilson and Premier Lloyd George. Secretaries of individual delegations will have seats at the sides of the room behind their respective delegations. The four big cut glass chandeliers which hang from the ceiling of the hall will scarcely be needed at the hour set for the ceremony, at 3:15 p. m.

Only six of the principal German delegates, three secretaries, official interpreters and an official stenographer will be admitted out of the large German delegation, according to present arrangements. The subordinates will have tables immediately behind the delegation chiefs. The German party will have only a few feet to walk to its place after entering the room as the entrance door is located in a corner near the designated position of the enemy representatives. The 40 representatives of the press have been assigned immediately behind the Germans. Premier Clemenceau was the first of the allied chiefs to visit the scene of the presentation of the peace terms this afternoon. A few minutes after his arrival President Wilson and Premier Lloyd George entered and were introduced by M. Clemenceau to Major Bismarck, the officer in charge for the French government who showed them over the rooms assigned for the principal session and for subsequent deliberations. All three took a lively interest in the details of the arrangements for the ceremony, suggesting various changes and improvements during the afternoon.

The German delegates in charge of financial affairs walked over from their hotel to meet allied representatives to continue the discussion of matters which were taken up last Friday. Five American correspondents will attend the session Wednesday and Germany, England, France, Italy and Japan will each have the same number. The remainder of the correspondents will come from the British colonies and minor powers.

HOHENZOLLERNS DO NOT OWN LAND IN CANADA

By Associated Press. OTTAWA, Ont., May 6.—Rumors that William Hohenzollern owned vast tracts of land in the Canadian far west are denied by government investigators who have announced that the former emperor does not own "a dollar's worth of holdings in British Columbia."

Several million dollars worth of property of enemy which is being held by the Dominion custodian, will be disposed of until after the peace treaty is signed, it is understood.

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STRIKE OF 8,000 EMPLOYEES AT THE OVERLAND PLANT

By Associated Press. TOLEDO, O., May 6.—About 7,500 unorganized employees of the Overland plant and 500 of the Electric Autolight Company, an Overland subsidiary, quit work as usual at 3:30 Monday afternoon in defiance of orders of their employers to stay on the job until 4:06 p. m. Included in the employees to cast their lot with the men were 500 women.

Vice President Clarence A. Earl of the Overland company declared that each employee quitting at 3:30 had forfeited his job. He made no statement as to what efforts would be made to replace the workers, but said the doors would not be locked against them. Union men at the Overplant said they expected the 3,000 non-union workers would walk out in sympathy. Threats of violence against them, if they failed to quit, were made. Police Chief Herbert announced 35 parolmen were being held in reserve. The men have been working 45 hours a week. Company officials several days ago informed the employees that competition in the automobile industry made all working days of eight hours each compulsory.

AUSTRIAN TREATY TO BE CONSIDERED AS COUNCIL WAITS

By Associated Press. PARIS, Monday, May 5.—Orders have been issued to specialists in Austro-Hungarian subjects to rush their reports so that the treaty with Austria can be considered during the 15 days that the Germans will be discussing the terms of peace to be submitted to them on Wednesday. At the plenary session tomorrow afternoon, Captain Andre Tardieu, of the French delegation, will read an extended digest of the treaty for the information of the minor powers. The document is so voluminous it is probable that no delegate has read all its sections.

SOLDIER IS KILLED IN FALL FROM TRAIN

By Associated Press. PARSONS, Kan., May 5.—After coming through the battle of the Argonne safely, Ernest J. Bailey, of Springfield, Mo., a member of the 138th machine gun battalion, fell from a train bearing members of the 35th division to Camp Funston yesterday and his body, with both legs severed below the knees, was found here this morning beside the M. K. and T. tracks.

**FROM WORLD WAR TO
WORLD BROTHERHOOD
KEYNOTE OF COUNCIL**

By Associated Press.
CLEVELAND, Ohio, May 6.—"From World War to World Brotherhood" will be the keynote of the special meeting of the Federated Council of the Churches of Christ in America, which opens a three-day session here today. The program, in general, will deal with the after-the-war responsibilities and opportunities of the church.

This delegated body, officially representing thirty-eight denominations of American Protestantism, ordinarily convenes quadrennially, but because of the emergencies of the reconstruction period, the 400 members of the council have been summoned to meet more than a year before the regular time.

The opening session was chiefly devoted to a consideration of committee reports. There will also be a discussion of international relationships. At a community mass meeting Tuesday evening, Rev. C. B. Myers, of London, and Dr. Robert E. Speer, of New York, will deliver addresses upon "The Leadership of American Protestantism in the New Internationalism."

Four Prime Demands.
For the two remaining days of the conference, the discussions will center about what are called the four prime demands of the hour upon the Christian church: first, a more effective proclamation of fundamental verities; second, a new sense of world responsibilities animating all the departments of church life; third, a resolute effort to understand what a Christian social order in America would be to obtain it; and fourth, a swiftly increasing co-operation among the churches.

Among the speakers on the program are Rev. Nehemiah Boynton, of Brooklyn, N. Y.; Rev. James I. Vance, of Nashville, Tenn.; Rev. Charles Judson Smith, of New York; Rev. Hubert C. Herring, of Boston; Rev. Charles W. Gilkey, of Chicago; Dr. S. Earl Taylor and Rev. Alfred W. Anthony, of New York; Wayne B. Wheeler, of the Anti-Saloon League; Dr. Earl Dean Howard, of Northwestern University, and officers of the council, several of whom have just returned from the war zone.

Look to America.
The churches of the world look to American churchmen for leadership in bringing about a world conference of churches. Reverend Charles S. MacFarland of New York, said today in a report read at a special meeting here of the Federal Council of the Churches of Christ of America, of which he is the general secretary.

"Recent correspondence with Christian leaders in the various nations seem to indicate," Mr. MacFarland declared, "that the time is approaching for a world conference of the churches, and there is a general disposition to look towards the Federal Council of the American churches for leadership in bringing about such a conference. Indeed some of the for-

eign church bodies have definitely committed this task to us."
Asserting that "one of the most important developments in the past few years has been the deepening relationship with the church bodies of other nations," Dr. MacFarland added:
Similar Federations.
"Indeed we find testimony to the fact the existence of the Federal Council has led to the organization of similar federations in other nations, and, in cases where federal councils previously existed, to the stimulation of their activities. These relationships have deepened, especial-

ly in Europe and more particularly in France and Belgium."
**FAMOUS DINING PLACE
TO BE CLOSED SOON**

**AMERICAN AUTOS GET
FOOTHOLD OVERSEAS**

DANISH AND AUSTRALIAN VISITORS PREDICT COUNTRIES WILL BUY HEAVILY.

FORCED FROM EUROPEAN MARTS BY WAR, THEY FIND AMERICAN CAR SUPERIOR

American automobiles gained a strong foothold in Denmark and Australia when the European nations were so busily battling each other that their output of cars virtually ceased. So well are they liked by the inhabitants of these far-away states that they have become almost a necessity.

Axel Semler and L. Bech of Denmark and H. B. Crosby of Adelaide, South Australia, who have been recent visitors at Dodge Brothers Works, Detroit, say that previous to the war the American cars were little known in Denmark, though they had been sold in Australia to a limited extent for ten years or more.

When the European nations ceased making cars, however, the Danes and Australians turned to the United States for automobiles. They found them cheap and durable and light of frame. They men here predict a continual increase in the use of American automobiles in their countries.

Mr. Semler said that before the war the larger part of the automobiles in Denmark were of European manufacture, mostly from Germany, but that hereafter the German automobiles will be in disfavor.

"We have always disliked the Germans," he said. "They took Schleswig-Holstein from us in 1864. We hope the peace conference will right that wrong. The constant sinking of our ships has added to our irritation."

"Although we have a population of scarcely 3,000,000 persons, we kept an army of 100,000 during the war to preserve our neutrality. The mines which the Germans set floating in the North Sea are now a menace to ships. On my trip over we had to anchor the first three nights to avoid these dangers. One day I counted three mines within fifteen minutes."

Mr. Crosby, who is a member of the national parliament of Australia, spoke of the plan of the colony for caring for returned soldiers. The government intends to make a loan up to \$3,500 to every returned man, either to buy land or start in business, and will ask no interest until the soldier is in a position to pay.

This district will be the first visited by the New Yorkers special train, which will then go to other Texas oil fields.

Two million acres of this land is in Texas, 200,000 being in the Ranger field. Development of this acreage already is under way and indications are most favorable for big results.

The train will be in charge of H. H. Scott of the Doherty interests. J. C. McDowell, President of the gas and transportation companies controlled by the Doherty interests, will be a member of the party.

BIG IMPROVEMENT IN BUSINESS PROSPECT DURING LAST MONTH

WASHINGTON, May 6.—During April business prospects improved and retail trade increased in volume, prices apparently assumed a more stable position and business generally was considered on a stronger and better footing, says a federal reserve board statement issued today. The floating supply of labor which threatened a considerable amount of unemployment during February and March has been partially absorbed and federal reserve agents report a growth in confidence and improvement in general trade and industrial conditions. Continuing the statement says manufacturing is still retarded in steel and some other basic industries, but there is improvement in the copper and lead situation. Textile manufacturing both in wool and cotton particularly the former, is improving. The export trade of the month was large and financial conditions quiet and reassuring.

OVERWHELMING MAJORITY FOR LEAGUE OF NATIONS

NEW YORK, May 6.—An overwhelming majority of 12,000,000 men of American favor the entrance of the United States into the league of nations, according to an announcement today by officials of the League to Enforce Peace.

Resolutions have been adopted by 193 organizations, it was said, including the American agricultural association, farmers, education and educational and co-operation union of American Farmers' Equity union; Farmers' National council, Farmers' National Board of Farm organizations; National Federation of Grocers, National Grange and the non-Partisan league, declaring in favor of the Paris project. At the same time it was stated, fifty five prominent agricultural representatives every state in the union, are mobilizing the farmers of the country for a "drive" on the United States senate when the league of nations is represented for ratification.

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NEGRO INSANE ASYLUM IS NEARING COMPLETION
