AN IMMIGRATION INSPECTOR KILLED NEAR THE BORDER LABOR TROUBLE AT

LARADO, TEXAS, May 9,-Charles LARADO, TEXAS, May 9,—Charles Hopkins, an immigration inspector, and three unknown Mexicans were killed, and two men seriously wounded, one perhaps fatally, in a gun fight between American officers and Mexican smugglers, seven miles southeast of Laredo last night. Ira Hill, of the Texas health service, and Valdez, an alleged smuggler were wounded, Valdez is not expected to live.

A party of two American customs inspectors, three immigration inspectors, including Hopkins, and the Texas health officer, while on patrol duty on the river a tten o'clock last night encountered the four Mexicans who had just landed on the American side When called upon to halt the Mexi-cans opened fire with rifles and re-volvers. VERSAILLES, Thursday, May The question whether Germany will sign the treaty or not is the pressing one of the hour. 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CHAIKMAN UF WAR LEGION

Feeling Between National Guard and Regular Army Is Brought to Front.

CRITICISM IS OFFERED

ST. LOUIS, MO., May 9.—Feeling between the national guard and the regular army today was brought to the front at the second day's session of the pational caucus of the American legion, composed of men and women who were in the military or naval service of the government during the war.

Major Hamilton Fish, of New York, represented a resolution urging that congress place the national guard and the regular army on an equal footing and charges were freely made that national guard officers in France had been discriminated against in lavor of the regulars. In addition, efforts were made by various delegates

favor of the regulars. In addition, efforts were made by various delegates to restrict the personnel of the legion to men not in the regular army.

Discrimination Charged.

Major Fish's resolution was the outcome of half a dozen drawn up by different state delegates on the same subjects. Some were much more drastic, urging constitutional investigation of the assignment of officers in the American expeditionary forces while others simply requested that

while others simply requested that the convention take some action in the matter of alleged discrimination against the national guard.

In regard to membership, strong teeling against the regulars was evident among the delegates but the general sentiment seemed to be that no final action should yet be taken in order not to affect the many men still in France, but who are not members

order not to affect the many men still in France, but who are not members of the regular army.

For Beer and High Wines.

Prohibition and employment were among other questions brought up. The prohibition resolution finally adopted by the committee urges that the sale of beer and light wines be continued until the members of the continued until the members of the American expeditionary force can voice their opinion in the matter.

The employment resoluton is sponsored by Major Wright, of New York City, and Major F. Deegan, also of New York. It requests congress to give federal aid to states and cities to boom building and thus increase employment.
