

GERMAN CABINET DECLARES GERMANY WILL NOT SIGN TREATY AS PRESENTED

(By Associated Press.)

The definite statement that Germany will not sign the peace terms as they were presented to her plenipotentiaries at Versailles is made by the German Cabinet through the Associated Press.

Statements along a somewhat similar line by President Ebert, Premier Scheidemann and other Germans in high place have preceded this one.

Today or tomorrow the German representatives are expected to transmit to the Allies a comprehensive statement on Germany's attitude towards the peace treaty as a whole, specifying what points they accept and what they desire to have modified.

Premier Orlando, of Italy, has gone to Rome for a conference with members of his cabinet on "certain interior and foreign questions," according to a Paris dispatch.

It is said that Chancellor Renner, of the Austrian mission, sent him back to Vienna in the interest of harmony during the negotiations.

The announcement also stated that President James Winnie, of the Veterans Association, had advised the association that there was a possibility of strike settlement within a few days.

Efforts of the union forces to control the supply and sale of gasoline in Winnipeg since the general strike in delivery activities over yesterday was noted, however.

Deliveries of machine, food and ice were made and a number of small delivery automobiles moved throughout the city. Some vehicles still carried placards declaring that they had received permission from the labor forces to operate.

No. 2,654,679, died at the new City National bank building now under construction at the corner of Eighth and Scott streets here. He was employed by the Westlake Construction Co. as a laborer. Death was pronounced by physicians to be due to heart failure, probably brought on by over-exertion. When the man's remains were found at the St. Elmo hotel was searched in an effort to learn more concerning his relatives. Some letters were found addressed to him from J. M. Cassidy, from Berner-ville, Oklahoma.

The reporter insisted.

# Market Report

## COTTON MARKET

**NEW YORK, May 21.**—The cotton market was nervous and unsettled after its sensational advance of yesterday. Liverpool did not fully meet this upturn, while there was scattered Southern selling and a good deal of realizing in the local market, which opened steady at a decline of 12 to 14 points. May showed the maximum loss while July sold off to 29.48 and October to 27.78, or about 20 to 25 points net lower.

There was no change in the bid-ask character of the news from the goods market, however, and there was further good commission house buying on the decline which caused rallies right after the call.

Fluctuations were very nervous and irregular later in the morning. A sudden break of about 40 points to 29.40 for July and 27.68 for October net renewed speculation and trade buying but rallies to within five or six points of last night's closing figures encountered further realizing and active months ruled about 20 to 28 points net lower early in the afternoon. The weekly report of the weather bureau was considered about a stand-off of an active demand of spots in the South helped to sustain prices during the early afternoon but bulges met-realizing and fluctuations were irregular. July rules around 29.50 and October 27.75 at 2 o'clock or 25 to 35 points net lower.

**New Orleans Cotton.**  
**NEW ORLEANS, May 21.**—Liquidation carried the price of cotton off 17 to 22 points around the opening today but fair support met the market at the decline, buying being based on expectations of unfavorable weekly crop reports. At the end of the first half hour of trading prices were 11 to 13 points higher than the close of yesterday.

The weekly crop reports were generally considered to be about as favorable as they were unfavorable and little trading was done on them. Liquidation increased again and the market was sent 29 to 41 points under the close of yesterday. At noon the tone was steadier and prices showed net losses of five to 15 points.

Opening prices, which ranged from 1/4c to 1c higher with July \$1.65 to \$1.65 1/2 and September \$1.58 1/2 to \$1.59 1/2, were followed by moderate additional gains.

Corn for immediate delivery and for May touched the highest price level yet this season. Later, though, the market suffered a sharp setback owing to reports that efforts were being made to cancel big orders for provisions. The close was unsettled 1/4c to 1/2c net higher, with July

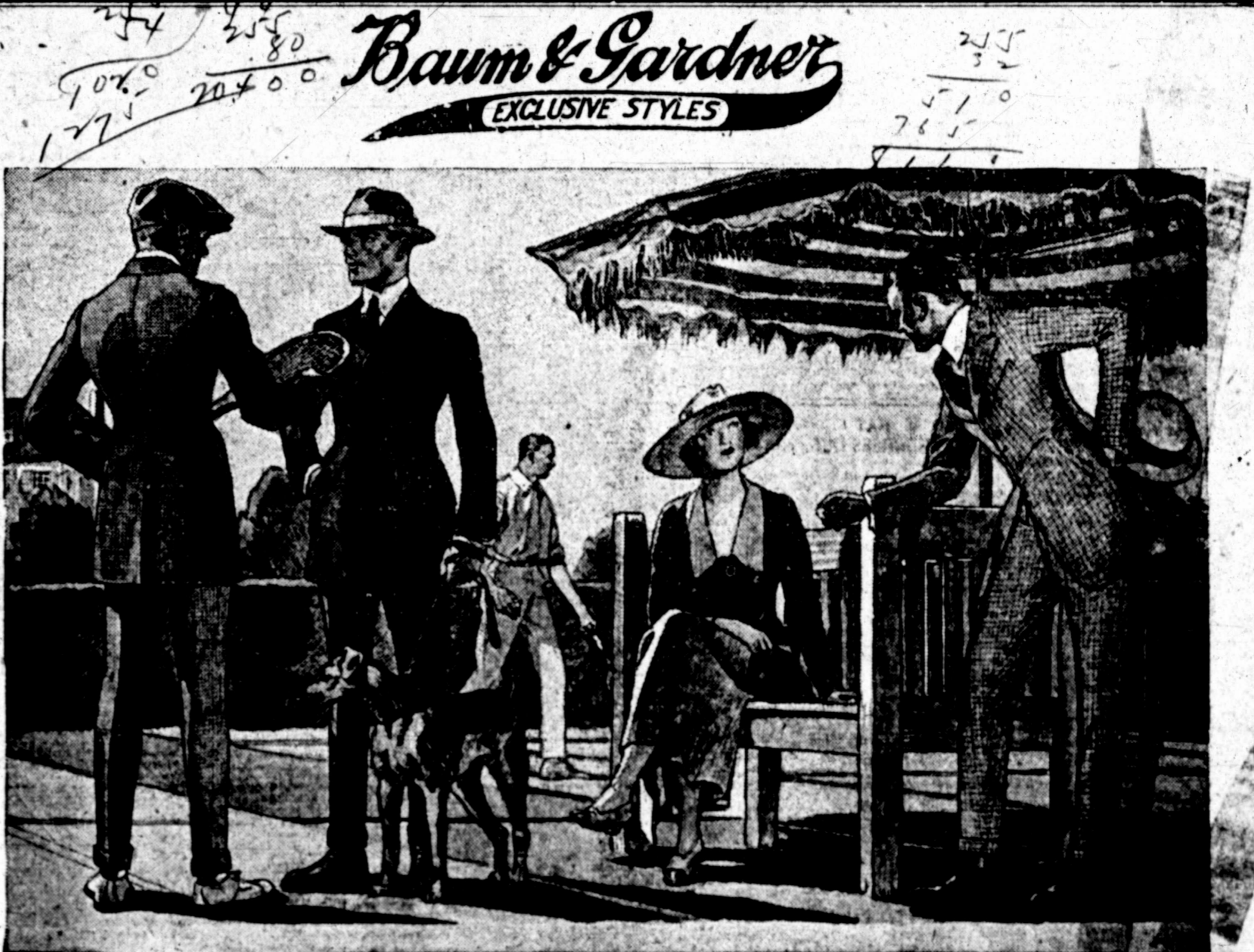

### RESUMPTION OF FLIGHT DELAYED BY ENGINE TROUBLE

By Associated Press. WASHINGTON, May 21.—Resumption of the trans-Atlantic flight by the naval seaplane NC-4 again has been delayed. A message to the navy department early this morning from Admiral Jackson at Ponta Delgada, said one of the plane's engine had developed trouble and that the start for Lisbon would not be made today. No mention was made of weather conditions.

The burden of carrying through the flight which gave such splendid indications of success until the three planes ran into a fog off the Azores early Saturday morning was shifted solely to the NC-4 yesterday with the announcement that the NC-1 had sunk and the NC-3, flagship, had been so severely damaged she then was being dismantled preparatory to shipment back home.

The distance to Lisbon is about 900 miles and it is stated the trip should be made in 10 hours, thereby making night flying unnecessary, as was the case in the flight from Trepassey to the Azores.

### PAYMENTS MUST BE MADE IN CASH

By Associated Press. AUSTIN, TEX., May 21.—Personal checks will no longer be accepted in remittances to state departments, and all payments must be made in cash, postoffice or express money orders or bank drafts on banks authorized to do business in Texas.

State Treasurer John W. Baker in making this announcement said the state depository law, which specifies the form in which remittances are to be made, has been in effect long enough for the public to have become familiar with its operation. "Henceforth it will be enforced," he stated.

### EVANGELISM AS ANTIDOTE FOR BOLSHIEVISM

By Associated Press. ST. LOUIS, MO., May 21.—Evangelism as a means of eradicating bolshevism and I. W. W.ism, was advocated by the board of home missions in its report to the general assembly of the Presbyterian church, U. S. A., today.

"Unless the masses are taught the principles of religion, the mad fury of bolshevism, with its twin scourges, atheism, will become universal, warned the report.

The report recommended increasing the number of missionaries in lumber camps and industrial centers as a method of checking the doctrine, and urged establishment of emigrant communities to Christianize and Americanize foreigners.

Publishers of religious periodicals in foreign languages as a means of bridging radicalism and "arousing Christian civic consciousness" was recommended in the report of the board of publication and Sabbath school work.

### FACTS ABOUT W. S. S. IN VARIOUS LANDS

War Savings Certificates were adopted and first issued in England during the spring of 1916. In the United States, War Savings Stamps were first issued in December, 1917.

In Great Britain, nearly three hundred million certificates have been sold since 1916, to January, 1919, bringing in approximately \$1,100,000,000.

Approximately \$1,015,000,000 worth of War Savings Stamps were sold in the United States from December, 1917, to December 31, 1918.

War Savings Stamps in forms similar to those of the United States and Great Britain exist in Australia, New Zealand, Canada, India, and Japan.

The British W. S. S. is dated when purchased and is due five years from that date. Certificates always sell for the same price, 15 shillings, six pence (\$3.83).

The W. S. S. of the United States are issued in annual series, and each series has a uniform date and maturity. The interest rate is kept uniform by increasing the purchase price one cent each month, beginning at \$1.10 in January.

The United States Government is back of every W. S. S. sold in this country. They grow in value constantly and can be redeemed for more than was paid for them any time after they have been held a month on ten days' written notice to the postmaster.

### PLAN USE OF AIRPLANES TO HUNT ILLICIT DISTILLERS

By Associated Press. CHICAGO, May 21.—Moonshiners may soon have revenue officers in airplanes on their trails. Beset with difficulties of finding illicit whiskey stills in mountain fastnesses of the South, revenue agents developed the idea of spying upon the hidden liquor makers from the sky. So Revenue Commissioner Ryer asked the war department for the loan of several airplanes which it was proposed to equip with telephotographic apparatus to take pictures of moonshine stills while flying low, the pictures to be used as evidence when the moonshiners were caught and brought into court.

The war department is considering the request but meanwhile army camoufleurs suggested that stills might be camouflaged beneath trees. So the revenue agents are endeavoring to hunt moonshiners afoot.

### TEXAS LOYALTY ACT IS UPHELD BY CRIMINAL COURT

By Associated Press. AUSTIN, May 21.—The Texas loyalty act, which declares disloyal speech while the United States is at war a felony, was upheld by the court of criminal appeals today in habeas corpus proceedings of Ben F. Meckel, of Crockett county.

The court says that the law observes the recognized limitations of the right of free speech.

"Prevention by law of the disturbance of public order by acts of violence or likely to produce violence, which, by causing consternation and alarm, disturb the peace and that it is a well known and generally known and recognized attribute of state government," holds the court.

### MAYORS DESIGNATED TO AID DISCHARGED SOLDIERS

By Associated Press. AUSTIN, May 21.—Mayors of Texas are designated in proclamation issued by Governor Hobby today as representatives of the State in the work of securing employment for returned soldiers. All employers are urged to cooperate with the federal employment bureaus.

### CHARGED ARIZONA MEN CONSPIRED IN KIDNAPPING

By Associated Press. WASHINGTON, May 21.—Evidence gathered in an investigation of charges that several officials of Cochise county, Arizona, were in collusion with Mexican authorities in the kidnaping at Douglas last December 14, of five men who later were executed across the border, had been transmitted to Governor Campbell, of Arizona, by the state department. It is understood state action in the case of the men was suggested. Kidnaping in a violation only of state law, and the Mexicans could not be extradited for such an offense.

The inquiry by the state department grew out of charges that several Cochise county officials co-operated with Mexican authorities in kidnaping Alfonso Leyva, said to be an American citizen, a Dr. Huerta and three others at Douglas and taking them across the border. The men kidnaped previously had been under investigation in connection with the murdering and robbing of Mexican officials on their way from Agua Prieta to Cananea, Sonora.

### ADMINISTRATION HAS PLAN FOR RELIEF STREET RAILWAYS

By Associated Press.  
WASHINGTON, May 21.—President Wilson has cabled his approval of a plan submitted by Secretaries Redfield and Wilson for the relief of the electric railway systems of the country now in the hands of receivers or threatened with insolvency. The lines affected are those in New York, Providence, Buffalo, New Orleans, Denver, St. Louis, Birmingham, Montgomery, Pittsburgh, Des Moines, Memphis, Fort Wayne, St. Paul, Spokane and Chattanooga.

Investigation of conditions in many cities where street railway companies have been unable to obtain approval of local authorities for rate advances and where consequently the companies face insolvency, will be undertaken soon by a new government commission. President Wilson today cabled his sanction for creation of the commission whose recommendations for action in each community are expected to carry great weight without specific power of enforcement.

As a result scores of cities which have street care fare or franchise disputes, particularly since the increase of operating expenses, forced the companies to seek higher rates will soon find their disputes in the hands of the government agency. The appeal to this agency may be taken either by the company, the local gov-

ment or other representatives of the public. President Wilson will appoint members of the commission soon on recommendation of Secretaries Redfield and Wilson, who outlined the plan to the President after months of discussion between government departments. One of the principal reasons prompting the action was that the government's war labor board in a number of cases ordered street railway companies to pay higher wages but left the companies without power to obtain higher compensatory rates. These companies applied to the war finance corporation for aid but this could not be given where a company's credit was undetermined by inadequate revenues.

# FITZGERALD SEES FRANK KELL AND TALKS OF WHEAT

(By Hugh Nugent Fitzgerald in Fort Worth Record.)

From the golden grain comes the staff of life. America is the granary of the world. American wheat farmers are expected to turn over to the elevators and millers of their country a billion bushels before the close of the harvest.

Texas has never been known as a great wheat-producing state. Its best record in bygone days was a crop of 25,000,000 bushels. The crop of 1919 may touch the 35,000,000-bushel mark. This is the estimate of Frank Kell, one of the foremost men of affairs in the Southwest.

Mr. Kell was here yesterday on his way to New York. He is one of the 16 millers of America appointed by the national association to look after the business of the elevator and milling interests and incidentally the interests of the consumer. These 16 representatives are all headed for New York City, where they will hold an important conference with Federal Grain Director Barnes, named by President Wilson, on recommendation of Herbert C. Hoover, as the government director of the grain crop of 1919.

There is a government guarantee of \$2.26 per bushel. Regardless of the fluctuations of the market this year or the moss-covered (hoary) that prices are fixed by the law of supply and demand, the American wheat farmer is to take down \$2.26 per bushel for this golden product of the soil.

Mr. Kell has been interested in the milling business for 30 years. He is one of the builders of Wichita Falls, one of the builders of the Panhandle, one of the developers of Texas and one of its upstanding and forward-moving citizens.

Worked for Country. All during the months of the war he worked for the government. This, too, without salary. He is working now for the government, the people, the wheat growers and the millers of America.

Be it known that Australia is a wheat-producing country, that Argentina is a wheat-producing country. Neither Australia nor Argentina was called upon to supply the Allies' soldiers or civilians with wheat during wartime. There was a scarcity of tonnage. Hundreds of ships had been destroyed by the German U-boats. It is a long haul from Melbourne or Sydney to the ports of the Allied countries of Europe.

There is a scarcity of shipping now. American soldiers are coming home on American ships. Let us forget, when they were needed to prevent the Hohenzollerns from becoming the conquerors of Europe all the Allied governments were willing to furnish the ships at their disposal or command to carry American soldiers overseas. Australia is a self-governing colony of the British empire. There will be ships a-plenty this year—British ships. There will be Japanese ships to transport the golden grain from the far-

away fields of Australasia to the millers of the British Isles and to the peoples of the continental European nations.

Regardless of this Uncle Sam is pledged to pay \$2.26 to the American wheat grower. Shipments from Australia and Argentina may cause a slump in the price, but even this is doubtful.

Grain Director Barnes has a big job on hand. The price must be stabilized. American profiteers must be held in check. Something must be done for that ravenous consumer known as "The People." There are millions of mouths to feed in Europe. There are 107,000,000 to feed here at home. There is no implied promise on the part of the government that there will be a cut in the price of flour this year.

In 1920 world conditions may be normal. Russia may come out of its hideous trance or bloody nightmare. There are 200,000,000 Russians. Ninety per cent of the 200,000,000 are peasants or rather tillers of the soil. Russia, some day will be the granary of half the world. If all the wheat fields of Russia and Russian Siberia were cultivated it would be easy for the Slavs to produce an annual crop of 3,000,000,000 bushels.

25 Bushels to Acre. This is the yield in Russia, 25 bushels to the acre, when it comes to transportation facilities, modern agricultural methods, improved farm machinery and the handling and marketing of the products of the soil.

Frank Kell is very enthusiastic over conditions in Texas and his view is rosy as to the future. He believes that Texas wheat growers will be rewarded by a crop of 25 bushels to the acre, that the crop may go beyond 35,000,000 bushels and he realizes that this will place between \$80,000,000 and \$100,000,000 for wheat alone in the pockets of the Texas growers.

He predicts the yield of oats will approximate 40,000,000 to 50,000,000 bushels and oats are selling at a fancy price. Algrists have said that the torrential rains have injured the wheat crop. Frank Kell scoffs at this.

"There is a larger acreage than ever before," he said. "There will be a greater yield per acre than ever before, and the prospects are certainly more alluring than ever before in the history of Texas."

## FIGHT ARENA WILL SEAT 50,000 PERSONS

By Associated Press. NEW YORK, May 21.—Tex Rickard, promoter of the Willard-Dempsey heavyweight championship battle, has returned here to complete arrangements for the bout scheduled for Toledo on July 4. The architects' blueprints of the arena, show that there will be 120 rows of seats with a total capacity of about 50,000 spectators.

Owing to the octagon shape of the arena, each succeeding row of seats away from the ring increases in circumference. According to the diagram there will be 28 rows of 60 seats, seven 50 rows, and a like number of 40 rows. Eight rows have been allotted to the 250 section, 21 for \$25; 26 for \$15, and 23 for \$10 on the extreme outside.

The ring will be a 24-foot enclosure with two foot extension or apron and the ropes will be of the postless type, the corners being guyed from iron posts set well outside the ropes. The ring floor will be covered with heavy canvas laid over a quarter inch padding, which will be carefully packed in order not to slip up the boxers while offering complete protection against injury by fall.

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

### DOUGHBOYS IMPRESSIONS IN PARK AT VERSAILLES

PARIS, April 26.—Standing amid the glories of the royal past of France, in the park at Versailles, an American doughboy burst into this apostrophe:  
"Say, pal, where do you get eafs around these diggin's?"

American fighting men in leave parties led by trained guides from the Paris headquarters of the Young Men's Christian Association War Work Council may be seen, everywhere in Paris and its environs, enjoying the monuments of the old regime and of the empire in a truly American fashion, which does not prevent the association of the great palace of Louis XIV and "chow."

"Looks like a decayed church," was the deliberate estimate of another boy in khaki as he stood before the Hotel des Invalides. Then he went inside and became enthusiastic over the marble railing about the tomb of Napoleon—because it was so "white" and hadn't a flaw.

One of them emerged from the Invalides and grew almost poetic about the yellow light coming through the stained glass windows above Napoleon's casket. Then he caught himself, and almost blushed.

In the next breath he called the Court des Invalides the "souvenir parlor of the armies of France."

When he saw Geynemer's airplane and learned what it was, he maintained a reverential silence of more than a minute before he began to determine its "make."

Perhaps the reactions from Versailles are the most illuminating. Halting at the Fountain of Neptune a doughboy cast his eye appraisingly down the vista of the park.

"Gee," he said, "there must be two miles of fountains."

Best of all, apparently, the soldiers like to go and sit on the banks of the Seine, watching the river traffic. The one-fourth size Statue of Liberty presented to Paris by the American colonies watches over them, here. But even it is the subject of frank criticism.

"Hub," said one of the critics, "I don't look as good as the old girl will when we steam into New York harbor."

### ANTI-SALOON LEAGUE 'NOT MUCH SURPRISED'

NEW YORK, May 20.—The Anti-Saloon League was "not much surprised" at President Wilson's recommendation to Congress that the wartime prohibition law be repealed, William H. Anderson, superintendent of the New York State branch, declared tonight.

"The wets were unable to keep from telling, after the return of Samuel Gompers, that some assurance had been given," Mr. Anderson's statement said.

"The Republican party was conceived in protest against a great evil. It has upheld the constitution. It has prospered in proportion as it has been responsive to the moral sentiment of the people. We shall be very much surprised if it permits the President to put it into the hole on this question."

"Plans of the league to have church congregations throughout the country adopt resolutions on June 3, calling on Congress to pass 'adequate' enforcement legislation for both the wartime and permanent prohibition acts, will be modified, he said, to make of the meetings "monster mass meetings to protest against the repeal."

"The Association Opposed to National Prohibition was 'neither surprised nor over-jubilant over the President's recommendation,' it declared tonight, explaining that it had received 'advice from Paris' two weeks ago that the President contemplated such action.

"But if the operation of such a piece of legislation would be unfair and unjust to those employed in the wine and beer business, it would be equally unfair and unjust to those employed in all other lines of the liquor business," the statement continued.

"Why play any favorites. There is not a single good reason why a single word of the act should remain on the statute books."

### GEO. B. HARMON OIL OPERATOR DIES AT HOME IN TULSA

George B. Harmon, one of the early oil operators at Electra, died at his home at Tulsa Sunday night after a paralytic stroke.

Harmon was one of the best known operators in the Mid-Continent field, having operated in Pennsylvania, Oklahoma, Ohio, Texas and Mexico. He was the owner of one of the greatest producers ever brought in in Mexico.

### HAWKER'S FATE DOES NOT DETER OTHER AVIATORS

ST. JOHNS, N. F., May 21.—Hope for the safety of Harry G. Hawker and Commander Mackenzie Grieve, missing since they set out eastward through the air on Sunday in their Sopwith bi-plane for Ireland, was virtually abandoned today by the British fliers here preparing to take wing in their wake. News of the safety of the NC-3 after being so long on the water had been a source of encouragement, but it is recognized that the Hawker-Grieve machine carried only a cockleshell emergency boat as compared with the stout hull of the American naval plane.

Undaunted by the Sopwith's disappearance, which must be taken into consideration as part of the hazards of trans-Atlantic flight, members of the other cross-ocean expeditions today continued to mature their plans for flights with the next full moon, three weeks hence.

From Harbor Grace came word that the Handley Page super-bomber would be in the air within 10 days instead of a fortnight, as the assembling of this machine is being expedited.

Captain Alcott, of the Anglo-American team, which will attempt a flight in a Vimy bomber, expects the latter machine to reach here tomorrow or Friday. Alcott here he will use as his base the Mount Pearl plateau airfield vacated by Hawker. Flying light to Harbor Grace he will there take on a full load of 865 gallons of gasoline before "hopping off."

His plane will have a range of 2,440 miles. Captain Alcott said today that he would carry as life-saving equipment only an inflatable vest, as he considered other contrivances of such doubtful value that he would not burden his machine with them.

Regarding the fate of Hawker and Grieve, some of the airmen here believe the Sopwith collapsed within a

short time after leaving St. Johns. The opinion is gaining ground that the field ice and icebergs extending for 100 miles off the coast may have affected the work of the engines through the intense cold congealing the oil.

### HOW \$285,000,000 IN SILVER WAS TRANSPORTED

WASHINGTON, May 21.—Now that the government has completed its wartime shipments to India of silver from melted dollars, Director of the Mint Baker has disclosed how thousands of tons of the metal were hauled from the Philadelphia mint to San Francisco in special trains guarded by armed men without loss of an ounce and without general knowledge of the procedure.

Eighteen of these treasure trains made the trip across the continent in the twelve months ended last April 23, with the silver like big bricks piled high in each of the five express cars composing a special train. Two men with automatic pistols at their hips and sawed-off shotguns on their laps, sat in each car and later guarded the secret transfer of the white bars from train to ship at San Francisco.

Each silver brick weighed about 62 pounds and was worth \$1,000 and each train carried between \$5,000,000 and \$10,000,000 of the bricks. Guarded shipments of silver dollars also were made from the United States treasury

in Washington and from the New Orleans sub-treasury to Philadelphia. These dollars traveled in stout bags of 1,000 each and were handled much like bags of sugar, except that armed men always were near. More than 265,000,000 silver dollars were melted and shipped to India during the year, to meet urgent war demands for coinage.

### PERSHING GIVES UP IDEA OF EARLY RETURN TO U. S.

PARIS, May 21.—(Havas.)—In addition to the abandonment of the projected trip to England of General Pershing, the American commander-in-chief, several of the higher American officers and certain members of the American peace mission, according to reports, have given up the idea of a return to America in the near future.

KERENSKY ISSUES APPEAL FOR AID FOR RUSSIA

By Associated Press. PARIS, May 20.—A. F. Kerensky, former premier of Russia, and seven other members of the Russian constituent assembly and members of the Parisian union for the regeneration of Russia, today issued an appeal to the democracies of the world for prompt action with a view to helping Russia out of her present chaotic condition.

It proposes the organization of a mission composed of delegates from all the powers and including representatives of organized labor which will go to Russia and explain to the people and the different Russian governments the democratic aims they are pursuing. The appeal says: "It should be stated categorically that the different governments repudiate the idea of any intervention likely to infringe upon the sovereign rights of Russia."

VICE-PRESIDENT MARSHALL ACKNOWLEDGES SEASON PASS

By Associated Press. CHICAGO, May 21.—President Johnson of the American League today exhibited a letter received from Vice-President Thomas R. Marshall, acknowledging receipt of a season's pass to all baseball games.

Under date of Washington, May 16, Vice-President Marshall wrote: "My faith in human nature has been very greatly revived this morning by a call from Mr. Minor as a messenger from you, conveying to me a season pass to the American league games. 'I returned from my vacation, and not finding a pass on my desk, I said to myself: 'Even so intelligent and patriotic an organization as the American league has forgotten that there is a vice-president.' I knew everyone else had forgotten it but the iron ruler entered my soul to think that you failed to remember. 'Now, however, the sun is shining, and whether we shall have a league of nations or not, I am quite sure I shall get more pleasure out of the performance of the American league than I will out of the performance of the American senate trying to organize a league of nations.'"

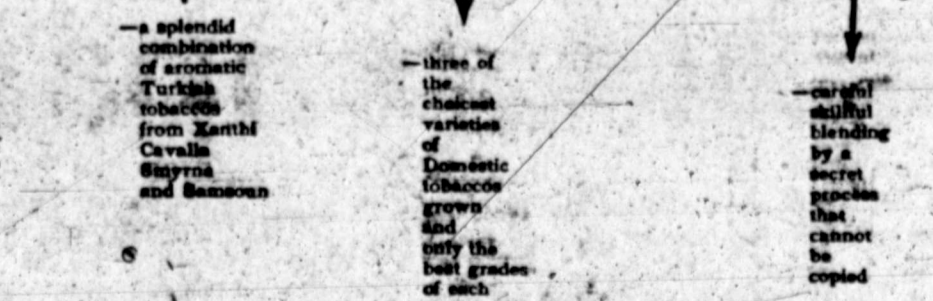
