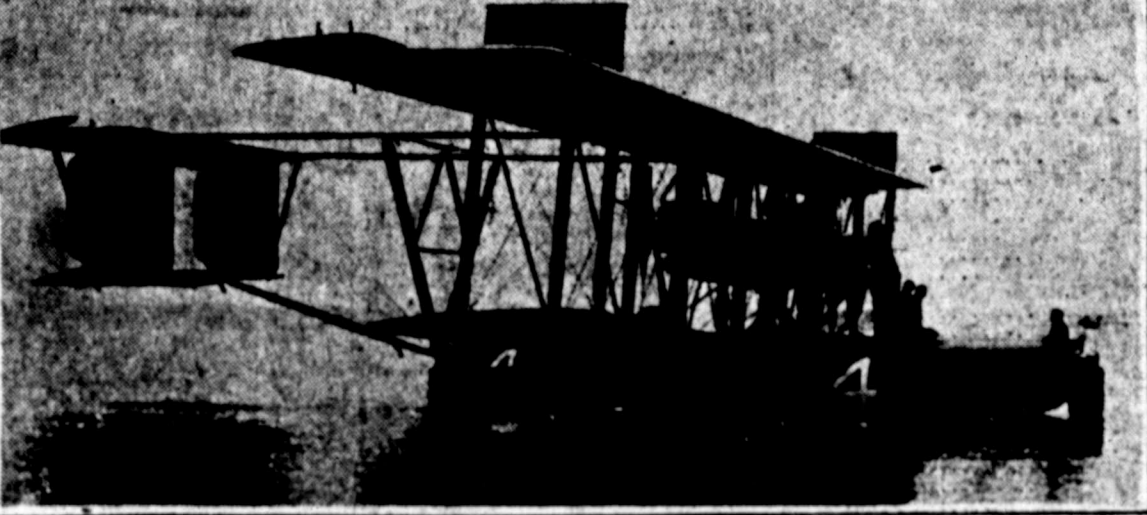

NC4 Makes Successful Flight to Lisbon Today

BULLETIN. WASHINGTON, May 27.—THE AMERICAN NAVAL SEA PLANE NC-4 HAS ARRIVED AT LISBON, PORTUGAL, COMPLETING THE FIRST TRANS-ATLANTIC FLIGHT.

For 52 hours, the NC-3 entered the harbor of Ponta Delgada, Azores, under her own power. She was so badly battered by the seas she encountered, however, that she was retired from the contest.

The crew of the seaplane which was the same as that which made the memorable flight from Newfoundland to the Azores, boarded the plane an hour before sunrise.

The weather was almost perfect this morning with the warm spring sun shining brightly on the waters of the bay.

On a successful flight of the United States naval seaplane NC-4 from Ponta Delgada to Lisbon today depends the completion of the trans-Atlantic flight.

The United States naval seaplane NC-1, NC-2 and NC-3 started from Rockaway Point, N. Y., on May 8 on the preliminary leg of their flight across the Atlantic.

On May 14 the NC-4 left Chatham and arrived at Halifax in safety. The next day it continued its flight to Trepassey, N. F., where it joined the NC-1 and NC-3 which had reached Trepassey May 10.

Secretary Daniels Refuses to Permit Towers to Proceed

HAWKER TELLS OF EXPERIENCE IN FLIGHT AND ON THE WATER

By Associated Press. LONDON, May 27.—The correspondent of the Daily Mail who is traveling with Harry G. Hawker and Lieutenant Commander Mackenzie Grieve on their way to this city, sends from Inverness, Scotland, a detailed account of the difficulties encountered by the two airmen during their unsuccessful attempt to fly across the Atlantic.

When about 800 miles out to sea the weather continued very bad and the clouds rose to great heights. Several times Hawker tried to clear them but lost height at every attempt.

Hawker described his efforts to find the cause of the trouble with the water cooling system and said that he concluded something had got into the water filter between the radiator and the pumps.

The aviators descended about two miles ahead of the steamer. The sea was very rough and the Danish crew at great risk to themselves, finally rescued the aviators after 90 minutes.

RESPONSIBILITY GREAT

Years in Office Weighted With Anxiety and Burdened With Obligation

PARIS, May 27.—"It is very delightful for one thing, if I may say so, to know that my presidency is not ahead of me and that his presidency is ahead of him," said President Wilson in referring to Dr. Epitacio Pessoa, president-elect of Brazil, at the dinner given by the Peace by the Pan-American peace delegation last night.

"The honor has been accorded me," President Wilson said in beginning his speech, "of making the first speech tonight and I am very glad to avail myself of that privilege."

"I suppose no more delicate task is given any man than to interpret the feelings and the purposes of a great people. I know that I may speak for myself, but I know that I have had to be the true interpreter of a national spirit, expressing no private and peculiar views but trying to express the general spirit of a nation."

COUNCIL TO AID KOLCHAK GOVERNMENT

Following the address the diplomas were presented to the members of the class by W. J. Bullock, president of the board of education, and the scholarships were awarded by W. W. Brown. The winners of highest honors in the class were announced. Mary Mathilde Akin won first honors with a percentage slightly higher than 85. For the second honors there was a tie between May Lee Guthrie, Lona Brown and Anne Edward Barcus. Among the boys Ernest Robertson was first with John Bradley second. H. E. Bell, principal of the high school, honored four departed members of the class of 1919, who had they lived would have graduated with this year's class, with a short memorial service reading the names of Robert Stayton, Ford Lon, Mable Ayers and Clara Turner.

Following the memorial service the winners of the Carnegie prizes for the most progress in the art of penmanship among the ward schools were announced. 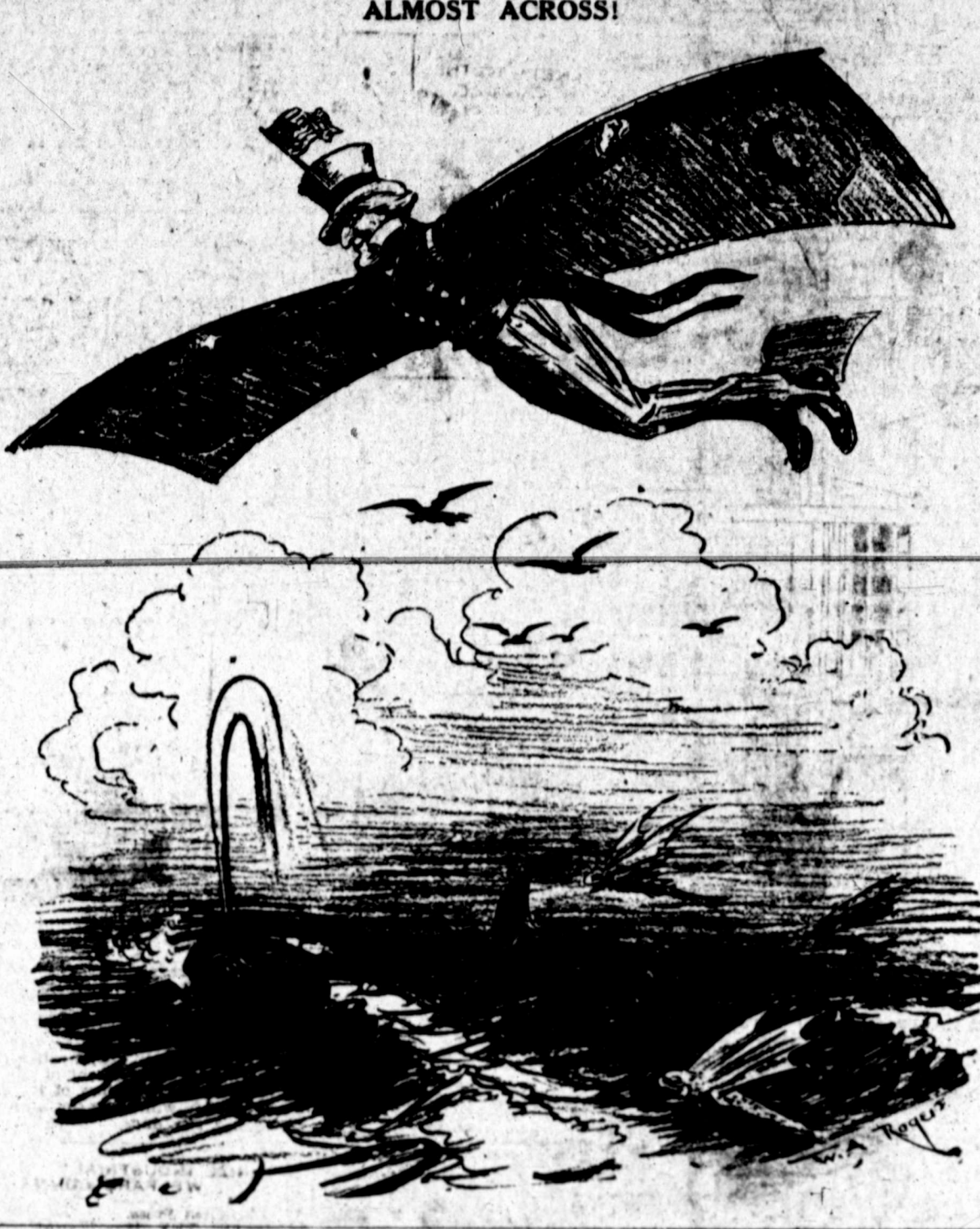

NEW YORK, May 27.—There was heavy general realizing with a good deal of selling for a reaction at the opening of the cotton market. First prices were irregular at a decline of 28 to 42 points, and active months sold 24 to 80 points net lower right after the call with July touching 31.70 and October 31.00. Stop orders were uncovered on this break but there was no change in the character of the crop and trade news, and the market rallied several points from the lowest after publication of the forecast for showers in the eastern belt and southwest.

Reports of clearing weather in the western cotton region increased the pressure to sell. In the trading up to noon prices went 88 to 126 points under the last quotations of yesterday. July sold up to 32.18 and October to 31.35 later on the unfavorable weather and crop advices but this bulge of some 25 or 40 points from the early morning encountered, however, and tractions and chemical shares developed sudden strength.

Southern Pacific, U. S. Rubber and tobacco were the strong features of the later dealings, other leaders making partial recoveries. The closing was irregular.

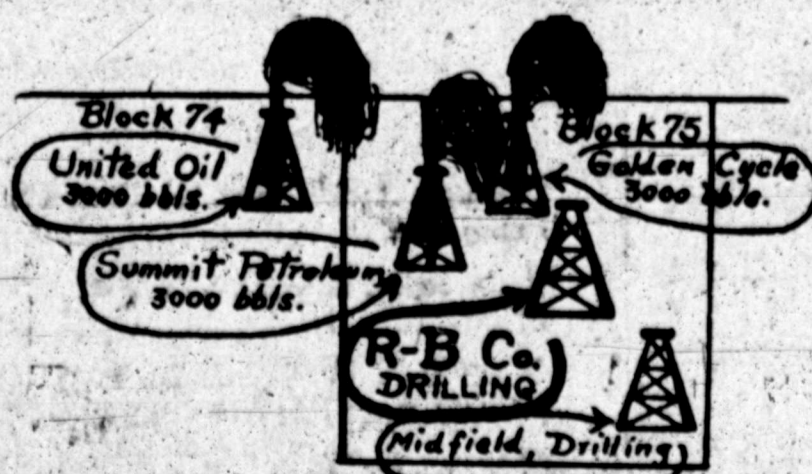

WASHINGTON, May 27.—One of the most urgent industrial needs of the country at the present time is properly trained foremen, according to officials of the Department of Labor, representing the U. S. Training Service. These experts have been making a nation wide study of industrial conditions and maintain that the keen foreign competition this country is soon to meet, demands more efficient industrial management than obtained before the war. Already England and France and others of the allies are straining every nerve to re-establish themselves in the markets of the world. In the past American industry has been handicapped by the fact that the rank and file of its workers have not had opportunity for adequate training in their respective tasks. The only practical way of lifting this burden on industry, according to the U. S. Training Service, is to establish training departments in the majority of the manufacturing plants of the country. The foremen are among those to whom first consideration should be given, it is said. Inquiries from leading manufacturers show there is a distinct trend in favor of relieving foremen of many of their secondary duties in order that they may concentrate their attention on their principal task, which is production. "Breaking in" new workers has been one of the many jobs of the average foreman. According to the newer standards this should be delegated to a training department, or in the absence of such a feature, to some especially qualified fellow worker. Because of the general demand for a better understanding of foremanship a staff of widely experienced production men employed by the U. S. Training Service is engaged in preparing a book on the subject. The result of its combined efforts promises to be a valuable treatise on the duties

**DEPOSITORY BOARD TO

AUSTIN, May 27.—The State depository board convened under the act of the 36th legislature will meet on May 31 to award contracts to State and national banks in Texas for the keeping of nearly \$9,000,000 in State funds. Bids recently received from 150 banks developed an average rate of interest of 4.13 on daily balances, the highest rate being six per cent and the lowest three per cent. The largest bid was from one bank for \$2,500,000 and many of the small banks bid only for \$10,000. The total amount of bids reached \$12,394,500.

EKATERINBURG TO BE HEADQUARTERS KOLCHAK REGIME

By Associated Press.
WASHINGTON, May 27.—Ekaterinburg, the east Russian city to which the Kolchak government, set up at Omsk, Siberia, is reported to be moving its headquarters, is described in a bulletin from the Washington, D. C., headquarters of the National Geographic Society. The bulletin, after calling attention to the fact that this city also figured in recent history as the reputed scene of the imprisonment and execution of the Romanoffs, continues:

"Ekaterinburg, geographically is well adapted to be a gateway through which the Siberian government seeks to spread its influence and oppose bolshevism in European Russia. It is the most important city in the Ural mountains, lying about 310 miles, by rail, southeast of the city of Perm, and in the erstwhile government of that name. Two-thirds of the Perm district lies in Russia and one-third in Siberia. Through Ekaterinburg passed the great Siberian highway.

"Ivan III sent German spies into what he regarded as a promised land of natural resources, and when they brought back favorable reports the task of developing one of the richest mining regions in the one-time empire began.

"This same Ivan III laid the foundation of Russia's imperial progress in other ways. He summoned an architect from Venice who was commissioned not only to build palaces and churches, but to make big bells, cannons, to fire off the said cannons, and to make every sort of castings very cunningly. His name was Murclli, but small wonder that he was nick-named Aristotle. For these protean services he received ten roubles a month.

"As early as the eleventh century

Novgorod began to exact tribute from the Perm quarter and to send settlers there. But when Ivan III, four centuries later, reached out from Moscow to Novgorod, deported a thousand of the wealthy families, and sent Moscow patriots to take their places, Perm was automatically released from Novgorod domination.

Development of Mining Region.
"But the development of the mining region of the east Ural began with Peter the Great, during whose time Ekaterinburg, the Scritan of the Ural, was founded. It was slow in growing as were many of Peter's reforms in taking root. In contrast to the radical experiments now launched before Lenin's breakfast in Russia it is interesting to recall the storm of protest against the census instituted by Peter, because it was a 'profane numbering of the people'; or against the change in the calendar, assailed as an effort to destroy 'the years of Our Lord', and of that freakish, if harmless, edict requiring beards to be shaved off, which was regarded as an insidious scheme to disfigure the 'image of God', so Christ would not recognize his sons at the Judgment Day.

Peter named the city for his wife, later the Tsaritsa Catherine I, that strange figure in Russia's bizarre history who was daughter of a yeoman, foster child of a humble pastor, wife of a Swedish dragon, and after being taken prisoner-of-war to a Russian prince who fancied her, paragon of a child of a humble pastor, who child impelled him to acknowledge her as his wife, to crown her empress consort, and to clear the way for her succession to the throne.

Admired For Ceremonies.
"No queen of procreant birth ever did (or would have wished to) adorn herself as did erstwhile Martha Skovrovska at the coronation ceremonies. Her crown bore more than 2,500 gems, with a crown of size ruby sustaining a bejeweled cross.

"When Peter took her to Berlin the daughter of Emperor Frederick William, father of Frederick the Great, wrote in a volume preserved as her memoirs, that the empress appeared to be low born, and that she wore so many decorations that her dress rattled. The Paris verdict of her remains unknown because Peter left her at Amsterdam when he went to the French capital. It is not fair to assume that the monarch sought a free field for a gay time. Rather, he seemed depressed by the refinements there and is quoted as saying, 'I am a soldier; a little bread and beer satisfy me.'

Far From Beautiful.
"Like Cleopatra, Du Barry, and other royal courtesans, Catherine was far from beautiful, positively homely, from most accounts. But when she ascended the throne her common sense redeemed her illiteracy. Her gem-laden crown, and the luxury and power it stood for, did not turn her head, while other head-dresses tell the story of her devotion to her husband and of loyalty to her people. When she accompanied Peter in the Caspian campaign she made the supreme sacrifice (for pre-Greenwich village days) of 'bobbing' her hair, and wearing a close-fitting fur cap to protect her from the sun. She also set a fashion of wearing the cocked hat of the army.

"The former Russian government maintained an important mining school, chemical laboratory and gold assay office at Ekaterinburg. Imperial lapidary works were engaged in cutting and polishing malachite, marble, porphyry and Jasper and the gov-

BUCKEYE STATE ENTERS PROHIBITION COLUMN

By Associated Press.
COLUMBUS, O., May 27.—Ohio today entered the list of prohibition states, the amendment to the state constitution, adopted by the voters at a referendum last November, becoming effective.

The Buckeye state is now the biggest dry state in the Union, taking the place held by Michigan for more than a year. Under prohibition, the state will lose liquor revenues totaling approximately \$4,000,000 a year. The legislature, now in session, has several new revenue producing measures before it.

Ohio begins its era of prohibition without specific prohibition law enforcement machinery. The legislature passed such an act, but without an emergency clause, and it will not become effective until July 1. In the meantime, liquor dealers declare that they will call a referendum on the measure and that it will be voted upon at the next general election in November.

The state liquor license commission will remain intact until July 1 and has announced that it will attempt to enforce prohibition up to that time. Thousands of gallons of wine in storage in the wine cellars along the shores of Lake Erie immediately will be shipped out of the state, and some of it out of the country.

Scores of saloons which quit selling liquors Saturday and yesterday already have opened as restaurants and soft drink saloons.

MEXICO BUILDING AIRPLANE A WEEK INCLUDING ENGINE

WASHINGTON, May 27.—Progress of airplane manufacture in Mexico is attracting the attention of officials here. The national factory on the outskirts of Mexico City has reached a production of one complete machine a week, the engine being turned out by the same plant.

The motor developed by the Mexican engineers is known as the Aztatl. It is rated at 80 horsepower and is described as "light, cheap and serviceable." Steps have already been taken toward the construction of aerial bombs and the Mexican government is said to plan the building of armored bombing planes this year.

TELEPHONE COMPANIES NOT PAYING STATE TAX

AUSTIN, May 27.—There are 196 telephone companies in Texas that have not been paying any tax. They have been uncovered by inspectors for H. B. Terrell, comptroller, who have been examining county records for corporations subject to the gross receipts tax. The telephone companies—mostly small ones—will be treated as new companies and will be required to pay an initial tax of \$50 in addition to the regular tax based on gross receipts. The authority to make such investigations recently was vested in the comptroller by an act of the legislature.

PERMITS WILL BE USED IN SHIPPING GRAIN THIS YEAR

WASHINGTON, May 27.—Permits for the shipment of grain from interior markets will be used by the railroad administration this year to control the movement of the mammoth harvest which is just beginning. Problems involved in the transportation of 1,200,000,000 bushels of wheat, the yield estimated by the department of agriculture, have been under consideration for weeks by Director General Hines. It was apparent that unless some method of restriction was devised, congestion which might paralyze the nation's transportation facilities was possible when the farmers, eager to market their wheat as quickly as possible under the standard price guarantee, began to pour the crop into the arteries of trade. After consultation with leading grain men in the west and officials of the food administration's grain corporation, the director general decided that a permit system similar to that in effect during the freight congestion of last year would be the best solution of the problem. Machinery for the operation of the system, now is being worked out at the railroad administration.

NICARAGUANS ARE TO OBSERVE NEUTRALITY

By Associated Press. MANAGUA, NIC., Monday, May 26.—The chief of the Nicaraguan frontier guard has notified the Costa Rican revolutionists that no arms, small arms or recruits will be permitted to reach them from Nicaragua. It is believed here that if the order can be carried out aid from Nicaraguan territory will be entirely cut off and that the revolution therefore cannot last long. The measure is said to have been taken in order to observe strict neutrality.

RESOLUTIONS URGE UNIONS TO SUPPORT THE ELECTRICIANS

The Wichita Falls Trades and Labor Council at its meeting last night adopted a resolution requesting union men to discontinue the use of electric current furnished by the Texas Power & Light Company and order the light meters removed and that union men refuse to work on any job or building for the company.

The Times has received the following statement of the proceedings from the Trades and Labor Council: To The Public:

"The Wichita Falls Trades and Labor Council met in regular session on Monday night, the 26th instant, with a large attendance of delegates. Visiting delegates from Dallas, Denison and Sherman were present and much interest was manifested throughout the meeting. Delegates from Wichita Falls who attended the recent convention of the Texas State Federation of Labor, reported the best convention ever assembled by the state body.

"The visiting delegates who attended the meeting of the council last night were here in the interest of the union linesmen who several weeks ago were 'locked out' by the Texas Light & Power Co. In connection with this matter the Wichita Falls Trades and Labor Council adopted the following resolutions:

"Whereas, the management of the Texas Light & Power Co. has persistently manifested an antagonistic attitude toward organized labor, such attitude extending to a 'lock out' against the union linesmen in their employ, and who were, and are still making an earnest endeavor to secure a living scale of wages and reasonable hours of work per day, and

"Whereas, an appeal and efforts of these union linesmen to secure any consideration from the company have failed; therefore be it

Resolved, that the Wichita Falls Trades and Labor Council in regular session, this 26th day of May, 1919, do urgently request all members of every affiliated local in Wichita Falls to promptly render all possible support to these union linesmen who are locked out in their demand for better working conditions. All local unions of the building trades are most urgently requested to refuse to work on any job or building now under construction or that may hereafter be under construction for the Texas

"The above resolutions were adopted unanimously and the secretary instructed to furnish copy of same to the local press for publication.—Wichita Falls Trades and Labor Council."

"We are going to put a stop to this automobile stealing and holding up people," Sheriff R. L. McFall said last night just after he arrested a vagrant. The "vag" offered to argue with the sheriff. The ex-cowboy has started a campaign against automobile stealing and according to his theory the best place to start is to gather up these boys who do not work.

"We only have 50 up there in jail tonight and this one makes 51," continued the sheriff. "There is no excuse for a man not having employment at this time as bad as labor is in demand in Wichita Falls. We'll make them hard to catch when this wheat harvest starts. They've got to work or get out and give somebody room who will," stated Mr. McFall.

REPORT PROSPECT FOR BUMPER CROP VERY ENCOURAGING

Prospects for a bumper crop of all grains planted in Texas are excellent, and all over the State the farmers and grain men were highly enthusiastic in their expression of conditions, at the State Grain Dealers Convention, held last week in Galveston, says Overton McDowell of the Wichita Mill and Elevator Company, who has just returned from the convention. The section immediately surrounding Wichita Falls is devoted practically entirely to wheat and here neither the rains nor the red rust, which came late, have yet had any widespread serious effect, and unless there are heavy rains for the remainder of the week, it is believed that harvesting can be begun generally by Saturday, and that the yield will average over 17 bushels to the acre.

Neither oats nor corn are planted to any extent in this county, but preparations are being made to put in a heavy acreage of milo maize and taffir corn, much of the wheat land to be planted to the feed crops as soon as the wheat is harvested.
