

CIVIC LEAGUE AFTER THOSE WHO OBSTRUCT SIDEWALKS OF CITY

ASK CO-OPERATION OF CLUBS IN RELIEVING CITY OF NUISANCE.

REPORT OF BRANCH LEAGUES

Number of Important Matters Considered at Meeting Friday Afternoon.

It is the duty and the purpose of the Civic League to keep hammering against the peddlers who are obstructing passage of the sidewalks until the law that is now in existence against that nuisance is enforced.

Such is the message members of the Civic League instructed their president, Mrs. T. M. Smock, to deliver to members of the Wichita and Rotarian clubs in their luncheons today and Thursday, in appealing for the co-operation of the two organizations against the customs objected to. The matter was brought up before the meeting at the library Tuesday afternoon.

Discontinue Luncheons. After some discussion the league voted to discontinue serving luncheons to the Wichita and Rotary clubs during the next two months. The hot weather, the absence of many members, and the many duties of other members were the reasons for stopping the luncheons through July and August. The work was dropped with regret and with the hope of renewing it again in the fall. J. W. Talbot from the Rotary club met with the league and expressed for his organization its appreciation of the service which has been rendered through the past several months and the hope that the arrangement might be renewed after the hot weather is past.

Report on Branch Leagues. The league heard a report from Miss Florence Jackson, in charge of the branch leagues in the city. She has been at work on play ground and clean up movements, in the districts across the river, around the factories and in the stockyards. The branch leagues are active and have been successful in bringing about improved conditions. Problems of street drainage and sewage in the district across the river are pending to be met at present, and the central organization will back any move made by the branches.

nation of the drinking water used by the people near the stock yards, and Miss Jackson has launched an educational campaign which has put housewives to boiling all water used in cooking and for drinking, and started a movement for better conditions. Another educational campaign in the river districts has been successful in securing the consent of 75 property owners for the installation of a sewerage system. Unless a right of way can be secured across the land of J. S. Fore, the establishment of such a system would be too expensive to be borne without the issuance of bonds, Miss Jackson says, but an effort will be made to secure the right of way. Conditions in the district are reported to demand attention.

Plan Play Ground. The league plans to assist in equipping a play ground in the river settlements as soon as it is ascertained whether the property suggested for the ground can be obtained from the city.

Mrs. M. Gattney presented the work of the Red Cross in organizing classes for instruction in hygiene, home care of the sick, and sanitation, and asked that the league assist the Red Cross in arousing interest. As soon as the classes are organized an instructor will be brought to the city. The employment of a community nurse is the next step in the plan of the Red Cross and after the class work has been successfully launched, the nurse will be brought in. Classes will be offered free of charge, it being necessary only that the text books be purchased. The need for these practical courses is obvious and the organization of a number of full classes is hoped for.

INTEREST AROUSED IN EARLY HISTORY OF PACIFIC COAST

SAN PEDRO, CAL., July 2.—Inter-est in the early history of California and Mexico has been increased through discoveries made on the island of Guadalupe, a picturesque and rugged peak rising out of the Pacific, about 350 miles southwest of this port, by a party of Americans who sailed from here and recently returned. Not only did they find what is considered evidence of the presence there of Americans more than a century ago, but also discovered what appeared to have been the last resting place of some daring explorer of a far earlier date. Much speculation has been aroused as to whether a leader of the famed expedition of Juan Rodriguez Cabrillo, perhaps even that hardy Portuguese himself, may have been given there the inquest of tombs.

This discovery was made by the merest chance, members of the exploring party resting on the crown of a great rock, a few rods from the shore, noticed what appeared to be rude lettering on the side nearest the sea.

The debris cast up about the rock by the waves was removed with picks and shovels and there was exposed to view the record of a landing by the crew of the ship "Triumph" in 1807—so reads the inscription.

Score of Names.
There are a score of names there; also an American flag and an American shield. The names are thought to be those of New England whalers, for they are such as were borne by the Puritans. There is one name cut out larger than the rest—Samuel Chapman. Another deeply engraved is David Christy. The Christian names are such as Thaddeus, Theophilus, Ebenezer, Johnathan, common in the last century.

The names are cut deep and are legible in almost every case. Landed September, the 9 A. D. 1807 is the record of their coming. "Left the" and the grinding of the rocks and sand of landslides has done its work and the rest is left to the imagination.

The loneliness of the isle may be judged from the fact that a party of Americans, including several women, survivors of a wrecked ship, were marooned there for seven months about three years ago. They were rescued by an American cruiser which nosed its way by chance into the snug harbor on the east coast.

Coast Line is Cliffs.
The coast line is almost all cliffs, perpendicular walls of rock 1,000 feet or more in height in many places. There is hardly a spot, except the harbor, where a landing is easy. A canyon runs back from the harbor and well up in this canyon is a spring, thought to be the only fresh water on the island. There are thousands of goats on the island.

It is on a little ledge jutting out from a cliff, probably 500 feet above the waves that crash about the jagged rocks, members of the party believe, some sea rover of an earlier age may have found out a granite couch. Whether there is a small cave back of the ledge, the party could not be cer-

tain from their boats, which could not be driven close to the dangerous shore.

But above may be plainly seen a large cross cut in the cliff and what looks like a word in Latin.

Certainly the man or men who cut the cross were bold and must have had a strong impelling reason—whether or not it was to make forever secure the body of the loved commander. No man could have scaled the cliff from below. Those who reached the ledge must have been lowered hundreds of feet from the towering plateau. The descent was not promoted by a mere love of the hazardous.

It has been generally supposed for many years that the bones of Cabrillo lie in some cave of the Santa Barbara channel islands and there have been many unsuccessful searches for them there. The records of the navigator who sailed along the California coast in 1542 and 1543 are very fragmentary.

JOHN WILLIAM STRUTT DIES AT LONDON HOME

LONDON, July 2.—Baron Rayleigh (John William Strutt) died last night. John William Strutt, third Baron Rayleigh, was born November 12, 1842. He was educated at Trinity college, Cambridge, and became professor of experimental physics at that institution in 1879. He was the author of many scientific papers and was awarded the Nobel prize for physics in 1904.

FUND FOR EXPERT INVESTIGATION OF TEXAS OIL FIELDS

WASHINGTON, July 2.—Congress has finally passed the appropriation for the bureau of mines which makes possible the expenditure of \$25,000 in special expert investigation in the Texas oil fields with the view to instituting economy production and of handling oil, as well as special reports on the Texas output, separating the new Texas fields from the Mid-Continent reports. Congressman Parrish originally secured \$50,000 in the House, but the conferees cut the amount one half.

ZUNTS RESIGNS FROM RESERVE BANK BOARD

WASHINGTON, July 2.—Resignation of James E. Zunts as chairman and member of the board of directors of the New Orleans branch of the Federal Reserve bank of Atlanta, was announced today. P. H. Sanders, at present director of the New Orleans branch, has been appointed chairman and L. M. Pool, director to fill the vacancy in the board.

CONGRESS ACTS ON ALL APPROPRIATIONS AND TAKES RECESS

WASHINGTON, July 2.—Although presidential approval cannot be secured until President Wilson reaches here from Paris, no embarrassment to government departments from lack of funds is expected as a result of the action of congress last night in acting on all appropriation bills needed by the various agencies of the government for the new fiscal year that began yesterday.

After being in session until midnight the House and Senate finally reached agreements on bills that have been in dispute for weeks. The measures as passed included the army bill carrying \$775,000,000; the sundry civil bill carrying \$605,000,000; the District of Columbia annual budget of \$1,000,000 and a deficiency measure of \$25,000,000.

With the appropriations bills disposed of and with passage of the administration's water power bill in the House both branches adjourned until Tuesday, July 8. At that time, President Wilson is expected to present the treaty of peace with Germany and while the Senate is debating that document the House will resume consideration of prohibition enforcement legislation.

ALL DISTRICTS INDICATE SUCCESSFUL AND PROSPEROUS YEAR.

PRICES CONTINUE TO RISE

Building Shows Continuation of the Revival Noted in Previous Months.

WASHINGTON, July 2.—Optimism as to the business outlook reported today in the federal reserve board's monthly statement of conditions was tempered with renewed warning against undue speculation.

"In nearly all the districts," the board's statement said, "the opinion is entertained that the prospects for a successful and prosperous year with very large output of goods and almost unprecedented financial returns both to manufacturers, agriculturists and laborers now are positive. The possibility that speculations may be carried too far and may exert an injurious influence, aided and furthered by the existence of free credit and speculation tendencies, appears as the principal offsetting influence on the situation."

Prices continued to rise throughout June, the board's statement showed an enormously heavy demand for goods for export had rendered products in many lines scarce. In nearly all districts it was reported business men had decided they could rely upon heavy demand and continuously sustained prices for some time to come, while a feeling of apprehension, entertained early in the war, was disappearing, jobbers and retailers readily entering into large commitments for fall and winter.

In many respects the agricultural prospects of the early spring are being more than justified. Wheat, corn, cotton, tobacco and Pacific coast crops will be harvested in record quantities. Livestock continues high in price.

Turn for the Better. Steel and iron experienced a distinct turn for the better. The fuel situation has been much below normal with prospects of a tight situation next winter. Metal mining industry was again improving.

Manufacturing likewise took an upward turn during June. Demand for fine cotton goods exceeds production. Shoe factories are producing at maximum capacity while heavy demand from Europe has drawn off much of the available supply. Wool products are sold ahead for months. Automobile manufacturing is running in many plants at record levels.

Building shows continuation of the revival noted in previous months. Heavy buying of lumber by retailers has become general. There is much trading in houses and business property. "The labor situation has now reached a distinctly advanced stage of full employment," the board's statement says in commenting on employment conditions. "There is apparently no present condition of unemployment; indeed, many industries report they cannot get the men they need, while wages are full up to past levels or higher. The requirements for farm help are absorbing surplus labor in practically all parts of the country. There is a surplus of unskilled workers in some centers but this is not different from the conditions in normal times. No reduction in wage scales is now foreseen."

"One of the principal problems in the labor situation noted by thoughtful observers is the fact that clerks, and office employes as well as other workers receiving more or less fixed incomes, have not yet participated in the advance in wages. Improvement for these classes of workers will be necessary if prices are to continue at their present levels but will, of course, add correspondingly to the cost of business to the government."

"Returning soldiers are being rapidly and steadily absorbed into business and the problem which for a time seemed to threaten in this connection is now apparently minimized in all lines. From the farming districts, particularly comes the report that the supply of labor is scanty and likely to prove more so as business progresses."

Government credit was reported in good condition as evidenced by the high and rising market for Liberty bonds of practically all issues, particularly Victory notes.

KING FERDINAND AND QUEEN MARY RECEIVE OVATION

Associated Press Staff Correspondent

PREDEAL, RUMANIA.—King Ferdinand and Queen Marie received an ovation and were showered with flowers at every railway station in Transylvania when a few days ago they made their formal entry into that country as sovereigns. For nearly four hundred years Transylvania has been under the foreign yoke, yet everywhere the Rumanian sovereigns were received with acclaim and hailed with joy. The day was made a national holiday.

In every city and town through which the royal party passed were such signs as "Long Live Your Majesty, Emperor of all Rumania," "Long Live the Royal Family," and "Long Live our Sovereign."

The journey was made partly by train and partly by automobile. At Ardeal which is the first town in Transylvania beyond the Rumanian border, Dr. M. Brailescu, representing the local government, declared to King Ferdinand that the Rumanian people had long waited for the moment when their sovereign would cross the threshold of Transylvania and redeem the country from bondage of the Austro-Hungarians. He assured the King that the people of Transylvania were as one in their devotion and loyalty to him and that they all hailed the day of their liberation from the foreign oppressor and their unity with brother Rumanians.

Expresses Warm Thanks. In reply, the King expressed his warm thanks and said he would have for the inhabitants of Transylvania the same affection and attachment he had for all people of Rumania and that he knew he could count with confidence upon their support in carrying

out the purposes and plans of Greater Rumania. At Nagyvarad the King and Queen were given a reception that left no doubt in minds of observers that taking Transylvania by Rumanians was genuinely welcomed by the people, even by those of Non-Latin origin. Thousands of persons were gathered at the railway station and along the principal streets and shouted terms of affection at their Majesties as they passed in their automobiles. The city was gaily decorated with flags, banners and lithographs of the King and Queen and on the principal streets triumphal arches were erected. Elaborate ceremonies were held in the churches and chimes were rung and whistles blown as the royal procession entered the town. An indication of their loyalty and patriotism, thirty thousand native Transylvanians marched in a great parade which was reviewed by their Majesties.

In the evening a great banquet was given by civil authorities in honor of the King and Queen. Representatives of the clergy, professions, schools, universities and patriotic societies were present and pledged to the King on behalf of their people, unwavering loyalty and support. King Ferdinand was deeply touched at the cordiality of the receptions everywhere along the route. To the Associated Press correspondent he said: "It is a source of great happiness

to me and to the Queen to find ourselves in the minds of the Rumanian people of Transylvania and to assist who have long waited for this great hour of their liberation and of their national unity. All of the emotion and enthusiasm with which they received the first sovereign of all the Rumanians not only is the best recompense for all of our struggles and sufferings but also a guarantee of the link which in the Great Rumania will bind together the people of the dynasty. I do not doubt that the Peace Conference will rally the right of my people to a complete unity."

Arrangements Complete for Big Fight Friday

TODAY LAST NAIL IS DRIVEN IN GREAT TOLEDO FIGHT STADIUM; PRELIMINARIES ARE COMPLETE

INSIDE DOPE ON BIG TITLE BOUT.

Fighters will put bandages on while in the ring. They will be thin with but little tape.

Specially made five-ounce gloves will be worn.

Five seconds will be allowed in each man's corner.

Dempsey will not grease his body as rumored.

Battle will be reported over world in fashion to outdo anything ever attempted.

Airplanes will take pictures of arena and battlers in action.

Airplanes will carry photographs to Pacific coast and other points.

More than 50 wires will send results from battle ground.

Movie men to operate from steel tubular column, not hindering view of spectators.

Kerna, manager, afraid Willard will not enter the ring to meet Dempsey.

One million dollars will be taken from sale of tickets.

Betting now five to four on Willard.

Dempsey expected to be favorite when fighters enter the ring.

ARENA COST \$150,000.

Built at a cost of \$150,000, the structure includes 1,750,000 feet of lumber and hundreds of kegs of nails and bolts, the combined weight of which runs into many hundreds of tons. In addition to the 30,000 spectators who can be seated comfortably there is standing room for close to 20,000 more so that the total capacity approaches the 100,000 mark. Four times the size of the Reno fight stadium, it measures over 600 feet across and the furthest seat is just 200 feet from the center of the ring. There are 24 miles of seats and the grade or rise is such that the face of each spectator will appear just above the head of the person in front giving the effect of a sea of faces when viewed from the ring.

Ring Well Constructed.

Great care was taken with which the arena has been constructed, attention has been lavished upon the ring in which the heavyweight championship of the world will be contested. It will be five feet above the floor of the stadium. Each side of the square, measured along the ropes, is exactly 20 feet and the extension outside the ropes, two feet.

The flooring consists of a two inch thick planking with a top layer of inch closely matched planks laid in cross-sections. This fighting foundation is supported by the heaviest kind of posts and beams until there is not a quiver when several 200 pound men plunge around on the structure. Over 20 feet square, it contains but two seams and will be stretched through especially constructed eyelets placed eight inches apart. It will be dressed with lampblack and 24 pounds of resin after being put into position, which will not be until one hour or so before Willard and Dempsey appear. For the preliminary bouts an old canvas will be used and the felt underneath covered with oil clothing in order that no water may seep through.

Support Eight Stories.

The ring posts will rise on the extreme corners of the platform and will be clamped to the floor by specially made metal collars in addition to being sunk into huge blocks, two and a half feet below the arena floor proper. From the posts, turn buckles will extend to the ring ropes 18 inches inside the posts. The top rope will measure four and a half feet from the floor and in one and a half inches in diameter. The lower ropes will be one and a half feet apart and all will be wound with heavy canvas banding. It is the claim of the contractors and builders that the ring and its foundation would support an eight-story building.

Half of Seats Sold.

The sale of seats has kept pace with the speed in arena construction and today Promoter Tex Rickard stated that close to half of the 80,000 seats had been sold including the greater portion of the higher priced sections. While he did not care to give the exact receipts to date, he said that they were well above his estimate when he first contemplated the possibilities of the match six months ago. The usual alibi of a heavyweight championship bout whether in a big city or on the sands of a desert, have made their appearance and veteran fight followers admit that the best touch of atmosphere necessary to complete the picture is in place. Counterfeit tickets for admission to the arena have turned up in the hands of innocent purchasers, who state that they bought them in other nearby cities. The tickets are but a poor copy of the real steel engraved tickets and not likely to cause trouble to the gate keepers on Friday.

The button and picture card vender is also present in force as well as the promoter of all kinds of games of chance in which the players take about 90 per cent of the chances. The police have taken cognizance of this

particular angle and have issued orders that the wheel, dice and playing card must be conspicuous by their absence henceforth.

MORE THAN 3,000 FANS TO GO FROM NEW YORK

NEW YORK, July 2.—More than 3,000 fight fans will go from New York to see the Willard-Dempsey fight, according to estimates compiled from railroad ticket offices. The largest exodus for Toledo, Wis. are made Thursday when it is expected that at least 2,000 New Yorkers will leave here to see the bout. Besides the number who are traveling to the fight via railroad, more than 500 automobiles are thought to have left New York and vicinity to carry spectators to the fight. Several reproductions of the fight will be staged in New York by fighters who will follow the blows of the bout as they are telegraphed to the local ringside.

WITHINGTON WINS FIRST HEAT IN HENLEY REGATTA

LONDON, July 2.—Paul Withington, of Boston, beat D. H. T. Gollan of the first Trinity crew, Cambridge, by two lengths today in the first heat of the King's Wood Sculls, in the Henley regatta. The time was nine minutes and sixteen seconds.

OBSERVATION BALLOON ATTRACTS LEGISLATORS

AUSTIN, TEX., July 2.—Interest in the Texas legislative proceedings has waned each afternoon about 3 o'clock, for the windows of both the Senate and House, chambers offer a good view of an army observation balloon which rises on the opposite side of the Colorado River to a height of several thousand feet and from which a man sails to earth in a parachute.

The balloon is carried by an army unit which is on a recruiting tour, and three parachute leaps are made each afternoon. Pages, stenographers and staid legislators have learned the time of the exhibition, and even important debate has failed to hold spectators away from the windows of the House.

Major General Allen formerly commanded the 90th Division composed of national army troops from Texas and Oklahoma. Previous to going overseas he was commander at Fort Riley, Kans. General Allen was born in Kentucky and entered West Point in 1878 from that state.

POLITICAL INSURRECTION IS THREATENING BERLIN

By Associated Press. BERLIN, Tuesday, July 1.—The communistic leaven has again arrived to the fermenting stage in Greater Berlin and there are indications that the strike movement may develop into a political insurrection. The candor and boldness with which the independent socialists and their communist henchmen are playing their cards show they feel more sure of their footing than during the March revolt.

The street car strike threatens to involve the suburban and belt line railroad workers if not the big industrial plants. The frankness with which Hugo Haase, Herr Hoffman and other radicals are now demanding a dictatorship by the proletariat is looked upon as significant. In the meantime, Gustav Hosok, minister of defense, is increasing his troop patrols in the inner city, planting rows of barbed wire at strategic points and generally tightening martial law regulations.

The government while apparently satisfied the present strike movement is purely political and determined to treat it as such, nevertheless is not underestimating its grave influence upon economic conditions.

The cessation of the city rail traffic has had its influence on the workers of the suburban roads and belt lines which stopped operating on the ground that the overcrowding of the cars is contrary to public safety.

Berlin's downtown streets today again were jammed with long lines of two, three and four wheeled vehicles, many of early types, which readily brought high fares. The few available automobiles and motor buses were quickly filled. Many persons are using bicycles or roller skates.

His friends assert he probably holds the record next to that of Alvin York, the "fighting parson" of Tennessee.

Oklahombi, it is said, is credited with having captured a total of 171 Germans, with participation in fifty successful stormings of enemy machine gun nests, and with having crossed No Man's Land many times to secure information for the Allied armies.

Peculiarly the returned soldier's name, "Oklahombi" is the Choctaw word for "mankiller."

NEW YORK, July 2.—That Russia under the dictatorship of the underdog is not exactly a land of liberty is one of the first discoveries of the foreigner visiting Moscow.

The bolsheviks like to call Russia the "free communistic republic." As a matter of fact, there are no laws, as they are known in other lands. But in their place there are several million manifestos, or proclamations, that have been issued by various soviets.

Nobody knows just how many there are, nor has anybody taken trouble to write them all down. Any soviet can issue manifestos, and all of them are printed in exercising the privilege. Usually new manifestos are posted up on walls or are published in some paper.

If you act contrary to one of these manifestos and a commissaire catches you—a commissaire is a bolshevik official—a tribunal settles your case. The tribunal is made up of three bolsheviks. It bothers not about either laws or manifestos, there being none of the former and too many of the latter. The tribunal simply decides what it thinks ought to be done to you, which may be anything from pardon for killing a man, to being shot at sunrise for stealing a loaf of bread, and it is done—that is bolshevik justice.

In soviet Russia, you are entirely at liberty, according to the bolsheviks. However, you cannot do any of the following things:

You cannot be at large without a permit to live issued by the commissaire. You need that for the right to breath.

You cannot buy a pair of socks, a shirt or any kind of clothes or merchandise. It bothers not about either to sell or people to buy merchandise. They are supposed to wait until it is issued.

It is forbidden to leave town, or travel anywhere, except on official business. Individuals cannot go from one town to another on private business or because they want to travel. You cannot rent a room or move into a new house, unless the commissaire assigns you to new quarters. You have to go where he says. Hotels do not exist. They are confiscated for headquarters.

It is forbidden to quit your job. If you do not like it, you are considered an enemy of the government if you

strike. The government can mobilize you to any job, it wishes, just as you were a soldier.

You cannot have a bank account, own a bicycle or automobile, own firearms unless you are a bolshevik, or be the long proprietor of anything of commercial value.

Otherwise, you are perfectly free—with a few more exceptions.

The bolshevik idea of liberty was impressed upon the United Press correspondent when he first arrived in Moscow. He was under guard, and was taken first to the police station. There, among all the millions of manifestos, the police commissaire could not find any which outlined regulations regarding foreign press correspondents who came into soviet land through the back door—the Lithuanian front.

The police commissaire decided to "pass the buck" to the foreign office secretary. "Why have a foreign office if it can't decide whether foreigners we catch here have any right to live or not?" he asked.

Under guard, but otherwise unharmed and unshowered, as well as unwashed, unshaved, and unclean from the long train trip—the correspondent was ushered before the foreign secretary whose first act was to lead a parade of abuse of all entente lands upon the head of the only specimen in captivity at the time.

Finally he relented and said, "We'll let you stay here a few days. I suppose the first thing is to get you out of arrest. Wait here while I see if it can be done."

Half an hour later an assistant came back and announced with a note of triumph, "You're free. You're at perfect liberty."

"Thanks, that's fine. I suppose I can hunt up a room now and clean up." "No, I can't," replied the bolshevik. "There aren't any hotels. They're confiscated. I'll take you home with me tonight."

"Can you recommend some one I can hire for interpreter?"

"No, it can't be done," said the Russian. "You can't hire anyone. You'd be a capitalist if you did."

"Is there any objection to my taking some pictures. I brought a camera."

"You cannot do that either," ruled the bolshevik. "It is forbidden for private individuals to have cameras. You'd better keep yours under cover or it may be confiscated."

"Guess there isn't much I can do right now, is there?"

"No, except read these pamphlets," he said, handing over a pile of propaganda. "You'll have to be interned now for a couple of hours, until I get through. I don't think you'd better wander about alone. You might get lost, or be arrested if you have no guide."

But otherwise you have perfect liberty in bolshevik Russia.

Applications are received from men desirous of entering other branches of the service and it may be that a special recruiting officer will be sent here from Fort Worth to handle these applicants.
