Senor Pardo, his ministers and a number of high officials of the army and navy, are in prison. Virtually no fighting and no casualties marked the overthrow of the Pardo government.

WORK OF GREAT IMPORTANCE.

The people of Wichita Falls are inclined to accept the irrigation project as a matter of course without weighing the immensity of the task of organizing it and building it, and they also fail to appreciate its importance.

The organization of the irrigation district, the financing of the project and the actual work of building it is the biggest work that has ever been undertaken in Northwest Texas.

"We have received the prospectus of the big Wichita irrigation and water improvement district, compiled and published by Vernon L. Sullivan, consulting engineer, of El Paso, Texas.

"The information which the prospectus contains is exceedingly interesting, the chief fact being that the project will care for 110,000 acres of the rich lands surrounding the wonderful city of Wichita Falls.

"For a number of years Kemp and Keil with other leading citizens of Wichita Falls have had the project under consideration and a close study of the proposition has been made by them from every standpoint, with the result that all doubt as to the feasibility of successful building and operation has been removed.

"It is the largest project that has been undertaken under the Texas district irrigation laws, and when completed will be of much value to the northern part of the state. URGE CONTROL OF THE PACKING PLANTS.

Pressure is being exerted upon members of congress by livestock interests and by consumers for legislation for government control of the meat packing industry. Consumers on the one hand point to the continued high prices charged for meats while the cattle raisers point to the falling prices for cattle on the hoof. The meat packer is criticized by the producers and consumers and it is their expectation that in some way the government can intervene and bring higher prices for cattle on the hoof and lower prices for beef on the block.

It may be that the government can do this, but recent experiences in government control do not warrant such expectations. Under government control, it ought to be expected from past experience that the price of beef on the block would increase and unless the government can show greater efficiency in the meat business than it has in some other lines, there might be no certainty that the meat could be had at any price.

"THE MAKING OF MAN."

The greatest study for man is man. "Know thyself" is an ancient dictum of eternal importance.

First, consider the force of heredity in man-making. To be well born is half the battle in life. Good bodies and good births go together. Heredity is the unity, continuity and the evolution of the living species. Eugenics is of first importance in this business of herity. Eugenics enlarges capacity by mating the fit and preventing the mating of the unfit. It is the science of selection for the propagation of the species called man through good bodies. The problem then that confronts all of us is the birth and welfare of good bodies. Thirty-five members of one family of hereditary defectives in Massachusetts have cost that state \$45,000. We are spending annually some \$20,000,000 on insane asylums; a like amount for almshouses, and \$12,000,000 on prisons. Then think of the vast expenditure for hospitals, detention wards, farm and reform schools and realize the need of good bodies.

Second, consider the force of environment in the work of man-making. This means good place for good births and good bodies. Environment is the stage setting of man's story of life. We must have utopias, good places of right opportunities in which talents can develop to their zenith. Heredity fixes talents and capacities. Environment fulfills them. Environment can be defined as evolution conditioned by nutrition, hygiene, growth, change and development. For the redemption of the race, for the salvation of society and peace on earth environment must become the reign of righteousness on earth as it is in heaven. You cannot have good places through bad business! Good bodies and good places for these bodies demand the destruction of any work or business that in any way tends to undermine health and sap stamina. Just as true is it with any so-called pleasure that mitigates against health both of the individual and so of society. Let us all see clearly that the welfare of society is the welfare of the individual.

In the light of this he who stands for that which makes against good births and good places is an enemy of man! Man, know thyself!

Third, consider the force of will in man making. Of all creation man alone has the force of will for good or for evil. The will of man makes or mars man and his institutions. Will is man helping to make man. Will is reasoned consciousness working in evolution. Will does its best work when it strives to improve heredity and environment thus paving the way for peace on earth and good will among men. Thus will acts on the past, uses the present and moulds the future. For the study of heredity we have the science of eugenics. For the improvement of environments we have the ideal of utopias. And for the exercise of the will we have "utopias"—the kingdom of good will! Let us have rightly trained wills that make for goodness by realizing capacity, creating and enjoying good places wherein thrive good bodies.

Heredity is the internal factor. Environment is the external factor. Will is the moulding factor. Man is the final factor. And the hour spell life. For this stupendous task we need that One who came that we might have life and have it full, even Jesus Christ. Man, think on these things!

PLAN LARGEST PASSENGER SERVICE IN THE WORLD

By Associated Press. LONDON, July 5.—The Irish nationalist alliance replying to a manifesto issued recently by the "Irish Dominion League" asserts that the first act of any freely elected parliament in full control of Irish economic and military resources would be to proclaim an Irish republic.

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MAKING AN EFFORT TO SETTLE BERLIN STREET CAR STRIKE

By Associated Press. BERLIN, Friday, July 4.—Leaders of the striking street railway employees and the municipal and government officials continued their conference tonight in an effort to settle the strike. At a late hour, however, prospects were not favorable to an immediate adjustment of differences.

The strike, which is in its fourth day, is proving a grave menace to the economic life of the city, especially as traffic between Berlin and the suburbs has not been resumed on account of the lack of available rolling stock. The government placed a large number of motor trucks at the disposal of the public today. They were liberally patronized.

Government advisers from Frankfurt which is at present the center of communist activities among the railway workers indicate that the strike is spreading from Frankfurt to other large cities in southern and western Germany. Many trains from Berlin toward southwestern Germany are being held up.

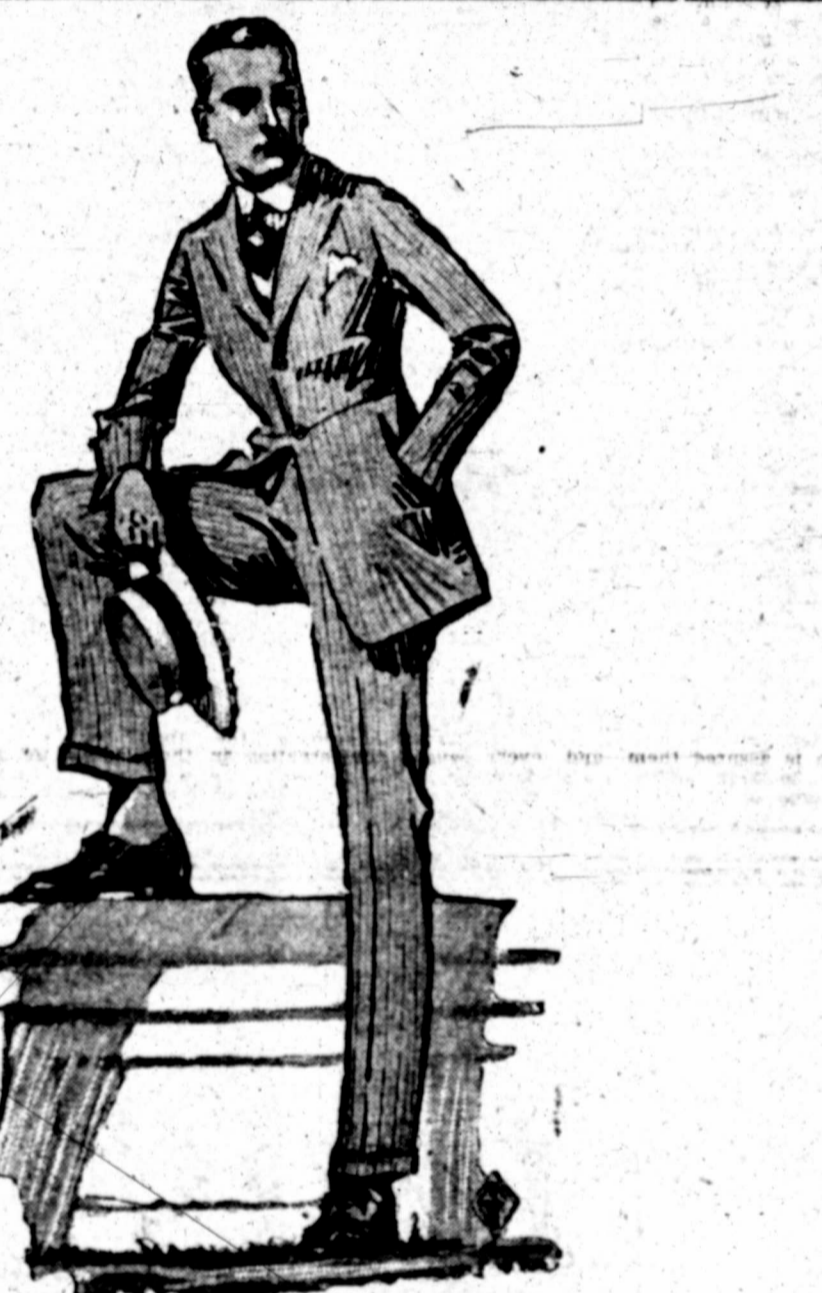

"NEW HOME DAILY" PLAN TO RELIEVE HOUSE SITUATION

There is every prospect that within a comparatively short time Wichita Falls will be able to boast of having a plant that will build "a new home every day" and one important factor in lessening the housing congestion has been established here. In addition the plant will manufacture sash, doors, etc., and a large force of well paid mechanics will find permanent employment.

The model home erected by the Seaboard Lumber and Milling Co. of Galveston, on a site near the Motor Truck factory, has been examined by the industrial committee of the chamber of commerce, and it is understood that a favorable report will be made on the proposed plan for removing the construction plant from Galveston to this city. The business of this concern has been established for 32 years and has been built up in making a change of location the choice was between Fort Worth and Wichita Falls, and this city will be given the preference if the conditions for the proposed transfer are complied with.

Two sites are now under consideration, one already having buildings that could be utilized for the purpose of the company. The committee having the matter under investigation is composed of Frank Kell, Mr. Jones and Mr. Lawton, and J. A. Kemp was called into conference with them in the matter. Secretary Harrison, of the chamber of commerce, said yesterday that he expected the committee to recommend favorable action by that body on the proposition to bring the plant to this city, and if the matter is brought to a satisfactory conclusion it will be possible to commence operations within a month or six weeks. J. H. Langston, a prominent capitalist of Galveston, is president of the company, and R. E. Harrison, secretary. The latter has made a good impression before the business men of the city while conducting the negotiations.

"THE WAR AND MUSIC" SUBJECT OF AN INTERESTING CLUB PAPER

Writing from the standpoint of the student of music, of literature, and of present day conditions, Miss Blanche Potter has written the following interesting paper on "The War and Music." The paper has been heard by members of the Travel and the Delta Daphnia clubs, and they are anxious that it be given wider publicity.

Opening with the statement, "Music is only another way in which our Creator expresses himself," the paper continues:

Music is the one art that in some form appeals to all classes. Ever since the time before Plato and Pythagoras it has exercised and uplifted the hearts of men. Ever since the time when man walked along the banks of a stream, and finding a reed growing there fashioned for himself a crude instrument whereby he might pour forth his heart in melody, ever since this time it has had its place in men's affairs.

Music has the power to stir new emotions and to awaken new thoughts. It brings to us the breath of spring, the fragrance and loveliness of flowers. In MacDowell's woodland sketches we catch the allurement of the woods, the charm of country lanes, the elfin like beauty of the pink wild rose. In these, all the beauties of God's out of doors are opened to us.

The art of music has a decided effect upon the physical, mental and spiritual nature of man. In regard to the physical effect, it is used in our hospitals and sanitariums to soothe the patient, to calm the insane, to soothe the effect upon the inmates. From the mental standpoint it is well known that music studied seriously in its various branches develops the intellect more than the study of any other subject. It gives a subtle understanding to all the other arts and even to life itself.

It is possible for any one of us to fully estimate the spiritual effect. Music has the power to lift man out of sordid surroundings into the realm of the spiritual. It can for the time being rid the heart of every ignoble thought. It brings back sacred memories, awakens new tendernesses, and more than any other agent it purifies men's hearts.

Music arouses, love of country, and patriotism. It did more to arouse the nation against the enemy in the thought than any other one thing. One of our highest officers said, "After the boys have sung the Star Spangled Banner and The Battle Cry for Freedom they could beat the devil himself."

One way in which the war had a decided effect upon music was in the "hit" which the rich and the poor, the high and the low, the learned and the unlearned met together to listen to the greatest music. It was here that boys who perhaps in their whole lives had never heard any real music were enabled to listen to the world's greatest classics interpreted by the world's most famous artists. And little by little an appreciation of the content of a classic, and a love for real music, were instilled into the hearts of these boys. Is it too much for us to expect that when they all come back to their homes, they will not demand the best? For it is a well known fact that when the love of good music has once been instilled in the heart, nothing less will satisfy.

One enthusiastic musician has gone so far as to say that because of the improved standard among all classes, that the first step has been taken toward sounding the death knell of the popularity of rag time. These insipid tunes which are whistled on our street corners, played on our Victrolas and hummed by our high school girls, bear the same relation to real music that a yellow backed novel does to real literature. It would seem to me that if a "rag" however small could be taken toward sounding the death knell of the popularity of ragtime that this of itself would be a great achievement. The ideal time, and the great age for music will be when we are accustomed to hearing only the best.

Perhaps the greatest achievement in regard to music has been the exploding of Germany's intellectual bubble. Germany has had that there would have been no art of music if it had not been for Germany. It is true that Germany has contributed much but other countries are capable of producing artistic results just the same as Germany. For many years prior to the war Germany's "Herr" professors had been engaged in floating her intellectual propaganda, and so cleverly had she done this that England, France and America were as ardent in their praise of Germany's intellectual superiority as Germany herself. Students of music in these countries felt that their musical education was incomplete unless they studied in Berlin or Vienna. We of America have always felt that we must go abroad, notwithstanding the fact that we have as good schools of music un-

derneath the stars and stripes as exist in the world today. It would seem to me that the greatest achievement is the doing away forever with the supremacy of Germany's intellectual superiority, because those countries which have so long bowed the knee to Germany will strike out into paths of their own and the world will be only the richer. For instance, we may expect a national school of our own, American music played by American musicians and the same may be said of the other countries and of the other arts as well.

The progress of men throughout the centuries has been paid for in blood. It was true of the Italian renaissance and the same may be said of the progress of later centuries has truly been paid for in blood, the blood of the whole world.

We well know that life's choicest and most precious achievements are inspired by the suffering of the human soul. This is true of the individual, it is true of the nation. Speaking of the individual, it is well known that Beethoven, the great master of melody, suffered from the neglect of his fellowmen. He suffered from poverty, and did not have even the necessary things of life. He had few friends and those he had failed to understand or appreciate him. The love of his heart was lost forever to him because of his humble birth. At the time when he reached the highest pinnacle of fame he lost his hearing and could not enjoy the beautiful music he created. Yet out of a soul racked by the deepest sorrow he has given to the world the most precious treasures, and so long as music has the power to charm the ear and bring comfort to the hearts of men so long will Beethoven's immortal melodies with their pathos and charm live forever in our hearts.

As this is true of the individual it is true of the nation, for out of so much pain and suffering brought by the hand of war across every threshold of the world there shall come an art, literature and music which shall bring joy and inspiration down through the centuries to those who shall come after us.

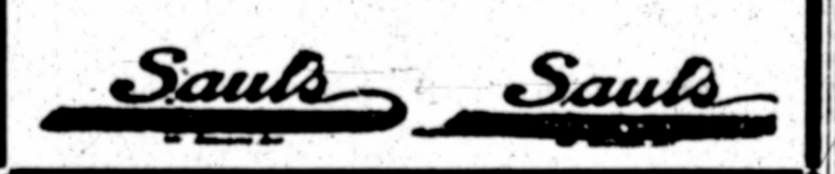

MAJ. IKE ASHBURN NEW COMMANDANT OF A. & M. COLLEGE

WILL ENTER UPON HIS NEW DUTIES WITH SCHOOL ON MONDAY.

FAMILIAR WITH THE A. & M.

Was Publicity Secretary Prior to Entering the Officers' Training School.

COLLEGE STATION, TEX., July 5.—Major Ike S. Ashburn Jr., who was twice wounded while leading his battalion of the 358th Infantry in the St. Mihiel drive and decorated for valor by both the American and French governments, has accepted the position of commandant of A. & M. College, to which he was elected by the board of directors earlier in the week and will enter upon his new duties next Monday.

As publicity secretary of the College for three years Major Ashburn became thoroughly familiar with the organization and traditions of the College and is one of the most popular men who has ever been identified with the institution. During his previous residence here he probably had more influence over the students than any other one individual, though his position entailed no duties connected with the administration of student affairs. His powers of organization and direction of men were evidenced in his rapid rise in the army and the enthusiasm with which his men followed him under fire as under every other circumstance.

Promotion is Rapid. Anticipating that his services might be needed in the event this country should become involved in the world-war—and the indications that the United States would ultimately become involved were very strong long before the official declaration was made. Ashburn attended the Plattsburgh training camp for civilians at Plattsburgh, N. Y., in the summer of 1916, and was accepted as a candidate in the first officers' training school at Leon Springs, in the late spring and early summer of 1917. So well did he acquit himself at Leon

Spings that he was recommended by the officers in charge for a commission as major upon the completion of the course there, but due to his lack of actual military experience by a war department thought it best to give him only a captain's commission at the time, though he was soon afterward promoted to the rank of major. Upon the basis of his excellent work in the St. Mihiel sector last fall he was recommended for promotion to a lieutenant colonelcy but as the armistice was signed a few days later the promotion was not given.

Wounded at St. Mihiel. It was while leading his command in action near Poyen-Haye, France, on the St. Mihiel salient, September 12, that bits of shrapnel shells struck Major Ashburn in the neck and paralyzed him for an hour. But without going to the hospital and with the loss of but little more than an hour's time he resumed the leadership of his battalion and continued to lead it with exceptional daring and effect, his citation for the distinguished service cross declares, until two days later when he was shot through the hip by a German sniper. This wound was quite serious and it was necessary for Major Ashburn to spend over three weeks in a hospital and undergo direct operations before he was able to walk again. He was practically recovered from this wound, however, when he received his discharge at Cheyenne, early in May.

New Departure at College. Major Ashburn's election as commandant marks a new departure at the College, as he will be the first man in the history of the College to hold that position who is not a West Pointer. Heretofore, the position has been held by the professor of military science and tactics, who is assigned here by the War Department, but the decision to place a civilian with ample military experience in the position represents a thorough study of the matter by the authorities of the institution and meets the approval of the military officers stationed here. This move means that all matters of discipline affecting the student body will be administered by Major Ashburn, in connection with the discipline committee of the faculty, while the professor of military science and tactics will give himself to the increased duties of that position, brought about by the large increase in the number of units of the military service introduced in the R. O. T. C. here. Col. C. H. Miller has been designated by the War Department to retain the position of professor of military science and tactics and he will be assisted by a large staff of men, including a lieutenant colonel in the field artillery, signal corps and such other units as other than infantry that may be established at the College.

Major Ashburn's home is at Greenville, and prior to his coming to College in 1914, as publicity secretary, he was engaged in the newspaper business at Fort Worth.

INSURANCE RATES INVOLVED IN FIGHT FOR CLEANER CITY

STATE FIRE MARSHAL ENGLISH IS COMING THIS WEEK FOR INSPECTION.

WILL PRESCRIBE A REMEDY

Failure to Comply Therewith Will Result in Requiring the City.

Chief McClure, of the city fire department gives notice to the merchants and business men of Wichita Falls that he expects a visit from S. W. English, state fire marshal this week, and that his mission is to investigate the condition of the streets and alleys, as to the observance of regulation governing the removal of trash and inflammable material from and near their premises and also the condition of stocks and packing material from the viewpoint of danger from fires.

"If his requirements are not at once complied with, after he has prescribed the remedy for the present dangerous conditions and lax methods—there will be a re-rating of risks and the whole business community will be affected by his decisions," said the chief.

Repeated warnings and pleadings have been without avail, and the last resort, a general raise in the rates of insurance faces Wichita Falls as the result of wilful neglect of those who have the matter within their own keeping. It is beyond the power of the sanitary department to keep the streets and alleys cleaned up without the whole-hearted co-operation of the merchants and business men, and if the rates are not to be advanced there will have to be a general awakening among those most interested, said Chief McClure.

OIL DEVELOPMENT HOLDS INTEREST IN MONTAGUE COUNTY

ENCOURAGEMENT IS AFFORDED
IN HISTORY OF DRILLING IN
EARLY DAYS.

MUCH ACTIVITY IS REPORTED

Carter County Oklahoma, Strike is
Attracting Considerable
Attention.

Special to The Times.

ST. JO, TEX., July 5.—Oil talk just will not down in Montague county. Growing somewhat reminiscent, an old citizen told of efforts to find oil in this locality in the early stages of oil development in Texas. Attention then was attracted to the asphalt beds in the vicinity of St. Jo. Three shallow wells were drilled to a depth of about 700 feet. One was located about four miles southwest of St. Jo, and the other two within a mile east from St. Jo. Oil was found at about 480 feet in each of these wells, but not in paying quantities. The oil which formed the asphalt beds may come from this sand. These beds are still soft and live on the underside, indicating a connection with the source of supply. About fifteen years ago, a well was drilled to a depth of 2,200 feet about a mile northwest of St. Jo. A Mr. Morrison, now working in the Burk Burnett field, was one of the workmen on this well. He recently made the statement that, had he known as much then as now about bringing in oil wells, paying well could have been made of this one at about 1760 feet, where a 40-foot sand was found. This would begin to explode the theory of deep drilling in Montague county. The showings found in the Nocoona Oil & Gas Company well from 800 down to the present depth of 1600 feet or below would also have a like result.

Drilling Near Munster.
The Munster Oil & Gas Company well, drilling near Munster over in Cook county, and about eight miles east of St. Jo, is working at 500 feet or below, after a job of under-ream-

ing. It is the intention to make this a deep test.

The new strike near Hewitt over in Carter county, Oklahoma, is attracting considerable attention on this side of the river, and the wonder is whether further drilling in Montague county will not prove some of the sands already found in wells here to be the same as those in Carter county. The gravity of the oil found in the Nocoona well at 800 feet was the same as Healdton oil. Interest will now center in what may be found in the Nocoona well at the same depth as that at which the Hewitt strike is reported, about 2,110 feet. The improvements being reported in this lower within the oil belt on the north side of the river from Ardmore, west to Granite, as well as the new wells and locations up and down this same region indicate the oil operators on the Oklahoma side intend to keep up their reputation for doing things. Healdton is sure becoming a center for pump stations on the oil trunk lines. The next stations to the southwest on the Ranger trunk lines are located at Bowie, where the Prairie Pipe Line Company is enlarging its pumping station to meet the demands of the 12-inch line, and the Sinclair Gulf is erecting a new pump station.

Survey for Pipe Line.
It is reported a survey has been made or is in progress by the Empire interests for an 8-inch oil pipe line from their refinery at Gainsville to the Burk Burnett oilfield. Oil is now being received by tank cars from the Burk Burnett field. This company has an 8-inch line in operation from the Healdton field to the Gainsville field to the Gainsville refinery. It is noted also that the Sinclair Consolidated Oil Company will build an 8-inch oil line from Cushing via Healdton to Burk Burnett. The Magnolia Petroleum Company has built an 8-inch line connection between their Fort Worth-Burk Burnett line and their line running north to Cushing, the connecting line starting from a point near Walton siding in Clay county, where a pump station has been built, and extending to their pump station on the Texas side of Red river, and north of Ringgold. The Gulf Pipe Line Company is at work on a 6-inch line from Fort Worth to Burk Burnett. Pipe is being delivered for this line.

All pipe lines lead through Montague county, and when Montague takes its turn at the wheel, it will supply its full share of the oil needed to keep these pipe lines in operation. The Gulf line just noted makes the ninth oil line to cross Montague county.

The oil company recently formed by citizens of Bowie with a capital stock of \$75,000, has made a location on the Cash McDonald farm about a mile southwest of Queens peak. It is reported work will soon start on this well, which is to be a deep test. This

company contemplates drilling one or more wells, and means to do its part to start the ball rolling in oil development in Montague county. This location is looked upon favorably.

Earlsville parties, under the name of Stanfield Ranch Oil Corporation, are starting an interesting test on Block 1 of the Peter Harness survey. This location is about six miles northwest from Ringgold and over in Clay county. This is a structure location, and will be watched with interest by the citizens of Montague county who are inclined to think that the star of empire in the oil game is likely to take its way east, or south a bit, not that it has not already shined in other directions.

The Beaver Valley well is drilling ahead at about 2,300 feet, after considerable delay in waiting for casing and an under-reamer. This test is to be drilled 3,500 feet. A new wire line of this length was taken to the well within the last ten days.

The Nocoona Oil & Gas Co., has recovered the tools in their test on the Leimmon farm, after a long fishing job. Drilling will now proceed.

AROUND 50 WELLS ARE ON SAND COMPLETION BEING DELAYED FOR PIPE LINE CONNECTIONS

An informal agreement of oil producers to hold back their wells until such time as the pipe line connection is somewhat relieved, by thirty days or sixty days, is forecast in the report that around 50 wells are on the sand, ready for completion, but will be held up for some time, waiting on the pipe lines. Many operators have expressed their intention of leaving the wells until the lines more adequately cover all parts of the field, and the railroad shipping facilities have improved, before completing them. There is nothing approximating a panic in the situation, as there is every assurance that in a few weeks the new lines now building, will be able to care for an enormous increase in the production. TO DRILL TEST ON HUDSPETH COUNTY UNIVERSITY LAND

EL PASO, TEX., July 5.—Dr. S. H. Worrell, dean of the State School of Mines and Metallurgy, who has just made an investigation of the geological formation on certain tracts of land belonging to the University of Texas situated in Hudspeth county, is very confident that oil in paying quantities will be found in the Hueco basin. All arrangements have been made for drilling an oil well upon University land in Hueco basin, situated about 45 miles from El Paso in Hudspeth county.

"If producing oil wells are brought in on lands owned by the University of Texas, it will mean the solving of the financial problem of that institution," Dr. Worrell said. URGE THE CONSERVATION OF OIL BY HOLDING BACK COMPLETIONS AND DEMANDING MARKET PRICE

Urging conservation of the oil resources to the fullest, by holding back the drilling in oil wells, and by refusing to sell oil under quoted market prices, a number of prominent oil operators have addressed the following communication to the oil producers of Wichita county, and particularly in the northwest pool at Burkburnett. These men, G. C. Wood, Walter Cline, Roy B. Jones, C. H. Clark and W. E. Norton, are operators of long time standing and as such their advice and opinions in the matter will carry weight. The communication follows:

"To the oil producers of Wichita county:

"The inadequate transportation facilities now existing in the Burkburnett field, together with the probability that same will continue for the next thirty to sixty days, require the most careful thought and earnest co-operation of all producers in this district. There is, however, no real occasion for the near panic existing among some of the producers at this time for while it is a fact that there is a temporary over production, there being probably more oil produced at this time than the present pipe line connections can properly handle, yet this condition will be righted within the next sixty days if the producers will but co-operate for the best interests of all parties concerned. Any attempt on the part of some of the producers to introduce the pipe lines to run their oil at a sales price less than the present posted price would secure only to the profit of the pipe lines. Not only would such a course on the part of a few producers cause the above result but their action would be followed by others to such an extent that the pipe lines would reap an immense profit which should properly belong to the producers and which they would eventually receive if they will but stand together in this seeming crisis. Having been through the same panic conditions caused by over production in other fields we, as producers of long experience, know that any attempt on your part to procure the running of your oil at the sacrifice of legitimate prices will hurt only yourselves and those others of us who are attempting to make the best of present conditions until such time as they may be improved for our mutual benefit and we do, therefore, appeal to all producers to decline to offer their oil below quoted pipe line prices. We make this appeal not only for the reason just stated but in proof of the reasonableness of same beg to offer the following facts relative to the present situation:

"(a) You will remember that last fall some of the smaller producers became alarmed at their inability to get their oil run promptly and as an inducement to obtain the service sold their product below the market price but it was only a few days thereafter that the pipe lines were able to properly care for all the oil produced and even paid a bonus over posted prices with the result that those who had sold their oil at the lower price sus-

CURTIS COMPANY BUYS 123 PLANES FROM CALL FIELD

MOVEMENT BEGAN SATURDAY WHEN TOWN SHIPS WENT TO LOVE FIELD.

DAILY FLIGHTS ARE PLANNED

Work to Begin At Once on Pipe Line
From Healdton to Burkburnett Field.

The Sinclair Consolidated Oil Corporation is planning to bring its refining capacity now rated at 50,000 barrels a day to 100,000 barrels or more as rapidly as the plants can be installed. Through its various affiliations it will own or control 7,000,000 acres of oil lands in various parts of the world. Will Be Important Factor in Development of the Burkburnett Field.

The Oklahoma Petroleum & Gasoline Company of Tulsa, Okla., is the title of a corporation subsidiary to the Oklahoma Petroleum & Gasoline Company of Tulsa, Oklahoma, by which it is financed and no flotation of shares was made. WILL CONNECT WITH TRUNK LINE TO COMPANY'S TULSA REFINERIES.

WILL BE A SIX INCH MAIN

Will Be in Position to Handle 20,000 Barrels Daily from the New Field.

The announcement comes from Houston that the Texas Pipe Line Company is about ready to begin the construction of a six-inch pipe line from the Burk Burnett fields to Healdton, to connect with its trunk line to the Tulsa refineries of the company. The company has in operation a six inch main line from Healdton to its refinery at Gulf points, and will complete the extension of its eight inch duplicate line as rapidly as possible. Feeders will be run from Burk Burnett to the northwest extension, and it is estimated that when the new line is finished to Healdton 20,000 barrels per day will be gathered from the field, making a great increase in the marketing facilities for crude. The pipe has been ordered and will soon be available and work will be rushed as fast as the arrivals of pipe will permit.

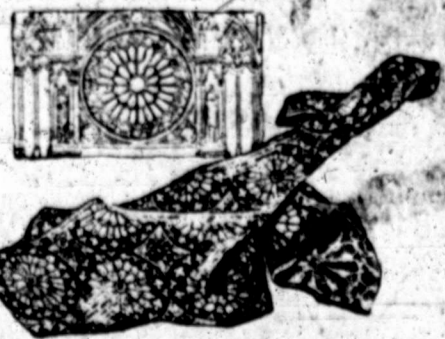

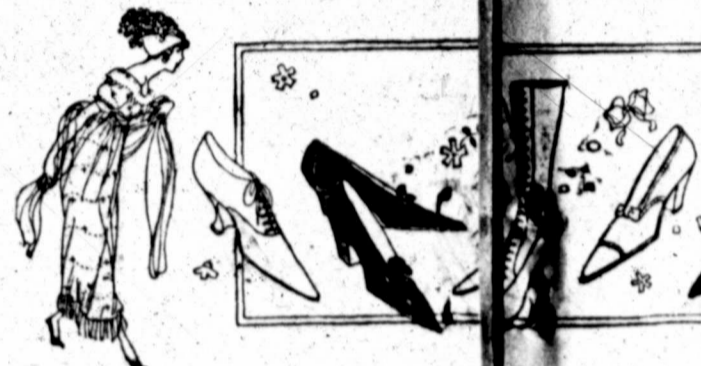

INDUSTRIAL PLAN GREATEST PROBLEM FACING RUSSIANS

TASK MADE DOUBLY DIFFICULT
BECAUSE OF PREVIOUS
CONDITIONS.

MAKE CONCESSION CAPITAL.

Indignants Offered For The Construction of Railroads and Factories.

NEW YORK, July 5.—Starting the industrial wheels going and keeping them moving is the greatest problem confronting the bolsheviks at present. The task is made doubly difficult by the fact that the bolsheviks fell heir to a defunct industrial organization left over from the old regime.

Factories erected by the Russian capitalists on the verge of collapse and were built for exploitation mainly. The railroads were in poor condition and were short of rolling stock.

Add to this the lack of management and the abolition of individual initiative which followed the overthrow of the capitalist system, and one realizes some of the difficulties the bolsheviks face.

Industrial commissions have been formed to plan reconstruction of factories, but so far plans have not advanced much beyond the discussion stage. The bolsheviks claim they cannot accomplish anything without the aid of labor and capital, and they need, and their men at the front.

As the result of experiments conducted so far, the bolsheviks are coming to realize that individual initiative is hard to substitute and that all men are not of the same value. A commission of so-called experts is planning new industries for the government.

In addition the bolsheviks have decided they must make concessions to capitalists to encourage new development. Consequently they are offering concessions to capitalists who will build certain railroads and factories.

The concessions as yet are not acceptable, since capital must comply with the Russian Code of Labor, limiting hours of labor and giving the workmen the right to set their own wages.

Industries operated by the state have been running since this system, but at a loss, which the state makes up by printing money. Capitalists hesitate to accept concessions under these conditions, though handsome offers are made of alternate strips of timber land on both sides of a railroad to be built across northern Russia.

According to the bolsheviks, they are forced to seize the Russian industries after the revolution. In an interview with Grigorii Melnitenansky, Moscow labor chief, who formerly was known in New York as George N. Melcher, labor leader and agitator, the following explanation was given the United Press.

"When the war with Germany ended the Russian capitalists closed their shops," said Melnitenansky. "They had made enough money and were ready to retire. The workmen were out of work and out of luck."

"We demanded work and insisted that they pay us while they waited to reopen the factories. The capitalists replied that they had no intention of opening the shops again. We could starve."

"If it had been in America, it never would have happened that way. American capitalists would have been ready to start peace time production the day after the war ended. But not the Russian capitalists."

"The workmen in Moscow held meetings and finally decided they would have to seize the factories and operate them. That was before the bolsheviks overthrew Kerensky. So you see we industrial unionists were the first to declare bolshevik tactics."

"Of course when we decided to seize the factories, the fighting started. It was confined at first to a few factories inside Moscow and a district we seized. But old government guards started it, and were getting the best of us. Then we called a general fight of the unions against the government, and when the workmen from the suburb factories attacked the troops from the rear, the workmen forced upon us by the capitalists. You can't realize the situation, because it never would have happened so in America. Now all we want is a chance to work our system out without interference from the outside."

Probably the body upon which the fringe of soviet Russia hangs more than on anything else is the Extraordinary Economic Soviet, headed by Alex Ivan Rikoff, a radical Russian journalist, who has gathered about him the bolshevik economic staff.

The body is trying to replace the initiative taken by capitalism in the old days with an inspired initiative. It has conducted a complete investigation of conditions and has gathered much data.

Rikoff's commission has drawn up plans for some new industries. It has also definitely opened negotiations with foreign capitalists to build up industries in Russia.

According to Rikoff, Russia wants benevolent capitalists.

"We will permit individual concerns so long as they operate on a socialistic basis," he said. "We need energetic and skilled managers from the outside. We would rather get them from America than from any other country, because there will be no political strings attached to deals with Americans."

Capitalists would have to make the same labor conditions we do, of course. Our industrial unions set the wages the factories must pay, with the endorsement of this commission.

"We realize we cannot live without making concessions, both outside and inside Russia. Many of our unions have already adopted the piece system for wages, contrary to communistic theories. Wages range from 600 to 2,000 rubles per month for laborers, with bonuses for managers. Perhaps we can make everyone equal, but now we must make concessions."

RANGER WILL HAVE CHURCHES IN KEEPING WITH CITY'S GROWTH

RANGER, TEX., July 5.—At least it may be said for men of the oil country that they don't do things by halves. In the days of its youth—its hardy nature yet, save for ambition and undertakings and accomplishment—was as wicked as they make 'em.

Now it plans the expenditure of \$200,000 for new churches. Half of that amount already is raised. The campaign for \$100,000 for a new Y. W. C. A. will be finished by the end of June. Most surprising was the way in which \$75,000 was raised for the erection of a new home for the Methodist church. Workers of the church were prepared for an extensive campaign for contributions. But the wealthy men of the oil country can not be called penurious, for they went down into their pockets and raised the entire sum the first time the matter was broached.

Bishop Alsworth, of Austin, came to Ranger to help in the campaign. He preached to the members of the congregation assembled in the modest little wooden structure which as yet serves as their structure.

"You may see down for \$10,000," spoke up one of his hearers, before an appeal was made.

Contributions Come Fast. And from one corner of the church and another came offer after offer, not all as munificent as this first, but all representative of open heartedness and generosity. Before the meeting was concluded, in a short hour, \$50,000 had been subscribed.

Plans of a Dallas architect for a magnificent white face brick building at Marston and Pine streets, the site of the present church, have been accepted. Within a few months members of the church which thirty-some years ago met in a school house to listen to the circuit rider will be gathered in one of the most modern church buildings in the state. The Rev. Edgar M. Wisdom is the pastor.

The First Baptist church, which has constructed a tabernacle on the Billy Sunday style to accommodate the increase in its membership due to the growth of the city, under the Rev. W. H. Johnson plans the erection of a still larger permanent building. It has secured a site, 100x200 feet at the end of Walnut street for the purpose.

For its size, Wichita Falls, with its vast wealth from the same source that brought Ranger its riches, has built the greatest number of beautiful churches of any city in Texas. When its building program is complete, Ranger will rival Wichita Falls save in number.

The Presbyterian church, of which the Rev. H. M. Feebles is pastor, has sites in the Young addition on which it will build soon.

FEDERAL RESERVE BANK SAYS EARLY CLAIMS JUSTIFIED

GOOD CROP AND BUSINESS CONDITIONS HAVE FULLY MATERIALIZED.

NO HESITANCY IN TRADING

Monthly Report of General Situation is issued by the Dallas Branch.

Special to The Times.

DALLAS, TEX., July 5.—As a whole early predictions of good crop and business conditions have been fully materialized, according to the monthly report of the Federal Reserve Bank of Dallas, prepared by the reserve agent and made public today.

"No hesitancy in trade is noticed," the report says, "and when it is borne in mind that increased activities in practically all lines are prevailing in the face of steadily increasing prices it is quite clear that profits arising out of business since the first of the year, are of a most gratifying nature."

"Crop conditions as a whole," the report continues, "have felt the effects of more rain than normal and work has been retarded, but notwithstanding this, expressions from all quarters reflect a fairly favorable situation."

"The financial position of the district shows ever little change during the past thirty days and the generally expanded condition of banks is still quite noticeable, but as the need for government financial grows less, and the liquidation season approaches, there is every reason to believe that the long continued inflation will gradually subside itself, though the process may be slow."

"In regard to resumption of building activities, the report says: 'There has been no noticeable resumption in building activities except in localities affected favorably by local conditions, and in the sections immediately adjacent to Dallas strikes have added to the unsatisfactory condition in that line.'

An investigation throughout the district, the review states, is basis for the assertion that the wheat crop is

a "bounteous one." There has been excellent weather for the wheat crop, and except for lack of labor, which has been short throughout the belt, the harvest is progressing well, the review states. "Conservatively estimated, place the crop at some 40,000,000 and 50,000,000 bushels this season, which is almost double former records."

"The oat crop, in which a greatly increased acreage was planted, is being harvested, and the results are very good."

Corn is Uncertain.

"Corn growing in the district is attended with some uncertainties which usually develop a little later in the season when hot winds and prolonged periods of dryness will upset what appears to be a good start, but heavy moisture and excellent growing conditions this season have put the plant in a strong position. Acreage has been increased in almost every section throughout the district."

"The rice crop is all planted, although delayed a little on account of excessive rains. There is practically no unold surplus stocks in the hands of millers at this time, and the outlook is regarded first class."

"According to some authorities the district planted about 600,000 acres of peanuts last year and while there seems to have been a reduction in acreage of perhaps 25 per cent this season, increased yield from some sections apparently will make up for the short acreage. The price is high and the demand for use as a substitute for animal fats is steadily growing."

Trade in General.

Regarding wholesale and retail trade generally, the review gives a fairly optimistic outlook. "The labor situation, according to the report, is becoming more acute as the summer season advances, and it promises to be a considerable factor in all crops that are harvested later in the year, principally cotton."

"In the cities skilled labor is fully employed at good wages notwithstanding strikes in North Texas and a general unrest due to an adjustment of differences between capital and labor. Lack of farm labor this year is very noticeable and the high wages paid do not seem to have relieved the situation, the report says."

CRACK REGIMENT IS FINANCED BY AMERICAN

By Associated Press. —ARRIVAL, ESTHONIA, July 5.—The crack regiment of the new Esthonian Army is one organized and financed by an American citizen, H. C. Reisser. It is composed of cavalry, infantry, and artillery units, numbers 1,000 men and has been fighting for several months.

This discovery was made by the American Red Cross mission which arrived here a few days ago with a

shipload of supplies for the relief of the country. Mr. Reisser had already organized a small Red Cross hospital of fifty beds. The first articles which this hospital requested of the American relief workers were an American flag and a Red Cross flag. When both of these were supplied they hung the two banners to the breeze from flag poles in the hospital ward.

SO HE DIDN'T DIE.

LONDON.—(By Mail).—The housing problem is one that confronts not only Londoners, but the inhabitants even of the smaller villages throughout England.

In one Midland village recently, when the news spread that one of the old inhabitants was likely to die, no less than six people went in one day to the landlord to "bespoke" the cottage.

The old man heard what had happened and at once began to get better.

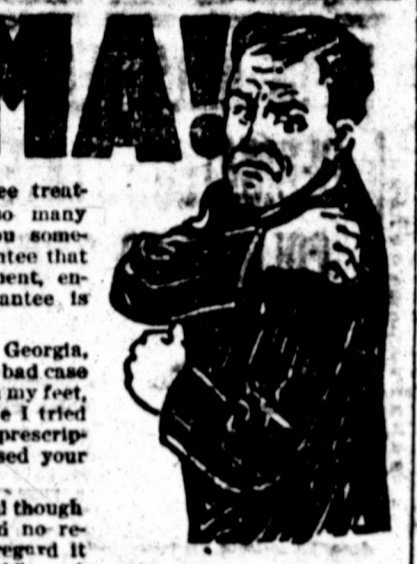

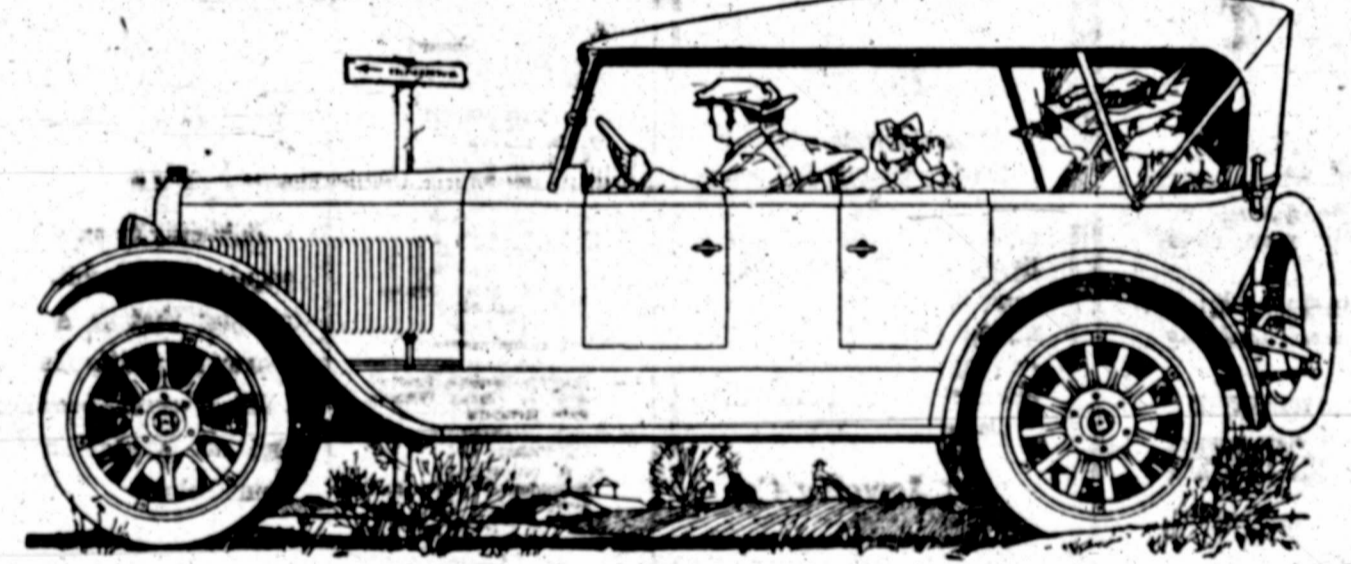

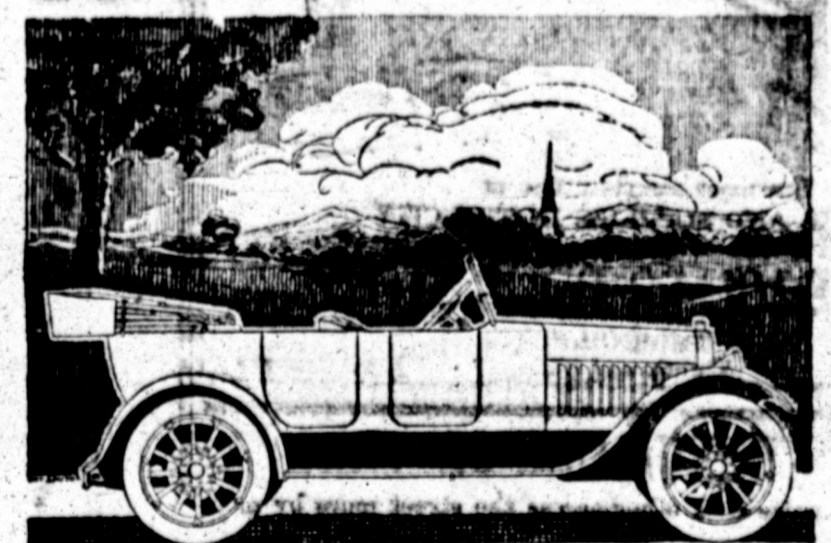

PUBLIC URGED TO CO-OPERATE IN THE HANDLING OF MAIL

BUSINESS MAN CAN MATERIALLY AID IN RELIEVING CONGESTION.

LITTLE SYSTEM IS REQUIRED

Mail Should Be Deposited at Intervals During the Day As Ready To Go Out.

The business men of Wichita Falls especially those who have a large correspondence, can help themselves and assist in relieving the congested conditions at the postoffice by systematizing the dispatch of their mail, as is now being done in other cities where conditions of congestion require drastic remedies.

Most of these houses and firms deposit their outgoing mail at one time, and generally at the end of the business day. This causes the work to pile up so that the night force faces a mountain of mail when coming on duty. They do all that is humanly possible, but if all the mail is not sent away that night, thereby making a serious difference in its delivery to the addressee, the senders have only themselves to blame.

If it were made the daily habit to mail one batch at 10 o'clock a. m. each day, or as some of the employes go to their lunch at noon, then send a second installment at 2 to 3 p. m., and the final batch at the end of the business day, 5 to 6 p. m., the tasks of the mailing clerks will be so evenly distributed that the chances of prompt dispatch are greatly increased.

Collection at Noon. Collection by the postal clerks is done at noon, and starts at 1:15 p. m., and there is always a great accumulation dumped in the box at the mailing window from 10 p. m. to midnight, rendering it practically impossible to handle the accumulation before the late trains. The suggestion above made for sending mail in several batches would dovetail in nicely with the regular collections, and a constant stream would be pouring into the office and be pouched in time for the trains passing in the middle of the day, thus lifting some of the burden from the train mail workers, as well as at the local office.

The postmaster at Dallas has found it necessary to call upon the public for this same sort of assistance, as conditions are daily becoming more and more congested. The department can give but a limited amount of assistance because of budget limitations, and the government cannot at all times meet the emergency demands that arise suddenly from unlooked for causes.

On Friday Postmaster Howard was obliged to recall his entire force of temporary clerks so as to avail himself of all those eligible for permanent positions, and there are still four vacancies with no material in sight to relieve the shortage. The next civil service examination for clerk-carriers will be held July 12, and it will be some time before those who pass can be utilized because of the routine of the department. Therefore everything that can be devised to make the best of a bad condition must be availed of to gain the utmost efficiency from the forces now in the service.

By helping the postoffice department in this manner the business man will help himself.

PRINCE CELEBRATES 25TH BIRTHDAY BY ESTABLISHING HOME

By PERCY M. SARR, (United Press Staff Correspondent.)

LONDON.—(By Mail.)—The Prince of Wales is celebrating his 25th birthday by starting housekeeping on his own, free from the restraint of Buckingham Palace, where he has had to govern his coming and going by the etiquette of court and the convenience of his royal parents, York House, St. James', is the Prince's new home, and the alterations and redecoration being practically completed he is busily engaged in moving in.

Whatever the war has done for most royal families, it has firmly established the House of Windsor on the throne of England, at least, as far as the present heir to the throne is concerned. The stranger does not need to probe public opinion very deeply to find that there is a sincere popular and personal regard for the Prince of Wales, who has already inherited most of the national affection for the monarchist system. King Edward, King Edward's hold on public affection, engendered after a most unpopular period of "wild out sowing," was due to his very human failings and virtues, but his grandson, after a colorless start, due possibly to the fact that he advertised no special virtues, has attained the same goal by proving himself a very human young man. Prior to the war he was always regarded as being too much impressed with the responsibilities of his future position, and likely to develop into a colorless personality. In public he was so solemn and shy, and was suspected of being too "mother-ridden."

Then came the war, with the rush of young men to the front. The Prince showed himself a spirited youngster by insisting on being allowed to take his chance with the youths of his own age. Revolutionary opponents of the monarchist system declared that this was "good advertising" but the soldiers who encountered him in France and Italy say that if it was merely advertising and monarchy, it was a risky job the way the Prince did it. Far from sitting in the shelter of G. H. Q. or in the comparative safety of the S. O. S., he took his turn in the front line, and more than once narrowly escaped the further advertisement of a "Blighly." (B. E. F. for wound.)

This welcome escape from the frigid atmosphere of the Court developed his character in a manner which would have been quite impossible under any other condition. And the development was all for the good. His pre-matrimonial solemnity fell from him like a cloak, and the open air life, with its mixture of danger, freedom and democratic camaraderie, disclosed a most essentially human personality.

Command of men has given him self-confidence and an intimate knowledge of men, matters and social conditions. The Prince is a most capable sailor, fully worthy of his naval rank of lieutenant, and his promotion to the army rank of colonel on the staff was more than a complimentary step due to royal favor, for Sir Douglas Haig's staff swear there is no more competent staff officer than the heir to the British throne. He is also a capable aviator, although his brother Prince Albert aims at the title of "flying prince," and is in the Royal Air Force. He has lately developed a keen interest in the housing question, and as a considerable landlord he has every opportunity of obtaining first hand information. Which opportunities, he has taken, considerably to the chagrin and surprise of the estate agents. The Prince, as Duke of Cornwall, owns a large portion of the most congested districts of south London, and he has made a number of surprise visits to investigate living conditions.

BLACK HILLS PEAK DEDICATED TO LATE COLONEL ROOSEVELT

By Associated Press. DEADWOOD, S. D., July 5.—Within sight of the country over which Theodore Roosevelt as a young man ranged his cattle and hunted wild game and just above the trails he followed while a visitor in this district, a mountain one of the most lofty peaks in the Black Hills—has become Mount Theodore Roosevelt, in honor of the former President of the United States, "The Great American." Two tablets were unveiled.

To witness the ceremony thousands of Americans from all parts of the country came to Deadwood. Governor Norbeck of South Dakota, presided at the ceremonies on the summit of the mountain, and Major General Leonard Wood, was the orator of the day. The arrangements were under direction of the Society of the Black Hills Pioneers, of which Colonel Roosevelt was one of the two honorary members. The movement to provide the memorial had its inception at a meeting

of the Society of Black Hills Pioneers last January, when a suggestion of Captain Seth Bullock a plan to change the name of Sheep Mountain to that of Mount Theodore Roosevelt was adopted.

Sheep Mountain, one of the highest peaks in the Black Hills and the highest detached peak in the chain of mountains so designated, lies three miles from Deadwood. It is accessible to its summit by a broad highway, suitable for teams or automobiles, while several trails, safe and convenient for horsemen or persons on foot lead to the top of the mountain. From its summit, the neighboring states of Wyoming and Montana are visible. The view from the top is unsurpassed for beauty in this section of the country.

The city of Deadwood is bearing the expense entailed by erection on the summit of the mountain of a round tower on which will be placed the bronze tablet bearing the legends telling a part of the life of Theodore Roosevelt and his contribution to Americanism. One of the tablets bears the following inscription:

In Memory of Theodore Roosevelt The American. October 27, 1858. January 6, 1919. Society of Black Hills Pioneers. July 4, 1919.

The other tablet pays a tribute to the services rendered by Colonel Roosevelt to his country.

AN ADJUSTMENT OF VALUES

We are asked a good many times, "Why the high price of coffee?" There are, of course, many contributory reasons. Among them: The frost damage in Brazil last August. The fact that Europe has had practically no coffee for four years, and the surplus in the United States is practically nil. Prohibition is also a factor. But the REAL REASON is an adjustment of values among commodities. A few years ago Rio sevens sold for 5 1/2 cents per pound, so did cotton. Now cotton sells for above 80 cents and Rio sevens for twenty-two. Wheat used to fluctuate between sixty-five cents and a dollar, and is now two-twenty. So it stands to reason the Brazilian can't take the old prices for his coffee and get by. Coffee is still the cheapest commodity of consumption—and the last to advance.

WHO CAN BEAT IT?

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
