Return of British Dirigible Delayed

MINEOLA, N. Y., July 8.—The start of the return trans-Atlantic cruise of the British dirigible R-34 was today deferred from early temorrow morning, the hour which had been fixed for her departure, for at least 15 and possibly 24 hours.

MINEOLA, N. Y., July 8.—Major G.
E. M. Pritchard, executive officer of
the R.34, after inspecting the dirigible's engines at 9 a. m. today said
all repairs would be completed by 5
o'clock tonight and that fuel, water
and other supplies would be taken
aboard before midnight. With favorable weather, he said, the R.34 will
be read to start at daylight tomorrow.

Major Pritchard said the airship
would take the southern track, four
or five hundred miles north of the
Azores, in view of the favorable forecast of "clear" weather for the next
48 hours, made by the weather bureau
in Washington, and received here this
morning. For one-third of the course
on the way over, it was said, the R.34
probably would strike northerly cross
winds which would not retard her very
much. The remaining distance, it was
stated, favorable westerly winds would
prevail.

Mechanics began work this morning in overhauling the engines of the R-34 preparatory to the beginning of her return flight tomorrow. It is believed that the overhauling will be completed by tonight. Work on the engines was rendered impossible on Monday by the swaying of the huge gas bag in the strong wind that swept across Roose-velt Field.

Twice last night the dirigible, which is moored to massive concrete anchors, began to settle toward the ground but her movement was detected in time for the members of the crew to release a part of the big airship's water ballast and injury to the machinery by coming in contact with the ground was prevented.

NEW YORK, July 8.—A copy of the memorandum setting forth alleged conditions in Tipperary county, Ireland, issued yesterday at Dublin by the chief secretary for Ireland, in outlawing all Sinn Fein organizations and Irish volunteers from Tipperary coun-ty, has been received here from Brit-ish sources in London. The issuance of the memorandum was announced in last night's cable dispatches. The memorandum recites a series

The memorandum recites a series of lawless acts reported to British peace officers and quotes from two cocuments said to have been selzed by British authorities in Ireland.

Quotations given from these two documents deal with an alleged "boy, cott" of police and measures to be taken again them.







THE MEXICO BORDER

By Associated Press.

AUSTIN, TEX., July 8.—The existence of small stretches of "No Man's Land" slong the Texas-Mexican border was pointed out by a resolution introduced in the Texas House today by Representative Canales of Cameron, a border county.

His resolution says that by the treaty between the United States and Mexico in 1907, all bancos or cut-offs on this side of the Rio Grande River were ceded to the United States, and that the United States has neglected to transfer this territory to Texas. As a consequence, people dwelling on these lands are refusing to pay state taxes or admit the jurisdiction of state officers and courts.

The resolution, which was adopted, requests that Congress cede this land to Texas, as was, according to the resolution, intended under the treaty.

PIPE LINE ABOUT COMPLETE

Refinery Will Have an Initial Capacity of Between 4,000 and 5,000 Barrels.

Crude will be run into the big stills of the American Oil and Refining Company's refinery, just now being completed, and after a preliminary week of "warming up" the boliers are to be fired up in earnest, and the refinery—will begin operations this week, according to J. G. Kilgore, the general manager. By the close of the week the company's pipeline to the burkburnet field will be in operation, and running the production from its wells in block 87, where the refinery company has a production of 4,000 barrels from two wells that are kept pinched down at present because of present pipeline and shipping congestion. This production can be easily increased to 10,000 barrels daily, Mr. Kilgore adds, in 30 days time, as several wells are now drilling. The company was fortunate in getting into the Waggoner pool early in the game and holds a large amount of acreage in the midst of production, which has just been touched at present, in development.

The pipeline will have a carrying

The pipeline will have a carrying capacity of from \$,000 to 10,000 barrels, and will be limited to carrying the company's own production. The refinery will have an initial capacity of between 4,000 and 5,000 barrels daily. It will have the largest initial capacity of any refinery in the county, and is considered by those who are authorities on refinery construction, authorities on refinery construction, to be one of the best plants of its size in this section of the oil country. The plant is of exceptionally sub-stantial construction, and has been arranged with an eye to attractiveness

as well.



"Meats in Storage"

Every working day of the year 75,000,000 pounds of meat are required to supply home and export needs -and only 10 per cent of this is exported.

These facts must be kept in mind when considering the U.S. Bureau of Markets report that on June 1, 1919, there were 1,348,000,000 pounds of meats in cold storage. If the meat in storage was placed on the market it would only be 20 days' supply.

This meat is not artificially withheld from trade channels to maintain or advance prices.

Meats in storage consist of-

- 65 per cent (approximate) hams, bacon, etc., in process of curing. It takes 30 to 90 days in pickle or salt to complete the process.
- 10 per cent is frozen pork that is to be cured later in the year.
- 6 per cent is lard. This is only four-fifths of a pound per capita, and much of it will have to go to supply European needs.
- 19 per cent is frozen beef and lamb, part of which is owned by the Government and was intended chiefly for over-seas shipment. I this were all diverted to domestic trade channels, it would be only 11/2 lbs. per capita-a 3 days' supply.

From this it will be seen that "meats in storage" represent merely unfinished goods in process of curing and the working supply necessary to assure the consumer a steady flow of finished product.

COMPANY GOING TO DEVELOP HOLDINGS

FORT WORTH, July 8.—Extensive development of the Panhandle district of Texas by companies exploring for oil has been undertaken.

The significance of these developments is very great as the territory lies on lines of easy transportation through the great middle west, southwest and inter-mountain districts of the country.

Reports issued by a number of geologists who have carefully surveyed this territory give rise to hopes that this district will rival the now famous Ranger and Burkburnett fields in production of oil. 

WICHITA COUNTY IS NEAR HEAD OF LIST IN NUMBER OF CARS

Wichita county stands seventh of the counties of Texas, in point of automobiles registered, according to the announcement of N. K. Brown, state registration clerk. Wichita is outranked in the number of registrations by Dallas, Harris, Bexar, Tarrant, McLennan and Ellis counties, being barely nosed out by the latter with 5.452 registrations to Wichita county's 5.446. However, in view of the fact that there are many hundreds of automobiles in Wichita county which were registered at other places before owners removed to Wichita Falls, there is no doubt that Wichita county stands above the cotton county in the number of automobiles owned by residents of the county, and possibly above McLennan county as well, as McLennan county is only credited with 6,733 registrations. Next after Wichita county come Grayson county with 5,263, El Paso county with 5,452 and Collin county with 4,520, all of them counties which two years ago could show a registration of almost twice that of Wichita county. The registration in the four large counties of the state are: Dallas, 17,587; Harrels, 14,580. Bexar, 13,599; and Tarrant, 11,919. The number of cars registered during the first half of 1919 exceeds the registration for the entire year of 1918, there having been 215,118 cars registered in 1918, and 275,927 registrations already this year, an increase of more than 25,000.

ROMANTIC FIGURE OF PIONEER DAYS IN ARIZONA IS DEAD

By Associated Press.

SELIGMAN, ARIZ, July 8.—A romantic figure of Arizona's pioneer days has just passed in the person of Commodore Perry Owens, cattleman, sure-shot, dashing indian fighter and fearless sheriff, who died here.

Mexico in 1882, to become range foreman of a cattle company at Navajo Springs.

In a single handed battle with three Navajo Indians who were stealing the company's cattle, Owens killed the trio. Then followed numerous clashes with the red raiders, many of whom fell before his deadly rifle. In time the Indians came to believe he bore a charmed life and gave him a wide berth, since, despite his frequent battles with them, he did not receive a single wound.

In 1886 when outlaws throughout Apache county were defying the law. Owens was elected sheriff, and, backed by Judge Robert E. Morrison, now of Prescott, he obtained indictments against 16 of the most notorious thieves and murderers.

While the grand jury was reporting the true bills, a dozen of the outlaws fled the country rather than tace the new sheriff. The latter tracked three of the remainder to the Blue River and there, when they were resisting arrest they were felled by the guns of Sheriff Owens and his posse. A fourth member of the gang. Finn Clanton, was trapped, captured and sentenced to 10 years in prison.

Perhaps Owens' most spectacular battle was one fought at Holbrook, where the sheriff killed Andy Cooper, a notorious bad man, and two companions. Owens had been told that the trio had taken refuge m a house near the railroad tracks. He rode down the street to the building, walked to the door and rapped for admission, with his rifle held in his right hand at his hip. Cooper opened the door and attempted to draw a revolver but the sheriff fired from his hip. Cooper fell badly wounded. At the same mounent another shot rang out from behind from the gun of one of Cooper's men, the builet missing the sheriff's head. With his back to his second assailant, Owens threw his rifle over his shoulder and fired. The outless dropped mortally hyrt.

As the sheriff retreated a few steps he saw a man through the window maneuvering for a shot and again the sheriff's rifle spoke. The outlaw inside fell to the floor and died within a few minutes. It was Cooper, who had been shot when he opened the door.

I nen the third desperado made his appearance running around the corner of the house with his revolver raised to fire, but before he could pull the trigger Owens shot and the last of the gang died in his tracks.

AN ADJUSTMENT OF VALUES

We are asked a good many times, "Why the high price of coffee?" There are, of course, many contributory reasons. Among them: The frost damage in Brazil last August. The fact that Europe has had practically no coffee for four years, and the surplus in the United States is practically nil. Prohibition is also a factor. But the REAL REASON is an adjustment of values among commodities. A few years ago Rio sevens sold for 5% cents per pound, so did cotton. Now cotton sells for above 36 cents and Rio sevens for twenty-two. Wheat used to fluctuate between sixty-five cents and a dollar, and is now two-twenty. So it stands to reason the Brazilian can't take the old prices for his coffee and get by. Coffee is still the cheapest commodity of consumption—and the last to advance. last to advance.
