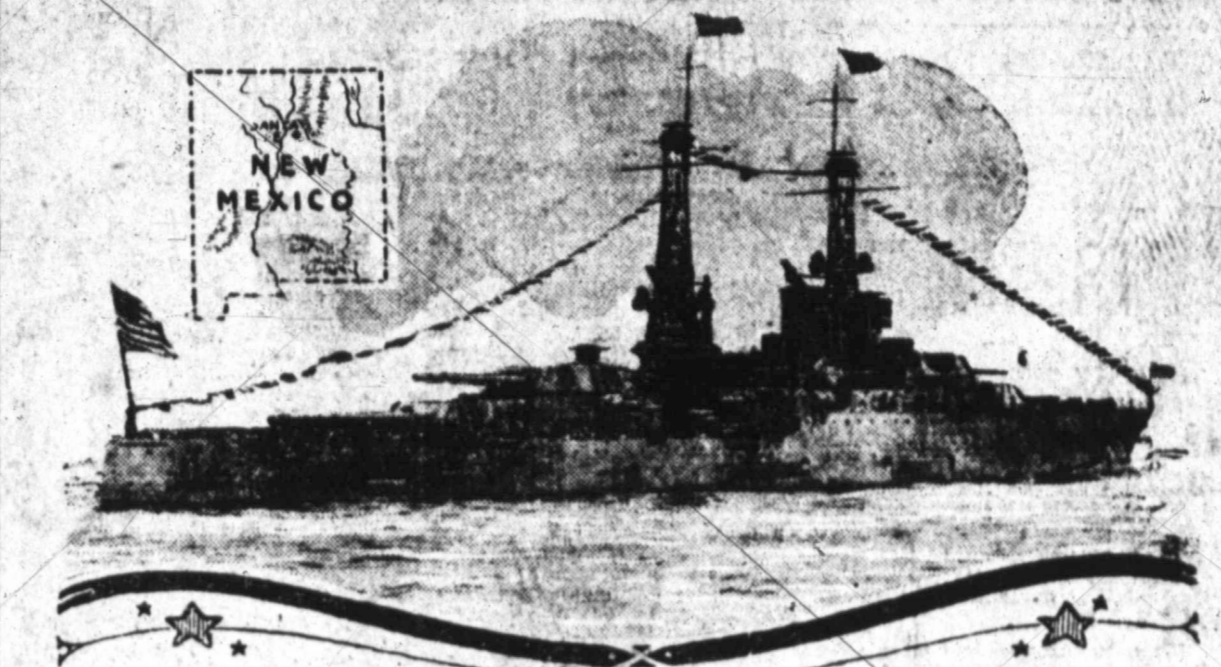

WOMAN ESCAPES A JAIL SENTENCE AS RESULT OF ERROR

KANSAS CITY, July 14.—Appearing at the district attorney's office today to surrender herself and begin serving a 30 day jail sentence after failing to pay a \$1,000 fine, Mrs. Lenora Warnock, a woman who had been charged with a conspiracy to defeat the draft law, was informed by District Attorney Frances M. Wilson that, owing to a clerical error in the court records, she would not have to serve the sentence. With eight men among them her husband, Raymond I. Moore, Mrs. Moore was sentenced in December, 1917, to two years in the federal penitentiary. Her sentence was reduced to a fine, however, by Judge Alva S. Van Valkenberg, who said that the court would set no record for the United States in its treatment of women who are charged with offenses of this nature. The record, according to Mr. Wilson, failed to specify that in lieu of payment of the fine the defendant should serve a jail sentence, and upon that ground she was released today.

VETERAN OIL OPERATOR SAYS SHUT-DOWN WILL PREVENT A PANIC IN THE LOCAL FIELD

"If a shut-down is ordered for 30 days time, as is requested by the operators, it will mean that the Wichita Falls district will have known the panic that struck the Cushing and Healdton fields, and that the large and small operators alike, will not suffer anything less than a brief inactivity," said "Bill" Rowland, veteran oil operator who has been in every oil strike in the Southwest, and who is now operating in Wichita Falls.

"I sold a hundred thousand barrels of oil from Cushing at 25 cents a barrel at one time. We didn't have any measure such as this for our protection, no other field has ever introduced such a measure, but it is very easy to see that this will be the salvation of the field, both from a conservation and from a financial standpoint.

Fire Hazard Great.

"There is a great fire hazard. That Northwest field is soaked with oil from tanks running over, and from oil run into slush pits and earthen tanks. The wells are pretty close together and with the wells producing and filling so much tankage, and overflowing and saturating the ground, while there is comparatively little outlet for the oil, there would be a general cleanup if fire should get started. In addition to this there is the actual waste of the oil. The Railroad Commission's order will of course be on the ground of preventing waste and removing fire hazard, by giving time to remedy these conditions, and these are very vital matters of course. But what interests those who are producing oil, the stockholders in companies, and the owners of oil properties is the fact that this will keep from breaking the price. There are some interests of course, who are buying oil, and who would like to see the price as low as possible. But you can't produce dollar oil at ten and fifteen thousand dollar seepage. To the little fellow with two and a half and five acre tracts for which he has paid a large sum of money, and to the small stock company, similarly situated this shut-down will prove absolute salvation. In the case of big over production the small company, without extensive storage, and dependent on the pipe line and marketing companies for an outlet for production will have to take any price he can get. With this shut-down until present storage is cleared and additional storage provided, and additional pipe line facilities in prospect, these small companies will be protected.

Experience As Teacher.

"The experiences of other days in Oklahoma and Texas fields where there was a big over production for a time, and where there was no concerted action on the part of operators, has shown very clearly what not to do. This course of procedure which has been outlined by the operators of the Wichita Falls district seems to me to be the only means of salvation, and I believe that the Railroad Commission, when it finishes the investigation, will see fit to make the temporary injunction permanent."

Mr. Rowland is building three 55,000 barrel storage tanks of his own at Burk Burnett, and named a number of other individuals and companies who have already begun to erect similar large tanks, or are planning to do so. More than 50 tanks of this size will be completed by various interests within 30 to 40 days. It is estimated, on figures gathered from various operators and companies. This will give around three millions barrels storage capacity. A summary of pipe line building activities has been made previously showing that there will be around 132,000 barrels daily.

VIOLATION SUBJECTS OFFENDER TO FINE OF FIVE THOUS. AND DOLLARS.

BEING GENERALLY OBSERVED

Individual Notification is Not Really Necessary Says Deputy Commissioner.

No new developments have arisen in the situation created by the order of temporary shut down issued by the Railroad Commission over the producing wells at Burk Burnett, and according to the report of J. L. Mildren, the oil conservation representative of the Commission, who is in this field to investigate conditions and to enforce the temporary order, there has been no direct opposition to the closing manifested. However, there is a tendency on the part of operators to continue operations until they are notified personally to shut down, though the order became effective on its publication, without individual notifications being necessary.

The committee of local operators, W. T. Willis, Thos. Morrissey, C. F. Noble and C. E. Rodgers, appointed to assist Mr. Mildren in his investigation, are in the field today, visiting the rigs and giving personal notification to each operator. Numerous other operators who are interested in the conservation measure are giving their assistance.

There were a few wells that were still running oil on Sunday, it was stated by those who had been in the field, but the shut down is so general as to be considered complete. There is a penalty of \$5,000 a day for each day that an order of the commission is violated.

GOOD LAW AND SHOULD BE ENFORCED

The adoption of the law requiring an applicant for marriage license to present a certificate that he is free from venereal disease, if honestly enforced will greatly lessen the number of divorces in this state and will greatly lessen the number of operations upon women and the number of women with wrecked health.

The Denison Herald says: "Enforcement of the bill requiring an applicant for a marriage license to present a physician's statement certifying that he is free from venereal disease marks a step forward in building a sturdier and healthier manhood. It lays the foundation for the establishment of a system of eugenic marriages wherein nature will play its appointed part to the benefit of the society and the uplift of humanity in general."

"Twenty years ago a similar measure was introduced in the Texas legislature and was headed from the calendar. Since that time the state has expended several millions of dollars in establishing additional asylums and colonies, and for the care and maintenance of those who were confined, admittedly as the result of hereditary diseases. And the end is not in sight unless rigid preventive measures are adopted and strictly enforced."

"But despite the burdens of expense, provision and care of the mentally afflicted and physically crippled entail, we hear very little from the pulpit or press about the makeshift marriage laws that make such conditions possible. It is the divorce law against which the anathemas are hurled and denounced as a disgrace to the state. But never a word about the law that permits a pair of mental and physical misfits to obtain a license to marry or the minister who performs the ceremony and unctuously declares 'whom God hath joined together, let no man put asunder.'"

"It is the most nonsensical proposition on earth for the state to maintain a policy that all are bound to admit is unworkable, the foundation stone of the social structure and sapping the lifeblood of the nation. No one wants to admit—and few will admit—that the human race is degenerating. And yet, when we look at the number of patients we annually send to the insane asylums, and epileptic colonies not considering those sent to private institutions for restraint and treatment, the conclusion is forced that there is something radically wrong with the system that requires the healing application of sane laws based upon scientific research."

"We might repeal the divorce statute in its entirety and the conditions complained of would not be relieved; if any thing they would be increased and greatly magnified. The stream cannot be purified by damming it at its mouth; it's at the source where the cleansing work must be done. Therefore, if we would depopulate the asylums and other institutions established to take care of the mental and moral misfits of the state, laws relating to marriage should be re-written and a new code promulgated. Then would the divorce problem be solved and the scandal-loving forced to look elsewhere for emotional excitement."

"The bill, although it has been engendered, may not become a law at this session of the legislature; but the fact that the subject is receiving recognition at the hands of the lawmakers insures its passage at no distant date."

KING FERDINAND BUSY HUNTING A WIFE FOR CROWN PRINCE CHARLES

By Associated Press. VIENNA, Friday, July 11.—King Ferdinand of Rumania, according to reports received here, is endeavoring to find among the European princesses a wife for Crown Prince Charles. Among those mentioned is Princess Yolanda, the oldest daughter of the King of Italy.

Crown Prince Charles last September married Miss Zyzia Lambrino without the sanction of the king. He was disciplined for his morganatic marriage and it was reported at the time that the Crown Prince said he would rather lose his throne than give up his wife. A report received in Paris on June 11 said that the Crown Prince had shot himself in the leg because his father insisted on an effort to forget the girl whom his parents had forced him to divorce. The dispatch added that Charles was still deeply attached to her.

NINETY MILLION TO BE AVAILABLE FOR HIGHWAYS

By Associated Press. AUSTIN, TEX., July 14.—A grand total of \$90,000,000 will be available for expenditure upon Texas highways within the next few months, according to revised figures of the highway department.

This total is divided as follows: County bonds, approximately \$70,000,000; federal funds allotted, \$15,865,295; state funds, \$2,554,767; automobile tax retained by counties, \$2,580,000.

The state highway department says that in addition to building roads, many counties are perfecting maintenance organizations.

SAYS AMERICA CAN'T FAIL IN WORLD CRISIS

(Continued from Page 1)

Political independence is limited to those cases where they are threatened or attacked by external aggression and does not apply to revolution within the nation. A nation's internal affairs are left undisturbed. Nationality with its vital stimulating patriotism, would be preserved, given new life and opportunity.

Importance of Guarantees. "Thoughtful persons recognize the importance of giving such a guarantee now, at least for a limited period, if the peace of the world is to be maintained. The autocratic governments that controlled Russia, Germany, Austria and Turkey have been overthrown but as yet no real, stable governments established. Some of the new states created out of this immense territory, without the guaranty of the league, would be overthrown and would return to the domination of their former oppressors."

"The Honorable Elihu Root, former Secretary of State, recognized the great immediate need of this article and recommended its acceptance without an amendment providing that any member could after expiration of five years from the signing of the covenant terminate its obligations under the article. But under this covenant the United States by giving notice of withdrawal from the league, can limit her obligations to time not far to exceed two years. If this treaty is ratified, the United States

can fully perform her obligations to her Allies, discharge her duties to the new nations she has aided in creating and then honorably retire.

"Receive Like Guarantees. "It should be noted that when in this article we guarantee the territorial integrity of all members of the league we receive at the same time from all of them a like guarantee to our territorial possessions. The Philippine islands have occasioned

us great apprehension. In order to safeguard those islands it will be necessary for us in the present disturbed condition of the world to construct the largest navy afloat and have an army equal to that of any nation. Shall we embark upon this great military expense or accept the league and with it the honorable pledge that Great Britain and Japan, the only two nations from which the islands could ever be threatened, would aid in preserving them from all external aggression.

Mentions Panama Canal. We should also reflect that the Panama Canal and the islands owned by us in the Caribbean Sea are outlying territories. Is our hold upon the canal lessened or strengthened by this article?

"The article provides in case of any such aggression—the council shall advise upon the means by which this obligation shall be fulfilled." The unanimous recommendation of the council is only advisory. Thus under article 10 no troops of the United States could be sent to engage in war without the advice of her representative in the council and the approval of her congress.

Answering objections to the article affecting the Monroe Doctrine, which guarantees the validity of engagements such as treaties of arbitration or regional understandings like the Monroe Doctrine for securing the maintenance of peace," Senator Swan-

son declared the article undoubtedly made a "clear explicit reservation" of the doctrine.

Monroe Doctrine Supreme. "If any conflict should arise between the provisions of the covenant and the Monroe Doctrine," he said, "as far as we are concerned, the provisions of the covenant are null and void and the Monroe Doctrine survives. We accept the covenant with this 'clear reservation'."

Objections that the doctrine is not properly described in the article, Mr. Swanson declared unfounded.

President Roosevelt in his annual message of 1907," he continued, "in speaking of the Monroe Doctrine, said 'It is simply a stop and a long step towards assuring the universal peace of the world by securing the possibility of permanent peace upon this hemisphere.' He distinctly limits the doctrine to the western hemisphere and commands it for securing maintenance of peace."

STATEMENT IS ISSUED REGARDING GERMAN TAX

By Associated Press. COPENHAGEN, Sunday, July 13.—Mathias Eraberger, German minister of finance, has issued a statement, according to a Berlin dispatch to the "Times," that the proposed levy on property in Germany will begin at 1,000 marks and will be graduated up

to 10 per cent for property valued at 50,000 thousand marks. The rate will become higher with property the valuation of which is above this figure until it reaches 65 per cent on property above 3,000,000 marks. The levy will be payable by installments extending over 30 years, beginning with January, 1920.

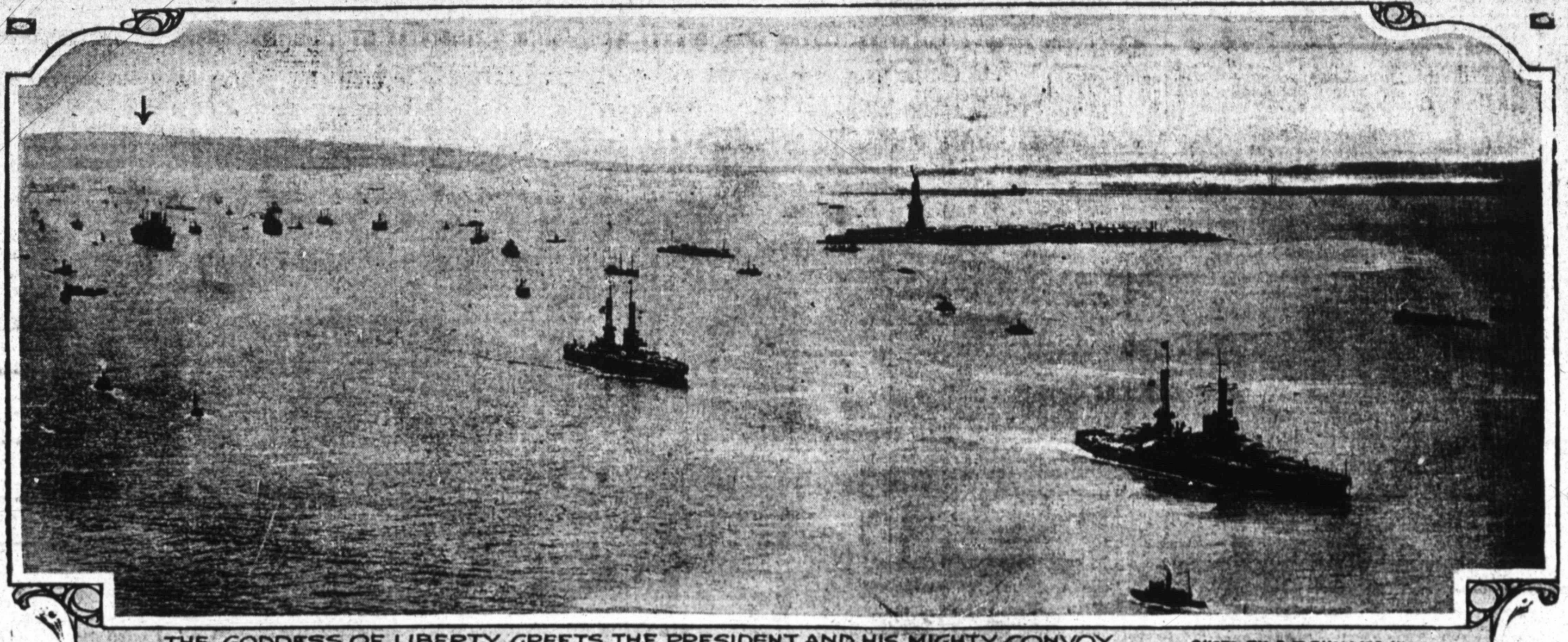

He has stated that the League of Nations covenant just as it stands should appeal to the manhood and better side of every earnest thinking citizen of the world.

MORTON COMMUNICATION ON CONDITIONS IN LOCAL FIELD AROUSES MUCH DISCUSSION

There has been considerable discussion among oil operators in Wichita Falls regarding a communication from A. D. Morton, of the Ryan Petroleum Company, appearing in the Dallas News of Sunday, July 13. The communication, in view of the present situation, and the request from operators that the production be shut down for a thirty day period, is liable to give the impression to those who are not acquainted with the situation, that conditions have been exaggerated and that there is no necessity for the action in closing, though Mr. Morton does not make such a direct statement.

Jones, county judge, as to the importance of the road and its immediate construction. The entire distance to the county line, five and a half miles, will be contracted for.

PAT MOORE READY FOR A BATTLE WITH WILDE

By DON E. CHAMBERLAIN (United Press Staff Correspondent). LONDON, July 14.—The stage was all set today for Thursday's 20-round bout between Pat Moore, Memphis, Tenn., bantamweight, and Jimmy Wilde, of Wales, flyweight champion of the world.

Both men eased up today on their training. The American is confident that he will show the Britishers that his win over Wilde last fall was not a fluke, and Wilde is just as positive he will prove it was a fluke. The men fight at The Olympia, a huge amusement hall. Ringside weight of 115 pounds will prevail. Odds slightly favor Wilde. Betting on a knockout also favors Wilde, backers of the American contenting themselves with merely wagering their money on Moore's chances to cop the decision. British sport writers declare that from the point of interest the bout will be the greatest staged in Britain since Freddie Welsh of Wales defeated Willie Ritchie of America for the lightweight championship of the world. Moore gained a decision over Wilde in a three round bout in the Anglo-American boxing tournament here last winter. There was considerable feeling at the time over the decision. Up to the time of meeting Moore, Wilde had eliminated everything in the British flyweight, bantamweight and featherweight classes, including the champions of the two heavier weights. Just before Moore, Wilde met and knocked out Joe Conn, runner-up for the British featherweight title. Moore's win over him was the first blemish on Wilde's record. It probably would have been forgotten if Moore had not been reported over here as calling Wilde a hard loser. This was too much for the diminutive Welchman and he began working for a long contest with Moore. Wilde's coming fight with Moore recalls the fact that it has been American opponents who gave him his start. It was an American boxer, the over-touted Kid Zulu of St. Louis, Mo., that gave him his original fame. After the match had been played up both in the States and here, Wilde knocked the Kid out in the first round. Since Moore beat Wilde, Joe Lynch of New York, slugged Wilde to a standstill in a 15-round bout at the National Sporting Club, but the referee awarded Wilde the decision because Lynch fouled.

"PEGGY WILLARD" OF POLICE FAME IN THE TOILS OF LAW AGAIN

By Associated Press.
OKLAHOMA CITY, Okla., July 14.—One of the most troublesome problems United States marshals and sheriffs of the southwest have had to contend with in recent years promises to be indefinitely postponed through the arrest recently at Muskogee, Okla., of Maybelle Fanning, or as she is perhaps better known, "Peggy Willard." Police and detention records give her aliases as follows: Leni Jackson, Dorothy West, Mrs. R. D. Green, Mrs. Bronson and Mrs. Donnelly.

Peggy's open boast has been that the law would never be able to keep her behind iron bars, and thus far it hasn't. Peggy, incidentally, has confessed to attempted murder, petty and grand larceny, diamond thieving, bootlegging and white slavery.

James Findlay of the United States bureau of investigation avers the young woman has developed her "profession" to the highest degree. Police of various Texas cities insist, in written communications to Muskogee, that she paid a Texas lawyer \$500 a week to insure bond and freedom.

Peggy was first convicted of felony May 25, 1912. Police assert her "haul" of diamonds, her favorite plunder, amounted to \$100,000 on that occasion. She was paroled August 6, 1912, but later was apprehended on old indictments, and sent back to the state prison, April 19, 1913, she was sentenced to three years more, charged with assaulting with attempt to kill Lee Simons, a Texas sheriff. She obtained her freedom by promising to testify against an alleged accomplice in this case. Her pardon was granted but she refused to testify after being released. She was tried on the writs slavery charge in Oklahoma City in May, 1917. Shortly after arriving at McAlester state penitentiary she made an appeal bond and obtained freedom again. She remained at liberty until a few weeks ago when she was incarcerated at Muskogee on a charge of stealing automobile tires at Vinita, Okla. Through a jail employe's error she escaped again.

June 29 Inspector Findlay received a message from Coffeyville, Kansas, informing that Maybelle Fanning and her six aliases had been arrested. She is awaiting trial on the auto tire charge at Muskogee.

OKLAHOMA WELL IS CLOSELY WATCHED BY HOST OF OPERATORS

Special to The Times.
WAURIKA OKLA., July 14.—Drillers asserted that when the well of the Penn-Kell-Watt Oil Company of Waurika had reached a depth of 2,500 feet the gas pressure had doubled the strong pressure encountered 100 feet higher, making an estimated amount of 4,000,000 cubic feet. The well therefore has become the most interesting wildcat in Southwestern Oklahoma and may furnish the production of three geologists, made within the last 10 days, that a prolific oil sand will be entered between 2,700 and 2,900 feet.

No wildcat well between Healdton and Burkburnett has been so closely observed. What makes it of extraordinary interest is that it is drilling in a region west of the syncline and granite formations in which Charles Wrightman drilled near Addington last year and immediately east of the structure along which the Texas Co. is to drill a string of wells extending through southern Cotton county, western Jefferson county and part of Clay county, Texas. Unprejudiced opinions practically all are in its favor.

There hasn't been a break in a soft blue shale for 250 feet and gas has been present continually for over 900 feet. The shale is so soft that casing can not be set and the pipe is being gradually lowered while drilling progresses slowly through 2,000 feet of water. The drillers are taking no chances. During the last few days the gas has been present in heads at intervals of about five minutes and during the disturbance there is an underground rumbling that may be heard for several rods. Several times as the header was pulled, the pressure under the 2,000 feet of water has thrown mud and water into the derrick. The small particles of gas that find their way through the water spout readily at the top of the hole.

There is a scouring for acreage such as has not been witnessed in this part of the state. Values near the well have passed the \$100 mark. D. R. Beatty of Houston, an official of the Humble Oil and Refining Co., who last year joined with District Judge Cham Jones in organization of the Waurika Petroleum Co., has sent his scouts back into the field. Lee Hagar of Houston, president of the Tidewater Oil Co., was himself a visitor to the region this week. He sought acreage south of the well to Red River and northward to the east Comanche.

It is not improbable, according to geologists, that the Texas Co. on its location in 35-4-9, near Red River, on the western side of Jefferson county will get a prolific shallow sand, the same sand found at 840 feet in the Penn-Kell-Watt well in 17-5-7. In the latter well the capacity was estimated at 15 to 20 barrels. An oil sand was found in the Allen well drilled

two years ago in 11-4-9. Another was found at 760 feet in the Twaddle well in 22-5-8, and in the last well of the Hawkeye Petroleum Co. in 33-1-5 at 1,500 feet. Comparatively shallow oil and gas sand were found in the I. & G. N. and Marion Oil Co. wells, both abandoned because of bad holes, in sections 3 and 10-7-8. An Allen well drilled in 2-5-8 to 2,100 feet and abandoned in the oil sand, found a shallow sand at 700 feet that made oil and gas.

Important among new locations in this territory is that of sections 2 & Hornaday in 25-2-6, a few miles north of Chappool. This is on an apparent structure lying east of the Wrightman syncline and the gas strata found by Roy Johnson northwest of Rigline. Campbell and associates of Fort Worth are blocking acreage south of Ryan and in that region Danziger Brothers of Kansas City, are soon to drill on a location made several months ago.

The Texas Co.'s deep test in 21-4-9 is drilling. This well is on probably the highest point of the region and lies directly north of its activities in Clay county, Texas. Almost on a line between the two regions is the 25-4-9 location on which material is being assembled.

On the same sweep of country tributary to Red River and over an area extending from a point a few miles south of Hastings to the Texas line in the region of Ryan as many as eight or ten locations have been decided on definitely, and apparently drilling is soon to start in several spots without one leaseholder waiting another to prove the formations. The Ohio Cities blocked a good-sized chunk of acreage in that region and is soon to start drilling in the northeast of the northwest of 15-6-8. The Donelson Trust Co., which has delayed operations pending closing on a few desirable tracts in proximity to their locations, will drill this year in the southeast of 22-5-8.

Practically every big company operating in Oklahoma has fortified itself with acreage all the way south from Comanche to Terrell and west from Grady to Red River. The Gypsy has been an active buyer lately. The Texas Co., which has the most com-

plete and most favorable geological report made on territory lying west of Waurika, recently increased its holdings. The Magnolia, the Carter and the Humble have large holdings. This region has been more thoroughly geologized this year than any other in Southwest Oklahoma west of the Healdton field. Waurika has been headquarters for one to four bands of geologists every week since March. Among recent corps was that of the Empire Gas and Fuel Co., which drilled a deep test on the Seay ranch near Red River.

The injured youth was employed as bottler in one of the local plants at the time of the accident.

RUMANIAN GOVERNMENT DECLINES ANOTHER OFFER FROM BOLSHEVIST PREMIER

GENEVA, Sunday, July 13.—The Rumanian bureau at Bern announces that the Serbian forces which have been occupying the city of Temesvar, 72 miles northeast of Belgrade, are evacuating the place, taking with them everything of value, including 40 locomotives, 1,500 railroad cars, machinery from factories, animals and household articles.

The Rumanian government, according to the bureau, has declined another offer from Nikolai Lenin, the bolshevist premier of Russia, for the arrangement of an alliance between Rumania and Russia.

INCREASE IN NUMBER OF DELIRIUM TREMENS CASES ARE REPORTED

CHICAGO, July 14.—An increase of approximately 50 per cent in the number of sufferers from delirium tremens in Chicago is shown in the report of the city workhouse, for the first two weeks of July, as compared with a similar period of last year. Seventy-five cases of delirium tremens were received at the hospital of the Bridwell from July 1 when wartime prohibition went into effect, to today, as against 50 during the same period a year ago.

Hospital authorities attributed this unusual increase to a sudden stoppage of the sale of liquors and to the fact that habitual drunkards have sought to quench their thirst with substitutes.

LOVETT HAS A SUGGESTION FOR U. S. CONGRESS

He Presents What is Called a "Sound Solution of Railroad Problem."

WANTS RAILROAD CAPITAL TO HAVE BUSINESS CHANCE

Believes That Financial Interests Will Take the Risk in the Matter.

NEW YORK, July 13.—Suggestion to members of Congress for a sound solution of the railroad problem, by Robert S. Lovett, former president of the Union Pacific Railroad system, formerly head of the Division of Capital Expenditures of the United States Railroad Administration, made public here today, included as a fundamental principle the necessity of legislation that will give railroad capital "a business chance."

"If Congress will enact the necessary laws giving railroad capital a business chance," declared Judge Lovett, "I believe that capital will take a business risk and the money required to provide the requisite railroad facilities for the future will be forthcoming."

The head of the Union Pacific declared that, in his opinion, the country is confronted with four contingencies:

of the traffic and the carrier, with the right of each carrier to keep what ever profit it can make out of rates so established, by good management, good service, economy, wise investment and success in competing for business.

Rate-Making Power.

Regarding rate-making, Judge Lovett maintained that the regulation provided by Congress "should require that the rates be sufficient to enable the carriers to provide the requisite service and facilities, protect existing investments and provide the new capital necessary in the public interest, as advocated by the Committee of Railroad Executives and submitted to the Senate Committee on Interstate and Foreign Commerce."

Judge Lovett, likewise, favors five other features of the railroad committee's report as being remedial and "wise as a national railroad policy," namely: compulsory federal incorporation, exclusive federal regulation of securities and rates, the creation of a Department of Transportation in the President's cabinet, the head of which would have power to act quickly and deal with emergencies, and modification of restrictions upon railroad consolidations and provision for the merging of lines when in the public interest.

"Our railroad transportation system," observes Judge Lovett, "which is essentially national, should be rescued from the irresponsible and conflicting State agencies, and brought under uniform control and regulation in the national interest, except as to strictly local matters."

Without Government ownership or operation, the only reliance for railroad revenue to support railroad credit must be upon the adoption by Congress of a sound railroad policy involving absolute justice to railroad capital and requiring specifically and plainly that the rates to be fixed shall be sufficient to enable the carriers to provide safe and adequate service, to protect existing values and to attract the new capital necessary in the public interest.

Deserve Liberal Treatment.

Railroad investors, according to Judge Lovett, are deserving as much of encouragement, liberal treatment and appreciation as stockholders in other enterprises "with no public interest involved."

"No money except that devoted purely to business is employed more in the public interest or is entitled to more encouragement or fairer treatment and consideration than that which is invested in the construction and development of railroad facilities," declared Judge Lovett, who added that "it is about time that we were introducing common sense into some of our theories about railroad capital."

Judge Lovett said he favored compulsory Federal incorporation because then the railroads would cease to be mere creatures of the States and cease to be "red hand-and-foot" when it comes to the issue and sale of stocks and bonds, a restriction that "too often threw them back upon short-term borrowing with dangerous and often unfortunate consequences."

Exclusive federal regulation of the issue of railroad securities, said Judge Lovett, is so vital to railroad credit and to the success of any system of regulation that may be adopted that "it must not be overlooked." Federal regulation of freight and passenger rates also, he thought imperative because: inadequate and poor service, government ownership, a federal guaranty of a reasonable return upon railroad capital, or reasonable rate-fixing by a government agency, the latter providing "consideration of the needs

case of the "notorious" discrimination by many State railroad commissions in favor of their own citizens against citizens of other States.

Establishment of a Department of Transportation with a Secretary in the President's cabinet was emphasized as useful for the reason that the railroad business, "the largest single industry in the United States next to agriculture," is unrepresented in the Government and "without any friend at court." Such an official, Judge Lovett said, would be able "to meet emergencies resulting from exceptional congestion in traffic, or through blockades in transportation, by quickly mobilizing the nation's transportation resources and by the arbitrary diversion, if need be, of traffic from lines which cannot handle it to lines which can and by other instant and heroic methods."

CONTRACTOR IS FINED FOR OBSTRUCTING STREET

Obstruction of Eighth and Scott streets by one of the contractors erecting an office building on that corner was the occasion for a \$25 fine in the police court this morning. This was the second fine within a week against the same concern, a fine of \$5 having been assessed in the former case.

Another fine of \$25 was levied by Judge Ogie on a charge of gaming, the defendant in this case being a frequent caller at the police court on this charge. Other fines included one of \$15 for gaming, and nine of \$10 each for the same offense. A case of permitting a game to go on in his room occasioned another fine of \$10 against the owner of the room.

Improper parking of a car in the business district cost the driver of the car \$5, and a case of speeding called for a \$10 fine.

AN ADJUSTMENT OF VALUES

We are asked a good many times, "Why the high price of coffee?" There are, of course, many contributory reasons. Among them: The frost damage in Brazil last August. The fact that Europe has had practically no coffee for four years, and the surplus in the United States is practically nil. Prohibition is also a factor. But the REAL REASON is an adjustment of values among commodities. A few years ago Rio sevens sold for 5 1/2 cents per pound, so did cotton. Now cotton sells for above 30 cents and Rio sevens for twenty-two. Wheat used to fluctuate between sixty-five cents and a dollar, and is now two-twenty. So it stands to reason the Brazilian can't take the old prices for his coffee and get by. Coffee is still the cheapest commodity of consumption—and the last to advance.
