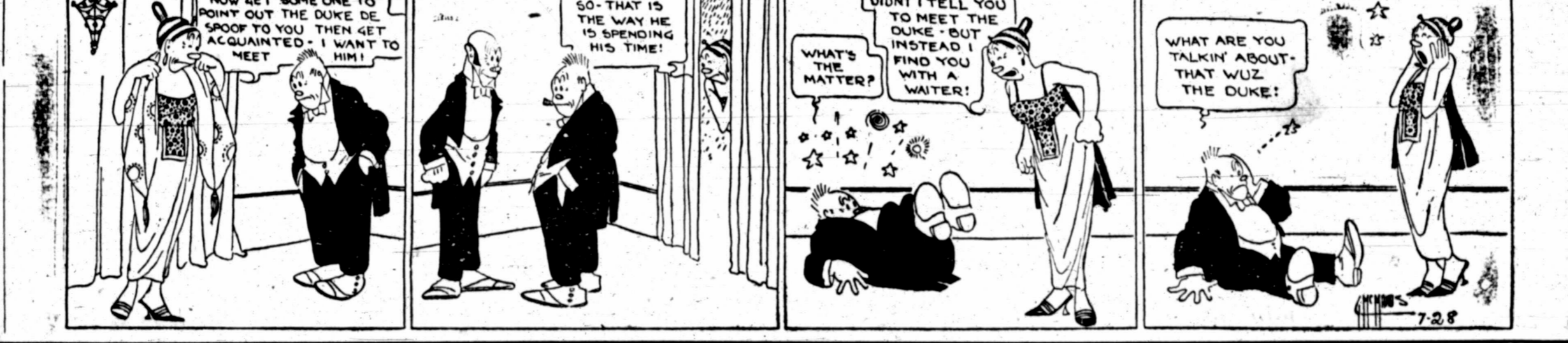
NOW DRILLING IN SIGHT OF FREDERICK, OKLAHOMA

The White House has let it be known during the last week that he was against any compromise but persistent rumors that he would agree to a program of interpretative reservations may make it expedient, it is believed, for him to put himself flatly on record.

PRISONERS IN THE LEAVENWORTH PEN RETURN TO WORK

LEAVENWORTH, KAN., July 28.—Ready, after a week's confinement in hot cells on a restricted diet, to submit to the orders of an armed guard numbering 1,200 troops from three nearby camps, a part of the 2,500 prisoners at the military barracks at Fort Leavenworth resumed work this morning without any demonstration such as precipitated the strike last Tuesday, according to Colonel Sedgwick Rice, commandant of the prison.

Their cells searched for weapons, and a number of hidden blackjacks removed, according to prison officials, the men were taken by small detachments from the barracks today and put to work inside the walls of the drive. So far, according to the government under control, Colonel Rice declared, that normal prison work, including a resumption of labor on the prison farm will be effected tomorrow morning.

Last Tuesday morning the men refused to leave their cells when ordered to work. Representatives among the prisoners, in a conference later with Colonel Rice, demanded better sanitary conditions, the right to submit to President Wilson a plea for amnesty and the return of two men recently transferred from the military barracks to another federal prison. Upon receipt of the demands at the War Department, Secretary Baker is said to have stated that the government would assert its authority at the barracks. Troops were dispatched from Fort Riley, Kansas; Camp Dodge, Iowa; and Camp Grant, Ill., and in the meantime the prisoners remained in their cells under heavy guard, on a greatly restricted diet.

An order for a general court-martial at Fort Leavenworth was signed by Secretary Baker following the inception of the strike but it has not been learned whether the scope of the hearing will include an investigation of the strike situation.

COTTON SPECIALIST DISCUSSES PROBLEM OF MAINTAINING PRICE

AUSTIN, July 28.—It is generally conceded that the 1919 cotton crop will be a short one, and possibly shorter than either of the four preceding it. Considering the expense of producing it, the short yield and the conceded large demand for cotton, a much higher price than has been paid during the past two seasons are naturally anticipated. But the South has had experience enough in the past to know it will not do to depend upon what conditions of supply and demand would justify. The past four crops have been very short and the past two have been very expensive to make. The demand has exceeded the production of the four crops and reserves have been used to keep such mills running as were permitted to have cotton until the reserve of available cotton is about exhausted. The expense of production, the supply and demand, and the value of cotton as compared to its competitors, silk, wool and flax, have fully justified the highest prices it has sold for. Still, strenuous efforts by combinations of manipulators were made to force these crops to sell for 15 cents, and but for the strong organization of the farmers by the departments of agriculture of the cotton producing states to name a price and hold for it, it is conceded by cotton experts, spinners and brokers that 15c would have been about the price which the two crops would have sold for.

So it will not do for farmers, merchants or banks who depend upon cotton as their money crop to relax their efforts and depend upon favorable supply and demand conditions to maintain profitable prices. We must remember there is at the other end an ever awake enemy to profitable prices and to the producers controlling the price. They are studying every scheme conceivable to reduce the price and prevent the producers having a voice in it. Controlling spot cotton, is the only weapon that will win.

Financing schemes and new cotton associations, world cotton conferences and other movements, originated and fostered by spinners and cotton gamblers, should not be considered as efforts to aid the producers to maintain profitable prices. If any of these should develop aid to the producers a "money wrench" is sure to be thrown in the market, driving wheel and its work stopped. Now is the time for friends of cotton to keep wide-awake; hold public meetings, discuss conditions and be prepared to handle the crop to the best advantage of all. This should include means of meeting obligations of the farmers without selling.

operation between bankers, merchants and farmers from now until the crop is disposed of should be the uppermost thought. To dispose of the crop as fast as gathered should not be dreamed of. Foreign nations cannot buy it so fast, neither are there ships enough to haul it as fast. To attempt to sell it faster than it can be paid for and shipped, simply invites a slump and plays into the hands of the enemy.

All of these questions will be discussed to the annual meeting of the State Farmers' Institute to be held in Austin, August 6, 7 and 8. All friends of cotton are invited to attend and participate in the discussions.

Several members of the legislature who have made cotton marketing a study have tendered their services, and help from this department may be depended upon at public gatherings if requests are made for them when not engaged.

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

HUGHES FOR TREATY WITH RESERVATIONS

Makes Known His Views in Reply to a Letter From Senator Hale of Maine.

INTERPRETATIONS REQUIRED PROTECTION OF AMERICA

Plain Need For a League of Nations Declares Former Candidate For President.

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 28.—Charles E. Hughes, in a letter to Senator Frederick E. Hale of Maine, made public today, declared in favor of a League of Nations but maintained that certain reservations and interpretations to the present covenant were necessary to protect American interests.

The interpretative reservations suggested by Hughes were:

- 1.—That any nation, after giving the two years' notice of withdrawal, shall cease to be a member of the league despite any charge of non-fulfillment of any international obligation, providing the withdrawal would not release the power from any debt or liability.
- 2.—That questions relating to immigration or import duties, when they do not affect any international engagement, should be regarded as matters of domestic policy and not within the jurisdiction of the league.
- 3.—That the United States under Article XXI of the covenant (referring to the Monroe doctrine)

does not relinquish any of its traditional attitude toward purely American questions and that the United States may prevent acquisition by any non-American power of any territory or control in the western hemisphere.

—That the United States, under Article X of the covenant, does not assume any obligation to employ its army or navy in any expedition that is not authorized by congress.

Answer to Hale.

Hughes' letter was in response to a communication from Hale, in which the latter asked the former supreme court justice for his opinion as to what reservations to the peace treaty and league covenant should be made to safeguard the interests of our country. Hale said that "many of us are in favor of having the United States enter a League of Nations, provided that in so doing we do not sacrifice the sovereignty and traditional policies of our country." He added that "We believe the proposed covenant now before the senate does not make such a sacrifice."

"There is plain need for a League of Nations," Hughes replied, "in order to provide for the adequate development of international law, for creating and maintaining organs of international justice and the machinery of conciliation and conference, and for giving effect to measures of international co-operation which from time to time may be agreed upon."

"It is manifest that every reasonable effort should be made to establish such a condition."

son why these objects can not be attained without sacrificing the essential interests of the United States," and suggested there was a "middle ground between aloofness and injurious commitments."

"One must take a light hearted view of conditions in the world to assume that the proposed plan will guarantee peace," he said. "Rather, the proposed covenant should be regarded as a mere beginning."

Suggest "Prudent" Course.

According to Hughes, the prudent course would be to enter the proposed league with reservations of a reasonable character "which should meet with ready assent."

Regarding the validity of reservations, Hughes said there was no need to assume that a reservation would lead to the complete failure of the treaty or compel a resumption of the peace conference, when the reservation leaves unimpaired the main provision of the covenant. He added that any nation making reservations "is not bound further than it agrees to be bound."

"Trouble Breeder."

Referring to Article X as "trouble Hughes said:

"It is idle to attempt to commit free peoples to the making of war in an unknown contingency when such a war may be found to be clearly opposed to the dictates of justice."

"Of course, a limitation of the operation of Article X to a period of years would be preferable to the indefinite obligation proposed, but in my judgment, it would be better that, if it is not eliminated, a reservation should be made."

COTTON MARKET.

NEW YORK, July 28.—While the weather over Sunday was fairly favorable and the map this morning showed satisfactory conditions in the cotton a number of private reports noted excessive rains in Alabama and Mississippi so that the cotton market after opening steady with January nine points and others one to seven points lower, turned stronger and made sharp advances. October contracts sold up to 34.94 and December to 25.08, or a net rise of six to 11 points. There was moderate buying by New Orleans and Liverpool and a little commission house support based on the steady cables and further activity in cloth markets at the end of the week.

For some time past Texas has been a persistent seller in the market here giving color to reports about a promising crop outlook in that state. With local liquidation influenced by the heavy rain the stock market this pressure around midday weakened October to 34.55 and December to 24.75 reaching a net decline of 25 to 39 points or 25 to 39 points down from the highest of the morning.

Local liquidation coupled with heavy selling by brokers with Japanese connections and further favorable crop advices from the Southwest led to renewed weakness in the early afternoon, October declining as low as 34.35, or 48 points under the previous close, followed by a 20 point rally on reaction.

The cotton market closed steady.

GRAIN AND PRODUCE.

CHICAGO, July 28.—New high price records for the season were touched in the corn market today as a result of abnormal heat and the continued drought. Material damage to the crop was reported by a leading expert. Trade was active, with demand chiefly from shorts and commission houses. Opening quotations, which ranged from 1/4c to 1 3/4c higher, with September 1.96 1/2 to 1.97 1/2, and December 1.67 1/2 to 1.69, were followed by moderate further gains.

Oats sympathized with the strength of corn. After opening 1/4c to 1c higher including September at 80 1/2 to 80 3/4, the market continued to ascend.

Provisions were lifted by the grain bulge. Trade, however, was light.

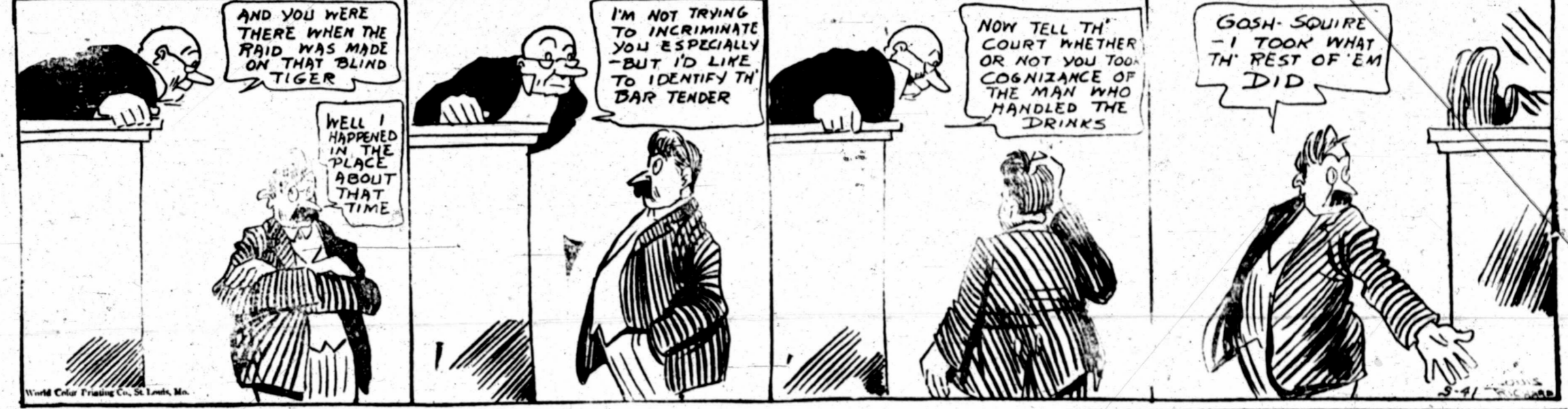

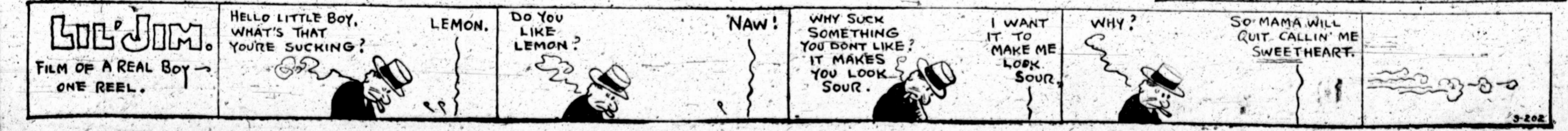

STATEMENT IS MADE BY TRAFFIC MANAGER OF FREIGHT BUREAU.

WILL REPORT HIS FINDINGS

Matter Will Be Taken Up With Chamber of Commerce Directors Tuesday.

Local railroads are not making full use of the facilities now existing to aid in working off the present freight congestion here, is the statement made after a careful check of the local yards of both the Denver and the Katy by M. E. Cox, traffic manager of the Wichita Falls Freight Bureau.

"I found empties, and cars of merchandise which does not belong on the team tracks taking up part of the space on team tracks in the city yards, as well as a number of cars of length of clear track," said Mr. Cox. Yesterday morning on the city track on the Denver, Mr. Cox reports that he found 30 city loads, 40 empties and cars which do not belong on team tracks, and 22 cars of length of clear track.

Mr. Cox also reports many instances where consignees had partly unloaded cars set on the team track and the car would be moved away and not be reset for in some cases, thirty hours.
