

Just what the federal government is costing is difficult to tell at present, but from taxes alone it is collecting. and spending about \$50 per capita. So the State government is really not hit ting, the people hard, considering the low purchasing power of the dollar and the heavy, expensive and impor-tant branches of service that are re-quired of the government.

If the taxes collected from the peo-ple are higher than 25 years ago, it must be remembered that the people are getting greatly higher prices for their labor and products than ever-before. They are getting a dellar for before. They are getting a dollar for three pounds of cotton where they, were getting a dollar for 14 pounds of were getting a dollar for 14 pounds of cotton. They are getting three or four times as much for their cattle and hogs as they got 25 years ago.

And if their expenses are due in large part to the high cost of living, let them remember that the men who serve them could obtain from six to seven times the quantity of the staples of living—bacon, beef, butter, eggs, meal, flour, fruit—25 years ago for a dollar as they obtain now, with salaries that were none too large, and which have been increased but little since.

AN ADJUSTMENT OF VALUES

We are asked a good many times, "Why the high price of coffee?" There are, of course, many contributory reasons. Among them: The frost damage in Brazil last August. The fact that Europe has had practically no coffee for four years, and the surplus in the United States is practically nil. Prohibition is also a factor. But the REAL REASON is an adjustment of values among commodities. A few years ago Rio sevens sold for 53/4; cents per pound, so did cotton. Now cotton sells for above 30 cents and Rio sevens for twenty-two. Wheat used to fluctuate between sixty-five cents and a dollar, and is now two-twenty. So it stands to reason the Brazilian can't take the old prices for his coffee and get by. Coffee is still the cheapest commodity of consumption—and the last to advance.
