WASHINGTON, Aug. 15 .- President Wilson today vetoed the daylight immediate and pressing need of the saving repeal act. The president said he returned the bill without his approval with "the utmost reluctance," because he realized "the very considerable, and in some respects, very serious inconveniences to which the daylight saving law subjects the farmers of the country."



NATIONAL RIFLE MATCH SCHEDULED FOR TODAY

CALDWELL, N. J., Aug. 15.—The most important national rifle championship matches that ever have taken place in this country got under way here today on the new rifle range constructed for the naval department. The navy has charge of the matches this year, an innovation considering that the matches always have been considered as belonging to the army. Marine corps officers, mainly, are in charge.

The matches beginning today are

The matches beginning today are an aftermath of smaller and less interesting competition that has been going on for some time. Teams from all over the world have been tuning up for the big events by preliminary shooting in team competition.

Rifle cracks from Belgium, England and many other countries now are hereto measure skill with the best this country can muster, which is considerable measuring considering that the A. E. F. team recently defeated everything the allies could trot out in competition on the other side.

The most interesting national matches will be two shot off for trophies coveted by rifle teams everywhere. The first is for the Wimbledon cup, presented the United States in 1878 by Princess Louise of Great Britain. This trophy goes to the champion long distance shot.

The Leech cup is the oldest rifle trophy in the country. It was a gift of Capt. Arthur Blennerhasset Leech, who was captain of the Irish team that competed with the Americans in 1874.

Military champoin of the United States is the title that goes with the winning of the president match. The winner also receives an autographed letter from the president.

The Marine Corps cup match is open to everyone and always attracts a large number of entrants.

Italy and Greece apparently have reached an understanding and the United States stands virtually alone in supporting Bulgaria's claim for an outlet to the Aegean Sea. The Balkans assert that Aegean Sea. The Balkans assert that only by giving them such an outlet gan another Balkan war be averted. A dozen different plans for the dividing and d sposing of Thrace have been considered during the last week but the one most likely to be accepted as a compromise, although opposed by Greece, contemplates an internationalised zone extending from the Bulgarian border to Dedeagatch, on the Aegean sea. Western Thrace would go to Greece and she would also be given a strip eastward from Dedeagatch extending from the Aegean to the Black Sea, including the port of Midia. 





"Construction of additional facilities has now reached the stage when we can make definite plans resarding improved service," said Z. G. Hopkins, special assistant to the federal manager of the M. K. & T. lines, who spenty esterday in W chita Falls.

New Completions Daily.

"While it will, of course, be some weeks before our construction program is finished, practically every day now will bring with it completion of some new facility which will help us out. For instance, yesterday me also completed a 100-car passing track at Devol, which will help in speeding up train movement. We cannot get the full beneft of some of these additional facilities until work is finished laying heavier rail and applyine ballast between here and Whitesboro, but we can now look forward to a steady improvement in our situation.

Rail-laying will be finished to Ringgold.

The fact that Europe has had practically no coffee for four years, and the surplus in the United States is practically nil. Probibition is also a factor.
