REPUBLICANS CLAIM TREATY VICTORY

CHARGE PACKERS HAVE 2,420,000 POUNDS OF MEAT STORED IN OHIO

Government's drive against alleged profiteering and food hoarding began to show results in various parts of the country.
Governor Cox asked Attorney General Palmer to seize more than 2,400,000 pounds of meat stored in Ohio.

ST. LOUIS, Aug. 15.—Twenty million pounds of meat are reported to have been seized late this afternoon when Federal authorities raided the Booth Cold Storage Company.

COLUMBUS, OHIO, Aug. 15.—Governor Cox of Ohio today asked United States Attorney General Palmer to seize 2,420,000 pounds of meat stored in Ohio by several big Chicago packers.

Our investigation shows unmitigated evidence of a wholesale violation and even defiance of law on the part of the large packing houses particularly, but we have discovered that food hoarding has been shifted from Chicago to Cleveland, returned again to Chicago and re-shipped back to Cleveland.

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PLAN FOR NATIONALIZATION OF NEW "AMERICAN PARTY" TO BE PERFECTED BY A COMMITTEE

FORT WORTH, Aug. 15.—Friends of former Senator Joseph W. Bailey will petition him to become a candidate for governor at the next election on a platform of "old time democracy," as outlined at the Fort Worth "convention" yesterday, according to newspaper here today.

Prominent Texas democrats are said to be behind the movement.

It also was said that private advices from Washington indicated President Wilson will be asked to make several speeches in Texas defending the League of Nations because of the "plank" in the Bailey-Ferguson platform expressing opposition to the league.

FORT WORTH, Aug. 15.—Plans for nationalizing the new "American Party" organized here yesterday by a group of Texas democrats dissatisfied with their old party, will be put into effect upon appointment of a special committee for that purpose, it was stated today.

Meanwhile, the other factions of revolving democrats, which determined yesterday on a campaign of reconstruction within the old party, went ahead with plans for holding a definite line of attack under the leadership of former Senator Joseph W. Bailey.

Judge C. F. Greenwood of Dallas, chairman of the "Bailey meeting," expected to appoint at once an executive committee which will set a time and place for a state convention to determine on the faction's future course.

Platforms Are Similar. Political observers, pointing to the similarity in the platform adopted by the two conferences, declare the factions simply are dividing up the means to attain a common end, and in reviewing the possibility that the Bailey group may not achieve desired results within the present democratic party, find strong grounds for the following utterance by Mr. Bailey: "We intend to follow the principles adopted yesterday wherever they may lead us. If the democratic party, state and national, come to these principles, then we are with the democratic party. If not, as I say, we will follow these principles wherever they may lead us."

Chairman W. P. Sebastian of the American party conference, declared today he would devote "very careful thought" to the selection of the committee to carry out the program of nationalization and would not say when this committee would be named. A Texas convention of the party will be called by the executive committee at a date not yet decided upon.

TWO FACTIONS ARE UNABLE TO AGREE. FORT WORTH, July 15.—Two factions of Texas democrats, dissatisfied with the present party organization, have determined upon separate lines of attack to accomplish their ends, the principles of Jefferson and Jackson in state and federal governmental affairs.

One faction, headed by former governor James W. Bly, says the present democratic organization and formed the "American party," which it is proposed to make national in scope before the next general elections.

The other faction, led by former Senator Joseph W. Bailey, laid down a declaration of principles to be followed in carrying the fight for party reconstruction to the regular democratic state convention and the national party conference.

Organizations were perfected at separate meetings. Former Governor Ferguson announced the birth of the new party at one gathering, and former Senator Bailey at the other. The latter laid down the principles to govern efforts at party rebuilding.

Delegates of both factions heard former Senator Bailey's address at the only apparent difference of opinion between the factions was in regard to the methods to be used in attaining desired ends.

Mr. Ferguson declared "we are going to jump the fence," and from the "American party" of the United States he called upon the people of the country to meet in their respective precincts and county and state conventions and select delegates to a national convention in 1920.

The platform adopted by the Bailey followers set down 12 principles, which favor an amendment to the federal constitution providing that all amendments be submitted directly to the people; expressed belief in a written constitution and in a federal authority to enforce its laws; declared for state's rights; opposed amendment to federal constitution depriving states of right to control vote "for purely local affairs"; advocated "sensible temperance" to regulate everything by law; denounced "growing extravagance" of state and federal government; opposed governmental ownership of railroads but favored limited regulation; but opposed monopoly and socialism; advocated free speech; opposed permanent alliance with European countries politically or engaging in European struggles for territorial acquisition; opposed class legislation.

RESOLUTION PROPOSES PLUMB INVESTIGATION. WASHINGTON, Aug. 15.—A congressional investigation of the charges of Green E. Plumb, author of labor's plan for the nationalization of railroads, that Wall street has systematically plundered practically all the roads of the country was asked in a resolution introduced in the House today by Representative Huddeston, Alabama.

The resolution carries an appropriation of \$100,000 to carry on the work.

CZECHO-SLOVAK SOCIALISTS ARE WORKING TO CREATE A MONARCHY

GENEVA, Thursday, Aug. 14.—A Prague dispatch received here quotes the Pravo Lidu, the organ of the Czech socialists, to the effect that a large section of socialists, under the leadership of Deputy Durlin, is working toward the creation of a monarchy in Czechoslovakia and that the choice for a monarch has fallen upon the Duke of Cannaught, uncle of King George of England. The dispatch adds that the duke is "probably unaware of the honor" and that no official negotiations have as yet been opened. It is said that the movement has been encouraged by the accession of Archduke Joseph to control in Hungary.

PREPARE HOME COMING FOR HUN PRISONERS

By CARL D. GROAT (United Press Staff Correspondent) BERLIN, (By Mail.)—Germany is preparing for the homecoming of thousands of its prisoners. While their return will probably inflict on the labor market a great new burden, Germany hasn't reckoned that in the reckoning, and just now is jubilant over the fact that they are soon to be released.

Their return to the "fatherland" will be accomplished with customary German methodical plans. A complete reception machinery has been organized. A number of stations for delivery in German territory have been erected, and there the home-coming will be officially greeted. From these delivery transfer camps, where they will remain three or four days while they receive military discharges and are examined to ascertain whether each man is in need of hospital attention.

Each man will receive 50 marks cash and an additional sum which will permit him to have an eight weeks' vacation. A number of stations near their own homes. Provision has been made to furnish all with tobacco, cigars and cigarettes.

As for their future, the government has devised means whereby temporary aid can be furnished each prisoner if he cannot at once find work, but every effort will be made to assist the men to places in the industrial structure.

Demobilization of what is left of the German army will release 15,000,000 meters of cloth, and a million pairs of shoes. As a result, the government expects that there will be a material decrease in the price of clothes and shoes.

It proposes to distribute the cloth and shoes, which had been stored up against further prosecution of the war, at low prices to deserving families. Rates will be made according to the size of the family.

Out of the sordid lands of the Berlin criminal courts, came the story of "back hand" persecution which had its inception in the recent anti-Semitic agitation here.

Karl Rietze, recently returned from a Russian prison camp, was accused of trying to kill several hundred thousand marks from two Jewish merchants under threat of death.

Rietze told the court he was at a loss to know why he was accused of trying to "kill the Jews," saying they had stolen money and supplies at stipulated places or suffered the consequences. But, he did plead guilty. He had read in a number of the pogrom pamphlets, and then had gone to the place of publication, where about 20 persons were congregated.

The explanation was made that the Jews should be oppressed, just as in Russia, and that money should be extorted from them wherever it came to the propaganda work.

Rietze said that he supposed this suggestion had been the inspiration for his own deed, for he at once set about to send letters, signed the "Secret Alliance" to the merchants while they were waiting not to have any company then they at once called in the police and had Rietze apprehended when he came to receive the deposed packet of marks.

PRIVATE PIPE LINE IS TO BE BUILT TO CHATTANOOGA, OKLA.

Roy F. Calvert, mechanical engineer in charge of the construction of a private pipe line from the Waigoner pool to Chattanooga, Okla., states today that the line will be completed, and ready for operation within the next 30 to 45 days, according to the present outlook.

The materials have been bought and are now in transit. Mr. Calvert states, and all preparations are being made to rush completion of the line. Seventeen miles of six-inch pipe will be laid from the field to Chattanooga where the loading rack will be constructed, with connections with the Rock Island railway.

BURK-LUCAS REPORTED MAKING 2,000 BARRELS. According to the report issued by D. C. ARE SATISFIED WITH VERDICT IN FORD CASE

Both Sides Claim to Have Been Vindicated by the Finding of the Jury.

WESTERN GOVERNORS MEET TOMORROW TO DISCUSS NEW LAWS

State Budget Systems, Aid to Returned Service Men, and National Guard Question to be Discussed.

SATL LAKE CITY, Aug. 15.—To discuss reclamation questions and other legislation vital to the west and to inaugurate a campaign for state ownership of public domain, Governors of western states will meet tomorrow preliminary to the conference of governors of all states which begins Monday.

Twenty-one governors have definitely notified Governor Bamberger of Utah that they will attend the conference beginning Monday. Thirteen are not certain as yet, and fourteen have notified Bamberger they can not attend.

State budget systems, aid to returned service men, the national guard question and consolidation of state commissions and bureaus will be discussed. The last three days of the convention will be spent in touring Yellowstone National Park.

AUTHORIZE PURCHASE SURFACING MACHINE FOR STREETS OF CITY

Purchase of the "Tar Baby" as the oil street surfacing machine, tried out by the city council on the dirt surfaced streets of the city, has come to be known among the city employees, authorized by the council at its Thursday night meeting.

SPECIAL MACHINE FOR FLUSHING THE STREETS

Flushing of the city streets will be carried on in the future by a special street flushing machine, instead of by means of fire hose as has been the case in the last few weeks, authority for the purchase of such a machine having been given by the council Thursday night to a committee composed of Dr. J. F. Reed, M. McFall and M. A. Bundy, members of the council.

The machine, which will cost in the neighborhood of \$3,000, will be a horse-drawn machine, and in addition to being a street flusher, can be used also in sprinkling the streets. Flushing the streets with the fire hose has resulted in the ruining of nearly \$700 worth of hose in 13 applications, according to M. A. Bundy, city and fire commissioner.

WANT EMBARGO RAISED ON SHIPMENTS OF PIPE AND PLUMBING SUPPLIES

The raising of the embargo on shipment of sewer pipe and plumbing supplies is to be asked by the city council of the railroads entering Wichita Falls, a decision to this effect having been made at the Thursday night session of the city council.

FORMER SUPERINTENDENT COLORADO AND SOUTHERN NOW WITH THE DENVER

E. F. Lott, former superintendent of the Trinidad division of the Colorado & Southern Railway, has been appointed superintendent of this division of the Denver railway. O. F. Maer, superintendent of the Wichita Valley, has been in charge of this work in addition to his duties as superintendent of the Wichita Valley since the departure of R. G. Fitzpatrick, former superintendent, because of illness. Mr. Lott will be in charge of the first and second divisions of the Denver railway including the lines between Fort Worth and Childress. The change became effective Thursday.

ACCEPT RESIGNATION OF MEMBER POLICE FORCE

Resignation of a member of the police force was accepted by the council Thursday night, following discussion in executive session of charges that members of the police department had accepted bribes from parties arrested and failed to make record of it at the police station. Another officer, whose name was brought up in a recent session of the police court in connection with these charges, was retained on the police force, the council deciding that he was not involved.

The whole matter was a frame up," said one of the officers to a representative of the Times. BOTH SIDES SATISFIED.

Both sides are reported to be satisfied with the verdict in the Henry Ford libel suit against the Chicago Tribune in which Ford was awarded damages in the sum of six cents. Ford's attorneys say the verdict vindicates him and the Tribune's attorneys declare that they are satisfied because the verdict clears the Tribune of the charge of pro-Germanism which Ford's attorneys made against them.

It is a happy ending for a lawsuit when both the plaintiff and the defendant are satisfied. In this case, both parties have gotten millions of lines of advertising and both know the value of advertising. Ford has maintained a very active press bureau during the trial and the revelations of Ford's ignorance have been considerably softened before they reached the great masses of the farmers from whom Mr. Ford draws his chief support.

Doubtless the suit and the trial have not been without their lessons, both for the Tribune and for Mr. Ford. The Tribune will hereafter not likely be so fast to stigmatize with an approbrious appellation one with whom it disagrees upon a public issue. Mr. Ford has doubtless learned that there are difficulties in reforming the world with hired experts, and we may expect less activity from him in that line.

Jim Ferguson appears to have broken up the playhouse planned by Joe Bailey and his followers of the people's democratic party. Jim seized most of the delegates at the Fort Worth meeting, "jumped the fence" and organized his own party under the name of the "American party." Of course, Bailey could not afford to form an alliance with Ferguson, although Ferguson and his crowd adopted practically all of Bailey's declarations of principles. Ferguson stole Bailey's thunder and didn't leave even an echo for Bailey.

SENATORIAL REDISTRICTING.
The newspapers of Texas are having much to say concerning senatorial redistricting of Texas. Although clearly entitled to several more senators, West Texas has gone along and suffered the injustice of being deprived of its rightful representation in the upper house of the Texas legislature since the census of 1910. A "howl" is being made and it seems probable that within the next two years that some relief will be granted. The people of West Texas are mostly native Texans and genuine Americans. There is little alien blood in the West and they don't make trouble, but in the future East Texas must come square and deal honestly with the West. If Texas remains the largest state in the union. Discussing this subject the Fort Worth Record said: State Comptroller H. R. Terrell is publisher of the Texas Monthly Review. The Review for August contains an interesting editorial on senatorial redistricting of the state. Mr. Terrell knows Texas. He knows the needs of Texas. He has been newspaper harnass for twenty-five years. Before the people of Texas made him comptroller he had sixteen years to his credit as a member of house or senate or the legislature. Senatorial redistricting is a burning issue in West Texas. Speaking of the issue, Comptroller Terrell says: "The question of senatorial redistricting which was presented to Governor Hobby by representatives of the West Texas chamber of commerce brings into the public eye an interesting situation inevitable in a growing state. The increase in population will almost always be unequal as to sections and so it has been in Texas. During the past twenty years more than half of the growth of Texas' population has been in the western counties. A considerable portion of the other half has been in the cities and towns of Texas. The consequence is that today West Texas senatorial districts have nearly twice as much population as East Texas senatorial districts."

It is said by those who are familiar with the conditions that the population of West Texas has been increased to the extent of 250,000 since 1910, owing to the rapid development of petroleum wealth and the strides made by the cities and towns in the favored section. Comptroller Terrell says that the vast increase in the population of West Texas was not of grave concern "until the western portion of the state began to develop strikingly individual types of industry exemplified by the production of petroleum and its extensive refining in small plants. Then there has come with the new prosperity resulting from oil development and a record-breaking wheat crop, the demand that steps be taken to conserve the storm waters of that part of the state, both for domestic use and for irrigation. To bring those plans to their fullest possibilities will require changes in the state laws. West Texas feels that it should have more representation in

The collision forced a steam pipe from the engine into the car, scalding the children in a stream of vapor. Most of the deaths were due to scald wounds.

WARRANT ISSUED FOR PRESIDENT OF JEWISH EDUCATIONAL ALLIANCE

CHICAGO, Aug. 15.—Warrants were issued here today for the arrest of Herman O. Blumson, president of the Jewish Educational Alliance and connected with dozens of other civic and philanthropic societies charging him with embezzlement. Officials here said Blumson had made vain efforts to obtain passports for return to America of his family members who had gone to Johannesburg at the outbreak of the war. Blumson, police said, obtained money through alleged forged drafts and bills of lading by which he was said to have sold flour and cereals he made at a milling company he headed. He was believed by police to have maintained a print shop where he "struck off" his own "bank paper."

The most interesting national matches will be two shot off for trophies coveted by rifle teams everywhere. The first is for the Wimbledon cup, presented the United States in 1878 by Princess Louise of Great Britain. This trophy goes to the champion long distance shot.

The Leech cup is the oldest rifle trophy in the country. It was a gift of Capt. Arthur Blennerhassett Leech, who was captain of the Irish team that competed with the American in 1874.

Military champion of the United States is the title that goes with the winning of the president's match. The winner also receives an autographed letter from the president.

The Marine Corps cup match is open to everyone and always attracts a large number of entrants.

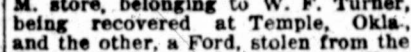

STUDY PLANS SUGGESTED TO DIVIDE THRACE

Effort Made to Find a Solution Acceptable to Both Greece and Bulgaria.

CONSTANTINOPLE MANDATE COMPLICATES SITUATION

United States Stands Virtually Alone in Supporting the Claims of Bulgaria.

PARIS, Thursday, Aug. 14.—The supreme-council of the peace conference is industriously studying various plans suggested for a division of Thrace in such a manner as to be acceptable to Greece and Bulgaria as well as England and France, which are vitally interested in the disposition to be made of Europe-an Turkey.

Uncertainty as to what country will receive the mandate of Constantinople and surrounding territory complicates the situation almost hopelessly as interested powers are striving to protect their own interests regardless of what gets Constantinople. Italy and Greece apparently have reached an understanding and the United States stands virtually alone in supporting Bulgaria's claim for an outlet to the Aegean sea.

The Balkans assert that only by giving them such an outlet can another Balkan war be averted. A dozen different plans for the dividing and apportioning of Thrace have been considered during the last week but the one most likely to be accepted as a compromise, although opposed by Greece, contemplates an internationalized zone extending from the Bulgarian border to Dedeaqatch, on the Aegean sea. Western Thrace would go to Greece and she would also be given a strip eastward from Dedeaqatch extending from the Aegean to the Black Sea, including the port of Midia. The territory immediately about Constantinople would be an internationalized zone and the mandate there. This internationalized zone would be under the administration of the League of Nations.

This plan violates the rights of majorities and separates districts to be given to Greece, but it is apparently impossible to reach an agreement on any plan which would make this region less of a crazy quilt. The plan gives Adrianople to Greece, which is regarded as an internationalized zone and is considered sacred by the Mohammedans. There is a great difference of opinion regarding the exact size of the proposed internationalized zone and new suggestions are offered at every meeting of the council.

RANGER COWBOY IS CENTER OF INTEREST AT NATION'S CAPITAL

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 15.—R. E. Madsen, giant cowboy from Ranger, Texas, admitted today that his visit to Washington has not been an unalloyed pleasure. He came here to see the sights and it turns out that most everybody thinks he is the principal sight, he explained.

The seven feet, six-inch cowpuncher caused a traffic jam when he stopped to talk to a friend in front of the Ebbitt. Madsen broke away from the crowd and went to the Capitol to visit friends in the Texas congressional delegation.

Congressman Lucien W. Parrish, the Texas University football star and the biggest man in the Texas delegation, looked like a pygmy alongside Madsen. Madsen laughed heartily when someone suggested he had the "Leg of Nations" and said he wore a 44-inch inside-measurement trousers leg.

CONSTRUCTION OF OIL BELT RAILWAY WELL UNDER WAY

Special to The Times.
RANGERO, TEX., Aug. 15.—Construction of the Hamon & Kell railroad between Ranger and Jukehamon, the new town near the Deasona oil field, is progressing rapidly and it is now planned to open the sale of lots in the town during September. The plans are to have the track built into Jukehamon by the end of October with adequate transportation facilities for the field there.

The survey of Jukehamon is progressing rapidly and the plat of the town will be photographed and available for the public in advance of the sale. The townsite is two miles due south of the present town of Deasona and lies on three large farms that present admirable topographic features for the purpose of a city site. The railroad through the city follows the property lines in a course approximately north and south and the area being platted extends over more than 200 acres most of which is west from the station building. The business streets of the city are being laid out of extra width and the grades are being established and the grades made. The site is well watered and there will be adequate supply of water for the immediate needs of the situation pending construction of waterworks. Arrangements are being made to install public service facilities including telephones and electric lights and an ice plant and it is expected that when the town is opened these facilities will be available for the people.

Being in the center of a most active and increasing oil pool Jukehamon is certain to attract a large population who will seize the opportunity to do business in a busy section where transaction and communication facilities are at hand ready for use. As soon as the part of the line to Jukehamon is in operation efforts will be made to complete the north end of the railroad line to Newcastle and a connection with Wichita Falls while the southern extremity of the line is being pushed on to Dublin for a connection at that place with the two railroads now operating there. The entire Texas part of the line is expected to be in operation by the beginning of the coming year. It will afford rail facilities for a great series of oil pools that are now without such facilities.

The Stephens county pools are being developed at this time in more rapid order than for many months and the demand for rail facilities and terminals on the railroad is increasing to an extent that makes the construction of this road most imperative. In Young county, also there is urgent need for railroad facilities and it is being built by Jake L. Hamon and Frank Kell. The present haul for material and supplies in these fields long and slow and expensive to the operators who are keeping an eye on the new railroad and awaiting its coming.

FIVE HUNDRED THOUSAND RECRUITS ARE SECURED

WASHINGTON, Aug. 15.—The "first hundred thousand" of recruits have been secured for the permanent regular army. General March, chief of staff, announced today and of these more than 53,000 were re-enlistments. It is estimated that an average of five of every 100 men discharged from the temporary forces since the recruiting campaign began, have decided to re-join the army.

DECLARES ONLY SOLUTION TO PRESENT RAILROAD PROBLEM IS THEIR RETURN TO OWNERS

WASHINGTON, Aug. 15.—The only solution uniting all conflicting elements in the present railroad situation is return of the roads to private ownership with a rate scale providing a return of not less than six per cent. Forney Johnston, advisory counsel of the National Association of Owners of Railroad Securities, told the House interstate commerce committee today.

CHANGE IN ATTITUDE TOWARD THE GOVERNMENT OF MEXICO IS CHIEF TOPIC OF INTEREST

WASHINGTON, Aug. 15.—The state department's latest note to Mexico warning President Carranza that if murders and indignities to American citizens continue the United States may be forced to adopt a radical change in attitude toward that country, was the chief topic of interest in diplomatic circles here today. The note, made public late yesterday along with a reply from the Mexican government, lacked only diplomatic technicalities to make it an ultimatum and was couched in probably the strongest language used in any communications between the two republics since the exchanges

DENY REPORT THAT CARRANZA GARRISON PROVED DISLOYAL

WASHINGTON, Aug. 15.—Denial of reports that the Carranza garrison at Chihuahua City had mutined with the intention of going over to the Villa forces was made in a statement today by the Mexican embassy.

"The Mexican embassy has received a telegram from General Manuel M. Dieguez, commander of military operations in the state of Chihuahua, stating that no mutinies have taken place in the capital of said state and that no conspirators have been executed. General Dieguez adds that only petty officers who planned to commit treason are implicated in the movement which was of no importance whatsoever."

Japanese have developed a process whereby silk worms can be cultured ten times a year instead of twice, as normally, and better silk produced.

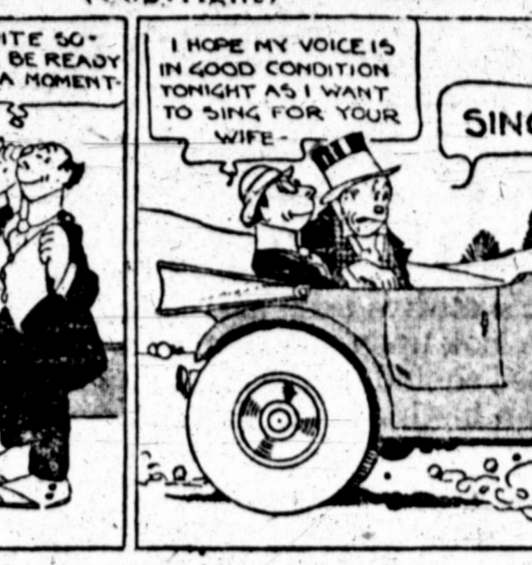

NEW KATY YARDS IN NORTH WICHITA PUT INTO SERVICE

IMPORTANT LINK IN IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM TOTALING \$750,000.

HAS CAPACITY OF 800 CARS

Will Materially Aid in Relieving Congested Conditions on That Road.

With the throwing of part of the new north yard into service at noon today, an important link in the Katy's \$750,000 improvement program to enable the handling of 400 cars of oil a day out of the Wichita Falls yard is practically completed.

Construction of additional facilities has now reached the stage when we can make definite plans regarding improved service," said Z. G. Hopkins, special assistant to the federal manager of the M. K. & T. lines, who spent yesterday in Wichita Falls.

"While it will, of course, be some weeks before our construction program is finished, practically every day now will bring with it completion of some new facility which will help us out. For instance, yesterday we also completed a 100-car passing track at Devo, which will help in speeding up train movement. We cannot get the full benefit of some of these additional facilities until work is finished laying heavier rail and applying ballast between here and Whitesboro, but we can now look forward to a steady improvement in our situation."

"Rail-laying will be finished to Ringgold next week and at Wichita Falls probably the first week in September. Ballast in following rapidly behind the rail laying, and by October 1 we expect to have the line between here and Whitesboro in first class condition."

"The strike of railway shop employees on some of our connections resulted in delay in the handling of our business and we are just now getting started. The inability of some of our connections to receive cars is due to the return movement of empty tanks to the oil fields and caused some shortage of tanks for loading. These disabilities are being cleared up now on connecting lines and we expect to make steady progress in improving the situation."

"Rushing Construction Work. Completion of the additional facilities, however, is the thing that will do most to relieve our congestion, and we are rushing construction work with all possible speed. There have been many things to contend with, which the railroad is now getting behind it. For instance, the water situation at the Wichita Falls roundhouse has been bad because of insufficient pressure. We are now installing an auxiliary pump at the end of the city line, which will relieve this condition. Rapid progress is also being made toward the completion of additional telephone and telegraph facilities. This, too, will have an important influence in the movement of traffic, as the management feels confident that we will be able to move a minimum of 400 cars of oil a day within a comparatively short time."

ORDER INSTALLED A ONE HUNDRED BOX AUTOMATIC ALARM

Installation of a 100 box automatic fire alarm telegraph system will be made in October, following a decision by the city council Thursday night for the purchase of this system. The cost of the system will be \$28,515. The decision to purchase a 100 box system instead of a 60 box system, was made by the council on learning that by having the installation made at one time the 40 additional boxes would entail an additional expense of only \$8,000, while such installation at a different time would entail a greater expense. While the 60 box system was proposed as sufficient to obtain the reduction in insurance rates allowed by the State fire insurance commission, the needs of the city for sufficient protection was placed at 100 boxes.

"Protection is the chief thing we want after," said Alderman J. M. McFall in discussing this matter. "Be slow that, as we are spending the citizens' money in this matter, I want to be sure it is spent in such a manner that it will go as far as possible."

"Another thing, we don't want the boxes placed so far apart that any-one will not have to run too far in a shirt tail or turn in an alarm," Mayor Marlow remarked.

Charles F. Maulen, general agent for the Gamewell Automatic Alarm System, who represented the company in negotiations for the purchase of the system, is engaged in gathering data for the specifications of the local system. The work of installation will begin in the middle of October and will be finished by the end of November, according to Mr. Maulen.
