WASHINGTON, Aug. 18.-With a statement by Senator Kenyon that the American people refuse to stand for "treasonable profits," the senate agricultural committee today began hearings on packer regulation legislation. The committee has before it both the Kenyon and Kendrick bills, the former below the more drastic. being the more drastic.

The hearing opened with a statement by Kenyon in which he explained the purposes of his measure. "The people will stand for reasonable profits, but they are not going to stand for treasonable profits," Kenyon declared.

"We are not trying to injure the packers, or ruin business," Kenyon explained. "It is true that the bill does lodge tremendous power in the hands of one man.
"These are radical bills. It is use-

"These are radical bills. It is use-less to pretend they are not. They have teeth in them. They aropose a new method of corporate control. "But in view of the facts disclosed in the federal trade commission's in-vestigations and in the conditions of unrest in the country, we felt congress could not sit idly by doing nothing. "A monopoly of necessities of life is indefensible and intolerable. These bills are to destroy that monopoly.

Kenyon explained that his bill is similar to the Kendrick measure, except that it attempts to regulate unrelated business which the packers are absorbing and formulates a policy.
