



# GERMANY ORGANIZING POLICE ALONG PURELY MILITARY LINES CONTRARY TO PEACE TREATY

COBLENZ, Saturday, Aug. 16.—Military organization of the German police, contrary to the terms of the peace treaty of Versailles, has already begun, according to information reaching American authorities. In the city of Cassel the police were recently completely organized on military lines by the Prussian government. It is said, and are now equipped with steel helmets and rifles, and follow the routine of a military company in their barracks. Of the 200 state police in office in Cassel, 100 have been transferred to the new organization, and the remainder have been given places in the civil service.

# CHARGE COPPER TRUST MADE HUGE PROFITS AS A RESULT OF PRICES BY THE WAR BOARD

WASHINGTON, Aug. 18.—The copper trust was allowed to make huge profits as a result of the war industries board's fixing of copper prices during the war, Representative Graham, Illinois, chairman of the special house committee investigating war department expenditures, charged today. Large profits were realized for the Anaconda Copper Co., in which John D. Ryan, who as aircraft administrator, ordered a large amount of the metal, has an interest, Graham said. "The war industries board fixed the price of copper during May, 1918, at a fair criterion, at 14.95 cents a pound for the Anaconda Co., 10.34 for Inspiration and 16.71 for Green-Canaan. At the same time the government was ordered by the board to pay 23.5 cents and in July this price was raised to 26 cents.

# STEEL WORKERS ARE TO ANNOUNCE RESULT OF STRIKE VOTE SOON

CHICAGO, Aug. 18.—The result of a strike vote involving between 400,000 and 600,000 steel workers will be announced at Youngstown, Ohio, August 20, union officials here said today. It was claimed here the vote now is practically complete and that 96 percent of the workers have approved a strike. The workers by this vote plan to show their approval of the demands of the national committee. This committee several months ago submitted a "12 point program" to steel officials. It included wage increases to certain scales and other demands for improving working conditions and strengthening of unionism in the plants.

# NEARLY 200 RESTAURANTS IN CHICAGO GUARDED BY POLICE RESULT OF RIOTS LAST NIGHT

CHICAGO, Aug. 18.—Police and detectives today guarded the nearly 200 restaurants and lunch rooms of the Thompson, Weegman and Messinger systems in the downtown district following riotous battles with I. W. W. agitators who had attempted to storm the restaurants and rout waiters and customers during the night. More than 100 shots were exchanged when uniformed and plain clothed police resisted an attack on a restaurant three blocks from the I. W. W. headquarters. A truck load of agitators, including a woman, who proclaimed herself "a real Russian Bolshevik," caused most of the disturbance. Battered up after trying to close up one restaurant, in efforts to induce waiters to join the "wobbly" organization to force all the loop restaurants to close, a detachment of police chased the invaders through downtown streets and engaged in considerable random firing. Thwarted in efforts to gain recognition from the Chicago Federation of Labor, several radicals among the discontented waiters requested aid from the I. W. W.'s. At a meeting last night, said to have been attended by "Big Bill" Haywood, convicted I. W. W. leader, who had recently been released from Fort Leavenworth prison, aid was offered and a course of sabotage decided on, according to police. Open threats to blow up the place were hurled by the malcontents when they entered the lunch rooms and clamored over counters. Little damage was done to property, however; however, four arrests were made.

# FAILS TO GET THE DENVER TO HAUL A CEMENT SHIPMENT

### AS A RESULT CONSTRUCTION WORK IS EXPECTED TO BE TIED UP.

## TEXAS & PACIFIC WILLING

### Refusal Due to Trouble at Fort Worth Over Transfer of Loaded Cars.

Efforts to secure shipment of a solid train load of cement to Wichita Falls over the Texas & Pacific and Denver railroads have so far been a failure, with the result that \$4,000,000 or \$5,000,000 worth of construction work in the city will practically be brought to a standstill from lack of cement, according to M. E. Cox, of the Wichita Falls freight bureau, on his return Sunday from a conference with the Texas & Pacific at Fort Worth.

Failure of the effort came through the refusal of the Denver railroad to bring the train from the Texas & Pacific at Fort Worth unless that road made some local concessions in the handling of freight at that point, Mr. Cox said.

**Situation Presented.**  
The desperate situation being faced in the construction work at this place was represented by Mr. Cox to R. M. Seale, superintendent of transportation for the Texas & Pacific, and R. L. May, superintendent of the Denver. Mr. Cox found the Texas & Pacific officials thoroughly appreciative of the situation facing Wichita Falls from the lack of cement, and secured their agreement to load the train of cement in question and handle it as a special proposition to the Denver at Fort Worth.

Another effort is being made to secure this shipment, Mr. Cox returning to Fort Worth Sunday night for that purpose. The new plan will be to bring the train from the Texas & Pacific at Fort Worth, in the hope that the Denver line will accept the shipment from the other line.

**Fort Worth Situation.**  
Refusal of the Denver to make this accommodation for Wichita Falls interests came through a local situation at Fort Worth, where the Denver has a number of loads in their yards for the Texas & Pacific, which at present is snowed under by the volume of outbound business on their hands that point and not able to take over in "normal times," according to Mr. Cox. "The Denver flatly refused to have anything to do with the shipment unless the Texas & Pacific would take a number of outbound loads, corresponding to the number of loads of cement handled to Wichita Falls. The Texas & Pacific officials represented that they agreed to handle the shipment as a special consideration for Wichita Falls interests, and refused to make any change in its routine of transfers from the Denver on that account. Another angle to the situation is the embargo declared on all freight consigned to Denver points developed by the Texas and Pacific which followed the embargo declared by the Texas & Pacific which followed the embargo declared by the Denver on August 6 on team track traffic.

**Little Cement in City.**  
"We feel that the attitude of the Denver in this matter is not anywhere

in line with what they owe to Wichita Falls," said Mr. Cox, in discussing the failure of efforts to secure the handling of cement. "They have never declared an embargo on industrial track consignments, and the entire train of cement we asked for would be immediately switched to industrial tracks here and would not discommodate the local yards in any way. In the meantime, except for a small reserve of cement in the hands of one of the large office buildings under construction here, there is hardly enough cement in town to put down a concrete sidewalk."

The general freight situation in this district, of which the present is an instance, is such as to have caused an appeal by the local chamber of commerce, the Fort Worth chamber of commerce, and various traffic organizations in this part of the State, to appeal to Walker D. Hines, director of the railroads, for the placing of a "strong arm" official in this territory with absolute authority to direct the movement of freight over all lines in the district, and with authority to put an end to the inter-company bickering which has done so much to aggravate the freight congestion at this place. Mr. Hines and other points in the district. The wire follows:

**Copy Telegram.**  
"We are facing a fierce blockade in this district. Denver and Chicago have stopped, account oil development Wichita Falls district, and officials in charge disheartened. Yardmasters refuse to take orders from highway officials. It is anomalous and awkward situation. Katy under one regional director at St. Louis, and Denver and Fort Worth under another at Chicago. **Blame Wichita Falls.**  
An accompanying statement by an official of the Fort Worth Traffic bureau, however, rather misrepresents the situation existing at Wichita Falls. This statement says in part: "The chief block exists in the Wichita Falls territory, where over 1300 cars are on hand, continually jamming the yards to the maximum and making movement almost impossible. Cars that should be unloaded at once are held up for many days, thus utilizing hundreds that should be used to carry out-bound freight that is rapidly accumulating."

"Of the 1300 cars on hand in the local yards, jamming them up as this statement says, less than 100 are consigned to this point, or have any place in the local yards," said Mr. Cox, in connection with this statement.

**Cars Promptly Unloaded.**  
"Local shippers are unloading their cars with promptitude, as shown by the fact that there are no demurrage charges on cars in the local yards. No reports have been received by me of delinquent shippers from the Katy, and only two during the past week from the Denver. One of these was from a shipper who received a consignment of nine cars, and had unloaded seven before the "fee time" began.

"Shippers are unloading cars wherever a team can be gotten to them, sometimes at a great additional expense, in one case amounting to \$125 per car.

"The handling of freight in the Den-

ver yards continues to aggravate the situation, where for the past week only about 50 per cent of their local team track facilities were utilized for handling team track stuff. In addition to this, the Denver continues to switch its local team track at about nine o'clock in the morning, instead of at night, thus handicapping the efforts of those shippers who are making an early effort to unload their stuff."

PREVENTATIVE MEASURES SHOULD BE TAKEN.

Epidemics of influenza in mild form have already appeared in parts of the country, and indeed, Wichita Falls physicians have reported cases here in Wichita Falls.

Influenza within the past two years has probably caused more deaths than any other epidemic. There is hope that medical science will discover a preventive or a treatment that will lessen the deadliness of this scourge.

Let us begin now with measures to prevent, if possible, such an epidemic.

AIR TRANSPORTATION FROM WICHITA FALLS TO PONCA CITY, OKLA.

Special to The Times. PONCA CITY, OKLA., Aug. 18.—Air transportation service daily between Ponca City and Tulsa, Oklahoma City and Wichita Falls, Texas, is the program now being worked out here between local citizens and Lieut. Walter H. Ligon of Llano, Texas, and it is expected that the service will be established within the near future.

Lieut. Ligon is making Ponca City his home at the present time. Only recently he was discharged from the national air service, where he served fourteen months at Kelly Field.

Will Maintain Two Pilots. In operating an air service out of this city two pilots and two mechanics will be employed at the beginning.

An investigation is now being made by a chamber of commerce committee relative to the cost of maintenance and also regarding a schedule of fares to be charged. These, it is understood, will be put on a basis similar to those now charged on the Galveston-San Antonio-Wichita Falls route.

HUNGARIAN MONITORS MANNED BY BRITISH ARRIVE AT BUDAPEST

BUDAPEST, Saturday, Aug. 16.—King Ferdinand of Rumania, according to reliable reports, visited Budapest last week, incognito. Four Hungarian monitors, manned by British seamen, have arrived here. They carry five inch guns and are under the command of Vice Admiral Ernest Troubridge.

Archduke Joseph, head of the Hungarian state, denied today that he had received a letter from Former Emperor Charles as charged in dispatches from Budapest to Berlin newspapers. The latter, it is alleged, ordered him to take over the power in Hungary and thanked him for his services to the Hapsburg dynasty.

Special mail service and express will also be maintained on the regular route to Tulsa, Oklahoma City and Wichita Falls, and those behind the proposition believe this will grow into one of the main features.

## BOTH OF NEW YORK TEAMS ARE VIRTUALLY OUT OF THE RUNNING

**NEW YORK, Aug. 17.**—Virtual elimination of both New York teams last week in the National and American League pennant race, leaves the field clear for western clubs to compete for the honor of meeting in the world series. After losing four of its six games with Cincinnati, the New York Nationals to overcome the Reds' lead of six games would now have to win 26 of their remaining forty games of the season while the Reds need to win only 17 of their 24, a respective ratio of .69 and New York's percentage of victories today is .524. In the younger league, Chicago, which stepped steeper last week, has a lead of 8 1/2 games over New York which held fourth place by defeating Cleveland.

**Fewer Errors by Reds.**  
In the National, Cincinnati batted lightly early in the week and broke even in two games with Philadelphia. In the six games with New York, four of which were decided by a one-run margin, each team scored a total of 18 runs. New York made 47 hits to Cincinnati's 45, but the Reds' made only nine errors to the Giants' fourteen.

In ability to hit the ball cost Chicago several games last week. Alexander won over New York and Brooklyn, allowing each team four hits and no runs. Vaughn beat Brooklyn in a close game, but was latted out Saturday by the Giants.

**After two victories over Brooklyn,** Pittsburgh dropped two out of three to Boston and broke even with Philadelphia. Two of the contests went into extra innings. St. Louis climbed out of last place by winning double headers from Philadelphia and Lipton, the Cardinals first winning week in two months.

In the American League, Chicago maintained a winning pace although its pitchers did not appear to be going strongly. Detroit averaged twelve hits a game last week, taking two contests from Philadelphia, and two out of three from New York. A tough night in the final game with the Yankees, the Tigers bunched their hits to win.

**Slugging Matches.**  
Cleveland shared two slugging matches in which forty-two hits and thirty-nine runs were made and then participated in a pitchers' battle in which Coveleskie beat McGriffe. Washington held the Indians even in two games. St. Louis broke even with Boston in two games and took two out of three from Philadelphia.

**"Babe" Ruth of the Boston Americans** broke the American League home run record Thursday by making his seventeenth circuit-clout and added another to his total Saturday and got still another today.

**ATLANTA IS LEADING IN SOUTHERN RACE**  
NEW ORLEANS, Aug. 17.—Atlanta retained championship place at the end of the sixteenth playing week of the Southern Association today, with New Orleans second, less than a game behind. With the exception of the loss of the lead for a day by Atlanta to New Orleans, the places of the teams remained unchanged during the week. Both lost more games than they won, Atlanta winning only three of eight and New Orleans dropping four of seven.

## GRADING BEGINS ON NEW RAILROAD NORTH OF RANGER

**RANGER, TEX., Aug. 18.**—Development of the famed and growing Hog Creek oil field in the north part of Comanche county and the southern extremity of Eastland county is making such marvelous progress that the field is now producing almost \$200,000 of crude oil a day and is constantly expanding. At this rate of production it is to be seen that the vicinity of this field is realizing approximately \$6,000,000 a month from the oil that is produced.

Construction of the oil field railroad by Kell & Hamon is under way at high pressure all along the line between Ranger and Jakehamon. Grading gangs are pushing the work in every township and material is being assembled in advance of the rails for the stations building at Jakehamon and another at Ranger so that service to the people may begin as soon as the uncompleted line of tracks can serve them. While the railroad between Ranger and Jakehamon is the present object of feverish activity the remainder of the line to the southward for connection with the Frisco and Katy systems at Dublin is also being rapidly built.

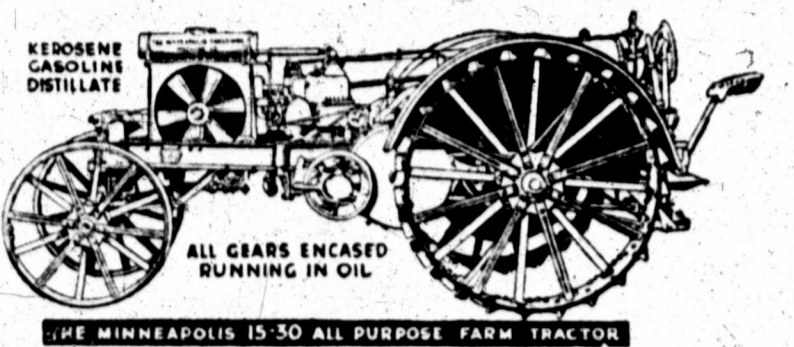

# POLK ALLEGES ENGLAND HAS SEIZED EGYPT

### Brief Is Filed With the Senate Foreign Relations Committee.

## BEYOND THE JURISDICTION OF THE LEAGUE OF NATIONS

### Recites Story of Killing of 800 and Wounding 1,600 of the Natives.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 18.—In a brief filed today with the Foreign Relations Committee of the United States Senate, Joseph W. Polk, former governor of Missouri, counsel for the Egyptian Commission, charges that "England under the guise of a protectorate over Egypt practically has seized that country as a British possession," that in an annex to the peace treaty the status of Egypt would be made an "internal question" and beyond the jurisdiction of the council of the League of Nations, which council the Egyptians desire to pass upon the status of Egypt.

The document sets forth that the original occupation of Egypt by British troops beginning in 182, was claimed by the British Government to be merely temporary for the purpose of suppressing "rebels" and collecting debts due to Europeans. The British Government, says Mr. Polk, pledged Egypt and the world that this occupation would be only temporary.

Review of Political History. After giving a resume of the political history of modern Egypt and the

alleged wrongs done in that country to enforce British rule in the last several decades," the brief recites the story of "the killing of 800 and the wounding of 1,600 Egyptian natives last April in the streets of their cities while holding demonstrations for freedom under the 'self determination' clause of the peace treaty."

Mr. Polk was formerly solicitor for the State Department and who now represents the commission which was named by the legislative assembly of Egypt, a majority of whom were elected by the people, he says, calls attention to the fact that Egyptian troops, numbering one million "fought on the side of the Allies, to make, as they believed, the world safe for democracy" and the right of national self determination for all peoples.

Subject of Turkey. Egypt, before the war, was independent for all practical purposes, though under the nominal sovereignty of Turkey and subject to an annual tribute to Turkey. On December 18, 1914, it is stated, Great Britain removed the ruler of Egypt and appointed Prince Hussein as "Sultan," ostensibly as a war measure and assumed by the Egyptians to be such.

When the time came for making peace, Mr. Polk observes, "the Egyptian people naturally concluded since, under the League of Nations they would be preserved from external aggression, the protectorate of Great Britain would be removed. But they were doomed to disappointment."

It is charged, was interred by order of the British Government upon reaching Malta. Released upon the recommendation of General Allenby, it is said, it reached Paris, "only to find, with amazement, that a recognition of the British protectorate over Egypt had been written into the treaty."

In conclusion, the brief states: "The condemnation of Egypt without a hearing before an international tribunal if one is established, would mean the continued subjection of Egypt to British bondage and continued mowing down by British machine guns of these liberty-seeking people who fought with America to make the world safe from military autocracy."

# FIREMEN WANT A 50 PER CENT WAGE INCREASE

### Also Demand An Improvement In The General Working Conditions.

## TWO HUNDRED MILLION REQUIRED TO INSTALL

### Would Increase Operating Expenses Seventy Million Dollars a Year.

CLEVELAND, O., Aug. 18.—Increases in wages averaging 50 per cent and the installation of automatic stokers, coal passers, grate shakers and door openers are provided in a new wage scale and standard rules report in the hands of the 300 representatives of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and Enginemen here today. The demands will be presented to Walker D. Hines, director general of railroads, as soon as the draft of the proposed measures is rewritten, according to President Timothy Shea.

The firemen and hostlers demand increases averaging from 35 to 65 per cent and the average is 50 per cent, said Shea. It will cost the railroads of the United States and Canada \$200,000,000 to install the automatic devices demanded, delegates estimated, while the annual increase in operating expense entailed by the wage demands was placed at \$70,000,000.

Average 300 Days. The latter figure is based on the assumption that the 117,000 firemen and enginemen in the brotherhood work an average of 300 days per year for an average of eight hours per day.

The committee which formulated the demands will ask for the employment of two firemen on each engine weighing 100 tons or more until such time as the automatic appliances proposed are installed. It was contended the work was too heavy for one man to handle. Of the estimated 40,000 locomotives of that weight not more than 5,000 are equipped with the proper mechanical appliances, the delegates said.

Shea said the proposed wage increase would hardly meet the pre-war

conditions. The summary of wage demand as announced by Shea is as follows:

Rate of pay for firemen and helpers in the passenger service to \$6.50 per day of 100 miles, except when Mallet engines are used, when the rate shall be \$7.20, or the freight rate for Mallet engines.

Freight Service. On engines weighing less than 100 tons firemen shall be paid \$6.50 per day of 100 miles or less.

Firemen and helpers employed in the yards shall receive \$6.50 per day of eight hours, except when Mallet engines are used, when the rate shall be \$6.80.

Firemen and helpers employed in local or way freight service, mixed trains, mine runs and roundabout service shall be paid a minimum of 50 cents per hundred miles in addition to through freight rate. This is asked because such trains are naturally slow.

Shea said Hines would ask the date of a public hearing of the demands set between September 1 and September 15.

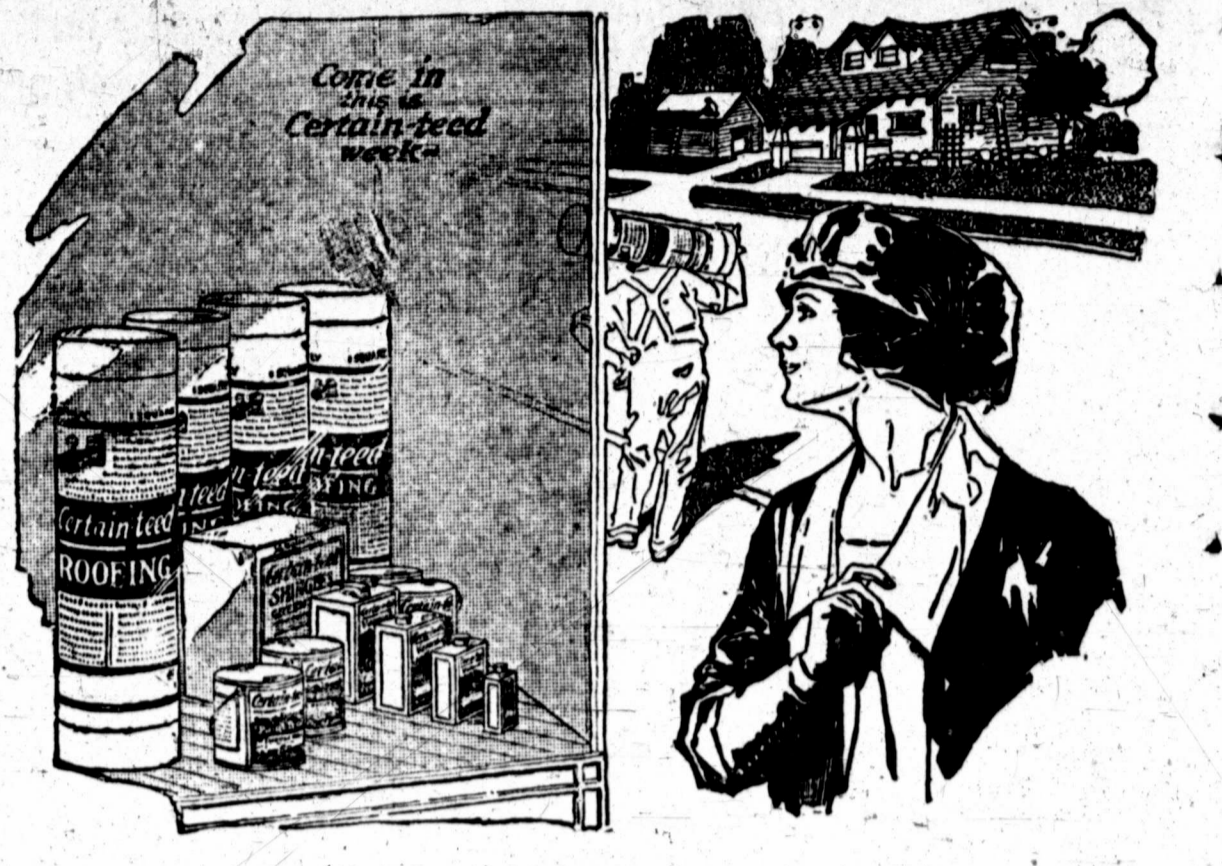

COMMISSION HERE TO MAKE A SURVEY OF RIVER BOUNDARY

Headed by U. S. District Attorney John A. Fain of Oklahoma City, a commission of five legal and topographical experts, arrived in Wichita Falls this morning to make a physical survey of the Red river country and surrounding country.

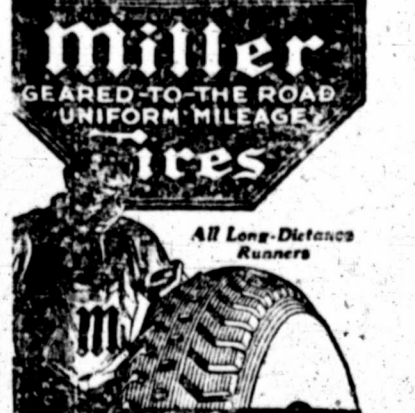
