LABOR SITUATION AWAITS VOTE ON TRUCE

AMERICAN GOVERNMENT SENDS REPLY TO PROTEST OF MEXICO AGAINST DISPATCH OF TROOPS

WASHINGTON, Aug. 27.—The American Government's reply to Mexico's protest against the dispatch of American troops into Mexico in pursuit of bandits who held two American aviators for ransom, was sent forward today, it was announced at the State Department. Officials declined to discuss the contents of the note, saying that it probably would be made public in Mexico City.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 27.—Reply to recent statements by members of President Carranza's official family in Mexico City to the effect that the Mexican Government has acquired the right to enact laws that would result in the confiscation of property owned by foreigners, and that retroactive laws were justifiable in international law, was made by the American Association of Producers of Petroleum in Mexico in a letter presented today to the State Department.

"The newspapers for several days," the letter said, "have carried statements emanating principally from Mexico City intended to justify Article 27 of the Mexican constitution, which declares that all petroleum in the republic belongs to the nation."

"It is commonly argued that laws have retroactive effect when general interest so demands, because no right may be acquired against public interest. According to our view, this is too absolute. If private parties may invoke against the application of a retroactive law, only their interest is impaired by the retroactive effect, the general interest should be before general interest. But when private parties have a right impaired by the law, the court may not in the name of general interest modify the rights of citizens. The maintenance of rights is the greatest of all interests."

"So again it transpires that the authority relied on is squarely opposed to their theory."

"They have proposed the expropriation that the constitution and laws are not retroactive. They now admit that they distinctly are; and the sole and only authority which they can cite in support of their contention. On such a base is built up their justification of spoliation."

BOTH SIDES CLAIMING MISSISSIPPI ELECTION

JACKSON, MISS., Aug. 27.—Statements issued at noon today at the headquarters of Oscar G. Johnson and Lee M. Russell, candidates for the Democratic nomination for governor, voted in yesterday's primary, claimed majorities for their respective candidates. Johnson's headquarters claimed a majority of about 1,000 votes for Johnson, while at Russell headquarters it was asserted that Russell was leading by 4,000 votes.

AMERICAN WARNING TO TURKS CREATES A STIR IN EUROPE

PARIS, Aug. 27.—An informal warning to Turkey that massacres of Armenians must cease, given recently by Rear Admiral L. Bristol, commander of the United States naval forces in Turkey, caused something of a flurry in French official quarters and in the supreme council of the peace conference. It was reported that the council there was reported to have occurred sharp criticism of American interference in Turkey through missions and otherwise, despite the fact that the United States had shown no disposition to accept the mandate for the administration of any Turkish territory.

GREATER PART OF CALIFORNIA HAS NO TRAINS

Railroad Administration Admits Themselves Unable to Give Service.

SAN BERNARDINO, CAL., Aug. 27.—Officials of the local "big four" lodges here said today they had received no orders to return to work. Individuals who declared they would disregard any orders from international officials to resume work.

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 27.—Representatives of the four railroad brotherhoods here have received definite telegraphic instructions from Warren S. Stone, president of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers, to return to work immediately. This announcement was made early today.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 27.—Most of California's railroad lands today on account of the strike of trainmen and shopten. Strikes, some announced to be in sympathy with striking employes here, last night, have instructions from the strikers to take steps today looking to a spread of the strike.

GRAND JURY PLANS AN INVESTIGATION

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 27.—The United States grand jury for this district convened today for the announced purpose of investigating the alleged abandonment of a train carrying mail at Colton yesterday by trainmen who carried the strike there.

PRESIDENT TO BEGIN HIS TOUR IN A FEW DAYS

Will Probably Start Within the Next Ten Days or Two Weeks.

ANNOUNCEMENT IS MADE BY SECRETARY TUMULTY

Will Occupy About Twenty-Five Days if President Can Stand Trip.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 27.—President Wilson will begin his trip to the Pacific coast just as soon as details can be arranged, probably within 10 days or two weeks. Secretary Tumulty made this definite announcement today, adding that the President will probably make the trip. It is regarded as likely that the President will reach the Pacific coast in time to review the Pacific fleet at San Francisco September 15.

WANTS TO GREET PERISHING. While the President wishes to start on his tour very soon, there are various elements that must be considered, including the necessary arrangements for his reception in the cities to be visited and his desire to greet General Pershing when he arrives in New York next week.

DANIELS SATISFIED WITH SWANSON BILL TO LEASE OIL LANDS

WASHINGTON, Aug. 27.—A letter received by Gifford Pinchot, from Secretary of the Navy Daniels today relates, according to Pinchot's office, the statement by Senator Smoot in the Senate yesterday that Secretary Daniels favors the passage of Smoot's Oil Leasing bill on which vote is expected tonight.

COMMITTEE AGREES ON AN INCREASE FOR POSTAL EMPLOYEES

WASHINGTON, Aug. 27.—Wage increases for postal employees totalling \$40,000,000 were agreed upon by the House postoffice committee today over the protest of the postoffice department.

BILL PROPOSES REORGANIZATION OF RAILROADS

Introduced in the Senate Today by Senator Lenroot of Wisconsin.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 27.—Wholesale reorganization of the railroads is proposed in a bill introduced today by Senator Lenroot, Wisconsin. Lenroot's plan is to organize a corporation which would own and operate the roads, this corporation to be controlled by a board of eleven directors chosen by the President from various economic groups.

PROPERTY INTERESTS WOULD BE SAFEGUARDED IN FINANCING THE PLAN, it was estimated. The bill would provide for a 6 per cent dividend on stock held by existing stock as valued by the Interstate Commerce Commission and one from railway commissions.

CHICAGO SHOPTEN TO CONSIDER OFFER SUNDAY

CHICAGO, Aug. 27.—Railway shopten of the Chicago district will meet Sunday to consider President Wilson's offer of a four cent wage increase. The meeting was announced today by John D. Sanders, secretary of the shopten, who said the men could not afford to accept the offer and predicted a nationwide strike next month.

BURKBURNETT PIPE LINE RUNS NOW EXCEEDS 104,000 BARRELS

Pipe line runs in the Wichita Falls district have passed the 104,000 mark again, last week's average showing approximately this much oil hauled from the field daily with Burk Burnett's daily average 92,000. This is a considerable increase over last week, when the freight congestion worked to effect a decrease daily of many thousand barrels.

Electric's production remains around 10,500 barrels daily, Iowa Park is edging a little close to the 1,000 barrel mark being 500 at present, a slight increase over figures for the past several weeks. Petrolia is credited with 525 barrels while Holliday remains at 200 barrels.

Norton & Cline have five completions in their lease on the Waggoner farm, out of block 84, No. 5, making 1,800 barrels, No. 4, 2,400 barrels, Nos. 1, 3 and 6, 2,000 barrels each.

Indications that the eastern edge of the pool has been defined in block 83, is found in the report that the Sinclair Consolidated No. 2 Fowler, in the eastern part of the quarter section, is a small well, possibly under 100 barrels.

The United Southern's test on the Schnakenburg, northwest of the proven line at present, is a junked hole around 1,800 feet, the fishing job being finally given up. A second hole is to be drilled immediately.

WANT PERMITS FOR HANDLING OIL FOR BURKBURNETT ROAD

Permits for the handling of oil to be used in the construction of the Oil Field Highway from Burk Burnett to the Bacou switch have been applied for to W. E. Williams, general manager of the Katy railroad, J. F. Hickey, general superintendent for this district taking the matter up personally.

The handling of this oil to a central point, such as Bacou, by the railroad, is expected greatly to facilitate the construction of the highway between Wichita Falls and Burk Burnett. Reliance for this oil at present is placed on truck and tank wagons, which on account of the long haul, are having considerable difficulty in keeping the oil of the road up to the pace set in the other work.

NEW POOL NO. TWO IS ESTIMATED BETTER THAN 2,000 BARRELS

An additional 10 feet of sand was drilled in the New Pool Oil Company No. 2, No. 1 Evans, on Tuesday, and the final balling out was begun, and today the well was turned loose until the available storage, 1,600 barrels, was filled. A total of 26 feet has been drilled, and the capacity is estimated in excess of 3,000 barrels.

Pipe line connections were made on the New Pool No. 1 company's well, effecting the second company's well to the west, on Monday. It is announced by company officials, connections for the second well are expected in a short time.

PRAIRIE HILL COMPANY BRINGS IN A PRODUCER FROM HOLE THOUGHT DRY

Deepening of a supposedly dry hole in the southwest quarter of block 75 has been accomplished by the Prairie Hill Oil Company promoters and the drilling contractor, and the well is securing good production, according to Pat Pope, secretary of the company, who on yesterday announced the bringing in of No. 1 producer of the Prairie Hill, in this same block. The well in question, the name of which Mr. Pope does not state, offsets the Prairie Hill to the west, it was bought by the Prairie Hill promoters and the drillers and drilled 50 feet deeper, Mr. Pope stated.

According to Mr. Pope's statement of the condition of the company's affairs, the officers of the Prairie Hill have pursued a policy a little out of the ordinary in that when the 17 producing wells on Sunshine Hill ceased producing, the officers put up the money for three wells in the north-west Burk Burnett extension, this well on the Renner tract being one of that three. Other drilling operations are planned, it is stated.

This company has 90 acres leased out of the Dale farm where the Cambie test is being drilled. There are also other tests in this vicinity which are considered worth watching.

COTTON MARKET.

NEW YORK, Aug. 27.—The cotton market was quiet early today. Nervousness over the labor situation and early cables led to scattered selling and the opening was 9 to 16 points lower. The heavy opening of the stock market was also a depressing factor but after selling off to 31.50 for October and 31.25 for January or about 22 to 23 points net lower, the market showed a tendency to steady on bullish private crop reports.

The weekly report of the weather bureau was considered about a stand-off and after its publication October sold down to 31.50 and January to 31.40 or 30 to 37 points lower under a flurry of scattered liquidation and little southern selling. The firm or ruling of sterling exchange was an encouraging feature, however, and prices steadied up again around midday on renewed covering.

The early afternoon advance extended to 31.95 and 32.25 for January or 16 to 20 points above yesterday's closing on continued covering.

Cotton futures closed barely steady.

NEW ORLEANS COTTON.

NEW ORLEANS, Aug. 27.—Favorable weather conditions over the belt caused selling of cotton as soon as the market opened today. In the first half hour of trading prices fell 20 to 21 points.

The weekly crop reports from the government were considered to be better than expected and they increased the selling pressure. Late in the morning, the most active months were 30 to 40 points under the close of yesterday.

Buying appeared during the noon hour which was attributed to foreign spot interests. At 1:04 o'clock all of the decline had been recovered and the market was 11 to 15 points over yesterday's closing.

Cotton futures closed steady at a net advance of two to four points.

CHICAGO, Aug. 27.—Scattered commission house buying and light offerings today failed to start to offset a general bearishness among corn traders. Conditions of industrial and economic unrest seemed reflected in the tendency to keep away from high prices. Opening corn prices were 5c higher to 1 1/2c lower, December showing the only increase. The initial figures were, September \$1.78 to \$1.78 1/2 and December \$1.41 1/2 to \$1.42.

Oats started weak with limited support and through the early trading moved in narrower lines than corn. Opening prices were unchanged to 5c lower with September at 71 1/2 to 74 1/2 and December at 74 1/2 to 74 1/2.

Provisions opened dull and weak, influenced by declines in live hog prices.

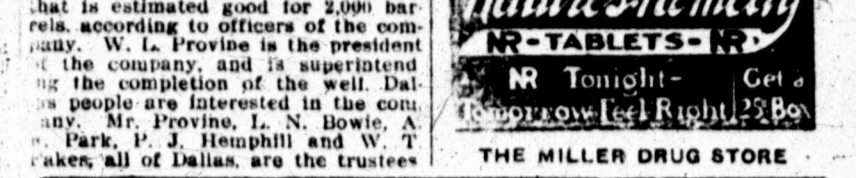

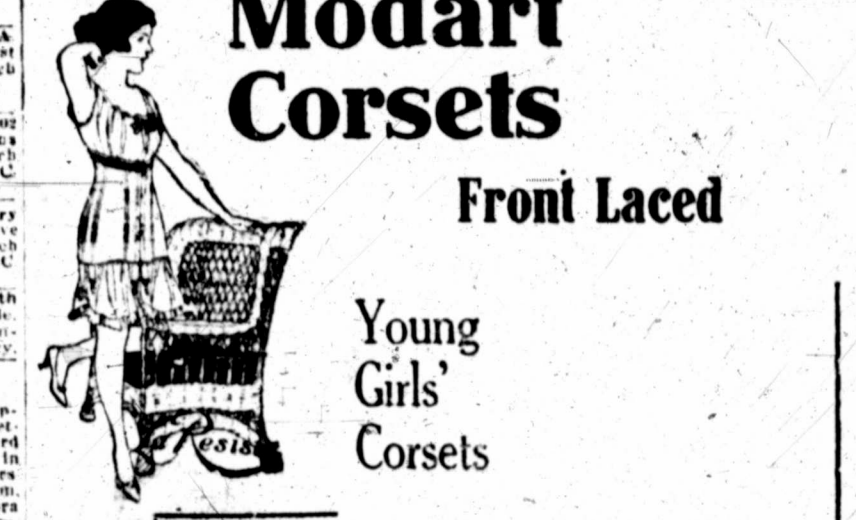

DENIKINE IS DOMINATING A LARGE AREA

Occupies Territory Larger than Germany and Forces Are Still Advancing.

PARIS, Aug. 27.—General Denikin, the anti-bolshevik leader in Southern Russia, now dominates a territory larger than Germany and his forces are daily progressing into central Russia with comparatively slight opposition. His actual front two days ago, according to accurate military information received here, extended from a few miles east of Odessa northward to Elizabetgrad, then north-east to a few miles south of Kursk, thence east to Novochoporsk, continuing to a point on the Volga a few miles south of Saratov. (Since this dispatch was filed, the capture of Odessa by anti-bolshevik forces has been announced.)

General Denikin also occupies all the Caucasus region from the Caspian to the Black Sea and south to the Georgian border. His forces are not occupying Astrakhan, at the mouth of the Volga, but he controls traffic on that river by occupying Tzaritzin.

SUCCESS IS CLAIMED BY THE BOLSHEVIKI

LONDON, Aug. 27.—Pskov, southwest of Petrograd, has been captured by bolshevik forces, according to an official statement at Moscow. The bolsheviks also claim success on the Volga in General Denikin's territory. They report the capture of Kamishin on the Volga, 120 miles southwest of Moscow, and say their forces are advancing toward Tzaritzin, 100 miles further south on the Volga.

SYMPATHIZERS WITH EDITH CAVELL WERE PROMPTLY ARRESTED

PARIS, Aug. 27.—Any Allied sympathizer in Brussels who came into contact with Gaston Quien, alleged traitor of Edith Cavell, was soon arrested and condemned by the Germans, according to the president of the court which is trying him. Among those mentioned by the president was Father Bosteels, who believed Quien was honestly aiding Allied soldiers to escape, gave him a railroad map which showed the latest German modifications. Father Bosteels was soon sentenced to 12 years imprisonment. It was declared that Quien had asked Madame Van Dame to aid two young persons to escape and that she directed them to the frontier and sent another lady with them as a guide. The two were jailed and condemned by the Germans. Quien admitted having seen Miss Cavell on July 26 after he had visited the home of Madame Bodart and that Jean Mares, accused him in the street. Here was read into the record a statement that Mares was in the pay of the Germans. Madame Bodart gave Quien a package to be left at the home of Madame Machiel. He admitted he knew it contained maps for the use of persons attempting to escape from the country. It was pointed out by the president that one of these maps had caused Madame Bodart to be condemned by a German court martial.

NEW TOWN TO HAVE BRANCH POSTOFFICE AT AN EARLY DATE

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 27.—Burk Burnett is to have branch post-office at the oil field, five miles northwest of the town. Representative Parrott was notified by the postoffice department Tuesday that the five or six thousand people at the field will be served with ample mail facilities. The branch office, designated as "Third Branch, Burk Burnett," a postmaster will be put in charge at a salary of \$1,750 a year and the office will be opened as soon as quarters can be obtained.

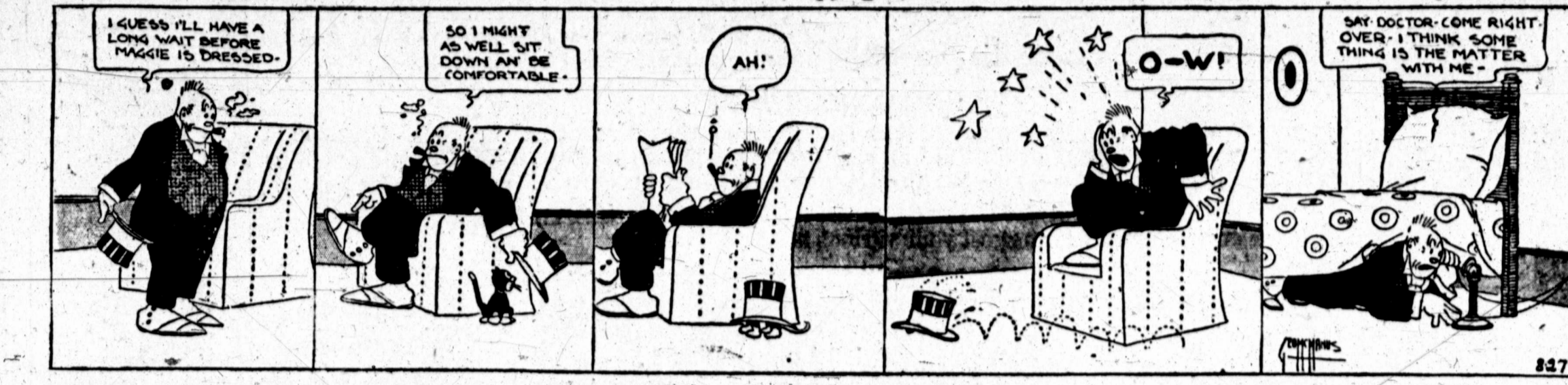
LIMITED SCHEDULE MAINTAINED BY CARS WITH AID OF GUARD

C., Aug. 27.—With state militia and armed deputies patrolling the streets, car service was resumed here today under a limited schedule after an interruption of two weeks, due to a strike of platform men. DESDEMONA, TEX., Aug. 27.—Authorities here today were investigating rioting Monday night which resulted in wrecking of two Greek restaurants and a clothing store. So far no arrests have been made. The trouble is said to have started when a Greek restaurant keeper ejected an oil field worker. A mob formed and stormed the restaurant, later wrecking two other establishments. The workers accuse the business men of profiteering.

GOVERNOR HONORS REQUISITION FOR FORMER SOLDIER

AUSTIN, TEX., Aug. 27.—Governor Hobby honored the application of the governor of Washington for return of A. McCowan, alias D. M. Delmas, self-styled former Lieutenant Colonel in the British army and veteran of the world war. McCowan recently was pardoned by the Texas Governor. He had escaped from the Texas penitentiary where he was serving a term for forgery, and was re-arrested in Seattle and returned to Texas. Dallas newspapers took up the case and repeated McCowan's story of how, as Colonel Delmas, he had won the Victoria Cross for gallantry in the eastern campaigns against the Turks, and eventually secured his pardon. "I went through the ordeal of fire and have come back purged," Delmas as he was known, said. "I was back to Washington, with his Victoria Cross and British army citations, to begin a new life for right to freedom, to claim to woo a Turkish battle-field."

POLISH INSURGENTS IN UPPER SILESIA SURROUND GERMANS

LONDON, Aug. 27.—Polish insurgents in Upper Silesia are surrounding the German garrison in Myslowitz and that town is expected to surrender, says a Polish official communique received here today. Our troops have reached Belsino (Breslau) and are pursuing the enemy," it adds.

FIRST TROOPS OF FIFTH EXPECTED ON SATURDAY

NEW YORK, Aug. 27.—The first troops of the Fifth Division will arrive Saturday on the transport Pastores, it was announced today at the port of embarkation, Hoboken. Nineteen officers and thirty enlisted men will comprise the unit. The Pastores, who left August 21, is bringing 1,473 officers and men, including a number of casual companies.

FORT WORTH, TEXAS, Aug. 27.—R. E. Townsend, merchant at Palo Pinto, who was injured last night when his auto was struck by a Texas and Pacific train west of Fort Worth, will recover. His wife and daughter, who were thought to have been fatally hurt, also will recover. Their injuries, it was disclosed, consist only of bruises.

NO EXCLUSIVE SOCIETY FUNCTIONS FOR PRINCE

WINNIPEG, MAN., Aug. 27.—There will be no exclusive society functions held for the Prince of Wales. He himself put a stop today to plans for receptions where only invited guests were to be admitted. The Prince's aides asked that the public be invited to all functions held for him in this city. Invitations already had been issued by Lady Akenside, wife of Sir Jas. Akenside, governor of Manitoba, for a garden party. The event was cancelled following receipt of the Prince's telegram.

BAVARIAN ARMY HAS MERGED WITH GERMANS

MUNICH, Monday, Aug. 25.—The Bavarian army officially ceased to exist today, it becomes part of the imperial defense army. President Ebert and Minister of Defense Noske were present at the ceremony. Bavaria was strongly opposed to losing its army and held to it to the bitter end against the rest of Germany.

We are asked a good many times, "Why the high price of coffee?" There are, of course, many contributory reasons. Among them: The frost damage in Brazil last August. The fact that Europe has had practically no coffee for four years, and the surplus in the United States is practically nil. Prohibition is also a factor. But the REAL REASON is an adjustment of values among commodities. A few years ago Rio sevens sold for 5 1/2 cents per pound, so did cotton. Now cotton sells for above 30 cents and Rio sevens for twenty-two. Wheat used to fluctuate between sixty-five cents and a dollar, and is now two-twenty.
