B. A. BROTHERHOODS SEND ULTIMATUM

WILL AID IN OPERATION OF ROADS IF MEMBERS DO NOT GO TO WORK BY SATURDAY

CLEVELAND, Ohio, Aug. 28.—Striking railroad workers on the Pacific coast were ordered to return to work by Saturday morning by the Four Brotherhood Chiefs here today.

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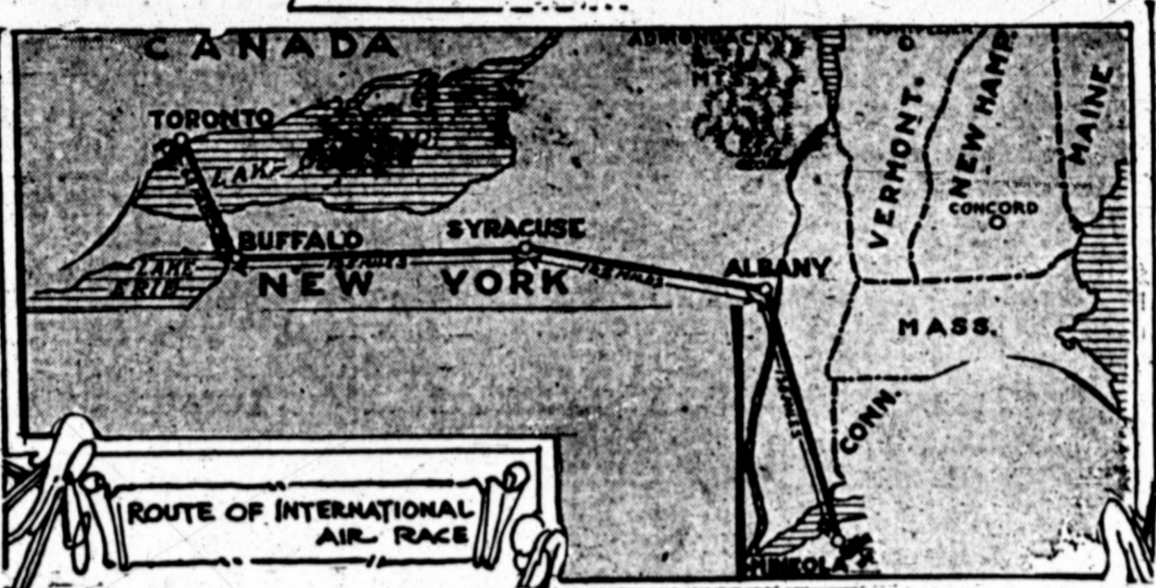

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# AN IMMEDIATE CONFERENCE IS URGED BY LANE

### Cabinet Member Would Call Representatives of Capital and Labor at Once.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 28.—An immediate conference of capital and labor is necessary to solve the economic situation at present confronting the United States, according to Franklin K. Lane, secretary of the interior, in a statement here today.

Events seriously threatening the welfare of the country are rapidly drawing to a climax, he said, and urged President Wilson to take immediate action looking forward to a joint meeting of employers, employees and all other elements interested in the industrial problems without waiting for congress to act on the situation.

"Such a conference should be called," Lane said, "and called at once. There is no time to lose. It is a very definite and real problem we have to solve, and we should administer only definite and tested remedies. "The organization of the conference should be given careful thought. While it might be termed a conference of capital and labor, it is rather indefinite terms. Capital is a rather vague term. While capital as representing finance and industry, it is a representation, there should also be representatives of management of those groups, which under capital have more immediate and direct problems of labor and production as they arise in the mills and shops and on the farms."

"To my mind the studies of the conference should be along two lines. "First, there should be a determination of principles which should govern in all relations between employer and employe. This should be founded on good conscience and should cover the question of wages to labor and return on capital, opportunity for advancement and betterment and recognition of merit."

"Second, should be the determination of ways by which these principles might be carried out. It is here that vagueness and theorizing should be barred. Every employer and every manager who comes into the conference should be asked, 'How do you handle these problems? What is your practice?'"

"There are employers who are solving the problems of production, of keeping their men satisfied and contented, of maintaining wholesome and stimulating conditions in their plants. These methods should all be laid before the conference and from this selection of the best methods, the program applicable to the whole of our industry—not just one method, but a selection of the best methods, the program applicable to the whole of our industry—not just one method, but a selection of the best methods, the program applicable to the whole of our industry."

"Too Much Concentration. "We must stop the concentration of our workers in a few cities," Lane said. "If we are to solve for long the problem of soaring food prices, the consumers are increasing more rapidly than producers, there is no wonder why a large percentage of our shop and mill men could not produce much of their own food, if our factories and shops were located where the men and their families as well as to the convenience and comfort of capital."

"I know of one mill town where every worker has a home with from half an acre to an acre of ground around it. Each has his own garden—enough to produce all the vegetables his family needs. Each of them has a pig or two and most of them a cow. Each has a flock of chickens."

"There is no method, however, that should consider in the location of future industries. That alone would be a help not merely to the workers at plants so located, but would relieve the cost of living problems of those who still must live in cities. It would relieve transportation and in many other ways contribute to a general betterment of all concerned."

# STEEL WORKERS GO OUT ON STRIKE AT CLEVELAND, OHIO

### CLEVELAND, O., Aug. 28.—Three thousand steel workers went out on strike here today and it is only with difficulty that union officials are restraining other organized steel workers from doing likewise, according to Gilbert H. Sharpe, business agent for the Cleveland blacksmiths' union.

Differences regarding wage and working conditions caused the walk-out, Sharpe said. The men were employed by the Champion Machine and Forging Co.

Henry Rasmie, secretary of the organization committee of steel and iron workers in Cleveland, said fully 13,000 union steel workers were clamoring to strike with or without authority, and were being restrained with difficulty. Rasmie characterized as "unfair" the refusal of Judge Gary, of the steel corporation, to treat with the union officials.

# NEW BASIS FOR PRICE FIXING IS ESTABLISHED

### HOUSTON, TEX., Aug. 28.—The state food administration here has officially recognized a request of local wholesale men made to Congress through the United States Chamber of Commerce, that a cost plus basis be ignored in fixing prices and that replacement costs be substituted as the basis of distribution.

As the merchant is compelled to suffer the loss of a falling market, so should he be allowed profit on a rising market, the appeal says, and declares that to establish cost plus regulations for food and clothing for other industries.

# RIVER BED WELLS GETTING TO INTERESTING DEPTH

The Burk Bet Oil Company's No. 1 State Lands is reported drilling around 1,600 feet. The Burk Senator, also drilling on State Lands, in the bed of Red River, is drilling around 1,250 feet, according to reports yesterday. These are the deepest of the river bed wells being drilled on the state land of Texas, and should furnish interesting developments of some sort in a short time.

# KEMP-MUNGER ALLEN NO. 1 DRILLING AROUND 1600 FEET

The Kemp Munger Allen No. 1 Mungler Ranch is drilling around 1,600 feet this week, according to field reports. This test is expected by the operators to be the deepest of the river bed wells to 1,800 feet, and the developments of the next few weeks will be closely watched. The test is being drilled with cable tools, and progress is for that reason slow.

# ORDEN ARMOR AVERTS FINANCIAL CRISIS FOR STREET RAILWAY

KANSAS CITY, Aug. 28.—The successful negotiation of a loan of \$1,000,000 from eastern capitalists on the personal endorsement of J. Orden Armour, announced today by F. J. Kealy, president of the Kansas City Street Railway Company, has averted a serious financial crisis for the local transportation company, according to company officials.

# PEOPLE WON'T BUY COAL MINES IDLE SUFFERING SURE

PORT WORTH, TEX., Aug. 28.—Because the people of the Southwest are not buying coal early, mines are idle in Texas and Oklahoma and representatives of the men are here today conferring with the operators on the situation. George Colville of Marceline, Mo., is here as arbitrator. John Wilkinson of Muskogee, Okla., is representing the miners. He is president of the Southwestern district, United Mine Workers of America. The 2,500 miners in the Southwest will ask a raise in the wage scale because of general conditions and because of the enforced idleness at the present time.

# GOMPERS GOES INTO CONFERENCE WITH RAIL UNIONS

### WASHINGTON, N. A., Aug. 28.—Upon his return here today from Europe, Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor, went into conference with officials of the fifteen railroad unions to discuss President Wilson's decision that there would be no general increase in railroad employees wages while the government was conducting its campaign to reduce the cost of living.

It was expected that a statement would be issued after the conference. Meantime the union officials declined to discuss what attitude Gompers had taken with regard to the President's decision.

# RUSSELL IS LEADING IN GUBERNATORIAL CONTEST IN STATE OF MISSISSIPPI

JACKSON, MISS., Aug. 28.—Out of 30,924 votes tabulated which include nine complete counties and 19 incomplete, four boxes missing, Lee M. Russell had a lead of 10,000 over his opponent, Oscar G. Johnston, in the contest for the democratic nomination for governor of Mississippi voted on in Jackson's primary. It was estimated that 140,000 votes were cast.

# STRIKE OF UNION STEEL WORKERS IS ALTERNATIVE

WASHINGTON, Aug. 28.—After a conference here today with the executive committee of the American Federation of Labor, representatives of the committee of the steel and iron workers union made public a letter to E. H. Gary, chairman of the board of directors of the United States Steel Corporation, announcing that the decree for a strike of union steel workers would be enforced unless the corporation granted an interview to the committee within the time limit set.

The letter was dated at New York yesterday, but was withheld until the steel workers' representatives could confer with Samuel Gompers and other officials of the federation.

The letter was made public following the committee's interview with the executive council of the A. F. of L. It declared that "Some few days are still at the disposal of the committee before the time limit will be no discretion left to the committee but to enforce the decree of your employes."

"Barely reasonable men can find a common union which we can all stand and prosper." "You may not be aware," Gary was told, "that the standard of life of the average worker is below the level of the pauper, which means that charitable institutions furnish to the pauper a better home, more food, clothing, light and heat than many of our workers can bring into their lives upon the compensation received for putting forth their very best efforts in the steel industry."

The actors were before the executive council immediately after the steel workers departed.

# TULSA WOMAN KILLED IN AUTOMOBILE ACCIDENT

TULSA, OKLA., Aug. 28.—One woman is dead and two injured as the result of an automobile accident on Wednesday night ten miles from here on the Tulsa highway. Mrs. Lena Carnister, driver of a local hospital shortly following the accident. J. W. Mitchener, owner of the car, suffered three broken ribs and Elmer Barnett, driver, was internally injured but has a chance to recover.

# MEXICAN YOUTH IS NOW ON TRIAL FOR KILLING MITCHELL

### Adelmo Diaz was placed on trial this afternoon in the Thirtieth district court as a juvenile, charged with slaying Jim Mitchell to death at the new asylum grounds August 9.

Judge Bonner is sitting as a judge of juvenile procedure, and this morning overruled a motion of counsel for defense for a trial by jury. Again this afternoon a Diaz motion was overruled and a bill of exceptions taken.

A dozen or more witnesses are to be examined, but it is thought the proceedings can be completed by tonight, when Judge Bonner will formally adjourn the present term of the Thirtieth district court.

Diaz only 18. Because Diaz has been held by the court to be but 18 years of age, he can be tried only as a juvenile. The court can sentence him, should he be found guilty, for a term of years in the state school for delinquent boys at McAlester, but such sentence automatically expires when he becomes of age. In the event of conviction, the sentence, consequently, cannot exceed five years in duration.

Mitchell was shot to death while working as a plasterer at the new state insane asylum. No motive has ever been discovered for the crime, as Mitchell and Diaz had no difficulties prior to the killing. Since the crime, Diaz has been in the county jail, having been indicted by the grand jury on a charge of "killing with a knife" and not for murder.

W. P. Martin of Dallas, special counsel employed by the Mexican government to defend citizens of Mexico accused of crime in Texas, is in charge of the defense of Diaz, being assisted by Attorney Fulton. District Attorney Jones is prosecuting the case.

In presenting the motion for a jury trial morning, Mr. Martin and Mr. Fulton, who are in charge of the defense, previously had agreed to trial by the court without a jury, and Judge Bonner overruled the motion. Judge Bonner explained that he had had an opportunity to secure witnesses from which to draw a jury, but because defense counsel had said no jury would be necessary had not taken the opportunity.

"There are half a dozen or more Mexican witnesses in the case and Judge Bonner appointed Mr. Porterfield as interpreter. Among the state's witnesses is an expert on wounds. But few people were present at the courtroom when the trial began.

# BIGGEST SLUMP IN HOG PRICES SINCE PANIC 1907

CHICAGO, Aug. 28.—A fall of hog prices to \$15 a hundredweight within three days was forecast by representatives of the big packing companies as the stockyards today when resumption of trading showed the cause. Hogs of the canning variety listed at Wednesday's close at \$17.00, a drop of \$1.50 in one day, were offered today at \$16.00 with few changing hands. The bulk of sales at the opening of the market was around \$17.00, compared with \$23.65 early this month. The packers remained out of the market and live stock experts predicted the biggest slump since the "Roosevelt panic" in 1907.

# PERMANENT RANK FOR PERSHING IS PROVIDED BY BILL

WASHINGTON, Aug. 28.—In recognition of General Pershing's services in the war, the senate today passed a bill authorizing the president to confer on him the permanent rank of general. The measure now goes to the senate.

## COTTON MARKET.

NW YORK, Aug. 28.—There was renewal of scattered liquidation and Liverpool selling at the opening of the cotton market today and first prices were seven to 24 points lower or wide fluctuating selling at 21 and 22 and 23. Reactively easy cables and a favorable weather map were factors on the decline but there seemed a more optimistic feeling over labor conditions and the strong opening of the stock market was an encouraging feature. This led to covering which caused rallies of five to 10 points right after the call, and there was probably some buying on a private report placing the condition at 60.7.

Prices weakened under continued Liverpool selling and scattered liquidation with December selling off to 17.75 during the middle of the morning. The more cheerful view of the labor outlook seemed to be threatened by the late forenoon news, however, and prices rallied to 32.05 for December toward midday when the general list held steady within 3 or 4 points of yesterday's closing.

In the early afternoon business was quiet but the undertone was steady on a little covering influenced by a favorable crop advance from portions of the eastern belt. The level of prices was about 40 points above the lowest with December at 32.13 and January at 32.05.

New Orleans Cotton. NEW YORK, Aug. 28.—The conciliatory electrician, was drowned and belt caused moderate selling of cotton on the opening day. The demand was restricted and the market had much of a holiday feeling. At the end of the first half hour of business prices were 22 to 27 points down.

Shorts tried to realize profits and their buying put the market back to within about five points of yesterday's close. Fresh selling based on the favorable weather forecast met the hard spot and late in the morning prices were 29 to 30 points under the final of yesterday.

Covering by the short interest gave the market a better tone and caused a fairly strong upward movement. In the trading up to 1:00 o'clock prices were sent 15 to 12 points above the level of yesterday's close.

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### GOOD RESULTS ARE ALREADY NOTED FROM ROAD WORK

**TIME FOR TRIP TO BURKURNETT HAS ALREADY BEEN CUT FOUR HOURS.**

**TWO COATS OIL ARE APPLIED**

**Subscriptions to Fund Now Total About \$2,300 and More Money Needed.**

"Skeptics who in any way doubt the value of the work being done on the Oil Field highway only have to drive out to the road to be thoroughly satisfied," said a prominent Wichita Falls oil man Thursday. "I drove 50 miles an hour over part of that road yesterday, and I'll tell you it has been a living time since I was able to travel anything like that time in this part of the country."

"The time it takes to make the Burkurnett highway a car row has been cut from four or five hours to an hour."

"Only about two coats of oil have been applied to the parts of the road graded so far, but we already have a road as good as a pike. When the road has been done over another time or two, and finished off with a coating of special road oil, there will be a road to Burkurnett and the field which will be as good as any paved street in Wichita Falls."

"Such a road is of great value both to Wichita Falls, Burkurnett and the country at large."

"Owing to inability to secure road materials, the building of the concrete highway system is being indefinitely delayed. In the meantime it is intolerable to think of having such an important road as this one in the condition it has been in previous to the starting of this work."

"The county has no funds to build this road with, being unable to use any of the funds voted for permanent roads. That is why it was necessary to do the work by subscription."

"Subscriptions received by the central committee at this time, I believe total about \$2,300, with about \$10,000 or \$15,000 more promised. This has been sufficient for starting the road but will not be nearly sufficient for its completion, and what is more important still, its maintenance until such a time as the county will be able to take over the maintenance, about the first of the year."

"Absence of the chairman of the central committee, W. M. Priddy, and the vice chairman, W. E. Norton, has temporarily delayed the work of solicitation of subscriptions."

"In the meantime, it seems to me that all public spirited citizens, who appreciate the value of the work, could facilitate matters considerably by not waiting for their subscriptions to be solicited, but sending them in to the treasurer of the committee, Hubert H. Harrison, secretary of the Chamber of Commerce."

### AN EX-SOLDIER HERO CONFESSES THAT STORY WAS ONLY A RUSE

He had learned that Strother had whiskey and he wanted to capture him, hence accosted him in Eighth street. Chambers was freed of course. He will be a government witness.

### LITTLE GIRLS WONDER AS PARENTS BATTLE FOR THEIR POSSESSION

Two sweet-faced little girls sit silently in the Seventy-eighth district court today, wide-eyed and amazed at the waves of legal technicalities that sweep through the august chamber where a battle is being waged for their possession.

Mrs. Edna Tucker is battling for her tiny daughters, as is Albert Tucker, her father, divorced by their mother late last year. "This case," Judge Scurry told counsel, contestants and others in the courtroom, "revolves wholly upon the question of character—some of the question of the parents. If it is proved to me that the father is not a fit man to rear these sweet little girls, then he shall not have them. If it is shown to me that the mother is not of the right character to be entrusted with their lives and futures, then she shall not have them, but I will give them to their grandparents."

"The character of the parents is the issue." The Tuckers were married October 25, 1912, at Abilene, and lived together until November 25, 1918. Later, Mrs. Tucker procured a divorce, but because of the ugly character of some of the testimony in the case, the children were awarded to Mrs. Tucker's parents.

Later, Tucker filed habeas corpus proceedings to procure them. Since, he was married. Now, Mrs. Tucker, because of his marriage, seeks possession of them.

Gladys, 5 years old, and Oweta, 3 years, are their children. This morning they were tired of the procedure. They played for a while in the rear of the court chamber, but later returned to their seats on the front row of benches and watched the attorneys fence and parry for them.

The case may not be ended before tomorrow. It will at least last until late in the afternoon. Many witnesses were being examined, all of them relative to the character of the father and mother of the two little girls.

### LATHERS DECLARE NOT RESPONSIBLE FOR PRESENT TIE-UP

"Blame for the tying up of lathing and plastering on the residential building in the city in no way attaches to the Lathers' Union," says C. A. Worrell, president of the Lathers local here. "We were simply locked out by the vote of the plasterers not to cover union lathers work. The dispute between the two unions affected only part of the big buildings in the downtown district. It is true that an international organizer pulled the lathers off the 'big jobs' but as the residences were not affected, we were willing to go ahead with the work on the residences."

"Stopping of the lathing and plastering at this time, pending a settlement of the matter under controversy would hurt the larger buildings to any appreciable extent, as they were not that far along yet. Many of the residences are being hurt by the stopping of lathing and plastering. For this reason we want to make a statement to the public that the stopping of this work is not by reason of any action of ours."

"The controversy is an old one between the two crafts, and concerns the manner of erection of 'corner beads.' The metal covering under the plaster of plastered corners. Specifications call for corner beads only in the big buildings down town, involving a considerable amount of work. Two of these buildings the specifications call for the corner beads to be stuck on, said to be the fastest manner of erection. The plasterers claim this work, claiming that by striking the corner beads, plasterers material would be used, bringing it within their jurisdiction."

"The erection of corner beads was awarded to the lathers at the time of the affiliation of the plasterers with the building trades department of the American Federation. However, to avoid dispute, the lathers agreed to erect the corner beads in another manner than sticking them, a change to which the architects were willing where specifications call for sticking, but the plasterers refused to agree to this."

"The plasterers would not be infringing on their international regulations in any way by allowing the lathers to do this work in any other manner than sticking them, while the lathers would be infringing on their international regulations by allowing another craft to erect these corner beads in any manner whatever."

"Following failure to reach an agreement, our men were, as I stated before, taken off the big buildings. We agreed however, to continue on the residential work, which was not affected. 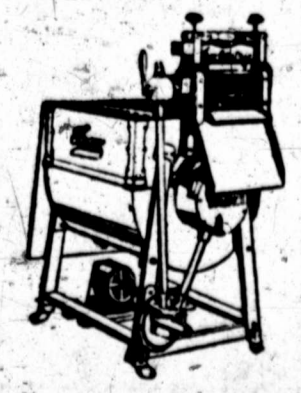

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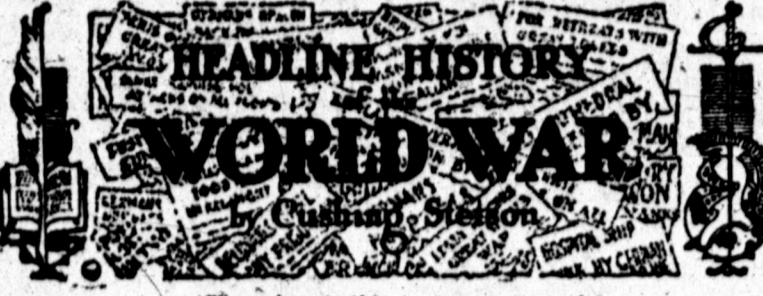

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# WICHITA FALLS IS VERY LARGE BOTTLE WITH SMALL NECK

SUCH IS THE DESCRIPTION SUPPLIED BY MR. HICKEY OF THE KATY.

HAS REFERENCE TO TRAFFIC

Better Transportation Facilities Are Needed and Are Now Being Supplied.

"Today Wichita Falls is a very large bottle with a very small neck; what is needed is a big neck at each end, in and out," said J. P. Hickey, general superintendent of the Katy at Wichita Falls, to the Times today. If the tracks across the bridge could be doubled, in addition to the improvements we are already making; when the traffic is dispatched by telephone instead of telegraph wires, and the automatic block signal system is installed on our lines from Frederick to Whitesboro, the M. K. & T. will be able to give trunk line service of big class. Today we are trying to operate a big main line trackage with the facilities and equipment of a small feeder, comparatively speaking.

Install Block Signals. We are now installing 15 of the latest automatic block signal stands between Devol and Winnett, where traffic is heaviest, and we shall continue the installation until the most active section of the line is fully equipped. This we regard as one of the most progressive of our many improvements.

"We are double tracking four miles of the line south from Winnett through Burk Burnett oil fields, which will help greatly in handling through business. The work was started two weeks ago and will be completed in five weeks. We are also building new team tracks and additional passing tracks at Burk Burnett. At Devol a 75-car passing track and 60-car team track are being laid. The new passing track at Grandfield, having 85-car capacity has been finished and we are working on a new passing track at Loveland.

Drilling for Water. At mile post 17 we are drilling a well to secure a supply of spring water for boiler uses. The water from Red River, which we have been taking near here is so impregnated with gypsum that we can no longer make use of it. This case day five engine failures occurred from lack of steaming ability, and we were prevented from moving 100 cars of oil. A new well is to be sunk at Loveland, 34 miles from Wichita Falls. At mile post 19, one mile from Devol, new well had been drilled that will give up a supply of excellent water and there are springs beside the well.

### ACCIDENTS IN JULY REPORTED TO BE 4,304

AUSTIN, TEX., Aug. 27.—July accidents reported to the Texas Industrial Accident Board were more numerous than for any other month since September, 1911. There were 4,304 accidents in July and 5,781 last September. The record for the year was also set in July with 33 fatal accidents. During July 1,251 persons filed claim with the Industrial Accident Board, and \$92,622 was paid in accident insurance.
