

CLEVELAND, Ohio, Aug. 28.—Striking railroad workers on the Pacific coast were ordered to return to work by Saturday morning by the Four Brotherhood Chiefs here today.

The order was issued from the offices of Warren S. Stone, president of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers, and stated that unless the organized workers return to work by Saturday morning, the officials of the four brotherhoods will assist the Federal Railroad Administration in operating the Federal controlled railroads affected by the walkout.

The belief was expressed that the order would be obeyed.

Hogs' of the canning variety listed at Wednesday's close at \$17.00, a drop of \$1.50 in one day, were offered today at \$16.00 with few changing hands. The bulk of sales at the opening of the market was around \$17.00, compared with \$23.65 early this month. The packers remained out of the market and live stock experts predicted the biggest slump since the "Roosevelt panic" in 1907.

Heretofore we have expanded by series of leaps, the most important advance being the result of an unforeseen discovery and we were caught wholly unprepared to double our population in one year and add so enormously to the total of business in all lines; but there is no reason why we should not begin today our preparations for the inevitable. If the citizens do not awake to a realization of their responsibilities wo shall have but a patchwork city of odds and ends, instead of a comprehensive and sanely planned municipal ity on lines as progressive as any of the leading cities of the State.

Other cities in Texas have adopted the plan of calling in expect city builders to devise a system of expansion in which every improvement shall but fill some gap, in the comprehensive entirely, and be another step in the line of practical progress toward a definite attainment. Cities should be built on the unit plan, as well as machinery plants; everything in the way of municipal improve ments should be part of a well defined purpose, the ultimate goal being

The first essential is an adequate water supply for all purposes—an over supply-for a city of 100,000 or more population. If the city is to be a great industrial center, as it easily may become, the question of power provision for all possible requirements should be considered from the

Natural gas possibilities should be probed and provision made for their utilization.

The arteries connecting the city with the productive lands adjacent should be improved early in the day to encourage an influx of farmers large and small. Good highways are city builders.

Sanitary and storm sewers should be calculated so that all additions to the city shall connect directly; of ade quate capacity to accommodate the increase without later tearing up the pavements and enlarging the mains a

Realty probably never will be so cheap again as it is today, and park provisions for a city of 100,000 would be economically secured at once. The will demand recreation grounds and it would be poor econ omy to buy blocks of improved property and demolish or move the buildings, when the demand becomes insistent.

The city should acquire plots of ground suitable for schools, fire stations and other municipal uses, and do it before the cost is prohibitive

Wichita Falls may in a few years attain the population cited, and all these measures would hasten the day of realization.

# AN ADJUSTMENT OF VALUES

We are asked a good many times, "Why the high price of coffee?" There are, of course, many contributory reasons. Among them: The frost damage in Brazil last August. The fact that Europe has had practically no coffee for four years, and the surplus in the United States is practically nil. Prohibition is also a factor. But the REAL REASON is an adjustment of values among commodities. A few years ago Rio sevens sold for 5% cents per pound, so did cotton. Now cotton sells for above 80 cents and Rio sevens for twenty-two. Wheat used to fluctuate between sixty-five cents and a dollar, and is now two-twenty. So it stands to reason the Brazilian can't take the old prices for his coffee and get by. Coffee is still the cheapest commodity of consumption—and the last to advance. last to advance.
