"The entire state guard of Massachussets have been called out. At present the city of Boston is orderly. There are rumors of a very general strike. I wish you to hold yourself in readiness to render assistance from forces under your command immeliately on appeal which I may be forced to make to the president.

SETTING THE CLOCK BACK.

The pig is out of the poke. The real fight in Washington is not to be against the Shantung clause of the treaty, but over Article X, the one which guarantees the peace of the world. In other words, the Borah-Johnson group is out to kill the treaty. It is like passing a bill making a certain act criminal, but amending it so as to strike out the penalty. It is true that the penalty for this crime—the crime of initiating a war of conquest like the one just ended—may still be inflicted, but the opponents of Article X mean that we shall not be a part of the jury that inflicts it; at least, that we shall not commit our

least, that we shall not commit our-selves to such a participation.

It is a policy of non-interference.
The Republican group, which com-prises a majority of the Republican Senators, bids us keep our hands off when we see a Power threatening when we see a Power threatening again to turn the world into a shambles. That is, it serves notice on all militaristic Powers that they can do just as Germany did in 1914, so far as we are concerned. Later on, of course, we may come in, as we did in 1917. The whole proposal, therefore, is to put the world back in the condition in which it was in 1914; to disregard the lessons of war, the cry of mankind for the end of bloodshed, and let the world take its chance as it used to do. "Quit and scuttle" was the President's word for the Senatorial attitude on word for the Senatorial attitude on Shantung; it applies equally well to the Senatorial attitude on Article X.



Was it for this that our boys fought and died? If the accusing ghosts of those who died in that belief were to confront those politicans in Washington, who are bent on re-opening the whole prospect of world wars merely to gratify their spite at a President who does not happen to belong to their political party, hof would those small calibred statesmen endure their gase?

Of course, those senators have not drawn their reservations with any bejue that it will help either the league of nations or the United States. They have drawn it for the purpose of killing the peace treaty by pulling out its teeth. The teeth are located in Article X. It is by that article that the league is to become something more than the ineffective Hague Conference, the A. 

AN ADJUSTMENT OF VALUES

We are asked a good many times, "Why the high price of coffee?" There are, of course, many contributory reasons. Among them: The frost damage in Brazil last August. The fact that Europe has had practically no coffee for four years, and the surplus in the United States is practically nil. Prohibition is also a factor. But the REAL REASON is an adjustment of values among commodities. A few years ago Rio sevens sold for 5% cents per pound, so did cotton. Now cotton sells for above 30 cents and Rio sevens for twenty-two. Wheat used to fluctuate between sixty-five cents and a dollar, and is now two-twenty.
