ODEM, TEX., Sept. 18.—Newspaper correspondents who arrived here to-day after a 20 mile tramp through the rain along the shores of Nueces Bay described a scene of much desolation and destruction.

Bodies of hundreds of dead cattle, sheep, hogs, fish and birds line the beaches. The stench in places is becoming almost unbearable. Winds are carrying it inland.

ARANSAS PASS, TEX., Sept. 18.— More than three thousand refugees have been crowded in this village with

a normal population of 2000 since Sunday night.
Supplies are low and suffering active. Housing facilities are inadequate. Clothing and blankets are needed at once. Railways have been washed away and heavy rains have rendered land travel almost impossible. Upwards of 350 persons are believed to have been drowned in this district. The town of Port Arangas, on the Wortheastern end of Mustang Island, by demolished. Many of its inhabitants, literally drifted into this village of the crest of the tidal wave.

INTRODUCED "STUNT" FLYING HERE



Brigadler General Charles Lee, of the Royal Air Force, who was killed cently when his airplane crashed 200 feet to the ground at Weston-Super-Mare, or the English Channel, was the man responsible for the introduction of "studied flying in the American air service. Coming to Washington in November, 1917, as head of the British Aviation Mission, he found American pliots being sent abrord for combat work on the western front without training in the more essential phases of the flying art. General Lee contended that an airman sent into battle without practice in "stunting" was as good as dead. A pilot of courage and skill, he took dozens of Senutors and Representatives through the "falling leaf" and the "nose dive" to demonstrate that "circus flying" was not unreasonably dangerous when performed at the proper heigh;







POLICE UNIONS TO BRING PRESSURE OPPOSED BY WILSON

MAKES KNOWN POSITION IN REF-ERENCE TO STRIKES BY UNION POLICEMEN.

HIS TELEGRAM MADE PUBLIC

Says Endangering of Public Peace should in no Sense Be Countenanced or Permitted.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 18 .- Presi dent Wilson, in a telegram made public here today, came out flatly against policemen unionizing with view to "using pressure" to obtain their demands.

Willis Brownlow, commissioner of the District of Columbia, read the President's telegram before a Senate

President's telegram before a Senate committee which is considering a bill to withhold the pay of Washington policemen who affiliate with the American Federation of Labor.

President Witson said he wanted to deal with the police in "the most just and generous way," but declared against any association of police of any great city, with a view of bringing "pressure" on the public that might "endanger public peace" as "embarrass the maintenance of odder." The telegram, sent from Dunsmuir, Calif., follows:

"I am quite willing that you should tell the Senate committee that my position in my conversations with you was exactly the same as I samples of the west, and of course I am as desirous as you are of dealing with the police force in the most just and generous way but that I think any association of the police force of the capital city, or any great city, whose object is to bring pressure upon the Lublic or the community such as will object is to bring pressure upon the jubic or the community such as will redanger the public peace or embarass the maintenance of order, should no sense be countenanced or per-

mitted.

(Signed) "Woodrow Wilson."

Brownlow, though opposing union tration of the police, declared they ought to be paid more.

"They can't live on the salaries they are getting, and it has been impossible to fill the force," he told the committee. "Undoubtedly many of our policemen went into the American Federation of Labor to get better pay, but I believe that if a vote were taken now they would decide to withdraw."
