

If you put extremely cold bood in these utensils, have the dish cold first. Or, if you put in hot food, heat the dish first with warm water.

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Here's another caution. Never put empty pottery, earthenware, or glass utensils over a flame Be sure the dish contains liquid, fat, or some moist food before it is set over heat. Glass made for the purpose can cook over high heat, but not earthenware or pottery. The safe rule with



The grand old men and women who made America great had a year-round Christmas song in their hearts. They never lost sight of the truth that their greatest gift to humanity was a realization and an assumption of their individual responsibility. They looked on the Star of Bethlehem as the guiding light to democracy.


