PITTSBURGH, PA., Sept. 29 .- "The steel workers now on strike will either be granted their demands or they will be starved into submission and compelled to return to work," Wm. Z. Foster, organizer said today in a state-

"I am convinced," he added, "that the steel workers are thoroughly organized. We are not claiming that the steel industry is shut down entirely. Some plants are operating. But the normal production of steel has been lowered in most cases well over fifty per cent. We are winning, that is all I can

In speaking of the Bethlehem situation, Foster said his reports were very meagre. He said the plant at Bethlehem was shut down completely by a tie-up of the power plant. No reports had been received from other points.

STEEL COMPANY'S STTEMENT. SOUTH BETHLEHEM, PA., Sept. 29.—The Bethlehem Steel Company is-

sued the following statement this afternoon: "Reports have been received at the offices of the Bethlehem Steel Company from the plants at Sparrows Point, Md., Steelton, Reading and Lebanon, Pa., all of them substantially reporting full operation. Exceptions to this were only in unimportant, isolated units, in no way affecting the large and

Today, proclaimed by both sides as one of crucial test in the great steel strike, opened with the situation still obscure because of conflicting claims. The opposing leaders issue flatly contradictory statements in regard to the proposed strike today of the 40,000 workers in the plants of the Bethlehem Steel Corporation. The corporation officials claimed that the strike call had been obeyed only by a comparatively insignificant number and that operations in all their mills were continuing. The union chiefs replied with a claim that the huge plant at Bethlehem was completely crippled and that the power house had been forced to close.

Reported conditions in the other great steel centers indicated that the balance was being held fairly equitably between the two opposing sides.

There was nothing to support the prediction of the steel company officials that the day would see wholesale desertions in the ranks of the strikers and hat there was a definite increase in mill operation.

At Farrell in the Pittsburgh district, one of the most hotly contested sectors on the striking front, the Carnegie Steel Company resumed operation of two blast furnaces.

At Youngstown where the strikers have so far been successful in completely stopping operations, groups of workers entered a Carnegie company plant but the superintendent stated operation would not be resumed for the

To offset these relatively minor gains the strikers at Cleveland were successful in tieing up the docks of the Pennsylvania Railroad Company and the Otis Steel Company through a sympathetic walkout of ore and conhandlers. As usual at headquarters of both sides the utmost confidence in the final issue of the struggle was expressed.





It was the great democratic sense of justice that gave freedom to the slave, and the soil of the South was drenched with the blood of thousands in the accomplishment of that result. But even freedom can not alter the decrees of God and nature. The racial feelings always asserts itself.

I have lived in Wisconsin, Minnesota, Kansas and Missouri and for the last few years my home has been in Texas. I have observed the relations of the races in these localities, in the above named states. There is a strong racial antipathy which doubtless prevails in all northern states. In many if not in most of the rural towns of Missouri I knew from personal observation a negro is pot permitted to stop over night. I am convinced that the residents of a large number of other localities would make the same reports regarding its rural towns, but I am only saying what I can verify by my own observation, and the same spirit, lies latent everywhere. In the North it is an antipathy directed against the race, and not against the individual; it does not always operate to exclude the presence and residence of a limited negro population, but if the nevro population assumes any large percentage of the whole population, the racial animosity will immediately assert itself, and is ever ready with some provocation to manifest itself, I have seen a whole community driven from its homes, its property destreyed, and never permitted to return and claim its own.

During my residence in Texas I have observed that there is no racial antipathy or animosity. The races dwell together in friendly and sympathetic relations, neither encroaching on the domain of the other. The negro has his own schools, supported in exactly the same way as the white schools are; he has his own counted he white man has; only he does not the amount of business he contributes to the road. 





PLUG OR ABANDON.

WARNED TO OBSERVE LAW

68 Are Announced Governing Operations in Connection With Abandonment.

"Many operators in the oil fields have made themselves liable for heavy penalties through failure to comply with the provisions of the law regarding the plugging of dry and abandoned wells," says Ellis Campbell, deputy oil and gas supervisor under the Railroad Commission of Texas, who has been in this section of the state for several weeks looking after the enseveral weeks looking after the enforcement of oil and gas resources. In many instances where the pipe has been pulled without the wells being properly pleaged, it has been due to the ignorance of the law, though the raises and regulations of the railroad commission have been published in practically all the daily newspapers and oil journals of general circulation throughout the state. throughout the state

throughout the state.

Disregard Law.

"In a few instances, however, operators have disregarded the law to avoid the expense of plugging their abandoned wells, thinking that they were not being watched and could evade prosecution for their negligence. It is, of course, impossible for the conservation agent to be all over the fields all the time, but operators who are interested. agent to be all over the fields all the fifme, but operators who are interested in the various fields naturally make it known to me when wells are not properly plugged, or other regulations for the protection of the field are disregarded.

"A number of such complaints are now being investigated, and the railroad commission will see that all abandoned wells are plugged as required by law.

"Operators will save considerable expense by plugging wells properly when they are abandoned, as it is very expensive to go back to a well and plug it after casing has been pulled."


