





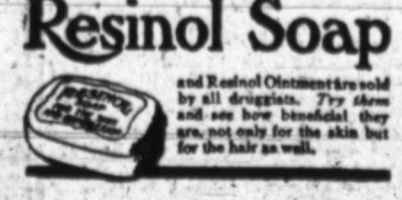

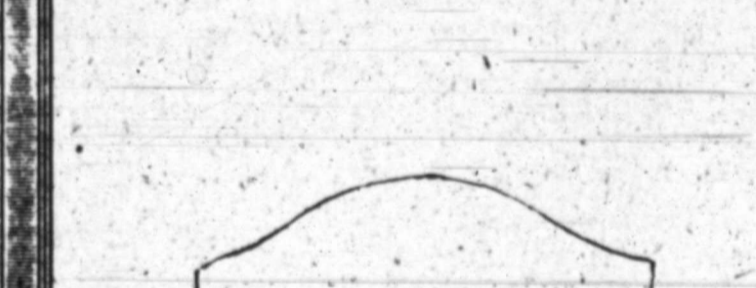

NORTHERNER DISCUSSES THE RACE QUESTION

The Dallas News of September 23 contained a communication from W. W. Sherwin of Queens, Texas, which, although written by a native of the northern state, admirably expresses the southern viewpoint of the race question.

Queens City, Texas, Sept. 28.—I am a northerner, bred and born; was a soldier of the civil war from my home state (Wisconsin); politically I am a republican, and was thoroughly inbred with the prevailing spirit of the north on the race question.

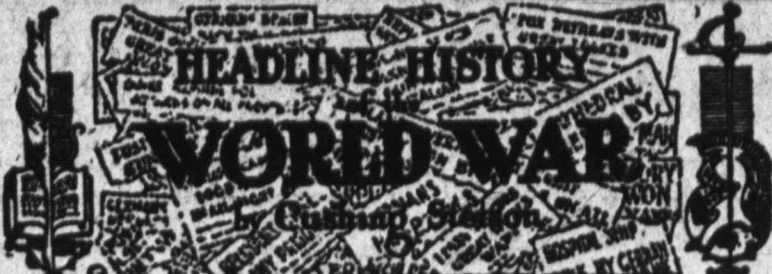
On that question I was not in accord with my people; as expressed in the language of the great commoner from Pennsylvania—Thaddeus Stevens: "It will prove a two-edged sword that will cut both ways."

South—Better for Negro. In the South, the natural habitat of the negro, and where he represents a larger per cent of the population, the case is different.

It was the great democratic sense of justice that gave freedom to the slave, and the soil of the South was drenched with the blood of thousands in the accomplishment of that result.

I have lived in Wisconsin, Minnesota, Kansas and Missouri, and for the most part, my home has been in Texas. I have observed the relations of the races in these localities, in the above named states.

During my residence in Texas I have observed that there is no racial animosity or hostility. The races dwell together in friendly and sympathetic relations, neither encroaching on the domain of the other.

but the negro has the same benefit and protection under them as does the white man. He receives the same compensation for his labor and for his products. The merchants and the banks extend him credit on the same basis as they do the white man.

The negro's rent is his land to tenants of both races on exactly the same terms. When there is any difference, the negro in most cases has the preference. If a negro is in trouble, he is given the best of advice and help from his white friends, and by the same token he generally prefers to do business with his white friends.

On the other hand, there is a tendency among some vicious and lawless blacks to commit crimes that arouse the mob spirit. The best classes of whites do not countenance mob violence, and the best class of colored people do all in his power to suppress the vicious tendencies of any of its own race, and both of these best elements of society are surely gaining ground.

Some reflections have been made as to the inferior housing of the negro that prevails in the South. This is due to the evils of the rental and landlord system that is incident to the industrial situation in all parts of our country, both North and South.

Now I want to say to the idealists of the North: "Do not interfere with the social affairs of the South. Only harm can come of it. If there is any result, it might be appalling in its consequences. Any society for the uplift and development of the negro

gro, and left alone they will live in harmonious relations. Do nothing to arouse sectional animosity again. The people of the South of both races are a bulwark of strength to be relied on in any emergency the government may be called on to face.

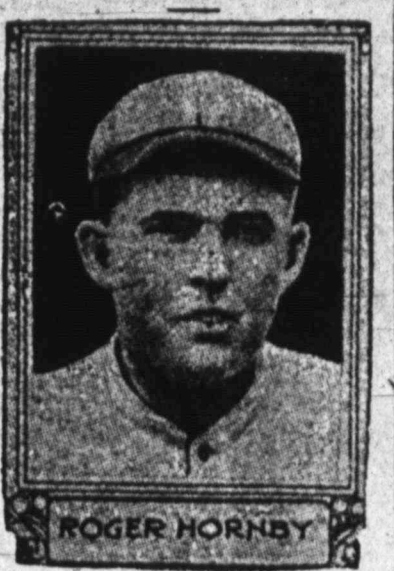

### TICKET DISTRIBUTION BEGINS AT CHICAGO

CHICAGO, Sept. 29.—Distribution of tickets for the world's series games to be played in Chicago began at Comiskey Park today. There have been more than 100,000 applications for the 18,000 boxes and reserved seats. Applicants for seats will receive in the mail tomorrow envelopes containing either their allotment cards or the checks which they sent in. Despite all precautions taken to keep the tickets out of the hands of speculators, several brokers have advertised that they will have tickets for those who will pay the advanced price. There will be 16,500 unreserved seats sold, one to each person, on the day of the first game in Chicago.

### GOVERNMENT TAX ON THE WORLD SERIES TICKETS TO TOTAL ABOUT \$18,000

WASHINGTON, Sept. 29.—The United States treasury is expediting to benefit at least \$18,000 on the world series baseball games. Each purchaser of a ticket will have to pay the customary admission tax of one cent for each ten cents or fraction thereof, which on the basis of last year's attendance will mean enough money to pay the salary of the president nearly three months. Officers of the bureau of internal revenue will go to Cincinnati and Chicago to check up the returns. Brokers, it is believed, will find the business of "scalping" tickets this

### MAJOR LEAGUE BASEBALL VIRTUALLY CLOSES SUNDAY

NEW YORK, Sept. 29.—The major league pennant races virtually closed Sunday, all of the teams having played out their schedules except the New York and Philadelphia Americans. A defeat in this contest today would drop the Yankees from third place as Detroit's victory Sunday put the Tigers a point behind New York. The two pennant winners, the Cincinnati Nationals and the Chicago Americans, had respective leads of 2 and 3 1/2 games. The Boston Americans, 1913 world's champions, finished in sixth place, just behind St. Louis. The Red Sox's loss Sunday while St. Louis was winning, made their final percentages as follows: St. Louis, 67 won, 72 lost, percentage .482; Boston, 66—71—48.1. After clinching the American League pennant Wednesday, Chicago ceased up and lost the next four games. By scoring five runs in the ninth inning last Sunday, Cleveland won its tenth straight game but Detroit interrupted its successful streak, winning Wednesday and Thursday. New York forged ahead of Detroit by winning six games out of seven while the Tigers were winning four out of five. Ruth, the Boston slugger, made two home runs during the week, bringing his season total to 29. In the National League, Cincinnati, with three regulars in the line-up, lost to Brooklyn last Sunday. The Reds won three straight from Chicago. Chicago took the fourth game yesterday. New York hit the ball hard last week, getting 24 hits in Thursday's first game with Boston.

### BREATHING SPELL FOR MEMBERS OF WHITE SOX

CHICAGO, Sept. 29.—The White Sox today enjoy a short breathing spell before starting their invasion of Holland. A short practice was ordered this morning but rain interfered. Tuesday Kid Gleason's pet will be gazing on the scene of the first world series game. The Sox board of strategy, composed of Gleason and Eddie Collins, mapped out the campaign for the big battle starting Wednesday. The final game of the season with the Tigers found the Sox loping on the job. Eddie Cicotte was given a workout for two innings to prepare him for Wednesday's game. The Tigers made three hits and a run while the Sox's best bet was on the mound. All tickets for the Chicago games which were placed on sale before the series have been grabbed up. Thousands of applications are still on hand. Those arriving too late for the first games will be given a chance at the second series in Chicago—if one is necessary. On the local "bosser" the White Sox are a heavy favorite. Odds of twenty to thirteen that the Sox will take the series are being offered. Betting has not been heavy.

### PLAY SUNDAY GAME IN FIFTY-ONE MINUTES

NEW YORK, Sept. 29.—A season record for brevity was set in the first game of Sunday's double headed between New York and Philadelphia when in 51 minutes the Giants scored a victory. New York won the second contest also. In the first game Barnes won his 25th victory, the only National League pitcher to reach that mark.

WARNED TO OBSERVE LAW

Rules Are Announced Governing Operations In Connection With Abandonment.

Many operators in the oil fields have made themselves liable for heavy penalties through failure to comply with the provisions of the law regarding the plugging of dry and abandoned wells.

In a few instances, however, operators have disregarded the law to avoid the expense of plugging their abandoned wells, thinking that they were not being watched and could evade prosecution for their negligence.

A number of such complaints are now being investigated, and the railroad commission will see that all abandoned wells are plugged as required by law.

Operators will save considerable expense by plugging wells properly when they are abandoned, as it is very expensive to go back to a well and plug it after casing has been pulled.

### SUGAR FAMINE IN PROSPECT RESULT ALLEGED SHORTAGE

Wichita Falls woke up Monday to find itself facing a sugar famine, which promises to prove very troublesome and inconvenient.

The restaurants already were cutting down the supply allowed to the cup of coffee at Monday breakfast, and some of them were doing out sugar rations, a spoon to the cup, as they did while everybody was saving sugar for the boys in France, which they didn't get.

One wholesale grocer told a Times reporter that 10 sacks of sugar arrived here Friday and that been divided as equally as possible among the retailers. No sugar has been received since it was said by this man that he did not know when any more would arrive.

The government controls the price of sugar and will not permit it being hoarded where the hoarders can be found. The charge is made here that the "big sugar people" are holding sugar until January 1, when governmental control of the price ceases, when they will boost the price to 20, 25 or even 30 cents a pound.

However, this being far from the base of supply, actual conditions governing the supply of sugar cannot be obtained.

Retail grocery stores here limited purchases this morning.

**MEN FRIGHTEN WOMAN ARE FINED \$10.00 IN POLICE COURT TODAY**

Fines of \$10 were imposed in police court Monday against two men who fought furiously and frightened a woman in the outskirts of the city Sunday afternoon. It was necessary for three police officers to exert themselves to arrest one of the men, who fought and bit even until he was in a cell at police headquarters. In the midst of the fight, a woman drove past in an automobile. One of the men leaped into the car and it was the woman's crisis for help that brought the police to the scene.

Then, in police court, too, was the daily array of vags, drunks, automobile speeders, wrong parkers, numberless autoists, disturbers and trash throwers. All of them drew fines.

**JEWIS OF CITY PLAN TO CALL A RABBI SOON AND TO BUILD A SYNAGOGUE**

For the purpose of considering the calling of a rabbi and the building of a synagogue as soon as possible, a committee was appointed Sunday afternoon at the business meeting of the Jewish congregation, held in the First Presbyterian Church. The committee consists of Dave Paul, A. Zundelowitz, Marka, Sam Kruger and Aaron Wagon.

The congregation owns the northwest corner lot at Eleventh and Burnett, and the building of a synagogue and a home for the rabbi on this lot is being considered. The entire congregation, both men and women, are to be called to hear the report.

### PRISONER ESCAPES BUT RETURNS WITH REQUEST THAT HE BE LOCKED UP

"But, why should I lock you up?" insisted Night Police Chief Scott at midnight Sunday when a man appeared with the demand that he be locked in jail.

"Well, you see, Chief, I went out while ago. I was in the cell there and there wasn't any water and some of the drunks were throwing up and the place wasn't nice, so when I saw the door wasn't locked I just walked out and got some 'body pop' and a sandwich," came the reply from L. C. Crouch, former cleaner and presser here, against whom charges of violation of the Mann white slave act were filed Saturday before U. S. Commissioner Laatz, as reported in The Times Sunday.

Crouch and two other prisoners had crawled through a hole in the cell door where the bars have been twisted out of place and never straightened. An empty box, placed in the cell as a seat, had furnished a sort of ladder to be used in getting through the hole. Incidentally Crouch's getaway proved convincingly that a man with shoulders nearly a yard across can get through a hole barely 18 inches high when necessity demands.

One man was too drunk to get out. The other two prisoners made good their escape. Money Crouch was transferred to the county jail.

### DAMAGE SUIT INVOLVES TITLE TO VALUABLE LANDS

Damages in the sum of \$12,000 and a mandatory injunction are asked in a suit filed in the Thirtieth district court Monday by J. A. Standfield and others against Chas. T. Wood et al. A preliminary statement filed with the petition sets forth that the suit is brought to establish oil and gas mineral rights to 40 acres of land in the west half of the northeast quarter of the James Walker survey.

It is claimed in the petition that the defendants will not permit the plaintiffs to enter upon the land to develop it, denying plaintiffs either ingress or egress. Judgment for the removal of cloud to the title also is sought.

The Texas Employers' Insurance association has filed suit in the same court against W. O. Moody, the action being suit on policy.

### REPRESENTATIVE MAY BE SENT TO MEETING OF THE COMMISSION SATURDAY

Dispatch of a representative to the hearing of the railroad commission at Fort Worth next Saturday to make strong representation in the matter of giving tips and fees to railroad employees to secure preferential handling of freight shipments is expected to follow consideration of this question at the meeting of the directors of the chamber of commerce at the Elks club rooms Tuesday morning. The attitude of the local body, on the question of the appointment of a terminal manager, will probably in a large measure be determined by the findings of the joint traffic committee which has been working with railroad officials as a substitute for this official, and apparently working in a highly satisfactory manner, in so far at least as the situation on the Katy is concerned. Attitude of the officials of the other road, in one or two particulars, has not yet been as satisfactory as some of the committeemen hope later to be the case.

The request of the appointment for a terminal manager at this point which is to be considered at this meeting of the commission, was made by the West Texas chamber of commerce at Fort Worth, despite the fact that officials of the local chamber of commerce, who are more closely in touch with the local situation, have agreed to give the joint committee a thorough trial before proceeding further.
