

CINCINNATI WINS GAME 9 TO 1

Judge Gary Refuses to Deal With Unions

FIRST WITNESS FOR EMPLOYEES TESTIFIES REGARDING THE ATTITUDE OF THE COMPANIES

WASHINGTON, Oct. 1.—Flat refusal to deal with union labor was made today by Judge Elbert H. Gary, chief of the United States Steel Corporation.

In face of repeated questioning, the industrial giant stood with arms outstretched on his contention that to deal with union leaders would result in the closed shop, a thing which he declared would be "injurious" to the country and prevent industrial prosperity.

Gary specifically told the committee he could not meet Samuel Gompers, or any other union leader as a representative of his employees.

When senators asked him about President Wilson's request that he confer with union leaders, Gary refused to answer and said the question should not have been asked him.

PITTSBURGH, Pa., Oct. 1.—A printed statement signed by Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor and William Z. Foster, secretary of the national committee, made public here today, declared:

The steel strike is a tremendous success. One of 370,000 steel workers are on strike.

By RAYMOND CLAPPER (United Press Staff Correspondent) WASHINGTON, Oct. 1.—Charges that the United States Steel corporation has mistreated its employees are "without a vestige of truth," Judge Elbert H. Gary, head of the corporation, declared today before the Senate Labor Committee.

Genesis of the strike and the issues involved before questioned. Gary was described as chairman for the board of directors of the United States Steel Corporation, its finance committee and the chief executive charge of the strike arrangements.

Replying to Senator Wolcott, Gary said he thought the slaying of Mrs. Snelling occurred before the strike.

MINERS AND OPERATORS BEGIN NEGOTIATING NEW WAGE SCALE

The possibility of a strike on November 1 seemed more remote than at any time since the conference began last week, following elimination of extreme propositions of both sides.

The first peace proposal came from the operators side in the motion to proceed to negotiate a new contract. # STRIKERS MAY REQUEST AID OF OTHER UNIONS

### British Government Meeting with Increased Success in Running Blockade.

### INCREASED RESTLESSNESS AMONG THE STRIKERS

### The Strictest Economy is Urged with Statement that Situation is Satisfactory.

LONDON, Oct. 1.—The strike conference at Caxton Hall, called by the transport workers and representing the majority of organized labor, voted today to send a deputation of 11 to confer with Premier Lloyd George at 3.30 p. m. today and report to the conference at 5.00. Lloyd George agreed to receive the committee.

Arthur Henderson and Robert Clynes, president of the National Union of General Workers, were included among the labor delegates.

LONDON, Oct. 1.—With the government meeting increased success in running the railway blockade, indications today were that the railway men favored a call for help from the "triple alliance" (railroad men, miners and transport workers) halting industry throughout the nation.

This was evidenced in a statement by Robert Williams, head of the transport workers' federation in calling a meeting for today.

"The transport unions are likely to become involved in the strike," Williams said, after a conference between transport executives and representatives of the National Railway Union.

Volunteers Numerous.  
Anti-strike volunteers are constantly becoming more numerous. Many sons from London's leading families are serving as porters, watchmen and other unskilled workers, declaring they wish to help in the "defense of the principle of constitutional government, which they say is menaced by the strike."

Increased restlessness is noticed among the strikers. Complaining against the government's use of military guards, one branch of the railway union has issued an ultimatum threatening to flood several tunnels and call out the tunnies pumps unless the soldiers are withdrawn within forty-eight hours.

Urges Economy.  
The government in a new statement, urged the strictest economy and reiterated that the food situation was satisfactory.

The clink from the coal shortage is tightening, however. A quarter of a million workers are idle in South Wales and it is feared that all the mines will be forced to close today.

Today the public anxiously is waiting the result of the statement of J. H. Thomas, secretary of the Railway Union, who declared:

"Hitherto we have refused the other union offers of help, but I am not going to continue refusing. I have been driven to this fight. My back is against the wall."

GLASGOW, Oct. 1.—Robert Smillie, leader of British miners and one of the speakers for the movement demanding direct action in the recent labor congress here, predicted this morning that 50 per cent of the workers of the country will be idle within a week. He declared he expected the mines, steel workers, shipyards and all factories to shut down.

# PRESIDENT DE VALERA OF "IRISH REPUBLIC" IS COMING TO TEXAS

NEW YORK, Oct. 1.—Eamonn De Valera, president of the Irish Republic, left New York for Philadelphia today on the first leg of a "swing around the circle," in which he will seek moral and financial support for the "republic," which he heads.

The trip, which will not be concluded until December 18, when Mr. De Valera is scheduled to return to New York, will take him into the states of Pennsylvania, Ohio, Kentucky, Indiana, Michigan, Illinois, Wisconsin, Iowa, Missouri, Nebraska, Colorado, Utah, Montana, Washington, Oregon, California, Arizona, Texas, Oklahoma, Arkansas, Tennessee, Mississippi, Louisiana, Alabama, Georgia, Florida, South Carolina, North Carolina and Virginia.

### ABOLISH CENSORSHIP ON TELEGRAPH LINES

PARIS, Tuesday, Sept. 30.—All restriction of the censorship applying to internal and international telegraphic communications which have been operative in France since August 1914, have been abolished, commencing tomorrow telegrams in all languages and in cipher may be filed.

VIENNA, Sept. 30.—Censorship over mails and telegraphic messages was abolished by an official order issued today.

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# NEW QUESTION NOW RAISED AS TO THE TREATY

### Want to Know What Will Happen If It Is Revised and Then Rejected.

### DEADLOCK IS REPORTED TO EXIST IN THE SENATE

### Declare If Treaty Fails Men Who Oppose It Must Bear the Full Responsibility.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 1.—Senators today were beginning to hunt the answer to this question:

"What will happen if the peace treaty is rejected either by direct Senate vote or by President Wilson's refusal to accept it with reservations which, in his estimation, destroys it?"

Many democrats declare that if the treaty fails, the men who cause its rejection must bear the full responsibility and take action to meet the situation. In such an event they expect the President would decline to initiate negotiation of another treaty with Germany, and would not go out of his way to make easier the task of negotiating such a settlement.

Deadlock Exists.  
A deadlock exists in the Senate today. One way out is for the President to yield on strong reservations. Another is for him to flatly refuse them, which might cause rejection by Senate vote. Or he could withdraw the treaty from further senate consideration or pigeon hole it when it reaches him with reservations which he considers objectionable.

Some of the President's supporters believe he may yet find a way to yield on these reservations without seeming to yield too much.

One of the most prominent democrats in the senate who has made it his business to learn the exact situation on both sides of the chamber declared recently that if senators voted their convictions, there would not be twenty Democratic votes for the treaty in its present form.

But though there are many indications that the senate will either adopt reservations or reject the treaty, the League of Nations covenant, has many enthusiastic friends today in the

Senate as it ever had. That is one reason for the strength of the reservationists, it is apparent.

Without reservations these league supporters think the treaty will be rejected and will carry with it in defeat the covenant. Hence these league friends argue, it is better to yield to the demand for reservations.

This view was expressed by Senator McCumber, the League's most outspoken friend on the Republican side and at the same time the co-author with other senators of the reservation on Article Ten.

"I want to see sixty-four votes cast for this treaty," said McCumber. "I know they won't be unless reservations are adopted. That's why I'm working for reservations."

Peace When Three Ratify.  
Senator Knox, republican, and Senator Thomas, democrat, have stated the belief that if the President pigeonholes the treaty, the status of peace with Germany will come about any way, as soon as three powers besides Germany have ratified the treaty.

They also agree in the view that the United States can resume trade relations with Germany by directing the re-establishment of the consular service then and by contracting a treaty of amity and commerce, which will have to be made in any event.

But most of Thomas' democratic colleagues differ with him and declare the United States will be technically at war with Germany until a peace treaty is concluded.

### ARE TO INVESTIGATE TICKET SCALPING

CINCINNATI, O., Oct. 1.—Cincinnati federal agent today began an investigation of alleged scalping of baseball tickets for the world's series games here. A number of Cincinnatians who are said to have bought tickets from scalpers at high prices were summoned to the office of the United States internal revenue commissioner for examination. If evidence warrants, it was said, warrants will be filed.

# MEETING TODAY TO DECIDE STRIKE OF SHIPYARD WORKERS

### NEW YORK, Oct. 1.—Members of the Metal Trades Council were to meet late today to decide whether nearly 100,000 shipyard workers in the New York district should strike to enforce their demands for a 44-hour week and a 25 per cent wage increase.

Several of the 110 shipbuilding concerns in this district already have entered a contract with the county, effective today to submit all questions of wages and hours to arbitration.

### REPORT NO CHANGE IN OKLAHOMA CITY STRIKE

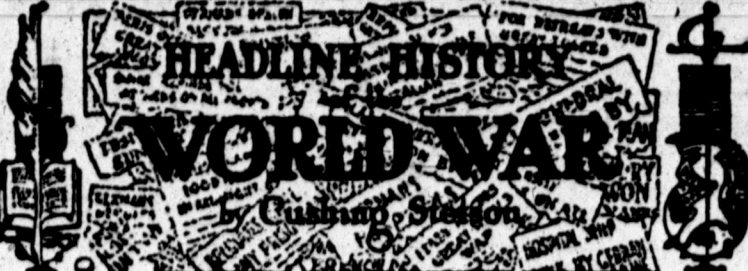
