



### TEXAS CHIEF OIL CO. WELL AND THE HARTFORD DAMAGED BY FIRE STARTED BY FLASH OF LIGHTNING

Fire, caused by a flash of lightning striking a storage tank filled with oil belonging to the Texas Chief Oil Company, on the company's lease in Block 97, northwest Burkburnett, started Saturday afternoon and at night still was burning. The fire spread to the Hartford Oil & Gas Company's property, also in Block 97, and is reported to have destroyed considerable oil, storage tanks, and the tools at the wells.

Officials of the companies could not be found Saturday night, and a correct estimate of the loss sustained could not be secured. The properties burning were north of the Livingston Oil Corporation's properties in the same block, but this company suffered no loss, it was stated at the local offices.

### REPORT OIL IN THE GRISDALE-ERICKSON TEST ON FORE FARM

Reports from the Grisdale and Erickson test on the Fore farm, northeast of Wichita Falls, a short distance, Saturday night were to the effect that oil is showing up on the slush pit, and the tools were taken out of the hole as covered with oil. According to visitors to the well no information is being given out as to the depth, or the opinion of the operators drilling the well have as to the present status.

### BURK EXTENSION IS REPORTED ON SAND AROUND 1900 FEET

The report that the Burk Extension test, five miles south of Hollister, in Tiltman county, has a sand around 1900 feet, and was preparing to test, has caused a great revival of interest in Tiltman county locally. The effect is chiefly noticeable in the stock market, where Burk Extension stock has gone from 40 to above par in a week's time. There was no definite news from the test Saturday, except that a test was in preparation at present.

### NATIONAL OIL PRODUCTS CO. SPUD IN THE FIRST WELL FIVE MILES NORTH OF CITY

On Wednesday the National Oil Products Company, backed by Pittsburgh capital, spudded in their first well on their 100 acres in the Nincebaler tract, located about two miles southeast of the Probasco and Guantee Land tracts, and about five miles north of Wichita Falls. The Probasco company now has three wells pumping oil into their storage tanks from shallow wells.

P. S. Peterkin is president of the National Oil Products Co. and will make Wichita Falls his headquarters and will give his entire time and attention to the development of his company's holdings in Wichita county. The equipment used by the National Oil Products Co. on their first well is considered to be one of the best in the field; it is standard cable tools equipped to go 4,000 feet. The company is under contract to drill their first well to a depth of 2,000 feet and will do so unless a good paying well is found at a lesser depth.

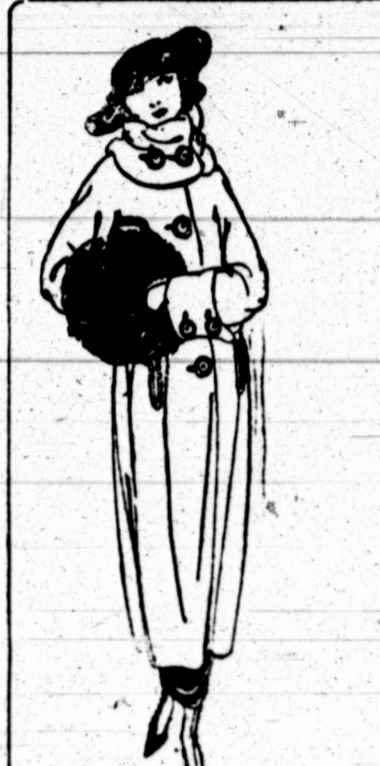

Mrs. T. E. Bressie, who told the authorities that she is wife No. 5, assisting in the investigation, is her brother, Mr. Wilemon, a prominent automobile dealer of Anson, Texas.

When Bressie was arraigned before United States Commissioner Lantz a few days ago he pleaded guilty to violation of the Mann white slave act and now is held in jail, having failed thus far to make bond.

Mrs. Bressie, No. 5, told federal authorities that Bressie has been engaged in the same line of work since this information also is being investigated.

She declared Bressie had married in Anson or that state and that she did not believe divorces had been granted every time before he took unto himself a new wife. This information, of course, was gained by the only recently, after Bressie became involved in white slaver activities and left her.

The young woman who came here with Bressie and who was arrested with him at an apartment they had rented on Fourteenth street, left the city Friday evening, saying she was going to Burkburnett. She has light hair, a rose-tinted color, and regular features forming a face very pleasing to look upon.

Friday Bressie attempted to smuggle a note out of the county jail, but the epistle was intercepted. Its contents were not made public. His plea of guilty has been binding upon his case, for he has been bound over to await the action of the federal grand jury. Should the investigation develop he has more wives than the law allows, the state will try him too.

Bressie also has been charged in county court with fornication.

### NO CONFIRMATION OF THE REPORT THAT RANGERS ARE ALREADY IN OIL FIELDS

Reports were in circulation here yesterday to the effect that Texas rangers already had been stationed in the oil fields, in compliance with a grand jury recommendation sent Governor Hobby a week or more ago by District Judge Bonner.

However, efforts to gain confirmation of the reports proved futile. Sheriff McFall said he knew nothing of the rangers' presence in the city, nor did Assistant County Attorney Martin.

Rangers were requested by the grand jury because of the lawless and vicious conditions alleged to exist in some parts of the oil fields, but as far as known no reply has been received from the governor following receipt of Judge Bonner's communication.

Phillips fell off a wagon in front of the Archer Inn, Scott avenue near Twelfth street, yesterday afternoon and received painful but not serious injuries. Phillips is an employe of the Moore-Richolt Lumber Co. He was lying on top of a load of lumber when he fell and he fell to the pavement. Several of his teeth were knocked out in contact with the asphalt and his eye lids were lacerated in an unusual manner.

### ANOTHER COAT IS BEING APPLIED TO OIL FIELD ROADS

Another coat is now being applied to the oil field road between Wichita Falls, Burkburnett and the Waggoner pool, W. M. Priddy, chairman of the central committee for this work, announced Saturday. The road has been entirely scarified and regarded since the recent rains, and with the second coat of oil now being applied will again be in top condition.

Work on this stretch from Burkburnett to the Waggoner is also progressing at a satisfactory rate. Mr. Priddy says, the road being practically finished from Burkburnett to a point beyond the school beyond that place.

An additional tractor and four Fresnoes have been purchased and added to the other equipment employed on the road, bringing the equipment bought by the central committee up to a point which will assure sufficient equipment for completion of the road and its maintenance under all conditions.

By the use of the two tractors they have purchased, the committee has been practically able to eliminate team work from the road work, the latter method having proved much more costly and less satisfactory. Purchase of much of the equipment was necessitated by the need of the county equipment, loaned for the first few weeks work on the road, in other sections of the county.

The amount of cash in hand on which the committee can call upon is running rather low, and the committee plans within the next few days to direct the solicitation of funds for the maintenance of this road. On account of the urgency for the work

It was started and rushed to completion before all had been solicited to contribute toward the work.

No solicitation whatever has been done in Burkburnett, but it is planned to visit that place early in this week, several of the prominent residents of Burkburnett having expressed a willingness to engage in this work at any time a delegation from Wichita Falls could be in Burkburnett to work with them.

In this connection, Mr. Priddy points out that operators, to whom advantage it is primarily to keep this road in condition, can co-operate advantageously with the committee in the upkeep of the road by keeping tractors and heavy loads off the road for the first few days following heavy rains.

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### DEVELOPMENTS IN AMARILLO SECTION ARE ENCOURAGING

NUMBER OF WELLS DRILLING AT AN INTERESTING AND PROMISING STAGE.

HAVE SEVERAL GAS WELLS

Active Development Began About a Year Ago Twenty-Eight Miles North of City.

AMARILLO, TEX., Oct. 4.—About two years ago a body of Amarillo citizens leased several thousand acres of land north of Amarillo. About a year ago they started a well on the lease on section 51, which is about 2 1/2 miles north of the city of Amarillo. At 1700 feet they struck a 17 foot gas sand which made between 2,000,000 and 3,000,000 feet of gas. At 1750 feet they struck another which was 20 feet thick making a little better than 3,000,000 feet. At 1892 feet they struck a 12 foot sand making 2,000,000 feet. At 2,000 foot level they struck a 10 foot making quite a good showing of oil. At 2253 feet they encountered another 16 foot sand which made another 2,000,000 feet of gas. This well was completed at 2395 feet and was in blue shale when so completed as a gas well. They then moved three-quarters of a mile south from said well and drilled a second well in which they encountered the same as above then moved three quarters of a mile east with the same result as in number one.

Another Company Drills. Another company known as the Ranch Creek Oil Co. obtained a lease south of the above wells and a distance of about three miles south of the third well above mentioned. They have drilled and encountered practically the same gas as was obtained in the above wells with a slight variation in the depth of the sand. They also got a better showing of oil in this well.

Four miles southeast of this well the Emerald Oil Co. is now drilling and have prospects of getting the same as the other wells when they get down to the proper depth.

Four miles southwest, Pat White and others, are drilling but have not as yet gotten down to the depth to obtain results. About nine miles south of the original gas well the Tuck Trigg Oil Co. is drilling at 2540 feet. They have encountered a gas sand making about 5,000,000 cubic feet of gas a day. There are several other companies now drilling adjacent to Amarillo.

Bivans Strikes Gas. The Bivans well on block 100, which is 12 miles southeast of the original gas well, is now 1520 feet deep and have struck the gas and there is no doubt at the present writing, of bringing in an oil well under this gas. They are now under-ream-

ing and will set casing and drill said well in. Twenty-five miles south of Amarillo is what is known as the Palo Duro Oil Co., which is now down about 1200 feet. They have encountered in drilling this well seven stratas of gas sand so far. The last blow-out sent the tools from 955 feet in the hole to over 100 feet above the 32 foot derrick. These tools weigh about 7200 pounds besides the cable. They are now drilling in blue lime for the last 156 feet and it is the opinion of all the geologists and oil men in this vicinity that as soon as they penetrate that blue lime they will bring in a rich oil well.

It is a well known fact that this country is a wild cat country of the wildest kind but it has proven so far to be better than any proven field, as the six wells above mentioned which have gone below 1500 feet are all producing wells. This is a record that no proven field can boast of. The Palo Duro Oil Co. is the last one slated to reach the 1500 foot mark and if this comes in a well it will mean seven straight producing wells so far in this field. Excitement is high and there is a great deal of trading going on in acreage and it is the common talk in the hotel lobbies among the oil men that it seems as if it would be impossible to get a dry hole in this field. If the Palo Duro well comes in this will prove a territory 28 miles north and 25 miles south of Amarillo.

There are some four test wells now being drilled in the Panhandle. The city of Amarillo has granted to the Buffalo Petroleum Co. a franchise to supply the city with natural gas. B. F. Yoakum and associates are now building a 2,000-barrel refinery here for the purpose of manufacturing a full line of lubricating oils, gasoline, etc. Having an abundance of cheap fuel is going to cause other manufacturers to come to Amarillo and locate as it is the best distributing point for the Panhandle district.

#### WILL DRILL WELL ON LEASE NEAR TOLBERT

VERNON, TEX., Oct. 4.—J. G. Hix of Wichita Falls, was in town one day this week, looking after his oil leases northwest of Vernon. Mr. Hix just returned from Fort Scott, Ark., where he closed a deal to drill a well 2,500 feet deep on one of his leases near Tolbert.

The people Mr. Hix is dealing with in this project are well connected, one being a prominent banker of Fort Smith, Ark., and one a son of an ex-governor of Arkansas.

This makes the third well Mr. Hix has secured for the country around Tolbert, and he states that he is now working on plans to get another well drilled.

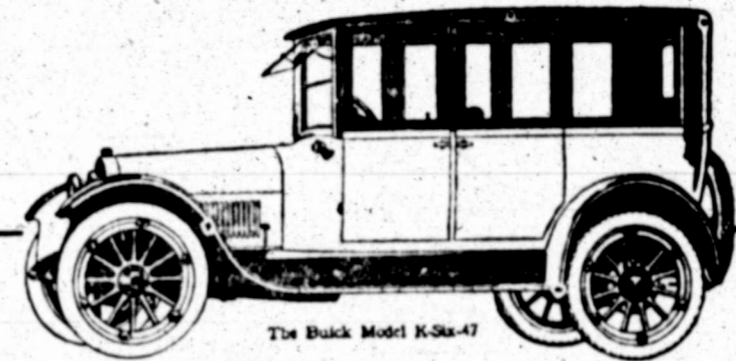

Eddie tried valiantly and drove a vicious grass cutter toward right field, but Muddy Rath saved the situation for the Reds by a startling stop and throw that beat Cicotte to the bag by half a step.

**No Longer Jinx Pitcher.**

Jimmy Ring today killed forever his title as the jinx pitcher of the Reds. The young right-hander pitched a magnificent game of ball, almost as good as that turned in yesterday by Dick Kopeck. Ring's performance registered off his delivery and one of these was a very flunky double in the second inning. Roush played Jackson's easy offering in miserable fashion, totally misjudging the ball. What should have been an easy out was turned into a two-base hit.

As a comeback pitcher Cicotte covered himself with glory. He was steady at all times and worked as well as he has in any game this season. The game was sprinkled with spectacular plays in the field. Duncan and Neale each turned a wonderful catch that cut off sure three-base hits.

In the ninth inning Helme Groh, the Sox third baseman, made a diving catch of a line drive from Muepola's bat for the final out. Buck Weaver, Sox third for the Sox, fielded in faultless style.

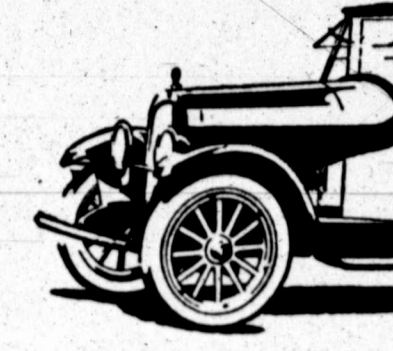

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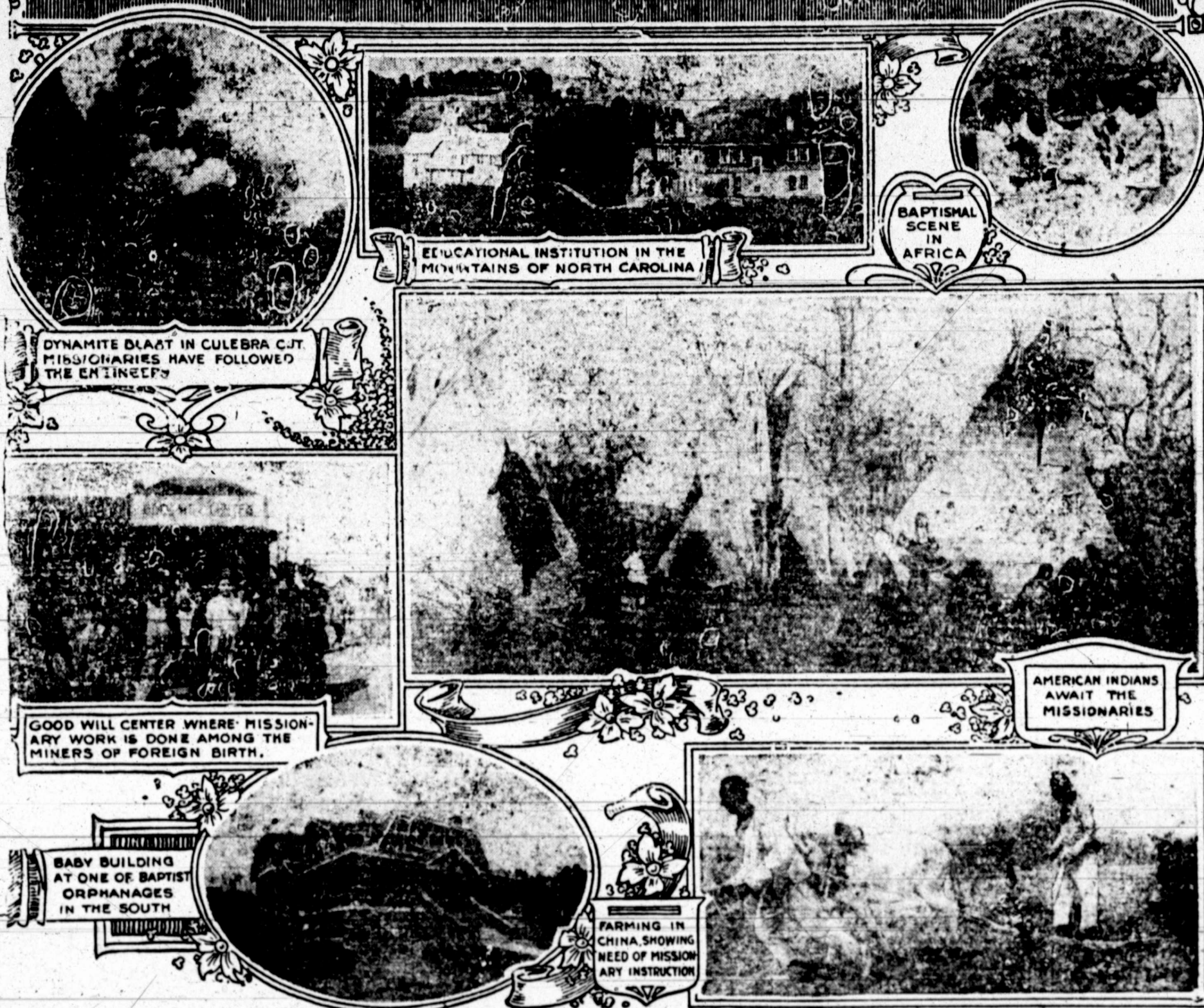

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# WHAT \$75,000,000 WILL DO



By FRANK E. BURKHALTER

Ever sit down in one of your idle moments and contemplate what could be done with \$75,000,000 in cold cash, or what you would do with it in the event you should suddenly come into possession of it through the discovery of a gold mine, a diamond bed, or more likely an oil gusher upon your property? Big sum of money, this. If Father Adam in his prime had learned the gospel of thrift and practiced it consistently by depositing \$10,000 annually in the Bank of Eden, followed the commandments of God so that he would not have tasted death, and had kept up that saving and depositing habit until today, his account would still be far below \$75,000,000, and he would have to continue to save his earnings and bank them at the rate of \$10,000 per year until January 1, 3419, before he could attain this goal. This is true, of course, provided the Bank of Eden did not pay interest on deposits, and so far as history records this was not done.

But of vastly greater significance than how long it would require to accumulate \$75,000,000 is what this money will accomplish if invested in the advancement of the kingdom of God in the world, and that is what the Baptist 75 Million Campaign proposes to do with it.

**Big Task is Confronted.**

Too big a sum to be asked at one time, did you say? It is a big sum, but not too large to meet the urgent world needs which the Baptists must help supply, nor is it in excess of what the Baptists can do during the next five years if they once get an adequate vision of their opportunity and the world call to them.

And what will this much money do during the five-year program over which its pay-out and expenditure will be extended?

Briefly stated, it will help build up the waste places at home, strengthen the hands of the missionaries in the foreign fields that are occupied already, make possible a large part in the spiritual reconstruction of Europe and the opening up of mission work in the needy fields in other parts of the world which have not been entered before. Then it will strengthen the Christian educational institutions so as to enable them to do a still larger work in furnishing the world with Christian leaders, both men and women, for the critical times through which the world is passing. Orphanages will be enlarged so as to make it possible to care for the 5,000 fatherless and motherless children who are crying for admission, and Christian hospitals will be enlarged and better equipped for rendering to the sick and suffering the aid and relief for which they are calling.

Other fields provided for. And what of the other mission fields of the world? They are not to be overlooked in this campaign. The sum of \$15,000,000 for the next five years, or an average of \$3,000,000 a year, will be expended on them in sending more missionaries, more Christian teachers, doctors and nurses, in providing comfortable and sanitary homes for the missionaries, houses of worship for struggling congregations, Christian schools for the education of the

young people and the training of Christian workers of all classes, and hospitals for the relief of human suffering.

Probably you are accustomed to thinking of China as a vast aggregation of laundries, proprietors of chop suey restaurants and coolies; of Japan as a many-eyed brown men, smooth but unprincipled designers upon their less aggressive neighbors; upon Brazil as a vast collection of dark peoples of the tropics who are all right in their place but who have no legitimate claim upon the rest of the world; or upon Mexico as one big family of banditti, "greasers," and makers of hot tamales, chile and revolvers.

If so, you are not informed. Out of the ignorance, superstition and backwardness of China there have come some of the finest Christians the world has ever known. The light and love of the gospel have made new creatures of them; life has taken on an entirely different aspect in regard to everything since God came into their souls; they have espoused the Christian religion under circumstances that required heroic sacrifice; and they have been the service of God in a manner that would make many an American Christian ashamed of himself were all the facts known. These Chinamen consecrate their money as well as their lives to God, once they have accepted the gospel. They give freely to the support of the Christian institutions of every character in their own country and are helping to send these blessings to the peoples of other lands. And what is true of the native Christians of China may be said, also, of those in Japan, Brazil, Mexico, Argentina, Africa, Panama, Cuba, Italy, Russia, Bohemia and wherever else the gospel has been carried to the people. Surely money invested in the redemption of people who contribute so much to the kingdom of God is wisely expended.

**What Year's Labors Produced.**

Indicative of the visible results obtained by the 316 missionaries maintained by the Southern Baptist convention on foreign fields last year, 5,635 baptisms were reported, 41 new churches constituted, two churches became self-supporting, a total of \$173,372 was contributed to various purposes by the native Christians, 128,258 treatments were given by the medical missionaries, human suffering was relieved in other ways, the seed of the gospel was sown in many places and the borders of Christ's kingdom were extended a little further in all the lands which are occupied. But when it is recalled that these missionaries are laboring among practically half the people of the globe the

inadequacy of their numbers can be readily realized. The Foreign Mission Board needs to employ 200 additional missionaries at once.

**Home Missions Gets \$12,000,000.**

But important as is foreign missions, it has no monopoly on the fund that is being raised by the Baptist 75 Million Campaign. A total of \$12,000,000 has been apportioned to home missions, which, briefly stated, includes the mission work in Panama and Cuba; reaching the foreigners in the homeland with the gospel; caring for the needs of the million Mexicans in the Southwest; uplifting the Negroes; working among the Indians, many of whom are located in the Southwest; the maintenance of schools in the mountainous territory of the South where there have been but very few public high schools; helping the weak churches in the remote districts and in the large centers of population in securing houses of worship; evangelizing the masses in the congested cities; and enlisting them in the work of the kingdom; and various other phases of work of an inter-state character which can be done more advantageously by the Home Mission Board than by the several state mission boards.

**13,000,000 Are Not Christians.**

To the task of state missions the sum of \$11,000,000 has been apportioned in this campaign. Few persons who have not had an opportunity to make an intimate study of this situation have any comprehension of the enormity of the need here. Accurate information just compiled at the headquarters of the campaign reveals the fact that there are approximately 13,000,000 white people of 12 years of age and older in the territory of the Southern Baptist convention who are not Christians. Reaching the people at our own doors should certainly receive earnest and immediate consideration, the leaders in the campaign urge.

**\$20,000,000 Goes to Education.**

With the exception of foreign missions, the largest apportionment that has been made by the campaign to any single interest goes to Christian education. This interest drawing \$20,000,000 during the next five years, or \$4,000,000 per year. There are 122 Baptist academies, colleges, universities, seminaries and training schools in the South and all of them are in need of larger equipment, and the more advanced institutions more especially, of an adequate endowment to enable them to perform their duty to the 12,000,000 young men and women who attend them annually.

**5,000 Orphans Ask for Home.**

Baptists have sought to discharge

their obligation to the fatherless and motherless children of the South by the establishment of orphan homes in fifteen states. Approximately 5,000 orphan children are being sheltered, fed, clothed, educated and trained for life and service in these institutions and a vast service to society is thus being rendered, but the pathetic side of the situation is that fully 5,000 more orphan children are on the waiting lists of these institutions, anxious to be admitted to the privileges there, but the lack of room is such that the doors must remain closed to them until the homes are enlarged. No more Christly task confronts Southern Baptists than the enlargement of their orphanages to the point where homes and practical Christian training can be provided for all orphan children who desire to enter, regardless of creed or sect. To make a worthy start in the accomplishment of this task during the next five years the sum of \$4,700,000 has been apportioned by the campaign and every cent of this will be needed.

**Plan Relief of Human Suffering.**

Fourteen hospitals operated by Baptists in the Southern states find themselves unable to meet the demands made upon them because of inadequate equipment and facilities. The demand for charity work is very, very great and will always be so, and it is work of this character that probably needs most to be done because of the inability of the sufferers to go elsewhere. Thousands of men, women and children have been relieved of suffering and placed upon the road to health and larger usefulness and happiness for themselves and the world through the instrumentalities of these hospitals and the sum of \$4,800,000 apportioned from the campaign for the strengthening of these institutions will be expended in a manner that will help those in charge do the work which Christ loved so much to do while on earth in giving sight to the blind and hearing to the deaf and enabling the lame to walk.

To succeed in raising this huge sum of money for purely spiritual purposes will make it necessary that Baptists have a larger vision than they have had before; a larger realization of the world's need of the gospel and of the service which Christ commanded His children to give to their fellowmen; a deeper spirit of prayer and consecration; a readier spirit of sacrifice; and a deeper love for the souls of men. There is no question about the ability of Baptists to do the job. They have been wonderfully favored with material blessings for many years. It is only a question of their will to do the thing.

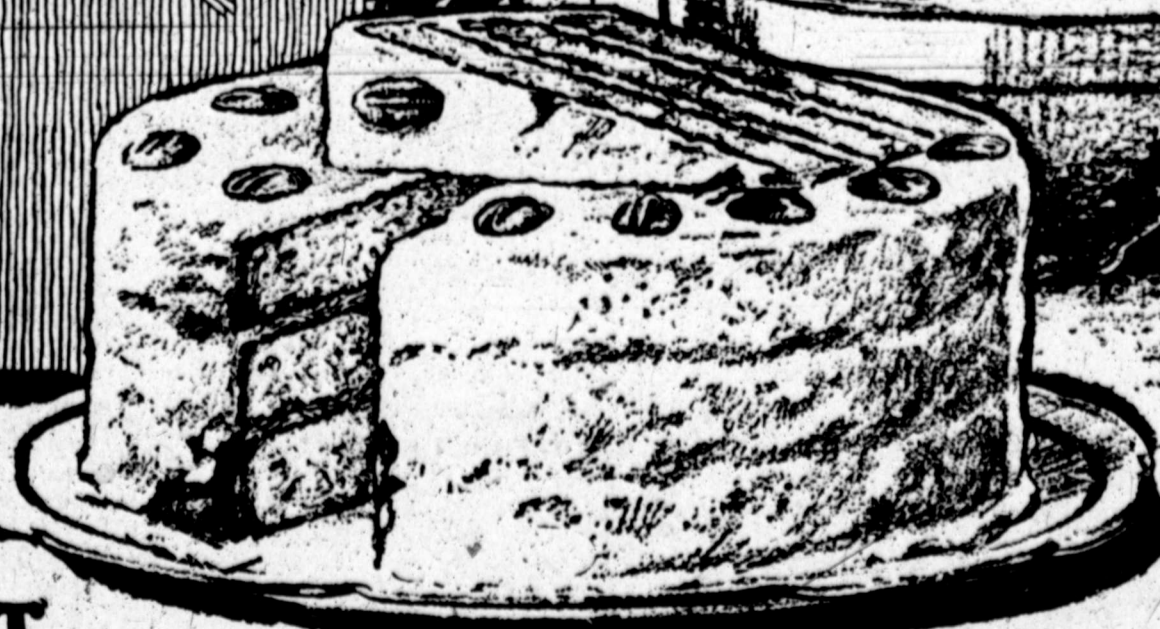

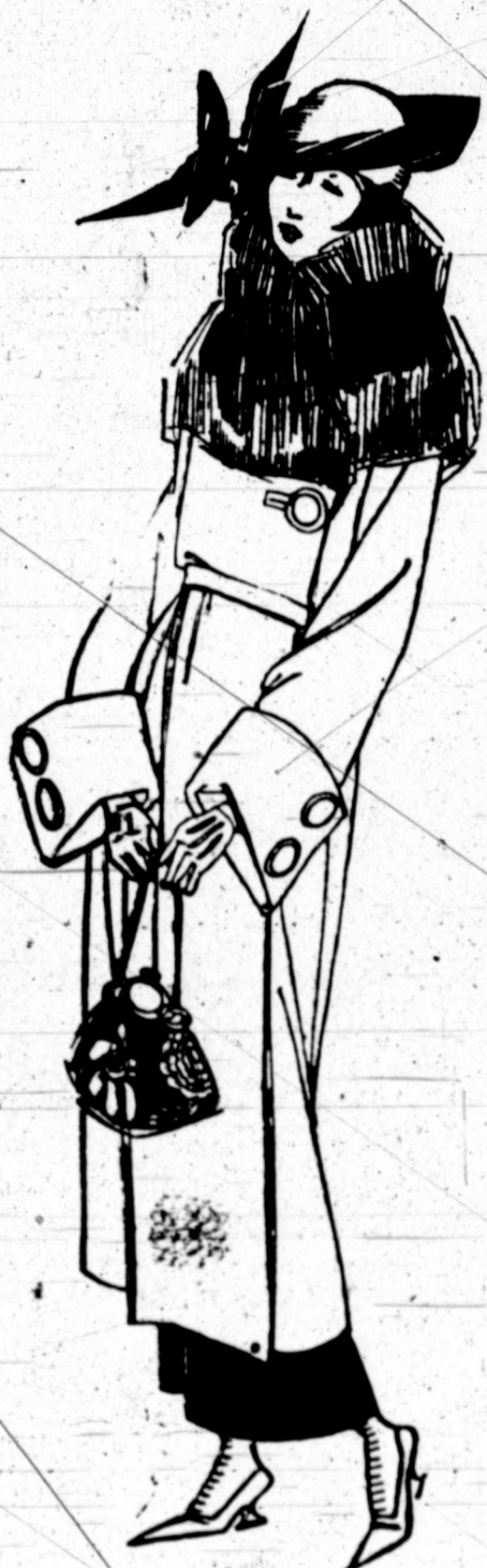

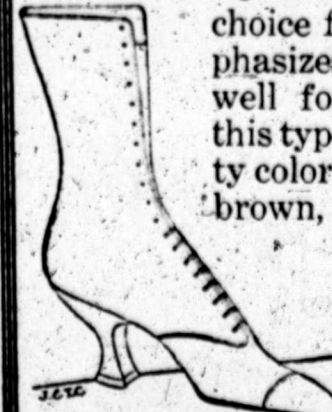

# GOODFELLOW TENDERS HIS RESIGNATION AS DEPUTY U. S. MARSHAL

## CHAIRMAN OF CITY EQUALIZATION BOARD ISSUES A STATEMENT

Robert L. Goodfellow yesterday tendered his resignation as deputy United States marshal for the Wichita Falls division of the northern district of Texas to J. A. Baggett, U. S. Marshal for the northern district. The resignation is to take effect immediately after Mr. Goodfellow is relieved although the resignation came as such a surprise no mention has been made as to any likely successor for him.

In his letter of resignation, Mr. Goodfellow explained that the salary the office pays is not at all commensurate with the excessive cost of living here. He adds that he is assistant commissioner of police and desires to devote his entire attention to that office, the remuneration being larger and the position more satisfactory.

The resignation means, in effect, that Mr. Goodfellow will devote his whole time to directing the affairs of the police department, which has grown to twice its former size under his administration. He will maintain an office at the city hall—the same quarters he has been using—but he will be there regularly in the future rather than spasmodically as he has been because of the duties of the marshal's office.

**Urged to Continue.**  
It is expected that Marshal Baggett will accept the resignation, although it is known that pressure was brought to bear not to have it tendered. However, the duties of the two offices, that of assistant police commissioner and deputy marshal, have grown until combined, they are burdensome, almost irksome, and enough time could be devoted to neither he held both, to do either satisfaction, said Mr. Goodfellow.

More "pep" will be injected into the police department and its organization will be more satisfactorily perfected along lines maintained in the larger cities. Mr. Goodfellow explained that Wichita Falls has grown until the police affairs of the 50,000 or more people must be handled in a strictly business and progressive way. He has several plans for the betterment of the department which he wishes to inaugurate, among which is the establishment of the detective bureau with a merit system and other modern necessities in approved methods of dealing with crime and conditions generally, including traffic affairs, in a city the size of this one, and the work will require his undivided attention.

Mr. Goodfellow has been deputy U. S. Marshal here for three years. He was appointed by Captain "Bill" McDonald and has served continuously since. His work has been highly praised by U. S. judges and other federal officials and there were many expressions of regret when it became known among the federal folks at the courthouse yesterday that he had resigned. He long has been an officer, having served Coleman county as sheriff previous to moving to Wichita Falls.

His letter of resignation follows:  
Wichita Falls, Texas, Oct. 3, 1919.  
Hon. J. A. Baggett,  
United States Marshal, Dallas, Tex.  
My dear Sir: In tendering my resignation as Deputy U. S. Marshal of the Wichita Falls division, I assure you that I do this with the kindest feeling and a sincere regret. The reason for doing this is that the salary is entirely inadequate, considering the cost of living in this city, which is much higher than at other places in the state on account of the tremendous oil development and the consequent rapid growth of the city. I am now assistant police commissioner here and must reluctantly tender my resignation as Deputy Marshal to become effective at your earliest convenience.

The following statement has been received from J. B. Fitts, chairman of the city board of equalization, in connection with the criticism of W. Newton Maer at the Wichita Club last week directed against the city board of equalization:

"Mr. Maer criticized this board and said that they were not posted, and that they were incompetent to sit on the board of equalization. I will agree with Mr. Maer that I am not as well posted on the values of real estate in the City of Wichita Falls as some other real estate dealers, however, I tried different real estate men to get their assistance in equalizing the taxes for the city, but their answers were all the same: 'I am too busy.' We have done the very best that we could, treating all property owners with the same due consideration. Mr. Maer received the same treatment at the hands of this board as any other tax payer in the city.

"Mr. Maer rendered lot 6, block 174, at \$20,000. The board raised the valuation of this lot to \$35,000. If I have been correctly informed, Mr. Maer sold this same piece of property for \$25,000.

"The Kemp Kort, in which Mr. Maer is interested, was valued at \$60,000. The same building is bringing its owners an income of \$1,350 per month, or \$16,200 per annum. Figure for yourself and see whether you think the board of equalization placed too high a value on this property.

"Mr. Maer's home place was rendered at \$5,000 and raised by the board to \$5,000. This vacant lot without any improvements at all is worth \$5,000.

"If Mr. Maer is not satisfied with the decision of the board of equalization, I have a party who will take his property off his hands at double the amount at which it was valued. I will agree with Mr. Maer that he is a large property owner and his taxes will be heavy, but that he has the goods, and must pay his pro rata part of the taxes, as well as any other citizen. Mr. Maer should be the last man to criticize this board raising the taxes. He has always advocated more improvements and greater Wichita.

"The town of Wichita Falls has grown from 20,000 to more than 50,000 people in the past 12 months and it is absolutely necessary to double the city rendition for the city administration to carry on the much needed improvements.

"When I called Mayor Mariow's attention to Mr. Maer's remarks in regard to the city board of equalization being ignorant and not posted on the value of real estate, his only remark was: 'Suckers roar is music to the gambler's ear.' It will leave part of the public to decide for themselves as to whether the city board of equalization has been fair and impartial to Mr. Maer, and whether this board is as ignorant as Mr. Maer would have them believe.


"If I am not out of order, I now place Mr. Maer's name in nomination for the chairman of the city board of equalization for the year 1920."

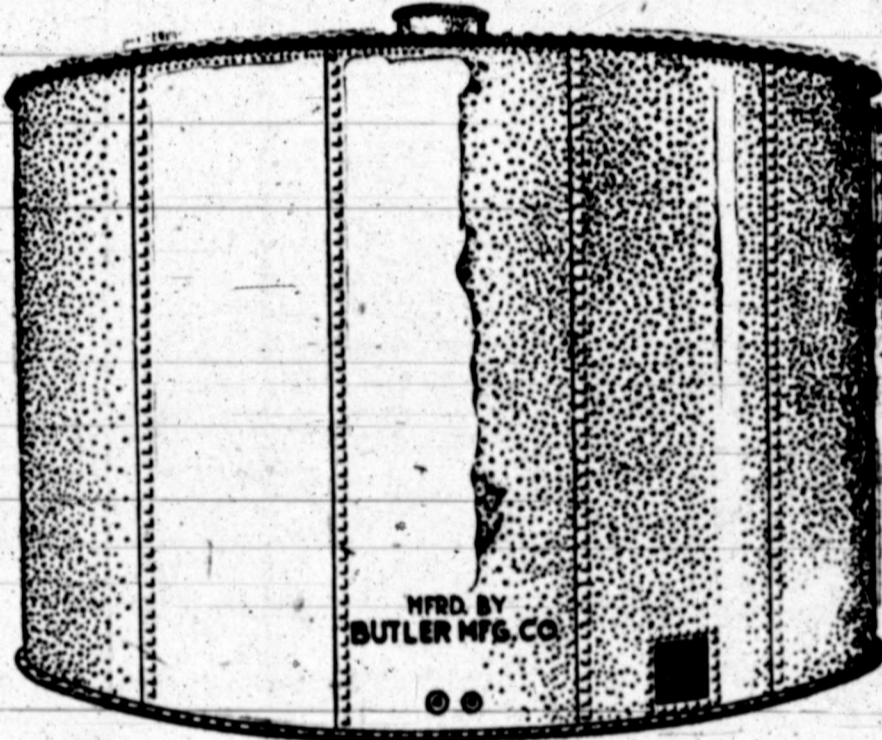
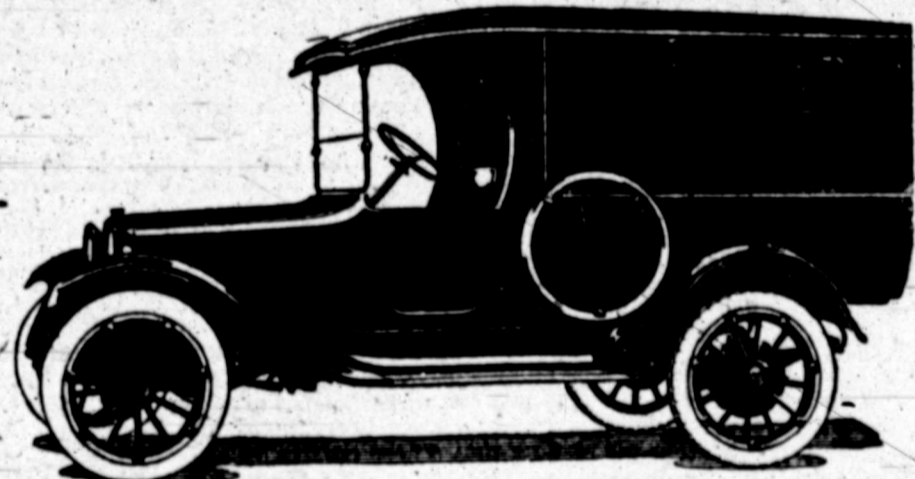

PETITIONS FOR CREATION OF WATER IMPROVEMENT DISTRICT TO BE PRESENTED ON MONDAY

Petitions asking for the creation of a water improvement district embracing the city of Wichita Falls for participating in the building of the Big Wichita irrigation project for the purpose of securing an additional water supply, will be presented to the commissioners court when they meet Monday for their October session.

will secure an additional supply of water which will be ample under all conditions of extended growth for a city of 150,000 or 200,000 people, in addition to providing a certain supply for the city under present conditions.

In actual practice, however, it is not expected that the water supply will cost the city district more than 12 or 13 cents on the hundred, for the bonds will be issued only as the work progresses, and during the first two years only sufficient taxes will be necessary to provide for interest and sinking fund on part of the bonds.

Signatures to the petition asking for the creation of the district were circulated Saturday and almost a score of times the necessary number of signatures were secured shortly after the circulation of the petition was begun.

Following the creation of this district by the commissioners court, the procedure will entail an election to name an executive board to administer the affairs of the district in much the same manner as the school trustees of an independent school district, and for the issuance of bonds to carry through the building of the project.

Under the plan favored at the recent mass meeting, the proposition stands for the city district to vote bonds for the building of the entire project, some \$500,000 and for the irrigation district, which will take in the 150,000 acres of farm land to be irrigated, to vote bonds for two-thirds of this amount, to be turned into the treasury of the city district to pay for the water right on the farm lands, and to be used in retiring the bonds of the city district and paying the interest charges thereon.

Report on the Geological Structure of the Dale Pasture Tract, between Dean and Petrolia in Clay county, Texas:

GENERAL: The examination of the acreage upon which this report is based was made in July, 1919, although I had previous to that time visited the property and examined the same when following up geological structures on adjoining land.

NEAREST PRODUCTION: About a mile north of your land good producing oil wells are on the Martin and Walker Tract No. 58, and to the east about one and one-half miles is the well-known oil field of Petrolia, where hundreds of wells have been producing profitably for about nine years.
