## Fire, caused by a flash of lightning BURK EXTENSION IS REPORTED ON SAND ARDUND 1900 FEET

NUMBER OF WELLS DRILLING AT AN INTERESTING AND PROMISING STAGE.

HAVE SEVERAL GAS WELLS

Active Development Began About a Year Ago Twenty-Eight Miles. North of City.

AMARILLO, TEX., Oct. 4.—About two years ago a body of Amarillo citizens leased several thousand acres of land north of Amarillo. About a year ago they started a well on the lease on section 61, which is about 25 miles north of the city of Ama-28 miles north of the city of Amarillo. At 1700 feet they struck a 17 foot gas sand which made between 2,000,000 and 3,000,000 fet of gas. At 1780 feet they struck another which was 20 feet thick making a little better than 3,000,000 feet. At 1892 feet they struck a 12 foot sand making 3,000,000 feet. At 2,000 foot level they struck a 10 foot making quite a good showing of oil. At 2253 feet they encountered another 16 foot sand which made another 2,000,000 feet of gas. This well was comfeet of gas. This well was com-pleted at 2395 feet and was in blue shale when so completed as a gas well. Another Company Drills.

Another company known as the Ranch Creek Oil Co. obtained a lease south of the above wells and a dis-tance of about three miles south of the third well above mentioned. They have drilled and encountered practically the same gas as was obtained in the above wells with a slight variation in the depth of the sand. They also got a better showing of oil in this well.

Four miles southeast of this well the Emerald Oil Co. is now drilling and have prospects of getting the same as the other wells when they get down to the proper depth.

They are now drilling in blue lime for the last 156 feet and it is the opinion of all the geologists and oil men in this vicinity that as soon as they penetrate that blue lime they will bring in a rich oil well.

The Palo Duro Oil Co. is the last one slated to reach the 1500 foot mark and if this comes in a well it will mean seven straight producing wells so far in this field. 





A. recreation secretary and acting general secretary, plans were made to secure emergency rooms, where a girl may find a night's lodging, when she is unable to secure accommodations down town. Frequently, Miss Clark states, the Y. W. C. A. is visited by girls who have just come to town, who have no place to stay, and at times it is almost impossible for the Association secretaries to secure them rooms. Under the arrangements made by the employment chairman some rooms. under the arrangements made by the employment chairman some rooms have been secured and others will be secured, as soon as personal solicitation can be made, where the newcomer can find accommodations in homes of the city. Mesdames J. W. Culbertson, W. W. Silk, Charles Pogenpohl and C. W. Beavers have already promised a room in their homes for this purpose. A. an employment bureau thatswill be glad to serve them, the committee states.

Report on the Geological Structure of the Dale Pasture Tract, between Dean and Petrolia in Clay county,

GENERAL: The examination of the acreage upon which this report is based was made in July, 1919, although I had previous to that time visited the property and examined the same when following up geological structures on adjoining land.

NEAREST PRODUCTION: About a mile north of your land good producing oil wells are on the Martin and Walker Tract No. 58, and to the east about one and one-half miles is the well-known oil field of Petrolia, where hundreds of wells have been producing profitably for about nine years.

OIL HORIZONS: The production to the east of your tract is found in six different shallow pay sands at depths of 275, 300, 440, 650, 750 and 800 feet; and in several deeper sands. The upper or shallow sands are evidently in the Permian formation, while the deeper sands are, according to the logs of the wells drilled, in the Pennsylvanian, which is the best oil bearing formation of this section of the Mid-Continent field.

STRATIGRAPHY The surface rocks are sand-stones belonging to the Wichita or lower members of the Permian; the exposures, which are few, show the sand-stones to be composed of spherical grains of uniform size, soft and pliable, similar to those of Louisiana. The largest oil producers come from unconsolidated, loose beds of sand, as in Northern Louisiana, California, Roumania, Salonica and Russia. This sand-stone has about 20% theoretical porosity and analysis shows insipiated hydro-carbons, indicating a high paraffin base of

The erosive forms show that the Permian overlaps the Pennsylvanian and I believe that this latter formation can be reached at about 1850 to 1450 feet.

STRUCTURE: There is clear evidence of a good structure or "anticline" on your acreage. The determination of the dips to the north and northwest, west, south and southwest, can be found on the exposed sand-stone ledges and a marked southwest dip is indicated.
