Each group would decide in caucus, by majority vote, how it should cast its ballot on any proposition. Then on the floor each three groups would cast one vote and unanimous vote of all three would be necessary to pease any proposition.

"Round Table" Accumed.

Opponents to this scheme assumed it was President Wilson's idea, in summoning the conference, to have a "round table" discussion on every proposition to clear the atmosphere and eradicate misunderstandings and that his plan was to have individuals, not groups wete.

The Rules committee's proposals were to be disposed of at this afternoon's session. Until this body's suggestions are adopted, or some other method of proceedure adopted, the conference is at a standstill as far as solving the nation's industrial problems is coherned.

Before the committee's report was made, Franklin K. Lane, secretary of the Interior, was elected permanent chairman.







AUSTIN, Oct. 7.—Attention of hunters is called to important and material changes, as well as differences, in State and federal game laws, in a statement by the Game, Fish and Oyster Department. Most important of these is that the federal law now forbids the shooting of curiew and upland plover, and fixes a dally bag limit of 25 on doves. The State law allows a maximum of but 15 doves. The new bag limits and open seasons follow:

Deer, three bucks, from November 1 to December 31.

Turkey, three gboblers, March 1 to April 30.

Doves, 15 per day, September 1 to

April 30.

Quait or Mexican pheasants, 15 per day, December 1 to January 31.



Rear Admiral W. F. Fullam, United States Navy, says :- "It is probable that a complete revolution in naval architecture will be forced upon us to the near future and that the present types of dreadnoughts and battle cruisers will be driven from the sea. There are five different methods of attack that involve the possible destruction of the immense and costly ships that are now regarded as the measure of sea power. 1. The plunging fire of modern guns at extreme ranges of 16,000 yards and above. 2. Attack by stroyers. 5. Torpedoes fired from torpedo-planes. The decks and upper works of modern ships are completely vulnerable to the plunging fire of big guns as well as to bombing airplanes. Aircraft will not only constitute dangerous offensive weapons in themselves, but they will contribute greatly to the accurate and effective use of a ship's guns in battle. They will be of double value, and from present indications airplanes will soon become one of the most invincible elements in sea power."



Our coffee business increased enormously and I soon bought a power roaster and continued to roast coffee until I quit the grocery business. In fact, the coffee business crowded the grocery business out and in the spring of 1915 I moved to 824 Indiana avenue and established the BERT BEAN COFFEE HOUSE, wholesale and retail, and now my fast increasing business demands larger and better facilities and so I have built a thoroughly modern plant back at the old "stamping grounds" at the corner of Ohio and Sixth and after moving will supply the trade through the grocer, but will continue to furnish them coffees FRESH FROM THE ROASTER each day.
