Will Take Up Extensions of Credit With Outside Banks to Prevent Forced Sales.

Backing from the banks of Wichita Falls to the efforts of the Wichita Falls Oil Association to prevent the selling of crude oil in this district below the posted price for mid-continent fields, is promised in the following let-ter addressed to the executive com-mittee of the association:

Gentlemen:
"All of the Wichita Falls banks fully realize the unusual conditions in the Northwest Burkburnett field, brought about by the inability of the pipe line companies and railroads to move the oil. We understand at this time the total capacity of the trunk pipe lines and railroads will not smount to more than about fifty per cent of the production.

pipe lines and railroads will not amount to more than about fffty per cent of the production.

"It will, in our opinion, be extremely unwise for the producers to sell oil below the posted market price. We will make every reasonable effort to take care of the needs of our customers and avoid the necessity of any of them giving their oil away. The Burkburnett oil is indeed so rich in gasoline and kerosine contents that it should be worth above \$2.25 per barrel. We understand, though, that in an effort to get their oil moved, many operators have been selling their oil below this price. We will strongly support any movement seeking to correct the demoralized conditions being caused by the congestion, which congestion, we are led to believe will be cleared up in the course of the next sixty or ninety days.

"We will be very glad to assist any operators in this field by taking up with outside banks, to whom the operators may be indebted, the question of granting extensions needed under such conditions, thus avoiding the necessity of forced sale of oil.
