

GAS SHORTAGE HERE DURING THIS WINTER IS EXPECTED BY CO.

ONE STAR GAS CO. ADVISES LAYING IN FUEL SUPPLY FOR COLDEST WEATHER.

OKLAHOMA GAS DIMINISHING

Decrease in Flow From Walters and Fox Fields Much Faster Than Was Expected.

Despite earlier advices to the contrary, Wichita Falls is expected to face a gas shortage this winter, according to a letter received by Manager Kenney of the North Texas Gas company from the Lone Star Gas company, the parent company.

The letter suggests that consumers fortify themselves for an emergency by laying in a stock of fuel.

Shortage of labor and materials, and failure to develop new wells in the Oklahoma field which supplies this section is responsible for the situation, the letter states.

The communication points out, however, that the supply of gas is ample at this time to care for domestic business throughout the system, which takes in Dallas and other north and north central Texas cities, and that consumers may also expect an adequate supply through the winter except during the coldest weather.

During the summer the supply from the big wells in the Walters and Fox fields in Oklahoma appeared large enough to care for winter consumption, according to this letter, but the flow is now diminishing faster than was expected.

Drilling operations have been carried on extensively in the hope that newer and bigger wells would be developed, but instead of gas they have been throwing up oil.

To meet conditions brought about by the depletion of the wells, ten compressors were ordered for installation early in the summer. They were to be delivered July 15. Labor troubles held them up, however, and further promises for early delivery this fall could not be fulfilled for the same reason. It appears improbable now that delivery will be made before January or February and probably later, according to the letter.

A line to West Texas fields was to have been put under construction August 1, and completed by December 1, but owing to a shortage of labor and materials, it is unlikely that this source of supply will be opened up before next spring. A 12-inch line to Walters field was begun recently and was to have been completed this month, but it was found that the wells with which it was to be connected were of oil and not gas.

No suffering is expected until the coldest weather in winter, and if consumers take steps to obtain other fuel to care for the probable shortage during these periods, it is expected that conditions will be greatly relieved.

CONNER WELL HITS THE TEXHOMA SAND WEST OF THE DANIELS

W. E. Conner has picked up the Texhoma sand, a mile and a quarter west of the Texhoma's original well on the Daniels, in his No. 1 H. Beach, and is today reported setting casing preparatory to completing. This well is in the north end of the Beach tract and is 2,000 feet south of the Texhoma well on the Dodson that opened up the 1,200 foot sand in the South Burnett district.

The Texhoma wells had made a diagonal line of a mile and a half extent of the 1,200 foot sand, northwest and southeast, and this Conner well broadens the line considerably. Various other tests in this district promise further extensions, in a short time, and there is much interesting speculation here, as in every locality where a new sand is picked up, as to the direction the sand takes, and the width and depth of the pool.

The Texhoma has made three new locations, two on the Daniels, and the third on the Dodson, offsetting the W. E. Conner well, reported above. The Black Burnett Oil Co.'s No. 1 Roller, south of the Texhoma operations, is drilling around 720 feet, according to reports from the field, while another test on the Roller lands, the Bay City Oil Co.'s No. 1 Roller, is drilling around 600 feet.

The White Oil Co. is rigging up over an old hole, abandoned at 1,000 feet two years ago on the Beach, and will drill for the Texhoma sand.

MAYOR CONSIDERING APPOINTMENT NEGRO AS POLICE OFFICER

MAY SUBMIT NAME OF NEGRO FOR APPOINTMENT AS POLICEMAN TO COUNCIL.

WILL NOT ARREST WHITES

To Be Especially Detailed for Work Among the Negro Population.

It is likely that when the city council meets tonight Mayor Marlow will present for confirmation the name of a negro who he is appointing as a police officer. At 3:00 o'clock Thursday afternoon the mayor had not made his selection, but was awaiting a recommendation from a meeting of the better element of negroes, which took place Tuesday night and at which, it is understood, a negro for policeman was agreed upon.

Under the mayor's plan the mere appointment of a negro on the police force will not be conducive of racial hatred. The mayor plans to have the negro stationed in the negro part of the city in "the flats" and have him detailed to arrest only negroes. He will have no authority to arrest white persons, said the mayor, but will call for a white officer should he find that such arrests are necessary.

The negro copper would be especially detailed on negro vice cases, it was said.

A representative of a grading machinery company of Dallas will appear before council with a view of selling street graders and other street working machines and it is expected that a program of street improvement and civic beautification soon will be mapped out and inaugurated.

SUIT GROWING OUT OF THE DEATH OF JACK KNIGHTSTEP FILED IN DISTRICT COURT

An echo of the accident in which Jack Knightstep was killed by touching an iron building which was charged with electricity at the Wichita Cotton Oil Company's plant here July 29 was heard in District Clerk Kerr's office this morning when the law firm of Chancellor & Bryan filed suit against the Wichita Falls Electric Co. for \$1,666.67.

The petition alleges that the plaintiffs were the duly authorized attorneys for Mrs. Knightstep to collect any damages that might be due from the defendant company through its alleged negligence in letting its heavily charged wires come in contact with the building, thus charging it. The plaintiffs exhibit a contract they had with Mrs. Knightstep by the terms of which they were to receive one-third of any sum she might receive in damages from the defendant company.

They assert that on September 30, the company settled with Mrs. Knightstep for \$5,000, negotiating directly with her and ignoring the attorneys in the transaction. They claim a third of the \$5,000 was due them, and they bring suit against the company for the \$1,666.67.

Other suits filed today include the following: B. F. Nix et al. vs. J. B. Thomas, trespass to try title and for \$30,000 damages alleged to have accrued through the occupancy of certain property by the defendant, upon which annual rentals should have been paid in the sum of \$10,000, it is alleged.

C. W. Cramer et al. vs. the Clauffield Oil & Gas Co., and J. W. Clabby, suit to cancel lease.

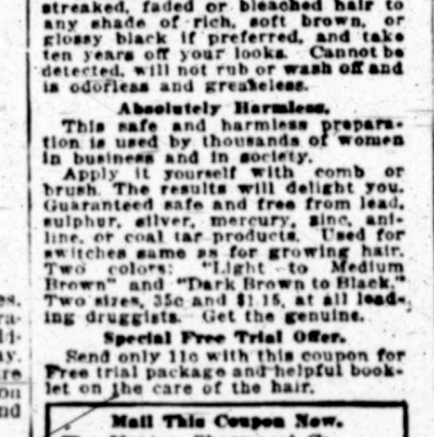

ACCEPTING RESPONSIBILITY. It was a favorite and a very effective argument of republican leaders, in connection with the so-called Philippine question more than a score of years ago that the United States had incurred responsibilities and duties in the Philippines which we could not evade or shift if we would.

Our republican friends were right then and we are glad to admit it. Not so long ago republican leaders appeared to see our duty in connection with the peace problems of the world and were discussing how we could meet our responsibilities. Now a good many of these same men would have the United States cut loose from all responsibility and from all efforts to see a just and lasting peace in Europe and let things in Europe and elsewhere go to the four winds.

One such is Senator Lodge. Last December in a speech in the Senate he said:

"We must do our share to carry out the peace as we have done our share to win the war, of which the peace is an integral part. We must do our share in the occupation of German territory which will be held as security for the indemnities to be paid by Germany. We cannot escape doing our part in aiding the peoples to whom we have helped to give freedom and independence in establishing themselves with ordered governments, for in no other way can we erect the barriers which are essential to prevent another outbreak by Germany upon the world. We cannot leave the Jug-Slavs, the Czech-Slovaks and the Poles, the Lithuanians and the other states which we hope to see formed and marching upon the path of progress and development unaided and alone."

That was accepting the responsibility of America in the spirit in which President Wilson has tried to meet it and in the spirit which the great majority of Americans want to meet. The other day in another speech in the Senate Senator Lodge completely reversed his attitude. He said:

"I do not see why we should take up the burden of settling boundaries all over Europe. Leave it to Europe to do."

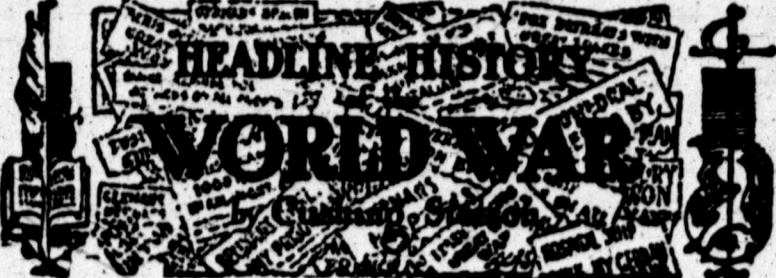

We do hold it against Whitney, that he, an American citizen, was only too ready to mix in an action that threatened to embarrass, if not actually involve, his own government. The government press is striving to create a sentiment for a "dictatorship of the middle parties," whilst the conservative organs quite frankly either lean for monarchy or something darkly reactionary, and the left papers are doing their utmost to restore the radicalism of last November.

At present it appears to the best observers to be more or less of a toss-up as to the force of the next coup; but there is a distinct impression that

the late fall or early winter—with its critical industrial situation—will be seized by the malcontents of right and left as a medium for their overthrow attempts.

Edwin Barth, editor of Verwaerts, writes in the socialist weekly, Die Glocke, "There is no man in Germany who is content with the situation, and such is right in his discontentment. We all know that, since the days of the revolution, we have day to day become poorer; that the foreign nations have no confidence in Germany; that the moral bewilderment progresses daily that his honesty and disinclination to work control the situation both in political and economic things."

All is talk, talk, talk, according to Barth, who would see Germany devoted to rebuilding, using all the means at her power, even to brutal power, to attain the one needed end of reconstruction.

Dilating on Barth's article, the Tagliche Rundschau draws the conclusion that the rebuilding, the restoration of order, work and peace can come only from other sides—namely the right—rather than from the middle which it contends has made a failure, or from the left which participated in the November revolution.

At the same time, the Rundschau says that the left is preparing "under the eyes of the administration" to stage another revolution.

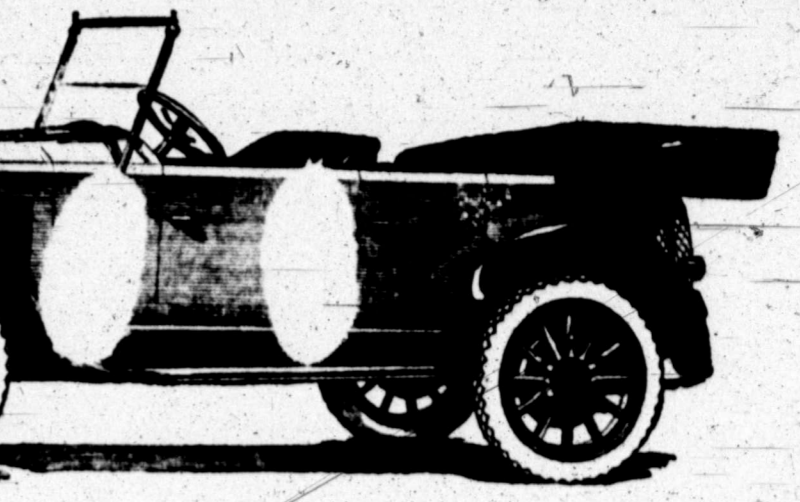
There are adequate proofs at hand that the left's method at present is a bloodless program. The communists would overthrow the government through a general strike. But, the communists and the independent are divided among themselves, and are not

presenting the strong front which many credit them with doing.

On the other hand, the right has gathered funds for a strong campaign. It is behind the anti-Semitic propaganda which is being used as a means of stirring up sufficient internal

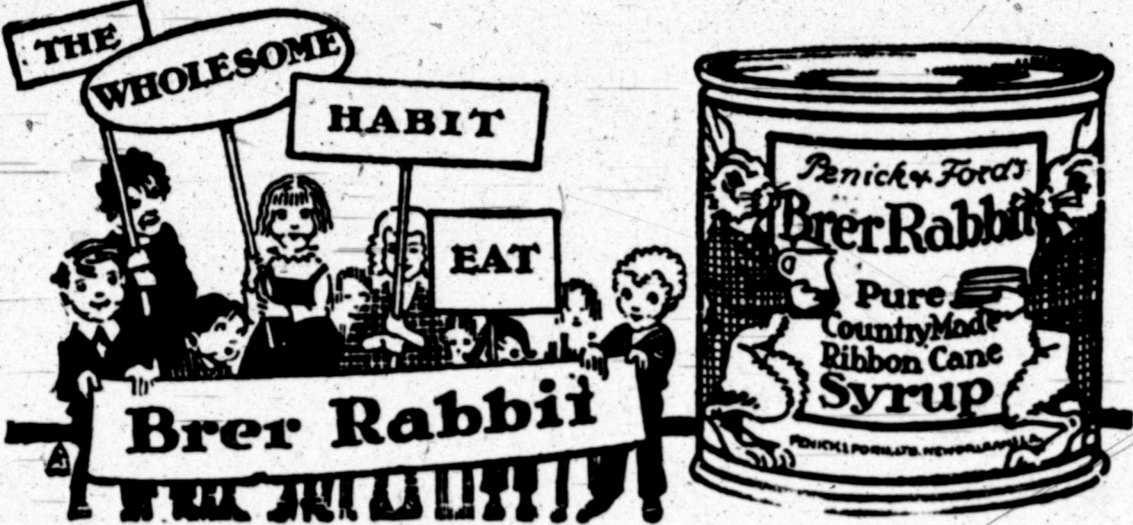
trouble to cause an overthrow of the government.

SHALLOW SANDS RECEIVING ATTENTION IN EASTLAND

JAKEHAMON, TEX., Oct. 16.—The area of shallow sands in the Ranger and Eastland counties seems to be expanding with further development and to promise a considerable factor in the oil fields of this section. The Olden section has several shallow showings the past fortnight and from that point the shallow production extends northward in an apparently connected series to north of the county line. A gasser has been drilled by the Humble of the Scott tract at 1,490 feet. In the same vicinity Root, Hupp & Jeff have a 50 barrel well at 1,572 feet and Gillespie has a 30 barrel well at 2,471 feet. The Holleman tract is doing 220 barrels from the shallow sands the United States Oil Corporation having a 400 barrel well at 1,590 feet, while the Texolium is producing some oil and much gas on the Thompson tract at 1,930 feet.

The shallow pay in the Ranger and Eastland pools seems likely to become a factor and will receive its due share of attention as soon as the excitement of chasing deep sands gets a bit less. The indications south of Eastland and of Ranger have in instances pointed to a possibility of this shallower production extending toward the south of the county and the drillers in the territory intervening between Ranger and Jakehamon are taking interest in well logs with a view to discovering a possibility of the shallower formation down toward the Hog Creek pool.

\$3,000,000 BOND ISSUE PROPOSED IN STEPHEN COUNTY

JAKEHAMON, TEX., Oct. 16.—In addition to the plans that have been made and bonds voted by the counties and precincts from Dublin north to the Stephens county line for road improvements the territory traversed by the Wichita Falls, Ranger and Fort Worth Railroad will also be served with good roads in Stephens county. Following the lead of Eastland county that recently voted a bond issue of \$4,500,000 for road construction in the oil fields Stephens county is now maturing plans to submit a proposition to vote bonds to the amount of \$3,000,000 for highway construction.

The problem of getting materials onto the ground for development of the oil fields in all the oil belt of Texas is thus being solved in a manner that looked impossible a year

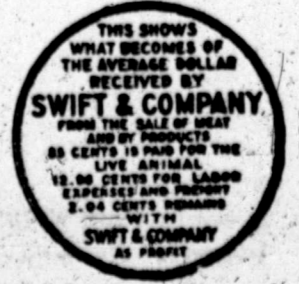

FIRST INTERNATIONAL TRADE CONFERENCE TO BE HELD ON OCT. 20

A letter from President H. L. Ferguson of the Chamber of Commerce of the United States, received by the local general session of the International Trade Conference at Atlanta City will be called to order at 2:00 p. m. October 20. The 20th and 21st, Mr. Ferguson says, will be devoted to conferences between the foreign delegates and the American committees about details of the subjects to be brought before the general meetings. Delegates, therefore, should arrive in Atlanta City not later than the evening of the 21st, or the morning of the 22nd. Mr. Ferguson urges delegates who have not yet arranged for hotel accommodations to give the subject attention at once. The conference will be held on Young's Million Dollar Pier.

The postponement of the conference from September 22 to October 20, President Ferguson believes, has resulted in having the program materially strengthened. The committees have been able to work out details of the various topics scheduled for discussion in such a manner that the conference can depend on all the facts submitted. At the general sessions stress will be laid upon those subjects which are peculiar to the adjustment period in foreign commerce. These include:

- Economic needs of the various countries concerned during the next two years.
- Emergency measures necessary during the adjustment period of the promotion of trade and the movement of raw materials.
- Possible measures for association of products, equipment and transportation.
- Possible measures for association of business enterprises here and in Europe to strengthen backward countries.
- Reciprocal measures affecting instruments of capital to secure equal advantage and avoid duplication of effort.
- Methods for stabilizing foreign exchange.
- Elimination of unfair practices and a basis for the reinstatement of commercial relations.

HINES URGES LEGISLATION FOR RETURN OF RAILROADS

INDIANAPOLIS, IND., Oct. 15.—Unless legislation looking to the return of railroads to private ownership takes definite shape during December, the country will be disastrously handicapped next year in having its business moved, according to Walker D. Hines, director general.

Mr. Hines spoke tonight at a dinner of the National Association of Railway and Utilities commissions, in commission here.

Mr. Hines called attention to the urgent need for additional facilities for handling the increasing amount of railroad business and said that, in view of the announcement by the president that he intended to hand the roads back to their owners December 31, early action by congress is vitally important in order that the private owners may see where they stand and begin in time to plan for additional facilities for moving their business.

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SOVIET ARMY HELD BETWEEN TWO MILLSTONES

Bolshevik Held While Cossacks And Poles From Two Sides Are Forging Ahead.

PRESENT SITUATION SOVIET GOVERNMENT IS MENACING

All Observers Agree That Position of Bolsheviks is Most Precarious.

GENERAL RETREAT BY SOVIET FORCES.

LONDON, Oct. 16.—A general retreat by the Bolsheviks before the armies of Admiral Kolchak in Siberia is announced in a wireless message from the Kolschak government at Omsk, dated October 13.

By Associated Press.

LONDON, Oct. 16.—Forced back by the onslaughts of enemies of four fronts, the armies of the Soviet government of Russia appear to be entering a period pregnant with disaster.

General Denikine's Cossacks from the south, Polish forces from the west, northwestern Russian legions in the northwest, and northern Russian troops from the north, have during the last few days forced ahead until it seems the Bolshevik armies are between the upper and nether millstones.

Petrograd is doomed to capture, in the opinion of observers. General Yudenitch being at Gatchina, only 25 miles south of the former Russian capital, in the extreme north, the northern Russian army has broken the resistance of the Bolsheviks, according to reports, and are pursuing the enemy toward Oleg, a village about 150 miles west of Achanal. Further to the south it has forced its way far down along the Dvina River. Polish forces have captured Kovno, on the extreme northern end of the line. Denikine's men have driven a giant wedge into central Russia as far as Orel and are thought to be on their way toward Tula, an important railway center that is considered the key to Moscow.

East of the Urals is Admiral Kolchak's army but it is seemingly too far away to enter into consideration as a vital factor in the situation which is developing in Russia proper. General Denikine and Yudenitch and Admiral Kolchak are said to be operating in close coordination.

West of General Denikine's army are forces of Ukrainians who, while supposed to be hostile to the Bolsheviks, have declared war on Denikine because of alleged atrocities perpetrated by the latter's soldiers on their advance toward Moscow. Reports have been received, however, that part of the Ukrainian army has been sent to Denikine's assistance and that the latter will wrest eastern Galicia and the province of Cholm from Poland.

Advices from Russia that Colonel Avall-Bermond, whose sudden attack on Riga last week caused a sensation, has declared he began the campaign only for the purpose of "securing the Dvina River front against Moscow."

This front is between the sector held by General Yudenitch and the Polish army. So far as known, fighting is still in progress in Riga but the exact situation there is not known. Germano-Russian troops under command of Colonel Avall-Bermond, however, seem to have gained ground north of Riga, having captured the town of Danumunde, according to reports.

This morning's newspapers conspicuously feature reports of successes by General Yudenitch and Denikine and the presumed impending collapse of the Soviet government of Russia. Editorial comment, while recalling frequent past predictions of the fall of the Bolshevik government which did not materialize, think the present position is more menacing for the Soviet government than it has been at any previous time.

The pro-Bolshevik Herald believes Petrograd and Moscow are in imminent danger and the Russian social revolution is in a perilous situation. In an editorial under the caption "The Crowning Infamy" the newspaper bitterly attacks the British and Allied governments and the League of Nations, charging that the latter is not materializing, think the present position is more menacing for the Soviet government than it has been at any previous time.

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Confidence in financial circles in the coming defeat of Bolshevism was shown by the strength of securities in the stock exchange yesterday, many advancing sharply with an active demand.

THE FEDERAL TRADE COMMISSION REITERATES CLAIM BIG PACKERS THREATEN CONTROL FOOD SUPPLY

WASHINGTON, Oct. 16.—Reiteration of the claim that the five big packing companies of Chicago bid fair to dominate the wholesale grocery trade and already handle more than 200 foods threatened to the meat packing industry, many of them directly competitive as meat substitutes, is made in part of the Federal Trade Commission's report on the industry, published today.

"The extent to which the packers should be permitted to enter unrelated food lines (even assuming legitimate competitive methods)," the report said, "is a matter which the public interest alone should determine."

Two questions, primarily economic, are involved: "Does the widening of activity result in additional economies of production and distribution?" "Does it result and will it continue to result in the price in lower prices and better quality of product and service?"

"A third question not here discussed relates to the ultimate effect of such vast and powerful organizations on the political and social fabric of American institutions."

Included in the list of commodities said to be falling under control of the "big five" are poultry and game, dairy products, lard and butter substitutes, canned and dried vegetables and fruit, canned, cured and frozen fish, cocoa, coffee, molasses and oils, and nut and maple syrups.

Armour & Co., one of the five, is said to be handling extensively soda fountain preparations and utensils. "Owing to the mass of secrecy of the packer's methods of conducting such of his business," it adds, exact statistics on many of these commodities are not available for the country as a whole, which will show just how far the packers' control has reached.

Many companies manufacturing or handling these commodities are controlled by pack interests to the extent which is disclosed by the names under which they operate and even a thorough-going examination may fail to uncover the packer connection in every case.

Four of the packers, Swift, Wilson, Armour and Cudahy, the report states, through their subsidiaries, and not including family controlled companies, handled in 1918, 49.9 per cent of the estimated total of shipped dressed poultry and 33 per cent of shipped eggs.

The year's earnings amounted to \$2,012, or 290 per cent on the capital stock and 67 per cent on the net worth of the company including capital, surplus and undivided profits as reported at the close of the fiscal year 1918.

Production of lard compounds and substitutes by the five packers during the first six months of 1917 was valued at \$5,428,830, or 75 per cent of the total, and oleomargarine at 51 per cent.

LOUIS F. SWIFT DENIES COMMISSION'S CHARGE. CHICAGO, Oct. 16.—Louis F. Swift, president of Swift & Company, today denied a statement in the Federal Trade Commission report that the five big packers are enlarging the scope of their business threatened to control the wholesale grocery trade of the country which are charged in the latest report of the Federal Trade Commission.

"The packing industry has again put in a strong protest against the total and oleomargarine at 51 per cent. Complete figures to show the packer interest in canned foods, such as fruits and fish, were not available, the report says, but the business of the big five was shown to be large and growing. The Libby company's canned food sales alone showed a 250 per cent increase in 1918 over 1917.

"In the first place the packers do not control anything," Swift & Company is in active competition with all other packers in the purchase and sale of every product bought and sold.

The charge that the five packers have divided the field, each specializing on certain lines, is absurd, Swift & Company handles only such products as logically result from being in the packing business and such other products as can be handled efficiently through its sales organization and its freighting equipment. The net result is the lowering of selling costs, more direct markets from producer to consumer and a better service to the public. This statement we stand by."

RADICALS WORK TO GAIN CONTROL OVER STRIKERS

SEIZE UPON PRESENT SITUATION AS FAVORABLE OPPORTUNITY TO PUSH PROPAGANDA.

SEEK INDUSTRIAL REVOLT

If Industrial Conference Fails to Find Solution, Situation May Become Serious.

By HUGH BAILLIE. WASHINGTON, Oct. 16.—Radical agitators are working to gain control of thousands of men on strike in America today, according to information received by the government from confidential sources.

The purpose of these radicals is said to be to lead the strikers in an industrial revolt that would border on a political revolt.

Their propaganda is held responsible for many of the unauthorized strikes.

Seize Favorable Moment. The fact that President Wilson is ill, that his confidential adviser, Colonel House is ill, and that Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor and foe of extreme radicalism, is in very poor health and liable to suffer a breakdown, makes the situation even more difficult for the government to handle.

The National Industrial Conference now in session in Washington, was looked upon by many officials as a dam against the flood of industrial difficulties. Even now that the conference appears to be having some difficulty to make progress, great dependence is being placed in it.

Unauthorized strikes are viewed by labor officials, cabinet members and congressmen alike, as a bad symptom. Rail Director Lines has warned B. M. Jewell, acting president of the Railway Employees' department American Federation of Labor, that they were "creating the basis for an argument that it is nonsense to recognize labor organizations in the railway industry."

Senator Aldrich has taken the lead in Congress in insisting that steps be taken at once to prevent revolution. He believes the government is in danger now, and that international agitators are responsible. He has introduced a resolution, which Attorney General Palmer is not deporting agitators.

Continued high prices are creating discontent and driving workers ordinarily law abiding, more ready to listen to radical leaders, in the opinion of Lee and other delegates to the industrial conference. Some measures asked by President Wilson and Palmer to enable government agencies to get at the profiteers have been introduced in the latter category is included a request for an appropriation to conduct the campaign.
