

Council's most drastic action was the approval on first reading of Alderman Curiee's ordinance banishing the wagons of vendors of peanuts, popcorn, hamburgers, vegetables and the like from their stands in the streets. Immediately afterward, council declined, through lack of a second, to place on first reading Mr. Curiee's ordinance forbidding the erection or maintenance of tents and other fragil-like structures within the fire limits.

It was on this first ordinance that a plaintive note of woe was heard, for the owner of a peanut wagon made an ardent plea to council that "the little fellow be given a chance"; that the foreigner within the city's gate, because he has the wherewithal to establishes flourishing peanut, pop-

that the foreigner within the city's gate, because he has the wherewithal to establishe flourishing peanut, popcorn and candy business in a building but has no citizenship papers, be made, too, to confine his business to the building and not encroach upon the sidewalk. This man, with a voice that quivered with emotion, told the council that he was a citizen here, that he spent the money he made here in Wichita Falls, that he was buying a home, yet was being put out of business by the ordinance driving his business from the streets. His talk may bear fruit, for the ordinance forbidding encroachment upon the sidewalk was ordered enforced.



Though some of the men had to hang on with one hand, we managed to give a creditable performance.
