The plane, piloted by Rex Randall, Gibbon, Neb., and carrying as passengers Lieutenant Wright and Miss Helen Haggart, went into a tail spin 200 feet from earth.

KING OF BELGIANS SEES GRAND CANYON IN ARIZONA TODAY

By DON CHAMBERLAIN. (United Press Staff Correspondent). WITH KING ALBERT OF BELGIUM IN GRAND CANYON, Arizona, Oct. 18.—Accompanied by Prince Leopold, Count D'Outremont and J. M. Wright, King Albert today went down the trail. They traveled seven miles on burro, descending several thousand feet. A pack lunch was served. The view here was in extreme contrast with that seen in the fertile Yosemite Valley.

ARE STILL DESPERATELY DEFENDING PETROGRAD

LONDON, Oct. 18.—Forces of the Soviet government of Russia are according to latest advices, still desperately defending the city of Petrograd toward which anti-Bolshevik troops have been advancing since October 11. Confirmation of dispatches telling of the fall of the former Russian capital has not been received in official quarters here.

RESIGNATION OF AUSTRIAN CABINET

VIENNA, Friday, Oct. 17.—The Austrian cabinet headed by Dr. Karl Renner resigned tonight. Over the winter situation in Austria is a comparatively short distance of the city but the rapidity of its advances during the first days of the offensive does not seem to have been maintained. General Yudenitch in his advance has drawn his troops into a rough semi-circle from Krasnaya Korca, on the northwest, to Tarskoe Selo, which is almost due south of Petrograd.

LETTS RECAPTURE THE PART OF DUNAMUNDE

COPENHAGEN, Oct. 18.—Pro-mosir Ulmanis of Latvia is expected to announce today from Riga announcing that the Letts on Thursday afternoon recaptured Dunaumunde, the port at the mouth of the Dvina, southwest of Riga, from the Germano-Russian troops.

BASE HOSPITALS WILL BE HELD INTACT BY THE ARMY

WASHINGTON, Oct. 18.—At the request of the war and navy departments and as a part of the peace program of the American Red Cross, the base hospitals organized by the Red Cross for the army and which saw service overseas during the war, will be held intact for future emergency.

COULD DODGE DEATH BUT NOT VERDICT OF A JURY

CHICAGO, Oct. 18.—Arthur E. Haensel, 38, dodged death in the Argentine but could not escape when encountered in the marble halls of the court house. He was convicted today and sentenced to be hanged for the murder of his wife. Haensel shot the bride, who waited for him throughout the war, after a nine-day honeymoon following his return to this country.

PLAN TO PENALIZE RAILWAY STRIKES

WASHINGTON, Oct. 18.—Provisions to end railroad strikes by penalizing employees who go on strike or others who foment strikes, were written into a pending railroad bill today by the Senate Interstate Commerce Committee.

PRESIDENT RESTED WELL LAST NIGHT

WASHINGTON, Oct. 18.—A statement issued by President Wilson's physicians at 11:20 today was: "The President rested well last night. There is no material change in his general condition. No new symptoms have developed."

TWO BIG EASTERN SCHOOLS WILL WALK MOURNFULLY TO TUNE OF DIRGES TONIGHT
NEW YORK, Oct. 18.—Two big eastern schools will walk mournfully to the tune of dirges tonight at the burial of their 1919 hopes.
There will be many funerals after the third big Saturday of the gridiron year, but the deepest gloom will fall around Ithaca and Syracuse, where the two biggest games of the east are to be played, between Cornell and Colgate and between Pittsburg and Syracuse.
Syracuse faces its toughest job of the season against Glenn Warner's Pittsburg Panthers. The New Yorkers loomed up as a powerful eleven last week by trouncing the army. On the surface the eleven look to be evenly balanced.
In Hastings, De Hart, Morrow and Davies, Warner has a fleet capable backfield that will outweigh Syracuse. On a dry field, which was predicted, the indications favor Pittsburg.
Harvard will send a slightly crippled team against Brown, but Cambridge hopes do not seem to be in the balance.
Vanderbilt and Georgia Tech's battle will hold the center of the stage in the South.
Princeton takes on Rochester as a fill-in for the cancelled game within Iordhan.
West Point meets Maine on the plains and the Navy enjoys a holiday.

CHICAGO, Oct. 18.—General Marshall—college football—begins to wield a wicked battle as throughout the west today.

With the alleged practice games generally tucked away in history the various conferences stepped into the arena that blot or polish the undergraduate's escutcheon.
Two big ten conference games played magnet for Chicago rooters today. Northwestern and Wisconsin were to meet at Evanston; Chicago and Purdue on the Maroon gridiron. Both Northwestern and Wisconsin disappointed their friends last Saturday but Northwestern was confident of getting by with her excellent backfield of which Boss Koppfer is the keystone.
Chicago is expected to drub Purdue. The boiler-makers stood up right bravely against Illinois last week but the Illinois were crippled somewhat. Chicago has a line up something like Maroons of old. Higgins, Graham, Egan and a host of subs have made stage a worry one of selection rather than the polishing nondescript. The Maroons' big score against Great Lakes last Saturday is not to be taken seriously as showing great strength but Chicago is good.
Iowa has hopes against the Illinois today, "doping" strength to herself on the fact that the best Nebraska badly while Nebraska later tied Minnesota, usually a conference leader.
The Notre-Dame-Nebraska conflict at Lincoln will attract much attention. Fro ma distance the corn bickers appear to have slow in starting. Notre Dame has been under blankets heretofore. The Catholic institution
