WASHINGTON, D. C., October 23.—President Wilson today constituted a new national industrial conference from the wreckage of the first one. At this suggestion, transmitted through Franklin K. Lane, chairman, the delegates, representing the public will remain in session to seek a solution of the nations industrial problems.

The delegates of the employers were excused from further attendance and the labor representatives walked out yesterday. But the public's conferees, the President told Lane, must carry on the work.

The public group will be expected to make an exhaustive investigation of entire national situation, just as the original conference of the public, capital and labor had planned to do, Lane explained.

"This group will carry on the work of the committees already appointed by the conference, re-organizing them where vacancies have occurred through the adjournment of the original conference," Lane said.

Statement Is Made by Former German Ambassador to United States.

READING OF TELEGRAM CREATES & SENSATION

German Programs of Peace Con-ditions Sent to Wilson Not the Same.

BERLIN, Oct. 23.—The former kaiser scoffed at the danger of American intervention early in 1917, according to Count Von Bernstroff, then German ambassador to the United States.

Replying to a question of Dr. Sinchemer when he resumed testifying in the Reichstag committee investigation of conduct of the war this afternoon, Von Bernstorff admitted that Withelm telegraphed Foreign Secretary Zimmerman about January 1. 1917, that "if a breach with America cannot be avoided, things must take their course."

The statement created a sensation, several committee members gashing audibly, There was a hurried consultation and after some delay a copy of the telegram was produced. It was read by Sinsheimer.

"His majesty does not care a bit about President Wilson's peace offer," the telegram said. "If a breach with America can not be avoided things must take their course. Events are developing."





Although Mr. Shea appeared before the board only in behalf of the firemen, it is generally considered that to increase the wages of the firemen would necessitate a similar increase to all railroad workers and any action taken by the firemen to enforce their wage demands would involve similar action by the other brotherhoods.

When Mr. Shea told the board he did not think it possible for working people to curtail expenditures any more, W. F. Morse, who was general manager of a railroad before becoming a member of the board, asked:

"Do you represent any men who are buying automobiles and those things?"

"I do not hear," the witness responded, "of any firemen buying automobiles as a necessity, would you?"






