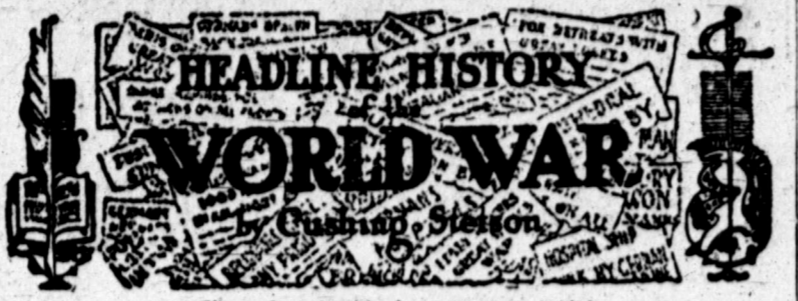

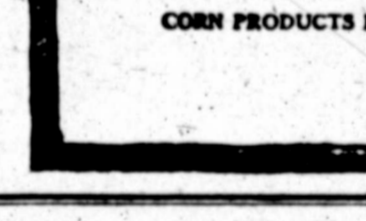

BASEBALL POLITICS FIGURES IN RUMORS OF RED SOX SALE

NEW YORK, Oct. 23.—Boston's Red Sox are being sold again. The baseball pot which had settled down to a simmer after the world series is boiling over with the report that Congressman James A. Gallivan had offered Harry Frazee close to \$1,000,000 for the Hub American Leaguers.

Frazee denies it though Gallivan announced the offer. All of which makes excellent fuel for the hot stove league.

Politics of the move have been thrown out by the faction war for the toga of the alleged boss of the league, Ban Johnson.

The persistency of Frazee in vetoing most of Ban's moves since he took over the Red Sox has aroused the ire of the league head. Last year Johnson was reported to have been behind several moves to get a new set of owners in the Boston offices. Since that time Frazee has joined the open enemies of the Johnson regime by enlisting in the Comiskey-Ruppert-Houston army. The major engagement of the offensive directed against the Johnson fortifications since the middle of the summer will be fought in December at the league meeting.

AUTHORITY RECEIVED FOR REGISTERED TOURNAMENT BY WICHITA GUN CLUB

Authority has been received from the American Trapshooting Association to hold a registered tournament on the grounds of the local gun club on Victory Day, November 11. Governor Hobby having proclaimed the day a State holiday a large turnout of shooters is expected.

The program will consist of two 15 and six 20 target events, and there will be \$150 added money. This purse will be apportioned to the various events, and the winners will receive their shares on the percent age system, 40, 30, 20 and 10 per cent. In other words, scores of 20 straight divide 40 per cent, etc. In addition to the added money, it is expected that a trophy will be donated to be put in competition between teams from Dallas and Fort Worth, the conditions of the race to be announced later. It is likely that the rules used between the New York Athletic Club and the Boston A. A. will be used; in other words, the five high guns for the day will constitute the team. This gives every man a chance to make the team, and is regarded as the squarrest possible way of conducting such a match.

The usual turkey shoot will be held Friday, starting promptly at 4:00 o'clock. The secretary invites all shooters to come out and inspect the grounds, now that all the weeds have been cut and the trees that bghered some of the shooters when right angle targets were thrown, having been cleared away. All shooters are welcome. Don't stay away because you don't happen to have a gun—any member will be glad to lend you one. Shells can be bought at the grounds.

THEORY MAY BE TRUE BUT IT WILL BE HARD TO CONVINCe THE FOLKS

CHICAGO, Oct. 23.—Pastry that "mother used to make" can't compare with modern concoctions turned out by bakers, delegates to the National Bakers convention, meeting here, today declared.

"Bakers have the advantage of scientific machinery for mixing and baking," said Eugene Lipp, Chicago. "Our recipes are results of years of study. Our ovens are regulated to a fraction of a degree."

The proof of the pudding is in the eating, Lipp declared.

"In former years practically every one did their own baking," he said. "Now the majority of housewives buy bakers' products."

UNABLE TO AGREE ON FAIR PRICE TO CHARGE FOR SUGAR

WASHINGTON, Oct. 23.—Efforts of the Senate agricultural committee to effect a fair price agreement between sugar producers and the United States Sugar Equalization Board have thus far failed, Senator Ransdell, Louisiana, a member of the committee, admitted today.

Plantation owners in Louisiana told the committee that because of successive rains less than a 50 per cent crop would be raised this year and that owing to the increased cost of production the price of sugar would have to be doubled if the producers

were to break even.

Both producers and refiners opposed the McNary bill which would renew the license of the Sugar Equalization Board and regulate the price of sugar.

When asked to what they attributed the high price of sugar, members of the Louisiana Sugar and Rice Exchange declared that "the President was directly responsible, and that he made a mistake when he refused to permit the sugar board to buy the Cuban crop."

C. A. Spreckels predicted that if the McNary bill was passed the people would have to pay from \$50,000,000 to \$60,000,000 more for their sugar this year.

Brokers of New York control the sugar of the United States, Spreckels said, but assured the committee that if the government would "take its hands off" the prices would go down.

Members of the Sugar Equalization Board returned to New York last night, and Senator Ransdell announced that another "get-together" meeting would be held Friday in an effort to reconcile sugar prices and prevent a recurrence of last year's nationwide shortage.

TOWN OF FRANKELL IN THE PARKS OIL POOL 11 MILES FROM RANGER

JAKEHAMON, TEX., Oct. 23.—With the progress of grading on the Wichita Falls, Ranger and Fort Worth railroad that is being made north from Ranger into Stephens county, the second town of the Hamon & Kell interests on that line to be opened with Frankell. It is eleven miles north of Ranger on the 220 acres of land acquired by Hamon & Kell from M. L. Goswick. The new town is in the Parks oil pool and is surrounded by a great deal of development that began several years ago as a gasser of great volume and developed into a big producer of oil giving a start to the pool that has been expanding in every direction thereabouts. The well was filled by the Texas Pacific Coal & Oil Company and that company owns great blocks of leases in the vicinity of Frankell.

The new town is named in honor of Frank Kell of Wichita Falls, banker and business man, who has been active in the development of West Texas and who is a partner of Jake L. Hamon in the railroad enterprise that is building through the oil fields. This new town is now being put in shape

by Jake Langston who prepared Jakehamon for opening and the work of clearing and opening streets will be followed by the opening of the town probably next month. Grading of the railroad toward Frankell from Ranger is well advanced and the railroad will probably be in operation to that new town in December.

LEADING BILLIARD PLAYERS IN NATIONAL TOURNAMENT

Seven of America's leading billiard players have begun a tournament at the Astor Hotel, in New York city, for the national 13.2 ballline championship. These are George F. Slosson, of Boston; George Sutton, of Chicago; Willie Hoppe, of New York; Jacob Schaefer, of Chicago; Ora Morningstar, of San Diego, Cal.; Welker Cochran, of Detroit, and Koji Yamada, of San Francisco. The winner of the tournament will be the recognized champion and must defend his title annually. It will be the first 13.2 ballline competition since 1915 and the first of importance at ballline since before the war. Slosson, Sutton and Morningstar are veterans at the game, the ages of the trio being sixty-five, fifty-four and forty-five, respectively. Hoppe is thirty-two, Yamada thirty-one, Schaefer twenty-six and Cochran twenty-two. All will try to excel Hoppe's record run of 900 and Sutton's average of 100.

FIRE DEPARTMENT BUDGET FOR 1920 CALLS FOR \$75,000

The budget for the coming year for the local fire department has been estimated by Chief McClure at \$75,000. While this figure is a great deal larger than previous years, in fact the largest figure in the past has been only \$13,000, the phenomenal growth of Wichita Falls, in the past year has necessitated measures being taken to improve the fire system to furnish an adequate preparation for a greatly increased amount of property.

According to the chief, the Wichita Falls fire department is far behind other Texas cities of the same population and property valuation, citing a comparison of this city with Waco, which place he says is about equal at present to this city in point of population. Waco has seven fire stations and a force of fifty men, while Wichita Falls has only two stations and a paid force of about 12 men.

The necessary improvements to bring this city up to the standard required to keep in step with the looking forward spirit of this city in municipal affairs, will require the expenditure of quite a considerable sum and an insignificant amount would not serve to alleviate conditions, Mr. McClure declares.

WANT A MEETING OF AMERICAN FEDERATION

PEORIA, ILL., Oct. 23.—Following the withdrawal of the labor group from the industrial conference at Washington, the Illinois Federation of Labor in convention this morning, authorized the sending of a message to Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor, and to members of the executive council, urging the immediate issuance of a call for a special convention of the American Federation of Labor in Washington.

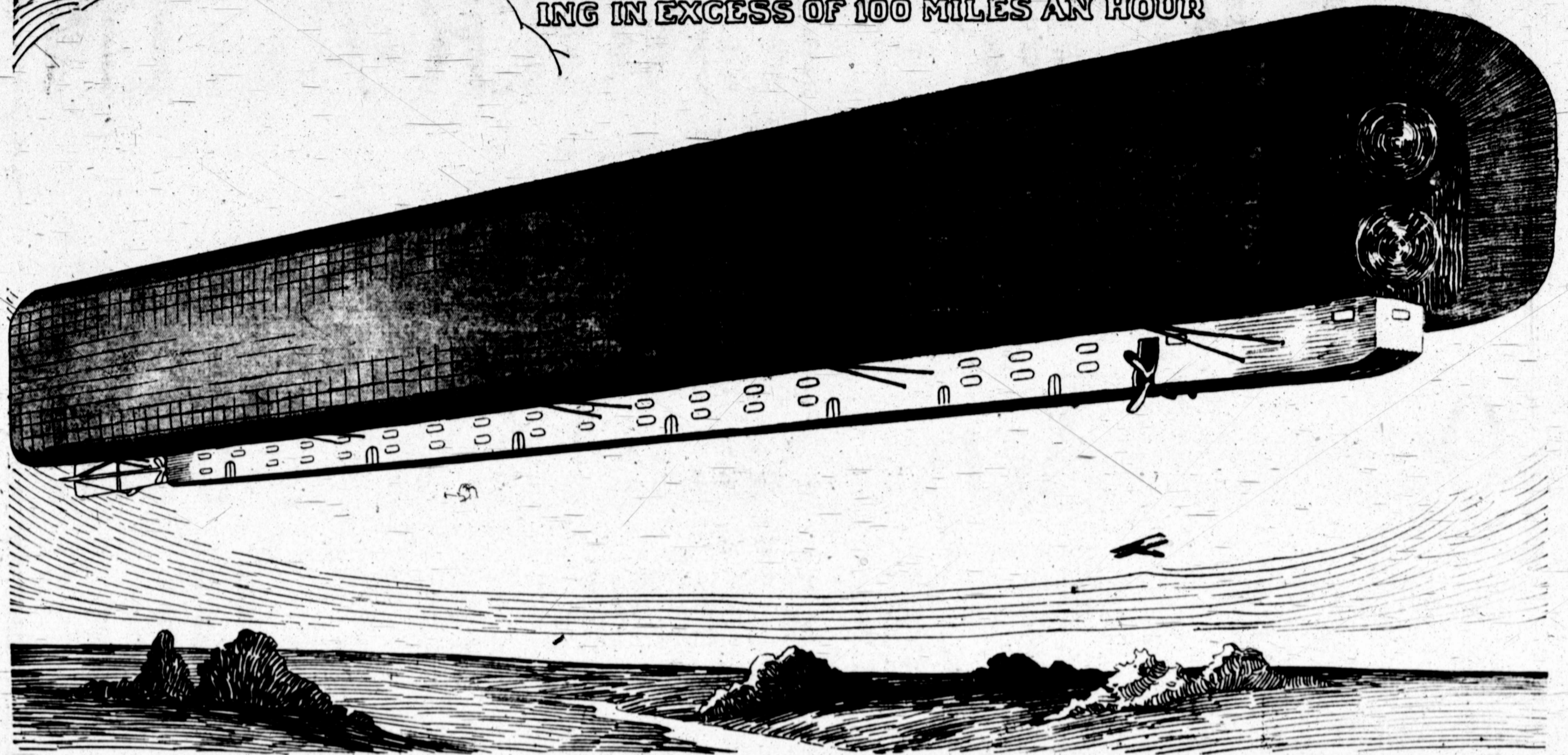

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Aerocruiser

ST. LOUIS INVENTOR CLAIMS TO HAVE OVERCOME HEAD RESISTANCE AND MAKES THE AIR DRIVE HIS SHIP ALONG INSTEAD OF RETARDING ITS PROGRESS - DECLARES HE WILL DROP OFF PASSENGERS AND MAIL AT STATIONS BETWEEN ST. LOUIS AND NEW YORK, WITH SAFETY, WHILE TRAVELING IN EXCESS OF 100 MILES AN HOUR



FROM St. Louis to New York at a speed of more than 100 miles an hour, without a single stop en route, yet receiving and discharging passengers, mail and freight for many intermediate points, is a seemingly almost fanciful project in aerial navigation that is being worked out in a decidedly practical way.

It is the plan rapidly approaching completion for the building of a giant dirigible of novel design embodying several innovations in construction which, its inventor says, will solve the knottiest problems that heretofore have baffled airship builders.

Moreover, the building of the huge flier will bring true another of the dreams of Jules Verne, the famous writer, whose dreams have a habit of coming true—witness the submarine—for a practical development of one of Verne's ideas for controlling the flight of a balloon by causing the gas to expand is one of the innovations embodied in the new airship.

As the lessons of wartime are applied to peacetime development of aircraft there becomes evident a decided if rather anomalous reversal of expert opinion regarding the future of the airship or lighter-than-air type of flying machine.

The utter futility of the German Zeppelin raids on London caused the casual reader of headlines to pronounce this type of craft a failure; but read the official report of the great naval battle of Jutland and one forms quite a different opinion.

High naval officers have made the unqualified statement that in their opinion the bulk of the German high seas fleet would have been cut off and destroyed but for the effective scout work of the Zeppelins, which gave warning of the approach of the British grand fleet.

But it is not as a military weapon that the dirigible of the future is expected to give best results. It is as a carrier of passengers, mail and light express.

True, airplanes capable of carrying fifty persons already have been constructed and have made successful flights, and undoubtedly the airplane

will have a definite and important place in air navigation, but the lighter-than-air machine possesses certain distinct advantages that undoubtedly will render it more important in the commercial field, especially for long trips, whether over land or over large bodies of water.

The great weight of gasoline which the airplane must carry to make a long trip virtually eliminates it as a possible passenger carrier over long distances, as the huge bulk of the airship would make it poor economy to use them for short trips.

Dirigible to Be Used for Distance.

So it is apparent, experts say, that while the carrying of mail, passengers and express over distances such as between the smaller inland cities will be left largely to airplanes of various sizes, each constructed in accordance with the definite task it is expected to perform, giant dirigibles will be depended upon for transcontinental and transoceanic voyages.

In both Europe and America the work of developing these huge airships is proceeding. The Germans, who led the world in this line before the war, are continuing to improve the Zeppelin. England already has made successful tests of several large craft, while both the United States Army and Navy have turned their attention seriously to this type of flier.

One of the great difficulties in handling the great airships has been the likelihood of accidents in landing. It has been said with truth that more airships have been wrecked on the ground than in the air.

Another matter of constant concern to airship builders has been the problem of housing them on the ground, but the British recently announced a system of anchoring them to high towers, letting them swing with the wind like a ship at anchor, by which the necessity of having large hangars was avoided.

The need of vast open spaces for landing and starting has been another hard nut to crack for the men who are planning to utilize airships commercially, as this seemingly rendered it impossible for the big craft to land or

ascend near the heart of a large city. Then, too, the eternal rapid transportation problem of avoiding delays intrudes itself in air navigation as obstructively as in railroad operation.

From St. Louis to New York in nine hours is an easy schedule for an airship going a little more than 100 miles an hour, but if a half hour must be lost at each stop, in bringing the huge machine to the ground and discharging and taking on passengers and freight, and stops were made at half a dozen cities the schedule would be lengthened by at least three hours.

Also, the possibilities of accident would be greatly increased and the necessity of providing adequate landing facilities would greatly increase the difficulties and expense of operation.

Thus it becomes evident that in the operation of the giant dirigibles common sense dictates that either they be used entirely for through traffic between cities or points a thousand miles or more apart, or some means be found to take on or discharge passengers, freight or mail, without stopping the ship.

With regard to mail it has been suggested that it could be attached to parachutes and dropped as the airship passed over, but there are many disadvantages to this plan, and as to passengers it is not likely that many would take kindly to the idea of a parachute leap of a few thousand feet.

Many and varied are other problems which the designers face in planning the great airships which soon, most probably, will make a trans-Atlantic trip a matter of a day or journey from New York to San Francisco in a few hours more.

Among them is the problem of head resistance. The great size of the gas envelopes needed to support tons of weight presents a broad surface to the air and powerful engines are needed to drive them at high speed.

Also, there is the necessity in most vessels of carrying water ballast. The loss of gas let out through the valves when the ship descends is another matter which gives airplane constructors cause for thought. The loss of this gas can only be equalized, except by stopping for replacement, by dump-

ing ballast and these tons of water cut down the useful load carrying capacity of the vessel.

But all, or virtually all, of these difficulties and problems have been solved in the design of a new airship—the "Aerocruiser"—plans for which are being completed by skilled draughtsmen according to Thomas M. Finley, inventor and head of the corporation which will build the great dirigible.

New Gas Bag to Be Made U-Shape.

Here is how most of the problems which heretofore have proved stumbling blocks to airship designers are solved in the "aerocruiser."

Head resistance which so greatly handicaps dirigibles of the familiar cigar-shaped type is almost eliminated by the novel shape of the gas bag of the new airship. From front to back of the "aerocruiser" extends a wide channel like an inverted "U." The engines and propellers of the ship are inside this channel and air displaced by the progress of the gas bag is not merely pushed aside, but is drawn into the channel and forced out the rear end.

As an airship of the conventional type is driven ahead by its engines, air displaced by the envelope forms a pack in front, while a partial vacuum at the rear acts as a drag, as does the displaced air passing over the envelope.

In the "aerocruiser" conditions are exactly reversed. The suction of the propellers draws the air displaced by the bag into the funnel-like mouth of the U-shaped channel, thus creating a partial vacuum in front of the machine, while the propelling of the air out of the rear of the channel not only eliminates any vacuum there, but creates instead an air pack that tends to push the dirigible forward.

The loss of gas through letting it escape through valves in descending is eliminated in the "aerocruiser" by a system of compression pumps that force a part of the gas in the envelope into compression tanks, thus lessening the buoyancy of the ship. When it is desired to ascend the gas merely is released from the compression

tanks, and the airship goes up.

This compression system also renders it unnecessary to carry water ballast, which gives two distinct advantages. One is that the useful load of the vessel is increased by many tons and the possibility of the ballast freezing at high altitude is eliminated. In this connection, news dispatches recently told of the latest and biggest British dirigible being forced to abandon a long cruise because the ballast froze.

The problem of suitable landing places has been solved by Inventor Finley in somewhat the same manner as the recently announced British plan of using high towers as anchors for airships. Finley's plan is to use the tops of the tallest office buildings in cities as landing places, fastening the airship by the nose to towers so that it points directly into the wind, no matter at what angle that may blow from. This plan has the added advantage of landing and taking on passengers in the heart of big cities.

But most novel of all the operating features of the new "aerocruiser" is Finley's plan for the elimination of delays in taking off or discharging passengers at intermediate points along the route of the big dirigible.

It is a unique combination of the qualities of the airplane and the airship; the utilization of one to simplify one of the problems faced by the other.

It is Finley's plan to take off and take on passengers and mail by means of airplanes which will land on top of the gas bag.

Novel Way of Taking On Passengers.

For instance, if the "aerocruiser" en route from St. Louis to New York was carrying mail and a passenger or two for Cincinnati, which is almost on a straight line between the two cities, and there were mail and passengers waiting at Cincinnati to be put aboard the airship, it would not be necessary for the "aerocruiser" to stop, or even slow up.

Probably twenty miles out of the Ohio city an air plane or two would meet the airship, which would be flying, say 5,000 feet high. The airplanes

would swing around and take positions directly over the top of the dirigible, which slowly would rise by merely releasing gas from the compression tanks, until the landing wheels of the airplanes were caught by members of the airship's crew and quickly lashed in place.

It would be but a moment's work to transfer mail sacks and passengers from the airplanes to the dirigible and replace them with passengers and mail for Cincinnati, then the pilots of the airplanes merely would speed up their engines; the lashings that hold the smaller machines in place would be cast off and away would go the airplanes to land their loads. Meantime, the great dirigible would have kept up its scheduled speed in the direction of New York.

The St. Louis business man who breakfasts at home one morning, boards a fast train an hour or so later and eats breakfast in New York the following morning, is enjoying about the ultimate in rapid surface transportation. True, a few hours may be clipped from this schedule by straightening of lines, and by the adoption of electricity as motive power, while there has been talk of fabulous speeds to be maintained by proposed monorail trains run on elevated tracks.

But the paring down of the schedules of surface lines at the best can mean only a few hours saved, and the monorail is of the future, while the airship is of the present. And it is on giant dirigibles that transportation experts are planning their faith to hasten the time when a man can breakfast in St. Louis and dine in New York that night.

Even the airships now in use could clip many hours off the schedule of the fastest of trains between the two cities, or even cross the Atlantic in less than two days, a five-day trip for the fastest of steamers.

Consider this tentative schedule of a "Aerocruiser" from St. Louis to New York, carrying passengers, mail and light express for a dozen intermediate points.

Glance at a map and you will note that the 32d parallel runs a few miles north of St. Louis. Follow it straight

east and you will find it runs a short distance south of Indianapolis, passes almost through Cincinnati, and brings one almost straight into Washington. A slight change of course to the north east at Washington and an almost straight line between there and New York would pass over or near Baltimore, Philadelphia and Trenton.

The distance from St. Louis to New York along this route is about 950 miles. Inventor Finley expects the "Aerocruiser" to maintain a speed in excess of 100 miles an hour. With out-stops between the two cities, the trip would be made in about nine hours under normal conditions.

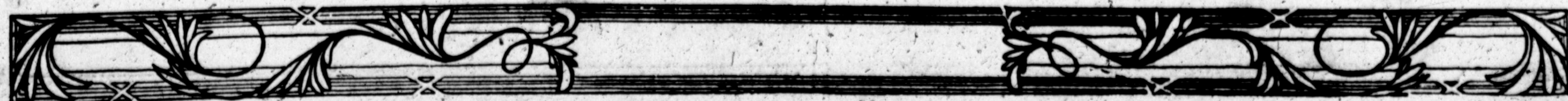
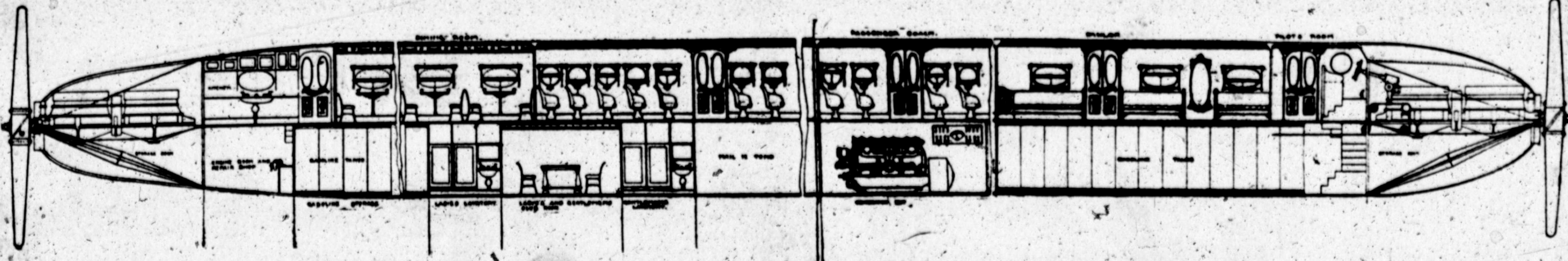
Starting from St. Louis, the first transfer of passengers or cargo probably would be at a point about thirty miles south of Indianapolis. Airplanes from the city would meet the airship; the transfer would be effected without loss of speed, and the airplanes would be winging their way back to the Indiana city even as a bevy of airplanes from Cincinnati appeared.

Near Cincinnati, airplanes could meet the airship with cargo or passengers from Frankfort, Ky., and somewhere over Ohio, mail for Columbus, or even points as far off the direct route as Charleston could be transferred to airplanes.

The transfer airplanes at Washington would have to work fast, in order to be clear before the planes from Baltimore appeared as the airship drove east at its 100-mile-an-hour speed, and hardly would the last of the Baltimore planes be out of the way when the airship's crew would be making ready to receive planes from Philadelphia.

Facilities for landing in New York are many. No city has more high buildings suitable for the erection of landing towers, so that passengers would be landed in the heart of Manhattan.

In planning the "Aerocruiser" Inventor Finley kept in mind the comfort of passengers, as well as their safety. The heave and roll of airships of the Zeppelin type is said to produce a form of sea sickness—considerably more uncomfortable than the worst experienced by a passenger on the ocean.
