# PRESIDENT STILL SLOWLY OPPOSE CHANGE

Important Issue Is Discussed in the House of Lords by Viscount Milner.

LONDON, Oct. 23.—Opposition to any changes in fiscal policities of Great Britain and a plea for careful consideration of the situation before the country were expressed in the house of lords today by Viscount Miner, secretary of state for colonies, who replied to criticisms of the government by Lord Buckmaster, who introduced a resolution calling attention to the "gravity of the financial position" and suggesting the necessity for the imposition of additional taxes.

"I deprecate panicky views which are prevalent regarding the country's financial position," said Viscount Milher, whose statements were considered as the government view of the situation. "The position, though grave, is far less serious than that in any other great country with the

n any other great country with the possible exception of the United States and Japan. It certainly does States and Japan. It certainly does not justify any rash changes in the fiscal system and no proof has been given that additional taxation is necessary. Nothing should be done until after deliberate and careful study. Irreparable mischief might be done to the recovery of trade and industry by recourse to such an expedient as a general capital levy which has been proposal by Lord Buckmaster.

Viscount Milner warmly defended the government sgainst charges of neglect to care for the financial status of the country.

"There have been a number of adverse circumstances, such as the delay in arranging the terms of peace, troubles in Afghanistan and Egypt and unsettled conditions in the Near East, which have prevented the curtailing of expenses," he said. "Our losition is regrettable but it is not catastrophic and the proper way is to regard this year's deficit as part of the war burden. It is quite certain we shall receive several bundred millions next year from the liquids. millions next year from the liquida-tion of war assets and debits of our dominions may be regarded as good debts. The amounts recoverable from foreign countries and Germany are certainly speculative but it would be preposterous to suppose that foreign countries are going to default in their obligations. Such an assumption would be an insult to our great Al-

# SPATURE SECOND NOTE

Action Follows Failure of That Government to Reply to First Communication.

TOKIO, Saturday, Oct., 18.-The Japanese Government not having as yet replied to the American note concerning co-operation in the administration of the trans-Siberian raliroad, it is understood here that the United States Government has dispatched a second note on the subject to Japan. Information has been received by the Associated Press, that the Japanese raply will be forthcoming in a few days. Further investigation, seems to indicate that the reason for the delay is the controversy between the moderates and the extremists and the difficulty of satisfying the military groups in framing a response it is apparent here that the result of the negotiations between America and Japan will determine whether the two countries shall in future co-operate in solving the Siberian problem, or whether America is to pursue an independent policy.

It has been learned that Admiral Kolchak, head of the All-Russian Government at Omsk, is trying to solve the Siberian crisis, and recently asked the Allies for a credit amounting to \$300,000,000 to be used for militry and economic purposes. At the same time he is said to be seeking additional Allied groups to guard the Trans-Siberian between Urkutsk, and Omsk as substitutes for Czecho Slovak troops who will soon return to Europe. yet replied to the American note

The police department protested vigorously against giving Mr. Thornburn up, on the grounds that his services in keeping the accounts of the police department straight was of greater value to the city than would be derived through the services of an equally competent man in any other city department.

Franchises Threatened.

The resolution refers to all public service corporations and instructed the city attorney to proceed against any public utilities corporation not complying with the terms of its franchise.

The resolution was in the form of a motion offered by Councilman Curlee, and came after Mayor Mariow had read a communication from a resident of the Sibley-Taylor addition, who declared he had been unable to obtain gas connections and service, even though he had offered to furnish the necessary labor.

Merchants Propose Ordinance.

A committee from the Retail Merchants association, headed by Secretary John W. Thomas and consisting of I. Markowitz, Joseph Colonna and Jack Barnard, presented an ordinance to council which will, if it finally is passed, bar itinerant merchants from conducting transient business; here without making heavy boud. The ordinance is a protective measure for home business institutions that pay heavy taxes and go to make the city, and it occupied much of council's time, the various committeemen and all members of council present taking part in the discussion that followed its presentation.

In offering the ordinance, Mr. Thomas explained that it was aimed at the itinerant merchants or peddiers who come here with stocks of furs, diamonds, clothing, jewelry and the like for sale in competition to the merchants who remain here year in and year out and pay heavy taxes, and back up the goods they sell with their reputations.

Provisions of the ordinance require Merchants Propose Ordinance.

Provisions of the ordinance require that all persons engaged in the mercantile business here furnish bonds of \$5,000 each. After six months continuous business here, the bonds would be cancelled. No merchant would be allowed to do business without a bond, violation, of the ordinance carrying a penalty of a fine of \$50 a day for each day it is violated.

Mayor Marlow took the view that protection should be offered insofar as the ordinance applied to furs, clothing, diamonds and other luxuries, but he
