MORE THAN 600 RADICALS ARE ARRESTED

U. S. Court Orders Strike Called Off

FURTHER DELAY IN RATIFICATION IS ANTICIPATED

Scores of Amendments Must Be Disposed of Before Final Treaty Vote

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 8.—A reservation to the peace treaty which would permit the United States at the discretion of congress to withdraw from the League of Nations was before the senate today for action.

INDIANAPOLIS, Nov. 8.—The United Mine Workers of America were today ordered to withdraw the strike order under which 400,000 men quit work November 1.

BOTH SIDES PLAN FOR LONG STRUGGLE

WASHINGTON, Nov. 8.—Both sides in the coal strike today seemed grimly set for a long struggle, faced with the possibility of the government taking over and operating the mines if the fuel shortage develops into a famine.

COAL PRODUCTION ABOUT ONE-THIRD AVERAGE NORMAL

WASHINGTON, Nov. 8.—Production of bituminous coal last Saturday, the first day of the coal strike, was estimated today by the geological survey at slightly less than 700,000 tons. This compares with an average normal daily output of nearly 2,000,000 tons.

WHOLESALE RAIDS ARE MADE BY FEDERAL OFFICIALS TODAY; OTHER ARRESTS ARE EXPECTED

America has declared war on the revolutionaries within its borders. Agents of the Department of Justice, in a series of raids last night and today, extending from coast to coast, seized alleged revolutionists in fifteen states and districts. More arrests were expected hourly.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 8.—Raids on radicals which began last night constitute the beginning of a nationwide campaign by the government to suppress the Union of Russian Workers, which advocates overthrow of the American government.

MORE THAN 200 ARE ARRESTED IN CHICAGO

**Proposals By the Bushel.**

All of which leads to the romances of the four women who, combined, according to popular report, have turned down proposals of marriage which if laid end to end, would reach from Fifth Avenue to Main Street, Yonkers.

Long noted as among the most beautiful and wealthiest women in the world—two of them holding high titles (one a Princess)—three at last have capitulated—two to officers of the navy and one to an army man. The fourth won a baron.

They are the Princess Patricia of Connaught, Lady Diana Manners, Mrs. Elsie French Vanderbilt and Mrs. John Astor, first wife of Col. John Jacob Astor.

One of the four, Princess Patricia, renounced her royal status to become the wife of a commoner, Commander Alexander Ramsay, R. N., while Lady Diana Manners, also has stepped below her rank to wed Captain Alfred Duff-Cooper of the Grenadier Guards.

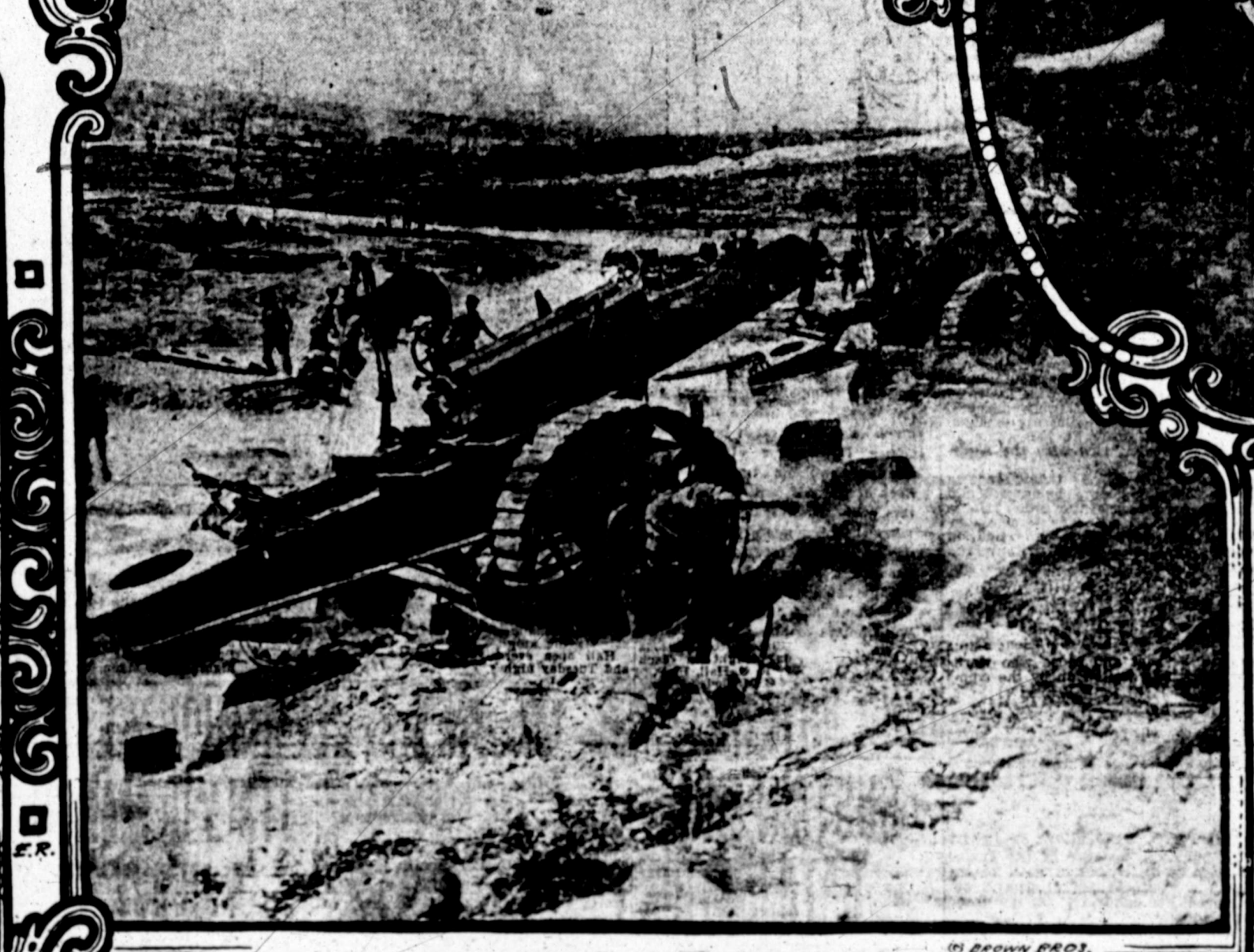
Either one of these two could have been a queen. Princess Patricia, as she was lovingly known on both sides of the Atlantic, turned down at least two crowned heads, while Lady Diana has the reputation of one to her credit.

**And That Would Be Some Blush.**

A few years ago—say in July, 1914, such a thing as either one marrying a commoner would have upset British court circles to such an extent that the scandal of it would have brought a blush to the statue of William the Conqueror in Westminster Abbey.

Now we see the King and Queen gladly attending the wedding ceremonies. The war seems to have made the world safe for romance as well as democracy—and to have made royalty a very meek and rubber-stamp proposition.

And on our side of the big drink, what do we observe? Mrs. Elsie French Vanderbilt, who since her divorce from Alfred Gwynn Vanderbilt has been one of the most sought-after prizes in the international marriage market, who has had the offer of several duchys, not to mention a couple of ancient titled estates, turns her back on the blue blood of Europe and quietly weds a young lieutenant since he to become a target for Russian-American naval service—Pauline bomba.

Both the former Crown Prince of Germany and the former Prince Elit Friedrich are royalties to whom Princess Patricia had the excellent good sense to refuse her hand—although they once seemed excellent matches.

Other important personages whom Princess Patricia is said to have placed on her list of discarded suitors include Prince Christopher of Greece, Prince Gustavus of Denmark, Prince William of Sweden, the Count of Turin, Mecklenburg-Strelitz, and the Duke of Saxe-Coburg-Gotha.

**Such Is Love.**

Lady Diana Manners, youngest daughter of the Duke and Duchess of Rutland, and the most recent of the four brides, in her 28 years rejected more than one royal suitor, not to mention innumerable lesser ones, before capitulating to the charm and uniform of Captain Duff-Cooper, who also wears the D. S. C., which he won in France.

Captain Duff-Cooper has himself a strain of royal blood in his veins, namely, that of King William IV, through his great-grandmother, Lady Elizabeth Fitzclarence, a natural daughter of that monarch, and can claim the status of nephew to the Princess Royal, and first cousinship to Princess Arthur of Connaught, who is also in her own right Duchess of Fife. For the Captain's mother is Lady Agnes Cooper, one of the three sisters of the late Duke of Fife.

Lady Diana must be very much in love indeed with her husband to be content with his relatively modest fortune. Lady Diana Cooper's sisters are, respectively, Lady Marjorie, now the wife of the sixth Marquis of Anglesey, and Lady Violet, now the wife of Lord Eicho, eldest son and heir of the Earl of Westmorland.

Mrs. Elsie French Vanderbilt Fitzsimmons is reported to be more than pleased with her new hubby and glad she didn't accept any of those foreign dukes that proved themselves such rascals after she had obtained her divorce from Alfred Gwynn Vanderbilt.

Lord Ribblesdale is the head of the famous Lister family and a noted statesman and sportsman. He is one of the oldest and most beautiful estates in England.

Mrs. Astor is fifty years old and her new husband is sixty-five.

The marriage is an alliance of two of the most notable families of England and America. For many years the acknowledged leader of New York's "40s," Mrs. Astor was no less famous as a hostess abroad.

She married John Jacob Astor in 1891. For years society regarded it as an ideal match.

It was a severe shock in New York social circles when, in 1908, it was learned Mrs. Astor, who had recently returned from England, had filed suit for divorce.

Mrs. Astor won her suit. And then began the series of happenings which kept society agitated for many months.

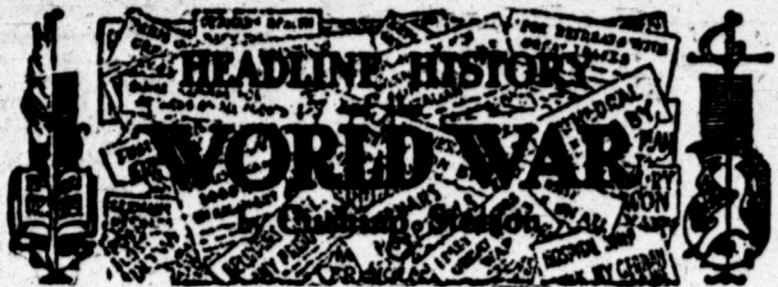

Russian cossacks invade Posen province, the first penetration of German soil; Kaiser worried calls council of war, attended by General von Hindenburg—Germans take important positions near Vienna-la-Chateau on west side of Argonne—Allied line holds fast at Ypres. 1915 Serbs lose Krusevac and 3,500 men; Austrians succeed along Bosnian front—Russian attacks in Dvinsk region repulsed by von Hindenburg and von Linsingen—Italians capture the Col di Lana on the Doberdo Plateau after months of fighting in snow; recaptured by Austro-Hungarians. 1916
