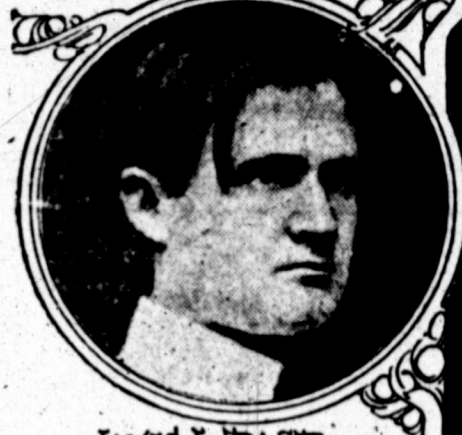

CLOSURE RULE IS ADOPTED AT MORNING SESSION UPPER HOUSE; ONE HOUR ONLY TO A SPEAKER

WASHINGTON, November 15.—A closure to shut down debate on the peace treaty was adopted today in the senate. Republican and democratic leaders voted together for the closure which means that until the treaty is disposed of no senator may speak in all more than one hour.

NEW ADVENTURE IS BEING STAGED BY D'ANNUNZIO

Sails From Fiume on Torpedo Boat Carrying Three Hundred Troops

TRIESTE, Nov. 15.—Gabriele D'Annunzio, who left Fiume Thursday night on a new expedition, has landed at Zara, on the Dalmatian coast, according to news received here last night.

PARIS, Nov. 15.—Gabriele D'Annunzio, the insurgent Italian commander of Fiume, is engaged in another adventure along the Dalmatian coast, according to advices reaching the peace conference here. He sailed from Fiume on the Italian torpedo boat Valerio, which is carrying two Jugo-Slavs, with the surrounding waters controlled by Rear Admiral Andrews of the United States navy and the armored cruiser Pittsburgh with a fleet of destroyers.

He was said to have been followed by an Italian warship which were merely observing his movements. The debarcation point on the Dalmatian coast is not known, but it is thought likely here that Zara has been selected. It is not believed he would go to Spalato, because Sunday is a national holiday in that city.

The advice to the American peace delegation were from Vice Consul O'Hara at Trieste. He forwarded the report here that D'Annunzio had left Fiume on the Valerio, which is expected to land on the Dalmatian coast line.

Importance is attached to peace conference circles to D'Annunzio's movements, because Sunday is election day in Italy, with Fiume the chief issue. It is generally thought that he is seeking to carry out a spectacular operation to strengthen the Fiume party, which is reported to have lost considerable ground in Italy during the past three weeks.

RIZZO IN COMMAND OF CITY OF FIUME TRIESTE, Nov. 14.—A telegram to the Trieste stock exchange says: "Gabriele D'Annunzio left Trieste last night for an unknown destination in a torpedo boat, followed by other ships. Rizzo was left in command of the city."

Commander Luigi Rizzo is commander-in-chief of the D'Annunzio forces. His daring exploit during the war resulted in the sinking of two Austrian battleships off the Dalmatian coast.

Scores of Radicals Are Rounded Up in Pacific Coast Raids

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 15.—Raids on I. W. W. and other radical organizations, begun as the result of the killing of four former service men at Centralia, Wash., last Tuesday, continued up and down the Pacific coast, and as a result scores of additional prisoners were in custody today.

The World must leave this city or go to jail. Threaten Deportation. At Seattle, Henry White, commissioner of immigration, made formal announcement that Allen Industrial Workers of the World rounded up at Centralia, Wash., as a result of the shooting of former service men on armistice day would be deported if they were not held in custody charges by the county authorities. Fifty-three I. W. W.'s were arrested by Seattle police in several raids yesterday and last night. At Raymond, Wash., 11 others were arrested by a citizen's committee and turned over to the police.

Some of them face charges of criminal syndicalism, some of inciting to riot and others of vagrancy. Three persons, alleged members of the radical order, received injuries in one raid which necessitated their removal to a hospital. At Los Angeles a number of former service men, said to be mainly members of the American Legion, broke into I. W. W. headquarters, cut and burned with clubs. Three men found there and wrecked the place before the police could respond to a riot call. In San Francisco the "people's institute" and I. W. W. headquarters were raided by the police and a fine new held in default of \$1,000 bond, on charges of vagrancy.

Those raids followed receipt of information, the police said, that school children were visiting the People's Institute and obtaining radical literature which they carried home. Police Captain O'Meara, who conducted the raids, said all industrial workers of the world must leave this city or go to jail.

EARLY MARKETS

EASTERN COAST OF THE BLACK SEA IS SEIZED

LONDON, Nov. 15.—The eastern coast of the Black Sea from Yelenski to Sooby has been seized by an insurgent army of 70,000 men operating in the rear of the forces of General Denikin, the anti-Bolshevik leader on the southwestern Russian front, according to a wireless dispatch from Moscow. Soviets have been formed, the dispatch adds.

RUSSIAN BOLSHEVIKI NOW OCCUPY OMSK

LONDON, Nov. 15.—Omsk, capital of the All-Russian Government, has been occupied by the Russian Bolsheviks, a Moscow official communique received here today asserts.

COTTON MARKET.

NEW ORLEANS, Nov. 15.—The cotton market showed continued activity and irregular trading during the early trading. The opening was 11 points higher on December, but generally 25 to 50 points lower, with January selling off to 35.10 right after the call under renewed liquidation.

CONTRACT LET FOR LARGEST TANK FARM IN COUNTRY

The Donaldson Construction Company of this city has been awarded the contract to build for J. B. Waugh of New York City, the largest tank farm in the country to consist of 50,000 barrels capacity on 50 acres just west of the Lone Star Refinery. Only ten of the tanks will be built immediately. Mr. Donaldson stated, as per the contract, that the other 15 tanks are in the plans of the storage syndicate which Mr. Waugh represents.

LADY ASTOR VOTES EARLY THIS MORNING

PLYMOUTH, ENG., Nov. 15.—Lady Astor, candidate for parliament, voted for herself early today. She was one of the first women at the polls.

FEW ARE EXPECTED TO RETURN TO WORK

CHICAGO, Nov. 15.—Virtually no increase in the number of bituminous miners returning to work was looked for today, Saturdays generally having been regarded as at least a half holiday at many of the country's mines. Aside from that the miners seemed intent to stand on their expressed determination not to return to work, despite recall of the strike-torger last Tuesday by John L. Lewis, acting president of the United Mine Workers of America, until operators and miners now meeting at Washington, effect an agreement on a new wage scale.

IMPROVEMENT SHOWN

Improvement in the general situation was shown today in Wyoming, however, 7,000 miners agreeing to return to work at once under settlement of the controversy between miners and operators. Colorado and Alabama showed some coal production with non-union miners in Pennsylvania reported operating at normal capacity and some West Virginia coal being brought up.

In the great Illinois fields virtually no work today had been done since the strike was called more than two weeks ago, and resumption of work, union leaders here were conducting an agreement made at Washington meeting the Illinois miners' demands for 60 per cent increased wages and a 30 hour week or be referred to a special miners' convention.

WILL CARRY FIGHT TO THE SUPREME COURT

NEW YORK, N. Y., Nov. 15.—Wet forces prepared today to carry their fight against the Volstead prohibition enforcement law to the United States Supreme Court, following the upholding of the act in a decision yesterday handed down by Federal Judge Learned Hand in two injunction suits. Two other injunction cases were lost to the wet forces when Federal Judge John C. Knox concurred in Judge Hand's opinion later in the afternoon in two similar cases being heard before him and Federal Judge John C. Jones at Maryland, sitting in New York.

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BOY SCOUTS CARRYING WOUNDED

The Boy Scouts

They Proved Their Value During World Conflict, Boosting Every "Win the War" Movement—No Less Necessary In Peace Times Is This Nation-Wide Organization.

DURING the long period of stress and strife, when everyone was devoting time, energy and money working for one ultimate result—victory for America and the allies—none responded with greater patriotism and devotion than the Boy Scouts of America.

The Boy Scouts of America were 100 per cent loyal citizens. They served in the capacity of messenger, police duty, distributors of literature, solicitors of subscriptions for all manner of war relief campaigns, making a house-to-house canvass for usable clothing for the stricken peoples of war-ravaged Europe, selling war savings and thrift stamps and Liberty bonds. There was a faithful service, rendered with eager hands, willing feet, smiling faces and glad hearts.

"Scouting is the most valuable process of manufacture," said Maj. H. K. Simmons, scout master for the St. Louis District, who has long been engaged in scout work, "that has ever been evolved or invented. It makes real men out of boys through a live, invigorating program, which engages the boy's leisure time and surplus energies, or quickens his dominant nature to wholesome activities of cultural and practical value. Without it the future citizenry of our country would be in jeopardy.

"It behooves America to conserve her great wealth of boyhood, for she must not only supply the material necessities to sustain the world's people and produce the commerce of the world, but she must supply the leaders of the world for a generation at least. Our's is a great responsibility. Our youth must be trained to an appreciation of their obligation, and prepared to meet it with credit and dignity worthy of their birthright of American citizenship.

"Scouting is outdoor life, and so health, strength, happiness and practical education. By combining wholesome, attractive, outdoor activities with the influence of the Scout's oath and law, the movement develops character. It develops the power of initiative and resourcefulness; it helps boys; it assures good citizenship. The Boy Scout movement healthfully and nobly offsets the disadvantages which civilization has caused, and fits the boy for life's school.

Should Be Thankful There Is a Boy Scout Movement.

"Every father and mother should be thankful that there is such a movement as the Boy Scouts, and should encourage their sons to become scouts, because scouting presents the greatest opportunities for the development of the boy religiously than does any other movement instituted solely for the boys. Its aim to develop the boy physically, mentally and morally is being realized very widely.

"The movement has been developed on such broad lines as to embrace all classes, all creeds, and at the same time to allow the greatest possible independence to individual organizations, officers and boys.

"The Boy Scouts of America maintain that no boy can grow into the best kind of citizenship without recognizing his obligation to God. The recognition of God as the ruling and leading power in the universe, and the grateful acknowledgment of his favors and blessings is necessary to the best type of citizenship, and is a wholesome thing in the education of the growing fundamental need of good citizenship boy. No matter what the boy may be—Catholic, or Protestant, or Jew—this should be kept before him.

Recognizing All Religions, It Is Non-Sectarian Body.

"The Boy Scouts of America, as an organized body, therefore, recognizes the religious element in the training of a boy, but it is absolutely non-sectarian in its attitude toward that religious training. Its policy is that the religious organization or institution

4,000,000 NEED TRAINING

BOYS between the ages of 12 to 19 years represent approximately 8 per cent of the population of the United States. Most states by law permit boys to leave school at the age of 14 years, which, to him, and, unfortunately, to many parents, means that he does not require discipline and the benefits of further education to prepare him for the responsibilities of citizenship. It is conservatively estimated that there are fully 4,000,000 boys between the ages of 14 and 19 years today in the United States who are without the influence and training of the schools.

It is these boys the men behind the boy scout movement desire to reach. Scouting will put a new influence in the youngsters' lives. But first, the boys must become scouts. How to reach them all—that is the problem.

nothing and makes the best use of his opportunities.

He Must Do What Is Right Despite Jeers and Threats.

"A scout is brave and does what he knows is right, in spite of jeers and threats. A scout is clear in body and thought, stands for clean speech, clean sport, clean habits and travels with a clean crowd. Finally, a scout is reverent toward God. He is faithful in his religious duties, and respects the convictions of others in matters of custom and religion.

"As an organization, the scout movement is not military in thought, form or spirit, although it does instill in boys the military virtues, such as honor, loyalty, obedience and patriotism. The uniform, the patrol, the troop and the drill are not for military tactics; they are for the unity, the harmony and the rhythm of spirit that boys learn in scouting. It is in the wearing of the uniform and doing of things together as scouts that they absorb the force and truth of the scout law, which states: 'A scout is a friend of all, and a brother to every other scout.'

"Conservation of our natural resources is universally approved, but of what value would material resources be unless we conserve the moral, intellectual and physical future of the coming generation? Prevention is recognized as better and less expensive than cure. The boy scout movement takes the boy at that time of life when he is beset with the new and bewildering experiences of adolescence, and diverts his thoughts therefrom to wholesome and worthwhile activities. In this manner our character-building movement has done much to diminish the problem of juvenile delinquency.

Diverse Thoughts of Boy to Wholesome Activities.

"War brings a relaxation of moral fiber, which is disastrous to our youth unless offset by powerful positive influences. Scouting is just such a powerful, positive, counteracting influence. Its program offers the essential antidote for these poisons of war. "We want to help boys on leaving

school to escape the evils of "blind alley" occupations—that is, such work as gives the boy a mere wage for the moment, but leaves him stranded without any trade or handicraft to pursue when he is a man, and so sends him as a recruit to the great army of unemployed, and, what is worse, the unemployable. "Doing is learning," and when a scout in the formative stage of his life has this lesson thoroughly impressed upon his mind, he has learned to be resourceful. The simple, help-yourself experience which a scout receives in his impressionable years prepares him to meet emergencies covering the entire range of existence which may develop later in his life.

In scouting the boy does not stand still. The opportunity and incentive for progress are always at hand.

Opportunity and Incentive for Advance Always There.

He first becomes a tenderfoot, then a second-class scout, and then a first-class scout. After this the whole sphere of the scout program is made available by the boy's own application in qualifying himself to pass the tests of the various merit badges, which cover the following subjects:

Agriculture, angling, archery, architecture, art, astronomy, athletics, automobile, aviation, bee keeping, book study, blacksmithing, bugling, business, camping, carpentry, chemistry, civics, conservation, cooking, craftsmanship, cycling, dairying, electricity, firemanship, first aid, first aid to animals, forestry, gardening, handicraft, hiking, horsemanship, interpreting, leather working, life saving, machinery, marksmanship, masonry, mining, music, painting, pathfinding, personal health, photography, physical development, pioneering, plumbing, poultry keeping, printing, public health, safety first, scholarship, sculpture, seamanship, signaling, stalking, surveying, swimming, taxidermy, wireless.

The Glamour of the Circus

NINE persons out of every ten have only been deflected from a circus career by the drab intentions of unambitious parents, who by their respectable scheming have bound childish muscles and curbed youthful spirits until it is too late to do anything but sit in stolid black rows, watching with gleaming, envious eyes those whose good fortune is just another of those fabled glimpses of a life that might have been, says the New York Evening Post.

And it's no good trying to cure old regrets by peeping behind the scenes, that is usually counted on to cure many such longings. As for the circus, it detracts not a jot from its charm as a vocation to have seen it from the wings at Madison Square Garden and the opening performance.

If there is any order in that apparent disorder, it is only discoverable by reading in the paper afterward that the performance went off without a hitch. How they know where they are "at" in the performance is past comprehension. The heat in the close quarters, the band blaring immediately overhead, the crowding, the shuffling of men, horses, elephants, camels—what it is on a July afternoon passes the imagination.

For half an hour before opening time almost the entire personnel of the circus is crowded behind that entrance curtain waiting to go on. On the first day the time passes quickly enough greeting old friends, exchanging gossip, and watching your step. The prospect of a hot summer is the chief topic of conversation. From the palanquin atop the elephant comes a plaintive "Ain't we ever goin' to start, Jerome?" And Jerome, who is for the moment something between a Pierrot and a Gloomy Gus, gets down from his mule, which he rides backward, takes a peep through the curtain and responds with a "Waitin' for the folks to get in, I reckon."

At last the mysterious whistle sounds from somewhere, the doors fly open, and all march out, hundreds of thundering hoofs drowning the music. Everything, even the ladies' smiles and the horses' prance, seems to creak a bit after the long wait.

But no sooner have the elephants and camels in harness been maneuvered amazingly out one door at the tail of the procession than the mandarins come flying in at the other, at a stroke divest themselves of their costumes and banners, and appear in their true character of hands. They are the army of workers that rush into the arena between acts and perform feats of dexterity and strength that we admire only as amusing teamwork. So it appears that every individual in the circus gets a taste of the limelight when he is pressed into service to swell the parade.

A peep into the wardrobe room shows that there is no picking up to do after the men. Every spear, cap, banner, costume, wig and cue has been put into place, so that no work has been made for anyone there to waste time doing.

Almost as brilliant a picture as the ring itself is the large dressing room at the circus, where the performers get into the tinsel. A circus lady's dressing room is really her trunk. It is fitted up with a mirror and a tray like a dressing table. That trunk is all that is really necessary to her comfort and appearance all summer. There are rows and rows of them in the large rooms, but stars—real "swells" of the circus world—have private dressing rooms.

How circus people like each other, how much good-will they have for each other, makes up even more of the charm of circus life than its romance does. Whoever heard of any one's leaving a circus—excepting that "Polly," who, after all, was only a little gray saleswoman at the notion counter in one of these big department stores hereabouts who couldn't in us one day that every first of May it is her habit to cast off this life of saleslady and go on the road as ticket seller with a circus. "And, oh, what a life!" she says, "and me sittin' all winter long in this dull hole!"

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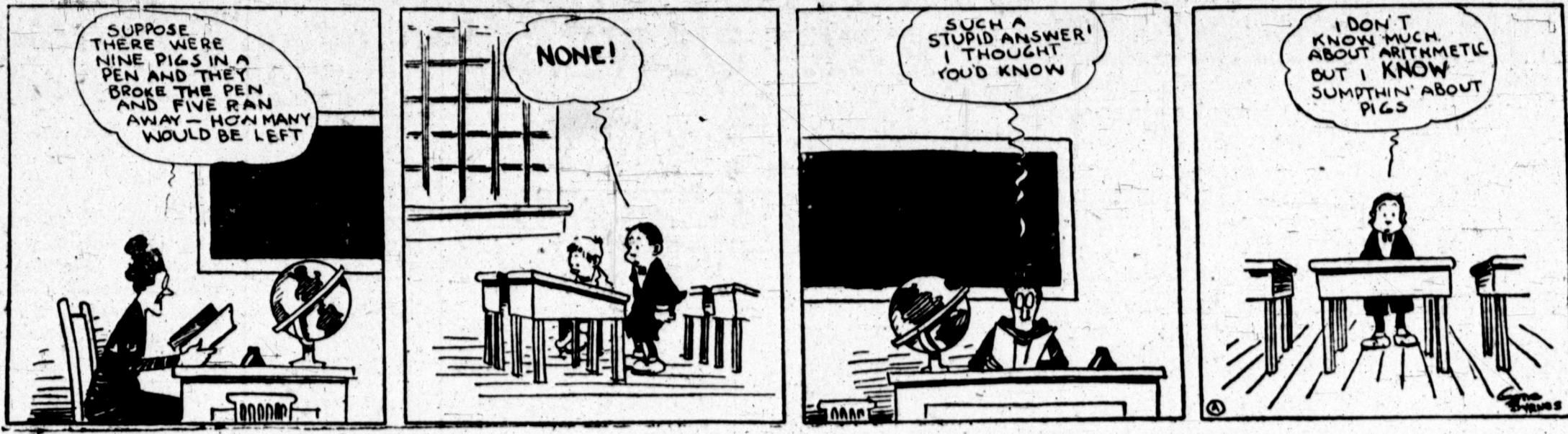

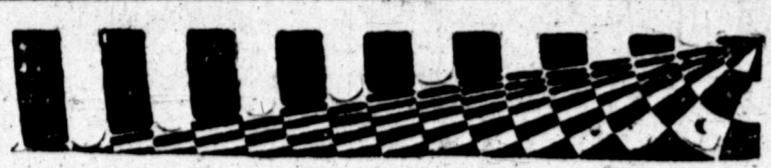
