# Coal Miners Accept Wilson's Proposal CLOTURE RULE IS ADOPTED AT MORNING SESSION UPPER HOUSE;

washington, Nov. 15.—Acceptance without qualification by the mine workers of Secretary of Labor Wilson's proposal for negotiation of a nation-wide scale agreement was announced at the conference today by John L. Lewis, acting president of the United Mine Workers of America.

Speaking on behalf of operators outside the central competitive field, F. Wi Lukens, president of the Southwestern Interstate Coal Operators' Association, proposed returning to the old policy of allowing the basic scale to be negotiated by the operators and the miners in the central competitive the miners in the central competitive

field.

President Lewis sharply denied charges of bad faith over the coal strike and the negotiations and William Green, secretary treasurer of the Mine Workers Union, took exceptions to Secretary Wilson's statement of Friday that a sixty per cent increase in coal miners' wages was impossible. Green said that the Federal government should see that the miners got that much increase to allow them an American standard of living.

Aside from that the miners seemed intent to stand on their expressed determination not to return to work, despite recall of the strike vorder last Tuesday by John L. # ONE HOUR ONLY TO A SPEAKER

WASHINGTON, November 15 .- A cloture to shut down debate on tel peace treaty was adopted today in the senate.

Republican and democratic leaders voted together for the cloture which means that until the treaty is disposed of no senator may speak in all more than one hour. It was estimated that the step would bring final action within a week. The vote adopting the cloture was 78 to 16.

The action, invoking cloture for the first time in the Senate's history, re-sulted in an immediate speeding up suited in an immediate speeding up of the reservation program, the next reservation on the committee list being adopted within one minute with out debate or a roll call. It related to mandates.

The text of the reservation adopted follows: "No mandate shall be accepted by the United States under article 22, part one, or any other provision of the treaty of peace with Germany, except by action of the congress of the United States."





"A scout promises that upon his honor he will do his duty to God and his country and obey the scout law; that he will help other people at all times, and that he will keep himself physically strong, mentally awake and morally straight.

"The scout law, covering the twelve fundamental principles, requires a scout first of all to be trustworthy. That means that he must not tell a lie, cheat or deceive, but keep every trust sacred. A scout is leyal to all to whom loyalty is due, including his scout leader, his home, his parents and his country. Furthermore, a scout is helpful, prepared at all times to save life, help injured persons, and do at all times to save life, help injured persons, and do at least one good turn daily. 





