LOGE RESOLUTION BEFORE THE SENATE

COAL OPERATORS AND MINERS TO COME TO AN AGREEMENT THIS WEEK PREDICT OFFICIALS

CHICAGO, Nov. 15.—Transportation will not be curtailed as a result of a shortage of coal, Rail Director Walker D. Hines announced today following a conference with Register Railroad Directors here.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 15.—Speaking with the authority of President Wilson's chief of staff, Administrator Garfield, told representatives of the bituminous coal operators and miners here today that "the people of the United States... must have coal."

RESERVATIONS EMBODIED IN LODGE RATIFICATION PROGRAM

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 15.—The Lodge resolution for ratification of the treaty of peace, placed before the Senate today, contained reservations already adopted by a majority of the Senate sitting as a committee of the whole.

PRESIDENT STRONGLY URGES THE FRIENDS OF ADMINISTRATION TO DEFEAT THE PLAN AS PRESENTED

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 15.—The final set in the dramatic peace treaty struggle began today with packed galleries.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 15.—At 3 p. m. the Senate still was engaged in debate on the Lodge resolution of ratification with no indication that a vote was in immediate prospect.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 15.—Senator Lodge, republican leader, offered his formal resolution of peace treaty ratification just after the Senate met today.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 15.—A letter from President Wilson advising administration senators to vote against ratification of the treaty with the foreign relations committee reservations was laid before a conference of the administration senate forces today by Democratic Leader Hitchcock.

The conference had been called to decide upon the final administration tactics in the fight for ratification which is expected to come to an end today or tomorrow.

After the President's letter was read there were indications that unless a compromise could be effected the administration senators would line up almost solidly against ratification.

The President's letter, addressed to Senator Hitchcock and dated yesterday, follows:

Dear Senator: You were good enough to bring me word that the Democratic senators supporting the treaty expected to hold a conference before the Senate on the Lodge resolution of ratification and that they would be glad to receive a word of counsel from me.

I should like to assist in any detail but I assume that the senators only desire my judgment upon the all important question of the final vote on the resolution containing the reservations of Senator Lodge. On that I can not hesitate for in my opinion the resolution in that form does not provide for ratification, but rather for the nullification of the treaty.

I trust that all true friends of the treaty will refuse to support the Lodge resolution.

Cordially sincerely yours, WOODROW WILSON.

Plan Seems Blocked. The President's reference to an opportunity to vote on a "genuine resolution of ratification" referred to the plans of the Democrats to get action on an unreserved resolution after they had voted down the Lodge proposal.

The Democratic leaders, however, say they have been promised a chance to vote on an unreserved resolution before the committee resolution is voted on.

Today's committee action took up that situation with the leaders hoping that they might obtain such modification of the resolution as would enable them to vote for it.

Republican Leader Lodge in a formal statement predicted that the senate would "not obey the orders of President Wilson with regard to the treaty."

The senate has equal power and responsibility with the President in the making of treaties, Senator Lodge said. They will not, in my opinion, obey the orders of the president, who undertakes to command the senate to ratify the treaty without the reservations adopted by a large majority of the senate, which Americanize it and make it safe for the United States.

What he commands will not, in my judgment, be done.

Report the Discovery Of A Plot to Slay Officials With Explosive Packages

MAYOR CENSURES MEMBERS OF LEGION FOR MAKING RAID

PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 15.—Discovery of a "Red" plot to slay officials with explosive Christmas mail packages was announced today by Superintendent of Police James Robinson.

Information of the plot, which he considers reliable, indicates it is a nationwide one directed against federal, state and city authorities who took part in the national roundup of radicals planning the overthrow of the government.

CINCINNATI, Nov. 15.—Mayor John W. Galvin today severely censured members of the Robert Bentley post of the American Legion, who raided the headquarters of the Socialist party here last night and burned a quantity of supposed radical literature.

The mayor designated the raid as a mob raid and asserted that it showed a lack of patriotism and good citizenship. He also said that he would investigate the failure of the police to intervene.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 15.—"I will arrest and prosecute any one who is responsible who sells beet sugar at 20 cents a pound," Attorney General Palmer said today when told that Governor Cox of Ohio, according to figures of the sugar trust, is selling beet sugar at that price in Ohio.

Eleven cents is a fair price for sugar retail, according to Palmer. The wholesale price should be 10 cents, he said.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 15.—Not profits deprived by the government from operation of the railroad in September were \$3,911,419, according to figures of the month made public today by the railroad administration.

The operating revenues totaled \$49,442,854, an increase of \$9,765,697, over the same month a year ago. Operating expenses increased to \$29,531,435, or \$2,914,217 higher than September 1918.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 15.—President Wilson paved the way for immediate adjustment of the busss today by signing the bill creating an equipment trust to refund the government the \$400,000,000 advanced to the roads for locomotives and cars during federal control and the resolution continuing until next January the restrictions on dye imports.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 15.—Six months to the day after the congress convened in special session the house formally adjourned at 4:12 p. m. today after receiving word from President Wilson that he did not object to the action.

The adjournment resolution was adopted by a vote of 55 to 5.

Unions to Share in the Management of British Railroads

LONDON, Nov. 15.—The railway men's union accepted the government's proposal giving the union a share of the management of the roads.

The proposal, announced recently by a conference before the House of Commons, provides for a joint board of control representing the government, the railway men and the unions. Disputes are to be referred to a similar joint board.

ARE ARRIVING AT FORT WORTH FOR MEETING

Officials of Texas and Oklahoma to Confer on Dispute Over Boundary.

FORT WORTH, TEX., Nov. 15.—The delegates to the conference between Texas and Oklahoma officials to settle the dispute over the boundary of oil wells in the disputed territory soon began arriving at this afternoon. The first was the Texas receiver, John W. Hornsby of Austin. The Texas attorney general, C. M. Cureton, is expected this afternoon. The two governors and party are due early Thursday morning.

OKLAHOMA OFFICIALS LEAVE FOR MEETING

OKLAHOMA CITY, Nov. 15.—Governor J. B. Robertson, Attorney General S. P. Freeling and members of the state land office commission left here today for Fort Worth, Texas, where they are expected to meet Governor Hobby and other Texas officials in an effort to bring about an amicable settlement of the Red River boundary dispute between the two states.

The ownership of large oil properties is involved on the question of whether the Red River, as it now exists, forms the boundary line between Oklahoma and Texas. An original bill of complaint recently filed in the United States supreme court by Attorney General Freeling of Oklahoma claims that the Prairie Dog Turn fork of the river as it existed in 1810 still marks the state's southern boundary.

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Action on Proposal to Try the Kaiser Within Few Weeks

LONDON, Nov. 15.—Action on the proposal to try the former Kaiser is hoped for by Christmas, according to the Telegraph, which said the attorney general and the solicitor general of Great Britain are in Paris conferring with the supreme council regarding the proposed trial.

FEDERAL GRAIN CORPORATION IS TO SELL FLOUR

Expected the Retail Price Will Be 75c for Twelve and Quarter-Pound Sack.

NEW YORK, Nov. 15.—The United States Grain Corporation announced today it soon will offer to the public "pure straight" flour, made from the finest wheat in 24- and 13-1/2-pound packages at prices which will reflect the Grain Corporation buying price of the flour.

The flour will be available in about three weeks in larger cities, the statement said. It is expected the retail price will be about 75 cents for a 13-1/2 pound sack.

Excluding the flour, which will be packed under the corporation's own brand, was reached at a conference of vice presidents of the Eastern grain here yesterday, Wheat Director Barnes said.

The opinion strongly prevails here that Great Britain will not accept any reservations made by the United States Senate which would necessitate the negotiation of a new treaty with the British government. It is believed, however, that the British government has every present intention of abiding by the decisions of the Paris conference.

The bill still exists in this country and the American government will ultimately take its place with the Allies. Meanwhile there appears to be a possibility that Great Britain and the others will proceed without the pact operative.

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### A LONE BANDIT ROBS TRAIN AND MAKES ESCAPE

Seven Poses and a Troop of Cavalry Are Scouring Hills and Valleys.

### ONLY RECENTLY ESCAPED FROM THE PENITENTIARY

Old Men, Women, Children, Soldiers and Sailors Were Exempt by Robber.

CHEYENNE, WYO., Nov. 19.—Seven poses and a troop of cavalry from fort D. A. Russell were today searching the hills and valleys around Medicine Bow for William Carlisle, a lone bandit, who last night robbed passengers on Union Pacific No. 19 train, the Los Angeles Limited, and escaped into the darkness, wounded in a shower of bullets. The bandit Carlisle boarded the train at Rock River, entered a tourist sleeper by smashing a vestibule window, fired one shot through the roof of the car to terrify passengers and forced all but "old men, women, children, soldiers and sailors" to contribute. "I do not rob these," he told the passengers.

As Carlisle stood in the vestibule, waiting for the train to stop, a passenger fired at close range and the bandit is believed to have been hit. He carried a rifle over his shoulder and a pistol in his hand. Blood was

found on the pistol, which the bandit dropped in his hurried escape. His hat was found by the train guard. Passengers were positive from description that the bandit is Carlisle, who escaped from the state prison at Rawlins, Saturday.

Poses Organized. Within a few hours of the robbery, poses had been sent into the Medicine Bow district where the bandit left the train, from Claymore, Saratoga, Laramie, Medicine Bow, Wheatland, Rock River and Rock Springs. It was thought Carlisle might have sought cover in the district 50 miles north of Wheatland where he hid for three weeks in 1916.

A large posse, organized following Carlisle's escape from prison in a box of shirts, left Wamsutter yesterday for the Red Desert where Carlisle was believed to be hiding. While the posse was detouring at the Wamsutter depot, an eastbound passenger train passed with a man said to answer Carlisle's description riding the rods. The incident was forgotten until reports of last night's robbery were received.

Carlisle was captured in 1916 following a series of train robberies and sentenced to prison for life. He was a model prisoner and a credited Liberty bonds and the Red Cross. Because of this his sentence was commuted to 25 to 50 years last September.

Carlisle is said to have boasted that he could escape from prison any time he desired. "I am here because I want to be here," he is said to have told prison officials. Saturday he was hidden in a box of shirts which left the prison shirt factory. The box was delivered to the Union Pacific freight house where Carlisle saw his way out. He obtained civilian clothes from a sheep herder and stole ammunition and weapons from cabins.

### MAKE PREPARATIONS FOR TRI-COUNTY INSTITUTE

STAMFORD, TEX., Nov. 19.—The Parent-Teacher Association is devising means to entertain visiting teachers in homes during the Tri-County Institute, December 15 to 19, inclusive. A nominal charge for room and board has been agreed upon, which is thought to be in conformity with salaries paid teachers, and every citizen is invited to entertain one or more teachers. Nothing will be left undone in making institute week one of pleasure to all. An interesting program has been prepared for this occasion. Hon. Annie Webb Blanton, state superintendent of public instruction, and Dr. Vinson of the University of Texas are among the distinguished speakers to be here at that time.

### PLAN TO ELIMINATE FUEL PROFITEERING

WACO, TEX., Nov. 19.—To eliminate profiteering in wood for fuel the city commissioners have appointed a committee to "explore territory contiguous to Waco and procure therefrom all available firewood," which will be shipped to the city and sold to consumers at actual cost. Complete with the coal shortage the supply of wood ran low and it is said the most inferior grade was sold on the public square at \$15 a cord. The city commissioners are of the opinion the city will be able to furnish wood at half the present selling price.

### EGYPTIAN MINISTRY TENDERS RESIGNATION

LONDON, Nov. 19.—The Egyptian ministry has resigned because of dissatisfaction with the mission appointed by Lord Milner, secretary for the colonies, for the investigation of the unrest in Egypt, according to official dispatches from Cairo today. Rioting occurred all day yesterday in Alexandria. The military restored order.

### PEACE CONFERENCE TO SETTLE DANZIG QUESTION

WARSAW, Nov. 18.—The peace conference will be asked to settle Polish-German controversies involving the free town of Danzig. It was announced here today. The German-Polish conference in Berlin has failed to reach any satisfactory conclusion and negotiations have been stopped.

### AUSTRALIA SUFFERS MOST DEVASTATING DROUGHT IN HISTORY

LONDON, Nov. 19.—Australia, especially New South Wales, is suffering the most devastating drought since white men have resided in that country, according to a Sydney dispatch to the Daily Mail.

Stocks and crops have been destroyed and it is doubtful whether there will be enough seed wheat for next season's sowing. Hundreds and perhaps thousands of settlers have been ruined. Northwestern New South Wales is described as a desert, stripped of everything green. Paddock are littered with the skeletons of cattle, and even rabbits are dying in vast numbers.

### TRAFFIC SAFETY LEAGUE FOR UNIFORM LAWS

DALLAS, TEX., Nov. 19.—A traffic safety league of 200 Dallas citizens is working on plans for a similar state wide movement to have traffic laws and regulations observed, the management of the Dallas Automobile Club has announced. The plan is to supply 200 citizens with cards which they will fill out, with the name, time and nature of the offense of drivers which comes to their notice. These cards, addressed to the automobile club, will be mailed, and the club will then write the offender inviting him to call at the club and explain why he failed to observe the law. If the invitation is ignored a second letter will be sent him, and if this is ignored his case will be taken to the police court.

"There hasn't been an issue of any daily paper in Dallas for several days that did not report an automobile accident, and in almost every instance some one was seriously injured," said E. Dick Spillers, manager of the Dallas automobile club. "This club will lend its full support to the safety first campaign. The object is to insist on more careful driving and not to prosecute a violator. If, however, a violator is reported a second time his case will be taken to the courts."

CHICAGO, Nov. 19.—Mystery surrounding the identity of the "Mrs. Mary Duke" who was taken from Lake Michigan a few days ago, today had been cleared up. She was identified by Theodore Machold, an automobile dealer of St. Joseph, Michigan, as his mother, Mrs. Mary Machold of El Paso, Texas. Mrs. Machold had been missing since last July, her son said, when her mind became unbalanced through grieving for another son she believed killed in France. Mrs. Machold, who said she was homeless, yesterday was offered and accepted a home proffered by a Chicago woman.

### BEES ARE STARVING FOR LACK OF SUGAR

SAN ANTONIO, TEX., Nov. 19.—Bees in Texas are starving for lack of sugar and unless relief is obtained apiculturists say damage to the honey-making industry will reach many thousands of dollars, according to E. G. Lestourgeon, president of the Texas Beekeepers Association. Heavy rains washed the nectar from late flowers, and damaged honey in the hives. Because of the shortage of sugar, twenty colonies of bees had starved, one beekeeper reported.

### BURGLARS ARE AFTER MORE VALUABLE GOODS

DALLAS, Nov. 19.—The bulk of the loot of Dallas burglars consists no longer of expensive jewelry and fine jewelry—but of wearing apparel. Of 40 thefts reported one week 21 of the law-breakers stole clothing, or other necessities of life. In only two instances was jewelry stolen.

### TOLEDO RAILWAYS RENEWS FIGHT TO RESUME SERVICE

TOLEDO, O., Nov. 19.—The Toledo Railways and Light Company, driven from the streets two weeks ago by an ouster ordinance approved by the voters, renewed its efforts today to secure signatures to a petition for submitting to the voters a 25 year franchise which provides for resumption of car service on a cost plus plan. Details of the ordinance were announced as providing for straight five cent fare with one cent extra for a transfer. The rate of fare when the cars were withdrawn on November 5, was six cents and two cents for a transfer.

The building will be located on the west side of Scott with a 60 foot front and will extend back to the alley.

WANT LIGHT TO PROTECT CITIZENS

To The Times: Last night about 8:30 (dark) when I was walking on Ninth and Polk, two white women, one white man and three negro bucks got off.

When she saw the white man turn to go west on Ninth she slackened her walk to allow the three negroes to gain distance, as they got off the car ahead of all the whites.

By this time the negroes were far enough ahead that they could hardly tell there were three except for their heads bobbing up and down past a streak of light from the electric light in front of Mrs. Tumbally's house on Tenth and Polk.

When the three negroes reached the garage on the alley between Ninth and Tenth, they turned and looked back. This made the woman feel a little nervous and she noticed that just at that time there was no passing either by auto or pedestrian, so she walked more slowly.

When the three negroes had passed the alley about five feet they stepped out to one side on the parking to allow, as they do, doubt thought, the lone, unsuspecting white woman to pass.

When the three negroes saw what they had done she turned and went back to the corner of Ninth and Polk to wait until some white person came along.

When the three negroes saw she had turned they got back on the walk and went on. A few minutes later a 17 or 18 year old boy came along and the woman asked him to go past the alley with her.

He said he had met the three negroes and admitted he was sometimes nervous when passing that alley.

No white woman should pass along there after dark unless attended either by some person or a gun. She says that the next time three negro bucks step to one side in some dark place to allow her to pass she will be prepared to emphatically ask them to move on, and if necessary insist on their moving to the bewitching strains of a friendly automatic.

There is no alley in town that needs an electric light any more than one on Polk street between Ninth and Tenth. Every night there are a number of negro men get off the cars, from one to four on every car, and go across Tenth to some servant's house in that part of town.

Between Tyler and Kemp Boulevard, east of Tenth street, there is a space about five blocks square where almost every house has a servant's house and each servant's house supports from one to three negro bucks and one can look out most any time of the day and see a bunch of blacks strolling along the street. They are nearly always dressed better than the average working white man dresses.

However, the three mentioned above were vagabond looking men. One was tall, one medium and the other a little below the medium. This was noticed as their heads bobbed passed the streak of light spoken of. If their intentions were as suspected, they must have been greatly disappointed in not being able to replenish their purse to the amount of street car fare for another week.

# DRASTIC BILL TO STOP "RED" ACTIVITY IN U. S.

Submitted to Senate By Department of Justice in Measure by Senator Nelson.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 19.—Drastic measures for the suppression of "Reds" in the United States were submitted to the Senate today by the department of justice in a bill introduced by Senator Nelson, chairman of the Senate Judiciary committee.

The bill, drawn by the department of justice, defines seditious persons as those who "advocate, oppose, prevent, hinder, delay or seek to do any of these things against the free performance of the government or one of its officers."

Under the section of the bill which deals with aliens convicted of spreading seditious matter and advocating Bolshevism the department of labor is given authority to deport all such aliens who are hereafter barred from the United States.

Failure of government departments to aid the country of foreign agitators who have been advocating anarchy and the overthrow of the government will be investigated by the House immigration committee during the next 30 days.

The first step will be to confer with Attorney General Palmer with regard to transferring all deportation work to the department of justice, instead of having it divided between this agency and the labor department.

STAMFORD, TEX., Nov. 19.—The additional passenger train to have been operated between Waco and Stamford over the M. K. & T. lines, beginning November 2, was delayed indefinitely in beginning its operation.

Officials of the M. K. & T. railroad have always shown an inclination to be friendly to Stamford and any request made upon them has always been considered and given courteous attention.

KERMIT ROOSEVELT AND MOTHER GO TO BRAZIL

OYSTER BAY, Nov. 19.—Captain Kermit Roosevelt, accompanied by his mother, Mrs. Theodore Roosevelt, will sail today for Rio Janeiro, Captain Roosevelt, who is connected with the Erie Transportation Company, is making the trip for business purposes and plans to visit cities in Brazil, Chile and Argentina.

# PRINCE OF WALES IS HAVING A TIME IN NEW YORK CITY

NEW YORK, Nov. 19.—The Prince of Wales, now a full fledged New Yorker in his own right, was up bright and early today to "see the sights."

Pleased by the warmth of his welcome yesterday, when he was made a free man by Mayor Hylan, the youthful heir to the British throne displayed boyish eagerness to become acquainted with the city.

His morning program included a trip to the top of the fifty-four story Woolworth building, an automobile ride through famous thoroughfares; visits to the stock exchange, the United States sub-treasury building, historic Trinity church and the Chamber of Commerce.

The Prince has captured the heart of New York by his democratic bearing. He was greeted with unusual warmth everywhere he went. The crowds, showing a democratic disregard for royal dignity, saluted him with such remarks as "Hello, Prince" and "Hello Eddie!"

The Prince is guarded by 2,500 special policemen and federal secret service agents but there has been little for them to do.



### DOCTOR GRAFTON A LEADER IN TRINITY MILLION CAMPAIGN

#### ACTIVE WORK TO SECURE FUND FOR UNIVERSITY TO BEGIN DECEMBER 7

#### PROCLAIMED DAY OF PRAYER

Dr. Wear to Oversee the Raising of the Texas Fund and Has Entered Upon Duties.

DALLAS, Texas, Nov. 18.—Texas Presbyterian leaders of the principal cities of the state have been appointed on a committee to aid in securing a \$1,000,000 endowment fund for Trinity University at Waco, Tex. The active campaign for which begins December 7. This day has been proclaimed by the Presbyterian synod of Texas as a day of prayer among the churches of the state for the success of the campaign.

Trinity University is on the 1919 list of those educational institutions to be aided by the \$35,000,000 campaign of the General Board of Education of the Presbyterian church in the U. S. This five-year program of the church is achieving great headway and it is expected that Texas will have no difficulty in securing the sum she is after, which will be added to the funds secured in \$35,000,000 campaign. The other sixty-seven Presbyterian colleges will also receive the aid of the church at large within the five years.

Dr. Webb Chairman. Following is the personnel of the Texas committee appointed for the million dollar project: Dr. B. Wrenn of Dallas, chairman; Dr. Nathaniel F. Grafton of Wichita Falls, Dr. Glenn L. Sneed of Dallas, Dr. M. C. Johnson of Nagardoches, Dr. Bob Alec Hodges of Temple, Dr. Floyd Poe of El Paso, Dr. James M. Todd of San Antonio, Rev. W. Clyde Howard of Houston, Rev. Samuel M. Bennett of Arlington, Rev. H. E. Beseda of Fort Lavaca.

Judge F. W. Melvin, Rev. Thomas W. Davidson of San Angelo and Dr. E. L. Moore of Honey Grove, Texas.

As field secretary to oversee the raising of the Texas funds, Dr. F. L. Wear, pastor of the Central Presbyterian church of Hartselle, Ala., was elected. He recently entered on his duties and reports encouraging progress. Another field man will be appointed soon.

Quota is Assigned. In order that each of the seven presbyteries of the state might have an equitable share in the raising of the funds an apportionment has been made as follows: Abilene presbytery, \$40,000; Amarillo presbytery, \$100,000; Austin presbytery, \$30,000; Brownwood presbytery, \$20,000; Dallas presbytery, \$165,000; El Paso presbytery, \$40,000; Fort Worth presbytery, \$100,000; Houston presbytery, \$30,000; Jefferson presbytery, \$35,000; Paris presbytery, \$151,000; S. W. Bohemian presbytery, \$5,000; and presbytery of Wichita, \$20,000.

Much interest is manifested throughout the state in Trinity University and in the campaign to be waged in its behalf. Presbyterians and others in Texas have come to realize that it is impossible to maintain a first class educational institution without adequate endowment and sufficient funds for operating expenses.

Trinity University is widely acknowledged to be doing a great work for young men and young women of Texas, and although under the Presbyterian church is attended by students of all denominations, the Sunday-school, women's societies and through the press. The Presbyteries receiving their apportionments respectation to the various churches within their bounds and these churches then attempt to raise their quota. Outside aid will also be received.

#### AMERICAN DELEGATION TO SAIL DEC. 5 OR 6

PARIS, Nov. 18.—The American delegation to the peace conference will sail for home on December 5 or 6, it was learned today.

The British delegation will probably leave Paris about the same time, although no official announcement has been made.

### TO START BUILDING NEW KATY WAREHOUSE

#### FIRST OF YEAR DATE SET FOR BEGINNING OF CONSTRUCTION

Building operations on the new K. & T. office and warehouse which is to cost \$100,000 will start about the first of January, it was announced at the local offices Tuesday.

While the exact location has not yet been selected, it will in all probability be on Ohio street between Ninth and Tenth.

The office portion will be three stories in height and will be 60 feet square, with the one story warehouse extending back for 155 feet more. The building will be constructed entirely of brick, and will be strictly modern and fire-proof.

### MAKE INQUIRIES REGARDING THE USE OF OIL BURNERS

AUSTIN, TEX., Nov. 18.—Many Texas industries which have been using coal for fuel are directing inquiries to the fire insurer a commission regarding the increased fire hazards of temporary installation of oil burning equipment to carry them through the coal strike. Authorities of the commission estimate that fully one-third of the Texas industries will be burning oil within sixty days if the coal shortage continues, and they are endeavoring to adjust fire hazards and insurance policies to meet the new conditions.

### EVER INCREASING DEMAND FOR HIGHWAY ENGINEERS

COLLEGE STATION, TEX., Nov. 18.—Realizing the shortage and ever-increasing demand from highway engineers, the Federal board of vocational education, section of rehabilitation, has decided to set certain educational institutions where disabled men are being trained to offer special two-year courses in this study.

Disabled soldiers are being trained in practically every college in the state at present. The men are paid a minimum of \$80 a month and allowed to choose the kind of education they want, and are then placed in the schools which offer the desired studies.

### HIGH COST OF LIVING HAS INCREASED TUBERCULOSIS

AUSTIN, TEX., Nov. 18.—The high cost of living has increased tuberculosis and it is expected that despite the fight being waged against it, the death toll of the white plague which claimed 4,851 victims in Texas last year, will increase correspondingly, according to an announcement by the Texas public health association.

High prices have brought insufficient and poor food, clothing and shelter to many and this, together with the epidemic of influenza and pneumonia, has so weakened the people as to reduce their resistance to consumption according to the statement.

### SINCLAIR PEOPLE SECURE LEASES IN GRAYSON COUNTY

DENISON, Texas, Nov. 18.—Activities in the local wildcatting field for the week ending today show that there has been no let-up in lease of lands, there being many changes of leases from private parties to companies and much work done with the assistance of the fair weather.

Early in the week the Detroit firm, whose local work is in charge of Emery Wiley, announced definitely that they had ordered material for their first test east of the city. This company has closed drilling contracts and will start in the first deep test as soon as tools and derricks material can be had.

The Grayson County Oil and Gas company made a definite announcement Thursday of its first test that will be made one and one-half miles south of the Westover No. 1 test. This company and will fully develop this acreage with several tests. Tools and rig lumber have been ordered.

The Westover No. 1 test will be continued as soon as a new string of tools that have arrived are set. This test has been tied up in a law suit for some time, but no time was lost by Mr. Westover in his operations.

One of the largest deals made during the week was that of the Sinclair Consolidated Oil and Gas company, which closed two contracts for acreage near Denison. This company, it is said, will make deep tests in this territory soon.

The Miller Oil Corporation, with headquarters in Oklahoma City, has two accounts in the local field and no doubt within another week will have secured acreage upon which will be placed several deep tests. This company has a reputation of doing things and by coming into the local field proves again that the Denison fields are attracting widespread attention.

Within another week Denison will have service of a ship-track concern. A company from Stephenville and Dallas will shortly open offices here and place in the local fields a string of large trucks for hauling heavy well machinery to local fields.

Drilling on the Viola well and the Peter No. 1 well has continued throughout the week without interruption and both tests are now going down very rapidly.

The Western Drilling company has a number of men in the field and is erecting its second derrick for the No. 1 well, a mile north of Denison. The derrick is set for the No. 1 test east of Denison, with considerable machinery on hand for work that will likely be begun next week.

All in all, the week just closing has been one of progress in the local wildcatting fields and has been favorable to oil men and field workers.

### VERNON BANKS HAVE DEPOSITS OF THREE AND QUARTER MILLION

VERNON, TEX., Nov. 18.—Figures given out here show that the total bank deposits in local institutions have reached \$3,250,000, a high mark in the financial history of Wilbarger county. Each of two banks here now has a million or more in deposits.

Contrasts with last year show that deposits have more than doubled in 12 months. Last year was one of the hardest years in the history of this region, while this year is probably the most prosperous ever experienced by the people of this section.

Last year banks in some cases had loaned more than their total deposits, while farmers were beneficiaries of the state drought relief fund, and were forced to buy feed with which to tide their workstock over the period of extreme drought. Much of the seed that produced this year's bumper wheat crop was bought with money advanced by the federal government.

This year the yields of cotton, wheat, feedstuff and corn are extraordinarily large, and the whole county is in a highly prosperous condition. The unusual wildcat exploitation of oil lands in the county, coupled with the unprecedented influx of population have added much to the "hushness" of the local situation.

### EXPRESS COMPANY ASKS POSTPONEMENT OF STANFORD CASE

STAMFORD, Texas, Nov. 18.—E. E. Horn and G. Y. Reed of the American Railway Express company have been in conference with the shippers here in connection with the shippers of Stamford, asking for a sixty day postponement of the hearing ordered by the Railroad Commission for November 18th, regarding the construction of an express depot here.

After giving assurances that the express company would do everything to relieve present conditions and to construct this depot as soon as possible, the shippers asked for this postponement. This is hoped to be a termination of his complaints on express service. However, no cessation of effects of securing will be noticed until the building has been erected.

Route Agent Hardin has been stationed at Abilene and instructed to visit the express office at least once each week until satisfactory method of meeting requirements of shippers is reached.

### WORK RESUMED ON LEMON FARM TEST NEAR NACONA, TEX.

NACONA, Texas, Nov. 18.—Work was resumed today on the Nocona Oil & Gas company test on the Lemon farm, about eight miles north and a little east of Nocona. Two to three million of gas was struck in this well at 2,340 feet, when the well was shut down. It attracted considerable attention on account of its location, being about 23 miles southwest of Healdton and on the Pennsylvania structure which extends from Hanger and beyond to Red river and into Oklahoma. It may be a week before work on the well begins, as it is necessary to move the coal over to the boiler which was moved back when the gas was struck, and any other preparations necessary before drilling begins.

This well will be watched with considerable interest. The Red River Oil & Gas company is making progress around 1,300 feet. This well has had favorable formation conditions, and is located on the W. W. Jones farm, out of the Wm. Donoho survey, and about 7 miles north of Wichita Falls, Nocona and Gainesville capital.

The campus had reports of a revolution in Captain Billy Murray's ranks, rumors of a sudden change in the lineup and "grape vines" of several of the big boys being booked for a reserved seat on the bench.





### PROMOTION PLANS OF PAN-MOTOR CO. AIRED IN COURT

CHICAGO, Nov. 19.—Business and promotion methods used by Samuel Pandolfo, president of the Pan-Motor Company, were aired today in the trial of the firm's officials before Judge Landis.

C. K. Hadahall, former secretary of the Pan-American Investment Co. of San Antonio, Texas, admitted under cross examination the company was organized in 1914 to help Pandolfo get credit.

### PETITION FOR MANDAMUS IS REFUSED BY COURT

AUSTIN, Nov. 19.—Petition for mandamus was refused today by the supreme court in the case of W. A. Mathias et al versus E. J. Clark, district judge of McLennan county. The relators sought by a writ of mandamus to compel the district judge to vacate an agreed judgment for letting the charter of the Texas Bonding and Fidelity Company and to require the commissioner of insurance and banking to ignore the judgment of the district court. In refusing to grant the mandamus, Associate Justice William E. Hawkins, who wrote the opinion, held that the judgment was entered by a court having jurisdiction over the subject, and further that the court cannot proceed to direct or control the action of the commissioner.

The supreme court reserved and remanded the case of the Galveston, Harrisburg & San Antonio Railway Co. against the state of Texas, from Fayette county. In the lower court the state had recovered a penalty of \$2,000 from the railroad company for the alleged violation of the law requiring railroads to maintain water closets at or within a reasonable distance from the station of Flatonia. In reversing the case the court held the facts not justify the imposition of the penalty.

### TEXAS ROADS MAY SECURE EXEMPTION FROM THE EMBARGO

AUGEN, TEX., Nov. 19.—Exemption of a considerable portion of the Texas railroad system from the general embargo which is being threatened because of the coal shortage could be secured, because nearly all the principal lines use oil for fuel, according to a statement by Railroad Commissioner Allison Mayfield today.

With the exception of the Texas & Pacific and the Missouri, Kansas & Texas, principal lines were burning oil before the coal situation developed, he said, and these two were preparing to install oil burning engines. Naturally, he continued, the suspension of interstate traffic by the tying up of roads of other states would cripple Texas transportation, and to some extent intrastate traffic would be demoralized by cutting off the coal supply, but most of the roads could continue necessary freight and passenger service.

The fact that many Texas commercial plan to use oil and gas for fuel would also lighten the blow, according to Mr. Mayfield.

### CHARTER EXPERT NOT IN FAVOR ELECTION OF CITY OFFICIALS

The absence of city government was explained Wednesday by Dr. A. R. Hatton of Cleveland, Ohio, here to write the new city charter, to members of the Wichita Club at the weekly luncheon.

Dr. Hatton is professor of political economy at Western Reserve University and is widely known as an economist and an authority of city government.

He spoke at length on various forms of city government now in vogue in various American and European cities, and came out directly in favor of the so-called "manager form" of city administration and strongly in opposition to the present system of elective executive officials.

Dr. Hatton declared that the cities of the United States would never have efficient officials as long as they present elective system of executive officials was in use. The speaker asserted that men competent to successfully manage the executive end of a large city administration always had better-paying positions than the majority of our cities pay and consequently would not take office even if elected. He advocated the manager system men are selected because of their special executive ability and not because of their political creeds.

Dr. Hatton reviewed the history of municipal government in the United States for the past century. He declared that the "manager system" was the original plan used in America but that the system was discarded there for political reasons.

He asserted that the manager system had been in use for years in the cities of the British empire and of continental Europe and was everywhere meeting with success. The speaker used the municipal government of the smaller cities of England, France and Switzerland as examples of splendid city administration and asserted that American cities would have similar administrations if they inaugurated the manager system.

Dr. Hatton spoke at length on the "commission form" of government as used by Galveston. He said that Galveston was the "pioneer American city in governmental reform" and that other cities of the Southwest would do well to make a study of the "Galveston plan."

He also went into the details of city government, explaining the evil effects of a chaotic administration every two or four years together with the evils of "political rings" and similar organizations that breed in cities where the present elective system is in force.

An interesting feature of the luncheon program was talks and music by members of the motion picture company who are here perfecting a picture, "Wichita Gold," the plot of which is laid in oil fields of this section.

Replying to William Green, secretary of the United Mine Workers, Dr. Garfield explained that the fuel administration in increasing the price of coal during the war had made an allowance of 15 cents for overhead because there was not time to make a minute examination into every case and for the same reason 30 cents was allowed as royalty.

Goods Thing to Do.

Referring to the 25 cents allowed for wages Dr. Garfield said that was "a crude thing to do" but that it was later found that the amount was in the average absorbed for wages.

Thomas T. Brewster, chairman of the operators' senate committee, told the miners that "a fabulous margin in the coal industry does not exist," Dr. Garfield's "impartial figures," he said, had refuted the reports of enormous profits in the coal business, but, which, he said, had been run on a "slender margin."

### FIVE THOUSAND FAIL TO FILE INCOME TAX RETURNS SAYS AGENT

ESTIMATES BASED ON FINDINGS IN "DELINQUENCY DRIVE" HERE.

### DELINQUENTS MUST EXPLAIN

Commissioners to Decide Whether Fines and Penalties to Be Imposed.

Five thousand residents of Wichita county failed to file income tax returns due to be turned in to the internal revenue collector last spring, according to the estimate of Deputy Collector A. F. Bowden.

The estimate is based upon a list compiled after a careful investigation of "delinquency drive" underway during the past few months.

Complication of the figures now in the hands of the government required the services of three special assistants who are still at work bringing the drive to a conclusion. The assistants are E. C. Jordan, G. S. Murphy and J. J. Alexander.

The law requires single men who made \$1000 or more and married men who made \$2000 or more to file returns. Each delinquent is to be summoned before the revenue collector and asked to explain his failure to file returns.

The full extent of the law governing such cases calls for a fine of \$1000 for failure to file without a reasonable excuse, additional penalty of 25 per cent of the taxable sum, and further fine of \$10,000 if the delinquent is adjudged guilty of willfully trying to evade the tax.

The revenue officers here are authorized to receive the explanation of alleged delinquents, assess the 25 per cent penalty and submit the question of the additional fines to the commissioner in Washington who is the final judge as to the acceptability of the excuses offered.

In some cases citizens are exempted even from the twenty-five per cent fine, but only in well defined and infrequent instances.

Mr. Bowden expects the majority of the list he has compiled to be able to offer legitimate excuses. The government does not publicly define what it considers "reasonable" explanation, leaving the collector and commissioner free to use his own judgment.

"Decisions are based on circumstances," Mr. Bowden states, "throughout the law to of course the general rule by which we are guided."

In discussing the work of next year in collecting 1935 taxes, Mr. Bowden said he expects Wichita county to pay as great an income tax as any other county in the state, judging from the information he has already in hand. He and his corps of assistants

LOGE RESOLUTION DEFEATED IN SENATE

COAL OPERATORS AND MINERS TO COME TO AN AGREEMENT THIS WEEK PREDICT OFFICIALS

CHICAGO, Nov. 19.—Transportation will not be curtailed at present because of shortage of coal, said Director Walker D. Hines announced today following a conference with Regional Railroad Directors here.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 19.—Speaking with the authority of President Wilson's cabinet, Fuel Administrator Garfield today predicted that the bituminous coal operators and miners here today that "the people of the United States need, must have and will have coal," and as long as the government stands they will not be prevented from getting it by "anything the operators and miners may do."

WASHINGTON, Nov. 19.—Coal operators and miners will come to an agreement this week, labor department officials predicted today before the opening of a joint conference called by Fuel Administrator Garfield.

Public is Partner. "We all realize now that in the great coal industry the public is an important partner. At one time the operators and mine workers, like farmers, considered themselves peculiarly independent. But the public has a paramount interest."

"The people of the United States are willing to pay sufficient to maintain American standards of living, but the question is what are American standards? The people want the operators to have a just return, but what is a just return?"

Dr. Garfield expressed regret that the operators and miners had not established a permanent body to adjust their disputes. "Lacking that, he said, the question revolved around the cost of production."

During 1918, he said, \$2,000,000,000 was paid for bituminous coal, the average price being \$3.81 per ton. The production cost was \$1.50 per ton, the miners receiving \$1,000,000,000, or an average of \$1.50 per ton. A total of \$280,000,000 went to the mine owners, but Dr. Garfield said this was not all profit as the income tax and excess profits tax had to be deducted.

"In 1917," Dr. Garfield said, "the taxes amounted to 30 cents a ton average over the whole country but it is difficult to estimate for 1918. The taxes of 1918, however, to come out of the margins are somewhat less, I believe, than in 1917 but I will continue my investigation to determine them accurately."

Lewis Asks Question. "Do you think the mine workers should give consideration to the operators' proposal to have a 'cost-plus' contract?" asked John L. Lewis, president of the United Mine Workers of America.

"The question is whether the consumer should pay enough to cover the excess profits tax and at the same time give the operators their normal profit too," replied Dr. Garfield.

"If the federal government took all the money by income, even that circumstance should not prevent the miners from asking reasonable increases," said Lewis.

"Well, we must bear in mind that the Lever act guarantees a reasonable profit on the production of fuel," returned Dr. Garfield. "Of course congress is responsible for all tax enactments."

RESERVATIONS EMBODIED IN LODGE RATIFICATION PROGRAM

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 19.—The Lodge resolution for ratification of the treaty of peace, placed before the Senate today, contained reservations already adopted by a majority of the Senate sitting as a committee of the whole.

- 1.—Reserving to the United States full right to decide whether it has met all international obligations under League in event America desires to withdraw.
2.—Reserving complete freedom of action under Article 10.
3.—Reserving to Congress only the right to accept mandates in behalf of the United States.
4.—Reserving to the United States the right to decide what questions are domestic matters and beyond the League's jurisdiction.
5.—Excluding the Monroe doctrine from the jurisdiction of the League.
6.—Withholding assent to the Shantung clauses of the treaty.
7.—Requiring appointment of American delegates to the League and commission authorized under it or the treaty to be made with the approval of the Senate.
8.—Reserving the right to trade with Germany without interference by the reparations commission set up under the treaty.
9.—Requiring congress to appropriate all funds contributed to the League.
10.—Limitations of armaments ordered by the League not to apply to the United States in event invasion or war is thereat.
11.—Reserving the right of American citizens to continue relations with nationals of a covenant-breaking state provided they are not living in their native country.
12.—Specifying that nothing in the treaty shall interfere with rights of American citizens. This is designed to safeguard interests taken over by the alien custodian during the war.
13.—Withholding assent to labor clauses of the treaty.
14.—Equalizing voting strength within the League when the United States is affected.

Report the Discovery Of A Plot to Slay Officials With Explosive Packages

PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 19.—Discovery of a "Red" plot to slay officials with explosive Christmas mail packages was announced today by Superintendent of Police James Robinson.

Information of the plot, which he considers reliable, indicates it is nationwide and directed against federal, state and city authorities who took part in the national round-up of radicals planning the overthrow of the government.

MAYOR CENSURES MEMBERS OF LEGION FOR MAKING RAID TO ARREST ANYONE SELLING BEAT SUGAR AT 20 CTS. A POUND

CINCINNATI, Nov. 19.—Mayor John W. Galvin today severely censured members of the Robert Bentley post of the American Legion who raided the headquarters of the Socialist party here last night and burned a quantity of supposed radical literature. The mayor designated the raid as mob rule and asserted that it showed a lack of patriotism and good citizenship.

THROW LITERATURE INTO THE STREETS

CINCINNATI, O., Nov. 19.—Members of the American Legion, numbering more than 300, led by their officers, descended upon Socialist headquarters in this city last night and threw hundreds of pounds of radical literature into the streets. The literature was burned.

PRESIDENT PAVES WAY FOR THE HOUSE TO CONCLUDE TERM

WASHINGTON, Nov. 19.—President Wilson paved the way for immediate adjournment of the house today by signing the bill creating an equipment trust to refund the government the \$400,000,000 advanced to the railroads for locomotives and cars during federal control and the resolution continuing until next January the restrictions on dye imports.

HOUSE ADJOURNS SIX MONTHS TERM THIS AFTERNOON

WASHINGTON, Nov. 19.—Six months to the day after the congress convened in special session the house formally adjourned at 4:30 p. m. today after receiving word from President Wilson that he did not object to the action. The adjournment resolution was adopted by a vote of 55 to 3.

Bill For a New P.O. Building

Special to The Times. WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 19.—One million dollars is the appropriation called for in a bill introduced by Representative Parrish just before the House adjourned today. This sum is asked for the purchase of a site and erection thereon of a federal building at Wichita Falls.

It is reported a public buildings bill will be submitted at the December session and in that event Parrish will make an effort to have the Wichita Falls appropriation included in that general measure.

Upon adjournment of the House, Representative Parrish left tonight for Henrietta to look after some personal business. He expressed regret that the brief time allotted to him would not enable him to get over the district, as he will return to Washington in time to be in his seat when congress reconvenes on the first day of December.

ARE ARRIVING AT FORT WORTH FOR MEETING

Officials of Texas and Oklahoma to Confer on Dispute Over Boundary.

FORT WORTH, TEX., Nov. 19.—The delegates to the conference between Texas and Oklahoma officials to settle the dispute over the ownership of oil wells in the disputed boundary area began arriving here this afternoon.

OKLAHOMA OFFICIALS LEAVE FOR MEETING

OKLAHOMA CITY, Nov. 19.—Governor J. B. Robertson, Attorney General S. P. Freeland and members of the state land office commission left here late today for Fort Worth, Texas, where they expected to meet Governor Hobby and other Texas officials in an effort to bring about an amicable settlement of the Red River boundary dispute between the two states.

REPORT ATTEMPT TO ASSASSINATE ADMIRAL KOLCHAK

LONDON, Nov. 19.—An attempt to assassinate Admiral Kolchak, head of the All-Russian government, which up until recently maintained its capital at Omsk, is reported in a wireless dispatch received here from Moscow. Head gravities were thrown at him. Six soldiers were killed and twelve wounded.

QUELL REVOLUTION AT VLADIVOSTOK

WASHINGTON, Nov. 19.—The revolution at Vladivostok has been quelled, dispatches today to the state department said.

BULLETIN

By Associated Press. WASHINGTON, Nov. 19.—The Lodge resolution containing reservations to the peace treaty was defeated in the Senate this afternoon by a vote of 55 to 39.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 19.—The final act in the dramatic peace treaty struggle began today with packed galleries. The crowd tensed and waiting peered over the rails as the senators filed into the chamber to their seats. Scores jammed the halls of the capitol.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 19.—Senator Lodge, republican leader, offered his formal resolution of peace treaty ratification just after the Senate met today. This resolution contains the preamble and fourteen reservations agreed upon by a majority of the Senate.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 19.—A letter from President Wilson advising administration senators to vote against ratification of the treaty with the foreign relations committee reservations was laid before a conference of the administration senate forces today by Democratic Leader Hitchcock.

The committee program, the President wrote, would provide for ratification. "But rather for the nullification of the treaty."

The conference had been called to decide upon the final administration tactics in Senate ratification which is expected to come to a vote today or tomorrow.

After the President's letter was read there were indications that the compromise could be effected if the administration senators would line up almost solidly against ratification.

The President's letter, addressed to Senator Hitchcock and dated yesterday, follows: "Dear Senator: You were good enough to bring me word that the Democratic senators supporting the treaty expected to hold a conference before the final administration tactics in Senate ratification and that they would be glad to receive a word of counsel from me."

I should hesitate to offer it in any detail but I assume that the senators only desire my judgment upon the all important question of the final vote on the resolution containing many reservations of Senator Lodge. I can not hesitate for in my opinion the resolution in that form does not provide for ratification, but rather for the nullification of the treaty. I sincerely hope that the friends and supporters of the treaty will vote against the Lodge resolution of ratification.

I trust that all true friends of the treaty will refuse to support the Lodge resolution. Cordially sincerely yours, WOODROW WILSON.

Plan Sees Blocked. The President's reference to an opportunity to vote on a "resolution of ratification" referred to the plans of the Democrats to get action on an unreserved resolution after they had voted down the Lodge proposal. That plan apparently had been blocked, however, by the decision of the mild reservation Republicans to stand by the resolution of Senator Lodge, providing such an opportunity.

The Democratic leaders, however, say they have been promised a chance to vote on an unreserved resolution before the committee resolution comes to a roll call and should the latter fail they expect the mild group to bring the committee draft back before the Senate on a motion to reconsider. In the latter eventuality their plan is to present amendments which will make the reservations acceptable.

It is known to be the purpose of Senator Lodge on the other hand, to force the administration leaders to make their compromise proposals before the committee resolution is voted on. Today's committee action took up that situation with the leaders hoping that they might obtain such modification of the resolution as would enable them to vote for it.

Republican Leader Lodge in a formal statement predicted that the senate would not obey the orders of President Wilson with regard to the treaty. "The senate has equal power and responsibility with the President in the making of treaties," Senator Lodge said. "They will not, in my opinion, obey the orders of the president, who undertakes to command the senate to ratify the treaty without the reservations adopted by a large majority of the senate, which Americanizes it and makes it safe for the United States. What he commands will not, in my judgment, be done."

GREAT BRITAIN AND FRANCE PUZZLED OVER TREATY STATUS

LONDON, Nov. 19.—Great Britain and France are considering whether they are not compelled to carry out the German peace treaty and operate the League of Nations independently of the United States, pending the decision of the American government on its course.

It is pointed out that matters are continually arising under the treaty which need immediate attention, such as a plebiscite commission, and it is considered that because of this fact it is no longer possible to delay making the pact operative.

The opinion strongly prevails here that Great Britain will not accept any reservations made by the United States Senate which would necessitate the negotiation of a new treaty, as the British government. It is declared, has every present intention of abiding by the decisions of the Paris conference.

The belief will exist in this capital that the American government will ultimately take its place with the Allies. Meanwhile there appears to be a possibility that Great Britain and the others will proceed without the United States.

CONSTITUTIONAL MAJORITY ITALIAN CHAMBER OF DEPUTIES

ROME, Nov. 19.—Latest reports indicate that the Constitutional majority secured 300 seats in the Chamber of Deputies in the recent election, the Socialists 120 and the Catholics 50.

ROME, Nov. 19.—First disorders resulting from Sunday's elections were reported from Milan late today. Inconventions attacked a procession during the post-election celebration, according to dispatches. Many were wounded. Police arrested several of the rioters.

Socialists declared a general strike in Milan this morning, the dispatches said. Milan police searched headquarters of the combatants last night and seized a quantity of hand grenades and other weapons. They raided headquarters of the Arditi society, uncovering a quantity of bombs and pistols. Five Arditi were arrested.

# A LONE BANDIT ROBS TRAIN AND MAKES ESCAPE

### Seven Poses and a Troop of Cavalry Are Scouring Hills and Valleys.

### ONLY RECENTLY ESCAPED FROM THE PENITENTIARY

### Old Men, Women, Children, Soldiers and Sailors Were Exempt by Robber.

### CHEYENNE, WYO., Nov. 19.—Seven poses and a troop of cavalry from Fort D. A. R. Russell were today searching the hills and valleys around Medicine Bow for William Carlisle, train bandit, who last night robbed passengers on Union Pacific No. 19 train, the Los Angeles limited, and escaped into the darkness, wounded in a shower of bullets. The bandit secured about \$250.

Carlisle boarded the train at Rock River, entered a tourist sleeper by smashing a ventilator window, fired one shot through the roof of the car to terrify passengers and forced all but "old men, women, children, soldiers and sailors" to contribute. "I do not rob these," he told the passengers.

As Carlisle stood in the vestibule, waiting for the train to stop, a passenger fired at close range and the bandit is believed to have been hit. He carried a rifle over his shoulder and a pistol in his hand. Blood was

found on the pistol, which the bandit dropped in his hurried escape. His hat was found by the train guard. Passengers were positive from description that the bandit is Carlisle, who escaped from the state prison, at Rawlins, Saturday.

Poses Organized.  
Within a few hours of the robbery, poses had been sent into the Medicine Bow district where the bandit left the train, from Cheyenne, Saratoga, Laramie, Medicine Bow, Wheatland, Rock River and Rock Springs. It was thought Carlisle might have sought cover in the district 60 miles north of Wheatland where he hid for three weeks in 1916.

A large posse, organized following Carlisle's escape from prison in a box of shirts, left Wamsutter yesterday for the Red Desert where Carlisle was believed to be hiding.

While the posse was detouring at the Wamsutter depot, an eastbound passenger train passed with a man riding the rods. The incident was forgotten until reports of last night's robbery were received.

Carlisle was captured in 1914 following a series of train robberies and sentenced to prison for life. He was a model prisoner and subscribed to Liberty bonds and the Red Cross. Because of this his sentence was commuted to 25 to 50 years last September.

Carlisle is said to have boasted that he could escape from prison any time he desired. "I am here because I want to be here," he is said to have told prison officials.

Carlisle was hidden in a box of shirts which left the prison shirt factory. The box was delivered to the Union Pacific freight house where Carlisle saved his way out. He planned a careful escape, carrying a .45 caliber and stole ammunition and weapons from cabins.

### MAKE PREPARATIONS FOR TRI-COUNTY INSTITUTE

STAMFORD, TEX., Nov. 19.—The Parent-Teacher Association is devising means to entertain visiting teachers in homes during the Tri-County institute, December 15 to 19, inclusive. A nominal charge for room and board has been agreed upon, which is thought to be in conformity with salaries paid teachers, and every citizen is invited to entertain one or more teachers. Nothing will be left undone in making institute week one of pleasure to all.

### PLAN TO ELIMINATE FUEL PROFITTEERING

WACO, TEX., Nov. 19.—To eliminate profiteering in wood for fuel the city commissioners have appointed a committee to "explore territory contiguous to Waco and procure therefrom all available firewood" which will be shipped to the city and sold to consumers at actual cost.

### EGYPTIAN MINISTRY TENDERS RESIGNATION

LONDON, Nov. 19.—The Egyptian ministry has resigned because of dissatisfaction with the mission appointed by Lord Milner, secretary for the colonies, for the investigation of the situation in Egypt, according to official dispatches from Cairo today.

### PEACE CONFERENCE TO SETTLE DANZIG QUESTION

WARSAW, Nov. 19.—The peace conference will be asked to settle Polish-German controversies, involving the free town of Danzig, it was announced here today. The German-Polish conference in Berlin has failed to reach any satisfactory conclusion and negotiations have been stopped.

# AUSTRALIA SUFFERS MOST DEVASTATING DROUGHT IN HISTORY

### LONDON, Nov. 19.—Australia, especially New South Wales, is suffering the most devastating drought since white men have resided in that country, according to a Sydney dispatch to the Daily Mail.

"Stocks and crops have been destroyed and it is doubtful whether there will be enough seed wheat for next season's sowing. Hundreds and perhaps thousands of settlers have been ruined. Northwestern New South Wales is described as a desert, strips of everything green. Paddockes are littered with the skeletons of cattle, and even rabbits are dying in vast numbers.

### TRAFFIC SAFETY LEAGUE FOR UNIFORM LAWS

DALLAS, TEX., Nov. 19.—A traffic safety league of 200 Dallas citizens is working on plans for a similar statewide movement to have traffic laws and regulations observed, the management of the Dallas Automobile Club has announced.

The plan is to supply 200 citizens with cards which will fill out with the name, time and nature of the offense of drivers which comes to notice. These cards, addressed to the automobile club, will be mailed, and the club will then write the offender, inviting him to call at the club and explain why he failed to observe the law. If the invitation is ignored, a second letter will be sent him, and if this is ignored his case will be taken to the police court.

"There hasn't been an issue of any daily paper in Dallas for several days that did not report an automobile accident, and in almost every instance some one was seriously injured," said E. Dick Spillers, manager of the Dallas automobile club. "This club will lend its full support to the safety first campaign."

"The object is to insist on more careful driving and not to prosecute a violator. If, however, a violator is reported a second time his case will be taken to the courts."

# IDENTIFY BODY AS THAT OF MRS. MARY MACHOLD

CHICAGO, Nov. 19.—Mystery surrounding the identity of the "Mrs. Mary Machold" who was taken from Lake Michigan a few days ago, today had been cleared up. She was identified by Theodore Machold, an automobile dealer of St. Joseph, Michigan, as his mother, Mrs. Mary Machold of El Paso, Texas. Mrs. Machold had been missing since last July, her son said, when her mind became unbalanced through grieving for another son she believed killed in France.

### SEES ARE STARVING FOR LACK OF SUGAR

SAN ANTONIO, TEX., Nov. 19.—Bees in Texas are starving for lack of sugar and unless relief is obtained apiculture say damage to the honey-making industry will reach many thousands of dollars, according to E. G. Leaburg, president of the Texas Beekeepers Association. Heavy rains washed the nectar from late flowers, and damaged honey in the hives. Because of the shortage of sugar, twenty colonies of bees had started, one beekeeper reported.

### BURGLARS ARE AFTER MORE VALUABLE GOODS

DALLAS, Nov. 19.—The mark of the loot of Dallas burglars consists no longer of expensive family plate and fine jewelry—but of wearing apparel. Of 40 thefts reported one week 21 of the law-breakers stole clothing, or other necessities of life. In only two instances was jewelry stolen.

# TOLEDO RAILWAYS RENEWS FIGHT TO RESUME SERVICE

TOLEDO, O., Nov. 19.—The Toledo Railways and Light Company, driven from the streets two weeks ago by an ouster ordinance approved by the voters, renewed its efforts today to secure signatures to a petition for submitting to the voters a 25 year franchise which provides for resumption of car service on a cost plus plan.

Details of the ordinance were announced as providing for straight five cent fare with one cent extra for a transfer. The rate of fare when the cars were withdrawn on November 6, was six cents and two cents for a transfer.

### DRASTIC BILL TO STOP "RED" ACTIVITY IN U. S.

Submitted to Senate By Department of Justice In Measure by Senator Nelson.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 18.—Drastic measures to suppress the "reds" in the United States today were submitted to the Senate by the department of justice in a bill introduced by Senator Nelson, chairman of the Senate judiciary committee.

The bill, drawn by the department of justice, defines seditious persons as those who "advocate, oppose, prevent, hinder, delay or seek to do any of these things against the free performance of the government or one of its officers." The writing, printing, circulating of any sign, word, speech or picture of any seditious nature or which tends to incite sedition is punishable by a fine of \$10,000 or 20 years imprisonment or both.

Under the section of the bill which deals with aliens convicted of spreading seditious matter and advocating Bolshevism the department of labor is given authority to deport all such aliens who are hereafter barred from the United States. Naturalized persons convicted under the act will be subjected to denaturalization and deportation.

Failure of government departments to rid the country of foreign agitators who have been advocating anarchy and the overthrow of the government will be investigated by the House immigration committee during the next 30 days. The first step will be to confer with Attorney General Palmer with regard to transferring all deportation work to the department of justice, instead of having it divided between this agency and the labor department.

#### DELAY IN PROVIDING ADDITIONAL TRAIN

STAMFORD, TEX., Nov. 18.—The additional passenger train to have been operated between Waco and Stamford over the M. K. & T. lines beginning November 2, was delayed indefinitely in beginning its operation. Advances have been received that this train will be added to the present service now as early as possible. The strike of coal miners caused the delay.

Officials of the M. K. & T. railroad have always shown an inclination to be friendly to Stamford and any request made upon them has always been considered and given courteous attention.

#### KERMIT ROOSEVELT AND MOTHER GO TO BRAZIL

OSTER BAY, Nov. 18.—Captain Kermit Roosevelt, accompanied by his mother, Mrs. Theodore Roosevelt, will sail today for Rio Janeiro, Capita of Brazil, where he is connected with the Kern Steamship Company, is making the trip for business purposes and plans to visit cities in Brazil, Chile and Argentina.

### PRINCE OF WALES IS HAVING A TIME IN NEW YORK CITY

NEW YORK, Nov. 18.—The Prince of Wales, now a full fledged New Yorker in his own right, was up bright and early today to "see the sights."

Pleased by the warmth of his welcome yesterday, when he was made a free man by Mayor Hylan, his youthful heir to the British throne displayed a boyish eagerness to become acquainted with the city.

His morning program included a trip to the top of the fifty-four story Woolworth building, an automobile ride through famous thoroughfares; visits to the stock exchange, the United States sub-treasury building, historic Trinity church, and the Chamber of Commerce. His afternoon will be taken up with visits to the Academy of Music and the annual horse show at Madison Square Garden. Tonight he will attend a dinner of New York societies and later will be the guest of honor at a ball in the home of Mrs. Whiteley Reid.

#### URGES IMPORTANCE OF COALITION GOVERNMENT

LONDON, Nov. 18.—Addressing unionists in London tonight, Andrew Bonar Law, the government leader in the house of commons, emphasized the importance of a coalition government in developing the strength of nations. He said that Great Britain, France and Italy in the war realized that the life of the nations was in danger, and formed conditions to save them. The United States, being further away, did not join.

#### COTTON SEED RECEIPTS ARE BELOW LAST YEAR

WASHINGTON, Nov. 18.—Cotton seed received at mills from August 1 to October 31, excluding re-shipments, total 1,555,310 tons, as compared with 1,913,719 tons for the same period for 1913, the census bureau announced today.

Products manufactured during August 1 to October 31: Crude oil 26,714,973; refined oil, 162,932,323; cake and meal, 44,614 tons; hulls, 264,197; linters, 123,456 bales; hull fibre, 17,588 bales.

Stocks on hand October 31: 608,822 tons of seed at plants, 114,541,487 pounds of crude oil and 110,232,721 pounds of refined oil.

#### MEMBER OF EXCHANGE IN CUSTODY CHARGED WITH GRAND LARCENY

NEW YORK, Nov. 18.—David Sullivan, member of the Consolidated

Stock Exchange was in custody charged with grand larceny in the theft of \$45,000 in securities. The authorities alleged he is one of a group of brokers, runners, taxi-cab drivers and gangsters said to have stolen more than \$1,000,000 in negotiable securities within the past three months.

#### REVERSE JUDGMENT IN PURE FOOD CASE

AUSTIN, TEX., Nov. 19.—The court of criminal appeals held in reversing the judgment against T. H. Vashin of Pannola county, who was convicted for violating the pure food law, that before a person violated this law he must know that the food offered for sale is adulterated. Vashin contended that material made into sausage by him had been secured from an out of state firm and that he did not know it contained a meat preservative.



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### DOCTOR GRAFTON A LEADER IN TRINITY MILLION CAMPAIGN

#### ACTIVE WORK TO SECURE FUND FOR UNIVERSITY TO BEGIN DECEMBER 7

#### PROCLAIMED DAY OF PRAYER

Dr. Wear to Oversee the Raising of the Texas Fund and Has Entered Upon Duties.

DALLAS, Texas, Nov. 18.—Texas Presbyterian leaders of the principal cities of the state have been appointed on a committee to aid in securing a \$1,000,000 endowment fund for Trinity University at Washington, the active campaign for which begins December 7. This day has been proclaimed by the Presbyterian synod of Texas as a day of prayer among the churches of the state for the success of the campaign.

Trinity University is on the 1919 list of those educational institutions to be aided by the \$35,000,000 campaign of the General Board of Education of the Presbyterian church in the U. S. A. This five-year program of the church is achieving great headway and it is expected that Texas will have no difficulty in securing the sum she is after, which will be added to the funds secured in \$35,000,000 campaign. The other sixty-seven Presbyterian colleges will also receive the aid of the church at large within the five years.

Dr. Webb Chairman. Following is the personnel of the Texas committee appointed for the million-dollar project: Dr. B. Wrenn of Dallas, chairman; Dr. Nathaniel F. Grafton of Wichita Falls, Dr. Glenn L. Sneed of Dallas, Dr. M. C. Johnson of Nacogdoches, Dr. Bob Alec Hodges of Temple, Dr. Floyd Poe of El Paso, Dr. James M. Todd of San Antonio, Rev. W. Clyde Howard of Houston, Rev. Samuel N. Bennett of Arlington, Rev. H. E. Beards of Fort Lavaca.

Judge F. W. Melvin, Rev. Thomas W. Davidson of San Angelo and Dr. E. L. Moore of Honey Grove, Texas. As field secretary to oversee the raising of the Texas funds, Dr. F. L. Wear, pastor of the Central Presbyterian church of Huntsville, Ala., was elected. He recently entered on his duties and reports encouraging progress. Another field man will be appointed soon.

Quota is Assigned. In order that each of the seven presbyteries of the state might have an equitable share in the raising of the funds an apportionment has been made as follows: Abilene presbytery, \$40,000; Amarillo presbytery, \$100,000; Austin presbytery, \$30,000; Brownwood presbytery, \$20,000; Dallas presbytery, \$150,000; El Paso presbytery, \$40,000; Fort Worth presbytery, \$100,000; Houston presbytery, \$30,000; Jefferson presbytery, \$25,000; Paris presbytery, \$151,000; S. W. Bohemian presbytery, \$5,000; and presbytery of Waco, \$300,000.

Much interest is manifested throughout the state in Trinity University and in the campaign to be waged in its behalf. Presbyterians and others in Texas have come to realize that it is impossible to maintain a first class educational institution without adequate endowment and sufficient funds for operating expenses.

Trinity University is widely acknowledged to be doing a great work for young men and young women of Texas, and although under the Presbyterian church is attended by students of all denominations.

Pastors will emphasize the need for funds for this institution and an appeal will also be made through young people's societies, the Sunday-schools, women's societies and through the press. This Presbyterian receiving their appointments respectively to the various churches within their bounds and these churches then attempt to raise their quota. Outside aid will also be received.

PARIS, Nov. 18.—The American delegation to the peace conference will sail for home on December 5 or 6, it was learned today. The British delegation will probably leave Paris about the same time, although no official announcement has been made.

### TO START BUILDING NEW KATY WAREHOUSE

#### FIRST OF YEAR DATE SET FOR BEGINNING OF CONSTRUCTION

Building operations on the new M. & T. office and warehouse which is to cost \$100,000 will start about the first of January, it was announced at the local offices Tuesday. While the exact location has not yet been selected, it will in all probability be on Ohio street between Ninth and Tenth.

The office portion will be three stories in height and will be 60 feet square, with the one story warehouse extending back for 125 feet more. The building will be constructed entirely of brick, and will be strictly modern and fire-proof.

### MAKE INQUIRIES REGARDING THE USE OF OIL BURNERS

#### EVER INCREASING DEMAND FOR HIGHWAY ENGINEERS

AUSTIN, TEX., Nov. 18.—Many Texas industries which have been using coal for fuel are directing inquiries to the fire insurance commission regarding the increase of fire hazards of temporary installation of oil burning equipment to carry them through the coal strike. Authorities of the commission estimate that fully one-third of the Texas industries will be burning oil within sixty days if the coal shortage continues, and they are endeavoring to adjust fire hazards and insurance policies to meet the new conditions.

### COLLEGE STATION, TEX. NOV. 19.—Realizing the shortage and ever increasing demand from highway engineers, the Federal board of vocational education, section of rehabilitation, has decided to ask certain educational institutions where disabled men are being trained to offer special two-year courses in this study.

#### DISABLED SOLDIERS ARE BEING TRAINED IN PRACTICALLY EVERY COLLEGE IN THE STATE AT PRESENT.

The men are paid a stipend of \$50 a month and allowed to choose the kind of education they want, and are then placed in the schools which offer the desired studies.

#### AUSTIN, Nov. 19.—The high cost of living has increased tuberculosis and it is expected that, despite the fight being waged against it, the death toll of the white plague which claimed 4551 victims in Texas last year, will increase correspondingly, according to an announcement by the Texas public health association.

High prices have brought insufficient and poor food, clothing and shelter to many and this, together with the epidemic of influenza and pneumonia, has weakened the people as to reduce their resistance to consumption according to the statement.

### SINCLAIR PEOPLE SECURE LEASES IN GRAYSON COUNTY

DENISON, Texas, Nov. 18.—Activities in the local wildcatting field for the week ending today show that there has been no let-up in leads of leads, there being many changes of leases from private parties to companies and much work done with the assistance of the fair weather.

Early in the week the Detroit firm, whose local work is in charge of Harry Wiley, announced definitely that they had ordered material for their first test east of the city. This company has closed drilling contracts and will spend in the first test material as soon as tools and derricks material can be set. This company is contemplating letting another contract for its No. 2 test soon, but the location has not been made known.

The Grayson County Oil and Gas company made a definite announcement Thursday of its first test that will be made one and one-half miles south of the Westover No. 1 test. This company will fully develop this acreage with several tests. Tools and rig lumber have been ordered.

The Westover No. 1 test will be completed as soon as a new string of tools that have arrived are set. This test has been tied-up in a lawsuit for some time, but no time was lost by Mr. Westover in his operations. He immediately ordered a new string of tools for immediate delivery and drilling will be resumed within a few days.

One of the largest deals made during the week was that of the Sinclair Consolidated Oil and Gas company, which closed two contracts for acreage near Denison. This company, it is said, will make deep tests in this territory soon.

The Miller Oil Corporation, with headquarters in Oklahoma City, has two accounts in the local field and no doubt within another week will have secured acreage upon which will be placed several deep tests. This company has a reputation of doing things and by coming into the local field proves again that the Denison fields are attracting widespread attention.

Within another week Denison will have service of a ship-by-truck concern. A company from Stephenville and Dallas will shortly open offices here and place in the local field a string of large trucks for hauling heavy well machinery to local fields.

Drilling on the Viola well and the Peter No. 1 well has continued throughout the week without interruption and both tests are now going down very rapidly.

The Western Drilling company has a number of men in the field and is erecting its second derrick for the No. 2 well, a mile north of Denison. The derrick is up for the No. 1 test east of Denison, with considerable machinery on hand for work that will likely begin next week.

All in all, the week just closing has been one of progress in the local wildcatting fields and has been favorable to all men and field workers.

### VERNON BANKS HAVE DEPOSITS OF THREE AND QUARTER MILLION

VERNON, TEX., Nov. 18.—Figures given out here show that the total bank deposits in local institutions have reached \$3,250,000, a high mark in the financial history of this county. Each of two banks here now has a million or more in deposits.

Compared with last year, when deposits have more than doubled in 12 months. Last year was one of the hardest years in the history of this region, while this year is probably the most prosperous ever experienced by the people of this section.

Last year banks in some cases had loaned more than their total deposits, while farmers were beneficiaries of the state drought relief fund, and were forced to buy feed with which to tide their workstock over the period of extreme drought. Much of the wheat that produced this year's bumper harvest was bought with money advanced by the federal government.

This year the yields of cotton, wheat, feedstuff and corn are extraordinarily large, and the whole crop is in a highly prosperous condition. The unusual widespread application of oil lands in the county, coupled with the unprecedented influx of population have added much to the "business" of the local situation.

### WORK RESUMED ON LEMON FARM TEST NEAR NAONA, TEX.

NAONA, Texas, Nov. 18.—Work was resumed today on the Naona Oil & Gas company test on the Lemon farm, about eight miles north and a little east of Naona. Two to three million of gas was struck in this well at 2,540 feet, when the well was shut down. It attracted considerable attention on account of its location, being about 22 miles southwest of Headton and on the Pennsylvania structure which extends from Kansas and beyond to Red River and into Oklahoma. It may be a week before work on the well begins, as it is necessary to move the coal over to the boiler which was moved back when the gas was struck, and any other preparations necessary before drilling begins. This well will be watched with considerable interest.

The Red River Oil & Gas company is making progress around 1,200 feet. This well has had favorable formation conditions and is located on the W. W. Jones farm, out of the Wm. Donoho survey, and about 7 miles north of Naona. It is being drilled by Wichita Falls, Naona and Galveston capital.

### EXPRESS COMPANY ASKS POSTPONEMENT OF STANFORD CASE

STANFORD, Texas, Nov. 18.—E. M. Horn and G. Y. Reed of the American Railway Express company have been in conference with the shippers of Stamford, asking for a sixty day postponement of the hearing ordered by the Railroad Commission for November 18th, regarding the construction of an express depot here. After giving assurances that the Express company would do everything to relieve present conditions and to construct this depot as soon as possible, the shippers asked for this postponement. This is hoped to be a termination of the complaints on express service. However, no cessation of efforts at securing the building will be noticed until the building has been erected.

Monte Arnett Hardin has been stationed at Abilene and instructed to visit the Stamford office at least once each week until a satisfactory method of meeting requirements of shippers is reached.

### AWAY FROM THE PANS FOR THE YALE ELEVEN

CAMBRIDGE, MASS., Nov. 18.—To get his players away from the valleys of "I heard this," and "they tell me that" barrage around the Harvard campus, Coach Bob Fisher will handle his regulars and nine of the "house" boys in Massachusetts tonight to spend the remaining days before the Yale game.

The campus had reports of a revolution in Captain Billy Murray's ranks, rumors of a sudden change in the line-up and "traps" of several of the big boys being booked for a reserved seat on the bench.

## AMATEUR ATHLETIC WORLD LOSES CHAMPION HURDLER

ST. LOUIS, Mo., Nov. 18.—The amateur athletic world lost one of its greatest athletes with the announcement that Robert I. Simpson, world's champion hurdler and classed among the leading all-around stars in the country, will become a professional track coach at the University of Missouri, Simpson, upon assuming his new duties, which, according to W. W. Maxwell, director of athletics at the University of Missouri, will be December 1, automatically loses his standing as an amateur and will be barred from all amateur competition.

Simpson has held practically every honor for which he strove, having been National Missouri Valley Conference, Inter-Allied and Western Conference title-holder. War prevented Simpson from participating in the Olympic games scheduled to take place in Berlin in 1916.

Simpson, who has been a champion hurdler, Simpson ranked high as a broad and high jumper, discus thrower, shot-putter and sprinter. With the exception of taking part in exhibition competitions, Simpson probably will not again figure publicly in an athletic competition in these areas. Usually, no professional track athletes in this country.

Twice he performed the astonishing feat of surmounting the high hurdles (120 yards) in 14 3/8 seconds, winning the event in the Western Intercollegiate Conference on the second occasion. He also tied the world's 220-yard low hurdle record of 23 3/8 seconds. Simpson was a quarter-mile of his class, being a 30 seconds man as a member of the crack Missouri University relay team.

### TRYING TO SPEED UP FREIGHT EMBARGO

#### TRAFFIC BOARD INITIATES CAMPAIGN AMONG CONSIGNEES AND TRANSFER MEN.

A campaign to impress the consignees of merchandise, especially the local wholesale houses, of the necessity of speeding up the unloading of the freight consigned to them and to utilize to the fullest extent the facilities presented by the transfer lines, was initiated at a meeting of the traffic committee of the Chamber of Commerce in the Elks' hall Wednesday morning.

It was decided by the representatives of the Chamber of Commerce and the railroads present that the consignees should be notified of the part they should play in relieving the freight congestion and a suggestion that the presence of some of the transfer men be urged at the next meeting in order to get their opinion on the possibility of a more extended unloading system. This matter was referred to Traffic Manager Chatham of the Chamber of Commerce, who said he would look into the situation more fully and try to secure the co-operation of the consignees and the transfer men with the railroads in relieving the situation.

The local coal situation was discussed by W. R. Grace, superintendent of the Katy, with reference to the shortage that existed both for the railroads and in the public supply. The car of coal has been turned over to a local coal dealer so far this week, he said, and several permits had been issued. He also stated six cars of coal had been shipped to Burkhardt during the past week to relieve the situation at that point.

The congestion of tank cars in the Wichita Valley yards was brought up by Harry Hollister, traffic manager of the Lone Star Refinery, who sought the aid of the traffic board in securing the movement of eighteen cars of fuel oil billed to cotton gins and other important industries on the Wichita Valley, who were in sore need of the fuel. He was promised support, and the railroad representative gave assurance the movement of the cars would be expedited as much as possible.

Miss Florence Jackson, representing the Y. W. C. A., came before the meeting with a request for a woman matron to serve at night at the union station to care for the needs of women traveling alone.

She explained that the local Y. W. C. A. was at present employing a woman matron during the day, but they would be unable to bear the expense of an additional matron for the service at night.



The relators sought by a writ of mandamus to compel the district judge to vacate an agreed judgment for setting the charter of the Texas Bonding and Fidelity Company, and to require the commissioner of insurance and banking to ignore the judgment of the district court.

The supreme court reserved and remanded the case of the Galveston, Harrisburg & San Antonio Railway Co. against the state of Texas, from Freyette county. In the lower court, the state had recovered a penalty of \$2,000 from the railroad company for the alleged violation of the law requiring railroads to maintain water closets at or within a reasonable distance from the station or station in reversing the case the court held the facts did not justify the imposition of the penalty.

### TEXAS ROADS MAY SECURE EXEMPTION FROM THE EMBARGO

AUSTIN, TEX., Nov. 19.—Exemption of a considerable portion of the Texas railroad system from the general embargo which is being threatened because of the coal shortage could be secured, because nearly all the principal lines use oil for fuel, according to a statement by Railroad Commissioner Allison Mayfield today.

With the exception of the Texas & Pacific and the Missouri, Kansas & Texas, principal lines were burning oil before the coal situation developed, he said, and these two were preparing to install oil burning engines. Naturally, he continued, the suspension of interstate traffic by the trying up of roads of other states would cripple Texas transportation, and to some extent interstate traffic would be disrupted by cutting off the coal supply, but most of the roads could continue necessary freight and passenger service.

The fact that many Texas commercial plan to use oil and gas for fuel would also lighten the blow, according to Mr. Mayfield.

### CHARTER EXPERT NOT IN FAVOR ELECTION OF CITY OFFICIALS

The science of city government was explained Wednesday by Dr. A. R. Hatton of Cleveland, Ohio, here to write the new city charter, to members of the Wichita Club at the weekly luncheon.

Dr. Hatton is professor of political economy at Western Reserve University and is widely known as an economist and an authority of city government.

He spoke at length on various forms of city government now in vogue in various American and European cities, and came out directly in favor of the so-called "manager form" of city administration and strongly in opposition to the present system of elective executive officials.

Dr. Hatton declared that the cities of the United States would never have efficient officials as long as the present elective system of executive officials was in use. The speaker asserted that men competent to successfully manage the executive end of a large city administration always had better-paying positions than the majority of our cities pay and consequently would not take office even if elected. He advocated the manager form of government under which system men are selected because of their special executive ability and not because of their political creeds.

Dr. Hatton reviewed the history of municipal government in the United States for the past century. He declared that the "manager system" was the original plan used in America but that the system was discarded years ago for political reasons.

He asserted that the manager system has been in use for years in the cities of the British empire and of continental Europe and was everywhere meeting with success. The speaker used the municipal government of the smaller cities of England, France and Switzerland as examples of splendid city government and asserted that American cities would have similar administrations if they imitated the manager system.

Dr. Hatton spoke at length on the "commission form" of government as used by Galveston. He said that Galveston was the "pioneer American city in governmental reform" and that other cities of the Southwest would do well to make a study of the "Galveston plan."

He also went into the details of city government, explaining the "evil effects of a change of administration every two or four years together with the evils of "political rings" and similar organizations that breed in cities where the present elective system is in force.

An interesting feature of the luncheon program was talk and music by members of the orchestra of the company who are here perfecting a picture, "Witch's Gold," the plot of which is laid in oil fields of this section.

The fact that coal mining was the basic industry necessary to the winning of the war and that reasonable profits had to be maintained. It was because a fair return was guaranteed under the Lever act that congress could not tax away all the mine owners' profits, he said.

"But the mine workers can not be deterred from demanding higher wages and better conditions as a result of the federal tax," Mr. Lewis replied. "That is the government's responsibility."

Replying to William Green, secretary of the United Mine Workers, Dr. Garfield explained that the fuel administration in increasing the price of coal during the war had made an allowance of 15 cents for overhead because there was not time to make a minute examination into every case and for the same reason 30 cents was allowed as royalty.

Grave Trying to Go.  
Referring to the 45 cents allowed for wages Dr. Garfield said that was a "grave thing to do," but that it was later found that the "amount" was in the averages absorbed for wages.

Thomas T. Brewster, chairman of the operators' scale committee, told the miners that "a fabulous margin in the coal industry does not exist," Dr. Garfield's "impartial figures," he said, had refuted the reports of enormous profits in the coal business, but, which, he said, had been run on a "slender margin."

President Lewis said the workers never had alleged that the operators made undue profits in 1915, under the government.

"But we have made some remarks about profits in 1919," he said. "We are prepared to prove that some concerns have sold coal at the mines at \$2 a ton, at \$4 a ton, yes, and even \$4.50 a ton."

"We are prepared to demonstrate that in 1919 the operators have gotten 120 to 125 per cent more for coal than they did in 1914 and that wage increases to the workers has been only 37.5 per cent above 1914 figures, while the cost of living has increased 110 per cent. That's our situation in a nutshell."

No Complete Figures.  
Dr. Garfield said he had no complete figures on the 1919 operations and was suspicious of partial figures, but that he did have some data which showed that in certain fields operators were making loss in 1919 than in 1915.

"But if that is true, why is it that selling price of coal to the consumer has increased \$1 a ton this year?" asked Percy Tellow of the miners.

"I don't know as to that," Dr. Garfield replied. "But even if that is so does it enter into our problem here except as it affects the cost of living?"

### NEW WARD SCHOOL WILL PROBABLY BE ERECTED THIS YEAR

A new ward school building is considered as a probability for the coming year, following a discussion of the needs for additional facilities coming up at a meeting of the board of trustees Tuesday night.

In order that he may study the system of heating with fuel oil now in use by the Houston school, the school board voted at the regular monthly meeting Tuesday night to send W. W. Brown, business manager of the schools to that place to make a thorough investigation.

The shortage of gas in this city has presented a problem which the school board will attempt to solve by determining the advantages to be derived from a substitution of fuel oil for the gas that is now used to run the heating systems.



FIVE THOUSAND FAIL TO FILE INCOME TAX RETURNS SAYS AGENT

ESTIMATES BASED ON FINDINGS IN "DELINQUENCY DRIVE" HERE.

DELINQUENTS MUST EXPLAIN

Commissioners to Decide Whether Fines and Penalties to Be Imposed.

Five thousand residents of Wichita county failed to file income tax returns due to be turned in to the internal revenue collector last spring, according to the estimate of Deputy Collector A. F. Bowen.

The estimate is based upon a list compiled after a careful investigation or "delinquency drive," underway during the past few months.

Completion of the figures now in the hands of the government required the services of three special assistants who are still at work bringing the drive to a conclusion.

The assistants are E. C. Jordan, G. S. Murphy and J. J. Alexander.

The law requires single men who made \$1000 or more and married men who made \$2000 or more to file returns. Each delinquent is to be summoned before the revenue collector and asked to explain his failure to file returns.

The full extent of the law governing such cases calls for a fine of \$1000 for failure to file without a reasonable excuse, additional penalty of 25 per cent of the taxable sum, and further fine of \$10,000 if the delinquent is adjudged guilty of wilfully trying to evade the tax.

The revenue officers here are authorized to receive the explanation of alleged delinquents, assess the 25 per cent penalty and submit the question of the additional fines to the commissioner in Washington who is the final judge as to the acceptability of the excuses offered.

In some cases citizens are exempted even from the twenty-five per cent fine, but only in well defined and infrequent instances.

Mr. Bowen expects the majority of the list he has compiled to be able to offer legitimate excuses. The government does not publicly define what it considers "reasonable" explanation, leaving the collector and commissioner free to use his own judgment.

"Decisions are based on circumstances," Mr. Bowen states, "although the law is of course the general rule by which we are guided."

In discussing the work of next year in collecting 1915 taxes, Mr. Bowen said he expected Wichita county to pay as great an income tax as any other county in the state, judging from the information he has already in hand. He said his corps of assistants

MAYOR RECEIVES TWO MORE CARS POTATOES

INSTRUCTS SALES TO BE MADE ACCORDING TO SIZE OF FAMILIES.

Two carloads of sweet potatoes, an additional one from Ardmore, Okla., and the other from Pottsville, arrived in Wichita Falls Wednesday morning, and are being distributed here from wagons stationed near the city fire station.

Each car contained approximately 800 bushels and are being sold at \$1.25 per bushel. The potatoes were shipped here by Mayor J. S. Marlow and are being distributed under the direction of the mayor in continuation of his efforts to force down the high cost of living.

Mayor Marlow announced Wednesday that the potatoes would be distributed according to the size of the family. Families containing five or more members will be allowed four bushels while smaller families will be limited to two bushels.

Several additional cars of potatoes from various points in East Texas and Oklahoma are expected to reach here shortly for distribution, Mayor Marlow announced.

THIRTEEN WOMEN AND SEVEN MEN TAKEN FROM ROOMING HOUSE.

Thirteen women and seven men were taken into custody by officials of the sheriff's department Tuesday night following a raid on a rooming house in Waggoner City.

The raid was carried out by deputy sheriffs working under the direction of Sheriff Bob McFall and Assistant County Attorney John M. Martin.

All but three of the prisoners were brought to Wichita Falls and lodged in the county jail. Charles E. H. Noe of Burk Burnett, charged with vagrancy, will probably be filed against those taken in the raid, according to officials of the county attorney's office.






