This was stopped, however, in the latter part of 1917 when the fuel administration was created and the government fixed coal prices at \$2.05 for screenings, \$2.35 for run of mine and \$2.65 for prepared sizes.

"When the armistice came coal consumption immediately dropped off and prices generally fell below the government price. This situation has continued until now, except in a few




