BEGIN ACTIVELY ORGANIZING FOR 1920 CAMPAIGN

Leaders Are on the Ground Early Arranging for Meetings of National Committees

PRESS AGENTS ARE ON HAND ARMED WITH LITERATURE

Various Views Expressed as to What Particular Issue Will Be Developed

By HUGH BAILLIE (United Press Staff Correspondent.) WASHINGTON, Nov. 25.—Republicans and Democrats today began actively organizing for the business of selecting a President of the United States in 1920. Leaders were on the ground arranging for meetings of the Democratic and Republican national committees here January 8, and December 10, respectively, to pick convention cities. Press agents representing the candidates were at Washington and in the field, armed with much literature. Announcements of new candidates were expected to come thick and fast from the G. O. ranks within a few days, but the Democrats were holding back. There were many ideas as to what the issue would be. Miles Foxletter, senator from Washington and one of the first Republican aspirants in the field, declared it would be Bolshevism and that he would make his fight on a platform promising eradication of the "Red menace."

MASS MEETING ON OPEN SHOP ISSUE TO BE CALLED SOON

CHAIRMAN RULES DISCUSSION OUT OF ORDER BY CHAMBER OF COMMERCE DIRECTORS.

SOME FAVOR THE MOVEMENT

High Wages Paid More Responsible For High Living Costs It Is Charged.

Initiation of the open shop movement, which has taken hold in a number of the principal cities of Texas within the past few months, in Wichita Falls, with the calling of a mass meeting at an early date to discuss measures to be taken to prevent its spread, is being met with a variety of opinion among the directors of the Chamber of Commerce Tuesday morning.

The matter was first brought up in the directors meeting but was ruled down by the chair as matter which was improper to bring before a meeting of the directors of the Chamber of Commerce.

The Chamber of Commerce represents the entire people," said Judge Huff. "For this reason I do not believe that the discussion of any matter affecting only a part of the people, or which would be to the advantage of one part of the people as against another, is proper matter for a discussion at a meeting of this kind."

Several of the directors took issue with the chair on this view of the matter, expressing the opinion that as the Chamber of Commerce does represent the whole people, anything which would be to the advantage of all and prevent any one class from benefiting at the expense of the others was legitimate business for the organization.

The most important problem which is facing Wichita Falls today is comprised in this very movement, was the opinion expressed by several of the directors in this discussion. "The carpenters have advanced their wages to \$10 a day, and other crafts are soon to advance their wages to that point or higher. Unless an end is put to this rate of increase we might as well give over any idea of business a city here, for it will be impossible at this rate."

In again discussing the attitude of the Chamber of Commerce it was brought forward that the Chamber of Commerce in Dallas and other cities where the "open shop" has been considered had taken the lead in this move.

"Wichita Falls will have to exhibit a different attitude toward outside capital than has been the case in the past if it is to interest outside money in the building of the city," was the declaration of W. W. Anderson to the directors of the Chamber of Commerce at the meeting of that organization Tuesday morning.

"I am sure that the people who live in Wichita Falls are not the only ones who believe in the future of the city. The real reason, I believe, why we have not attracted the money from outside in the way we should is the attitude we have exhibited toward outside capital. There seems to be an attitude here which we must correct, that is of giving the cold shoulder to outside money. We have not in the past lent any encouragement toward people from the outside, seemingly having the attitude that it is wrong for anyone outside of Wichita Falls to make any money here except the people who live here. That is an attitude that we will have to correct if we are to build a city here as we should."

"Then, in addition to endeavoring to attract outside money here, we should make an effort to hold capital in Wichita Falls which has been made out in the Northwest field, not only setting the employment of this money in the upbuilding of the town, but in this way making citizens out of the people who make that money. Mr. Anderson's sentiments were echoed by a number of the directors present, although there were a number present who expressed directly opposite views. "The town is just reaching that stage where outside money will come in," was the view expressed by another of the directors. "Dallas, which was mentioned as one of the cities largely built by outside capital, was already firmly established before this capital began to interest itself there."

"The reason that Wichita Falls money is almost entirely represented in the buildings which have gone up is because there are some of the home folk who are not entirely asleep," was the view expressed by Judge R. E. Huff, president of the Chamber of Commerce, in the course of the discussion.

23 INDICTMENTS ARE RETURNED BY GRAND JURY TODAY

Twenty three indictments were returned by the special grand jury in the 30th district court Tuesday morning. More than half of the total number of indictments allege forgery and implicate Clarence H. Mape and H. D. McClure.

Seven indictments were returned against H. D. McClure each of which alleges the passing of forged instruments. McClure is charged in the indictments with passing seven forged instruments. McClure is charged in the indictments with passing seven forged checks ranging in value from \$15 to \$52.

Seven indictments on charges of forgery were also returned against Clarence H. Mape. He is alleged to have forged checks ranging from \$20 to \$30 on various Wichita Falls business concerns.

Elmer Farham, Alexander Utz and W. A. Doloch are charged jointly in two indictments with the theft of property valued at over \$50. The defendants are charged in one indictment with the theft of an automobile from J. E. Warren valued at \$400 and in the second indictment with the theft of railroad tools valued at \$55. The tools are alleged to have been taken from U. A. Smith and are said to have been taken to the United States railroad administration.

Joe Proasley is charged by indictment with the theft of an overcoat belonging to R. D. Kennedy and valued at \$60.

Ben Jordan was indicted on two counts on charges of forgery. He is alleged to have forged two checks each calling for \$20.

A. H. Ford was indicted on a charge of forging a check for the sum of \$30. Laird Heyers was indicted on a charge of assault to murder. The indictment is in connection with the shooting of D. B. Conklin, said to have occurred on November 4. A pistol is said to have been used by Heyers in the shooting affair.

Harry and Letha Smith are charged by indictment with the theft of an automobile valued at \$3500. The car is alleged to have been stolen from Edgar Biles. The grand jury is continuing its investigations.

William Kaiser, deputy constable at Burkburnett, is charged by complaint in Justice A. J. Arrington's court with the commission of a statutory offense. The complaint was filed Monday night and Kaiser was committed to the county jail in default of bond fixed by Justice Arrington at \$3,000.

A young Burkburnett girl, said by officers to be less than 13 years old, is the complaining witness in the case.

ANALYSIS OF VOTE.

That is a very interesting calculation made by Senator Hitchcock in analyzing the Senate's votes on the peace treaty ratification.

On the Lodge resolution of ratification, thirty-nine votes were cast for it and fifty-six votes against it.

On the resolution of ratification containing five moderate reservations presented by Mr. Ford, forty-one Senators voted for that resolution and fifty against it.

On a resolution of unqualified ratification presented by Senator Underwood, thirty-eight Senators voted for it and fifty-three against it.

Only fifteen Senators voted so on all three propositions. These were the irreconcilables like Johnson and Brann on the republican side and Reed on the democratic-fourteen republicans and one lone democrat.

On the other hand, as Senator Hitchcock shows, eighty Senators voted for ratification in one of the three forms presented, and he is sure that from this eighty-eight when Senator Glass of Virginia takes his seat—the necessary sixty-four votes can be secured for ratification on a compromise resolution that will get the support of the democrats and of the mild reservation group of republicans who want the treaty ratified but insist on some partisan interpretative reservations.

The general feeling in Washington is that the final refusal of the Senate to ratify means a long delay in the United States ratification. But we wonder if those who hold this belief are not overlooking that factor of the Senators; getting a different perspective at home from what they had in Washington, and that, confronted by the seething unrest which threatens the old world and indirectly menaces the new, they will return to Washington next month in a chastened and milder spirit, out of which feeling, on both sides, can be built a compromise agreement.

Senator Hitchcock's statement that "Concessions on both sides must be real and not merely nominal" shows the democrats are dominated by a spirit of conciliation. Let us hope that the republicans will find at home a feeling that will give rise in them to the same spirit.

The increase of \$5,482,747.83 in the deposits of Wichita Falls banks in the two months and five days intervening between the statements of September 12 and November 17, is a fair index to the increase in Wichita Falls' business generally in that interval, for there is hardly any line of business in Wichita Falls in which the increase has not been at least as much as the approximately 17 per cent gain in bank deposits. Speaking on a per capita basis, we believe Wichita has a higher average of deposits than any city in the Southwest and is one of the highest in the country. "We are building here a great city. GEN. ALLEN PRAISES NINETIETH DIVISION

COLLEGE STATION, Texas, Nov. 25.—That study of the ground over which the Ninetieth Division fought in the St. Mihiel offensive has added greatly to the prestige of the division, is one of the statements which Major General Henry T. Allen, commanding the American forces in Germany, in a belated message sent to the Ninetieth Division Association. General Allen prepared a brief address to be read to the association at its recent conference in Dallas, but the communication has only recently reached the office of Ike S. Ashburn, president of the association.

General Allen commanded the Ninetieth Division from the date of its mobilization until after the armistice was signed. As a recognition of the work of the division and his service as its commander, he was placed in command of the Fourth Corps. Later, when the A. E. F. was disbanded, General Allen was placed in charge of all of the American forces in Germany. The address in full follows:

"For some unfortunate reason your letter dated August 26, requesting some word from me to the Ninetieth Division on its first reunion, at Dallas, October 11, has only just now reached me. I fear, therefore, that this communication will not reach you in time. I deeply regret this, for I truly want to have my ever cordial greetings and deep gratitude expressed to the assembled members of the Ninetieth.

Lived on Spiritual Plane. "Several times during the last few months I have travelled over the region south of Metz and have studied the Hindenburg line from Pagny-sur-Moselle west through Ereny. If possible, this position was stronger and more strategically chosen than the Freya Stellung. Pagny and the ridge west is far stronger than I had ever imagined. The study on the ground of that position, in front of which we had such stubborn and determined resistance over such a long period, has greatly increased the prestige of our division.

"On your first reunion I deeply regret not being there other than in spirit. While not temperamental in character, and probably too remote from idealism still I want to frankly tell you that the spirit of my old division still dominates my higher self and I shall always worship it. In the slimes of those cold, rainy days, amid the crackling of machine guns on earth and in air, in the fetid gas, surrounded by bursting shells, continually forcing the Great Hereafter, the Ninetieth Division was living on a spiritual plane above itself. Never can you descend to your former levels. Your spiritual greatness has increased your nobility and your country is enriched by your exalted character.

"Would that I could say this to you in person, as I shall at some future date. My reputation left in Europe by the Ninetieth is so good and great that flattering comments are frequently heard.

"As one of your best representatives, I ask you, my dear Major, to have the kindness to bring these, my cordial greetings, to all who may assemble from Generals O'Neil and McAlexander to the hero private.

ALLIES SHOW SMALL DEGREE OF LENIENCY

BERLIN, Monday, Nov. 24.—Privy Legation Councillors Simon and Gruppert returned to this city this morning from Paris and later held a conference with Dr. Haniel Von Haimhausen, under-secretary. According to the Tagblatt, they reported the entire showed some small degree of leniency, but said the impression, on the whole, was unfavorable.

GERMANY'S INDUSTRIAL SITUATION A PROBLEM

COLOGNE.—Germany's industrial situation continues to be a paramount problem for public discussion. Almost every newspaper in the country has been devoting one or two columns daily to suggestion and criticisms of the industrial policies adopted by the national assembly. No relief is in sight so far as the editors have been able to foresee owing to the coal shortage, lack of transportation and the scarcity of raw materials still to be faced.

The demand for rubber and rubber products appears to be increasing. Rubber articles of all kinds being particularly scarce on the market. Prohibitive prices have been paid recently in Cologne and other Rhineland cities by dealers from the interior of Germany for old automobile and bicycle tires. Millions of marks worth of salvaged rubber goods have been sold by the American, French and British army authorities to the Germans but this supply apparently has not relieved the demand in the least.

ROUMANIA WILL BE ANOTHER OPPORTUNITY

PARIS, Nov. 25.—Roumania is to be given another chance to sign the Austrian peace treaty, eight days beginning November 27, being named within which she may attach her signature. Permission to sign is also to be given Siberia. The supreme council made this decision today.

SHOULD A MAN RETIRE AT FIFTY AND WORK FOR THE PUBLIC GOOD? SOME ANSWERS TO THE QUESTION

NEW YORK, Nov. 23.—Edward W. Bok's advice to successful American business men and women to retire from active work at 50 years of age and devote the remainder of their lives to public work has met with a variety of opinions, pro and con.

Addressing a luncheon in Philadelphia, Pa., who himself quit as editor of the Ladies' Home Journal after 31 years of service, said: "People come to me and say, 'are you well?' Then they look at me as a curiosity for retiring. That is what men should do. They should not wait until they are so old they cannot do any more. Get out of business in time and become a civic asset to your community."

"There are forty men in Philadelphia who should do as I have done. These interesting thespians in civic work, what a power they would be!—aiding our mayor in making our city what it ought to be!"

To determine whether successful men and women in other cities shared Bok's views, the United Press has asked prominent persons in Chicago, Boston, San Francisco, St. Louis and Cleveland what they thought of the idea. Several declared the idea would be workable, while others asserted it would result in an overbalancing of the scales, as one man expressed it, "a rule by the ancients."

The "pros" expressed their opinions as follows:

Thomas Lovelace, under 50, assistant secretary of the St. Louis chamber of commerce:—"Mr. Bok's plan would result in a greater country and better conditions. Every man, before and after he reaches 50, should devote some part of his time to civic usefulness. It is good advertising, and if not done from the standpoint of unselfish service to the community, it should be done from the standpoint of self-interest. Advertising betters a man's business and gives him a better viewpoint. Everyone should devote a part of his time to civic work, no matter what his age or degree of success in life."

James Jackson, under 50, former vice-president of the State Street Trust Co., Boston:—"A good part of the industrial problems today might have been averted if successful men had de-

voted their time to the good of the community and played the part of good leaders. Men financially able ought to retire, as Mr. Bok suggested, at 50 and start in as young as possible at civic work or clean politics. As things go now—wholly business men give most of their time to their own affairs, politics and welfare work fall into the hands of apathetic, selfish and indifferent leaders. There's too much of the spirit of 'we won the war; now let's sit back and let somebody else run things.'" When men and women have comfortable incomes at 50 years old, the nation would benefit if they would devote their time to its affairs, instead of trying to make more money. If I am financially able when I reach 50, I will consider it my privilege to retire from business and try my hand at helping in civic affairs. The best qualified men and women too often shirk their duty when they decide to participate in their country's or city's affairs."

Robert Dollar, 76, president of the Robert Dollar Co., San Francisco, largest shipper on the Pacific coast:—"There'd be no retiring for me until I am dead. I am more valuable in my business now of developing the world's foreign trade than I ever was before. I wouldn't quit for anything. I will keep on working to the very last. I know nothing about civic work, anyway, and I would be a failure at anything else. As at anything else, requires a lifetime of endeavor."

M. L. Wilkinson, above 50, president of Scruggs-Vanderport-Barney, department store, St. Louis:—"I would feel sorry for both civic work and business if all successful men retired at 50. Bok was born in Holland in 1848. He came to America at the age of six and became self-supporting by working as a stenographer. While still a boy he organized a literary syndicate, and among other notable undertakings, handled the sermons of Henry Ward Beecher. After working in several publishing houses, he became editor of the Ladies' Home Journal in 1888. He is the author of several books.

REPUBLICANS WANT TO KNOW SENTIMENT

WASHINGTON, Nov. 23.—While President Wilson worked today on his message to congress, Republican leaders in both houses planned their attack on his expected demand for quick ratification of the peace treaty.

The situation is: When the President's message goes before congress the Republicans will be ready to concentrate their efforts on passage of Senator Lodge's resolution declaring the war ended. If Wilson adheres to his stand that the treaty should be ratified with only explanatory reservations and that the Lodge reservations satisfy the document, the Republicans immediately will start the drive to force their resolution through and put it before the President for his signature, thus laying on him responsibility for continuing the technical state of war, if he vetoes it.

But if Wilson manifests a spirit of compromise and says the treaty is acceptable with the Lodge reservations or with reservations based on them, opposition leaders will devote their efforts to bringing about this qualified ratification.

Change in Plan. This indicates a change in the Republican plan, as Senator Lodge previously stated that if the President re-introduced the treaty next session it would suffer "the delay of death," in the foreign relations committee; and later expressed an eagerness to make ratification a campaign issue in 1920. The Republicans now figure that they will gain strength in the presidential campaign, no matter what course the treaty might take as they will go before the country as the party that safeguarded national interests and "Americanized the treaty."

If it is adopted and as the party that saved America from entangling foreign alliances—if it is finally beaten.

Word of what attitude the President will take in his message is carefully guarded at the White House. His friends do not believe he will recede from his stand of only a week ago that the treaty is practically killed by the Lodge reservations or anything like them, unless he couples such action with a declaration that even with crippling qualifications the treaty is essential to stabilize world conditions, being better than none at all.

OKLAHOMA SCHOOLS ARE RECEIVING TWO MILLION ANNUALLY FROM LEASES

OKLAHOMA CITY, Nov. 24.—Oklahoma schools receive \$2,000,000 a year from bonuses, royalties and rentals of school lands leased for oil, gas and other mineral purposes, according to figures recently made public.

Greater development of the fields now in operation or the addition of new ones will cause the annual income to mount upward until the permanent school funds will amount to many millions.

More than a million and a half barrels of oil were taken from the state school lands during the past fiscal year. Millions of feet of natural gas were also sold.

SCIENTIST PROMISES END OF THE SLOWLY

SYDNEY.—(By Mail.)—News that the British scientist, Professor Leroy, has discovered a remedy for the ravages of the blowfly upon sheep, has been received in Australia, as in other sheep-raising countries of the world, with intense interest. Professor Leroy was said to have stated that Australia could be cleared of the blowfly within five years.

ABSENCE OF U. S. OFFICIALS IN BERLIN CAUSES CONFUSION

BERLIN.—(By Mail.)—Lack of American official representation in Berlin is causing American travelers considerable embarrassment.

The Spanish embassy representing American interests can sometimes help the traveler; but more often not. It has too much business to handle. And red tape unwinds slowly in Germany.

As a result of this situation, Americans coming here are complaining considerably over the situation. England and France are liberally represented on missions here, Americans are not. And its interests have

to be conserved mainly by the American legations in the Hague and Copenhagen.

Two stranded American sailors reached town recently expecting passports here. They were penniless but expected a lift here. They couldn't get a passport right away; maybe by waiting long enough they might have had one through the Spanish embassy. Probably they passed the borders somehow "on their own." It can be done, but it's unpleasant.

And, at the same time an American business man arrived in with a perfectly good pass, but found he needed to travel to Czechoslovakia to complete an important deal. Could he get his pass amended here? No, he had to travel to Copenhagen and run the risk of losing his business deal through the delay.

These are only sample cases. Daily, Americans with difficulties as bad or worse than those above cited are here, and find that the U. S. A. isn't among those present. They say it should be.



BODIES OF AMERICANS TO REMAIN IN FRANCE TWO YEARS OR MORE

PARIS, Nov. 25.—The 65,000 American dead in France must be left in the graves they now occupy until the French are ready to exhume their own dead, which it is hoped, will be before January 1, 1922.

The foreign office has promised to accede to the request of the American government for the return of its former soldiers, but later the following official announcement was made: "It has been definitely decided that allies who fell, together for the same cause, should remain together in death until circumstances permit of the returning of the bodies to the families for whom they sacrificed themselves."

GEN. ANGELES AWAITING END OF HIS TRIAL

Rebel Leader Is Unrelenting and Believes He Will Receive Justice

JUAREZ, MEXICO, Nov. 25.—General Felipe Angeles, military genius of Mexico, today awaited the conclusion of his trial at Chihuahua City before a military court, the verdict of which may mean his execution.

The rebel leader is unrelenting since his arrest, the advices said, although he has expressed confidence that he would receive justice.

PASSENGERS REFUSE TO PAY 10C AND A BATTLE IS RESULT

NEW YORK, Nov. 25.—A pitched battle was waged between inspectors of the Brooklyn Railway Company and about 20 passengers early today at a climax of the war of street car patrons of Brooklyn against 10 cent "zone" fare.

The car in which the riot occurred had been run on to a siding earlier in the evening when the 20 men refused to pay the second fare at the end of the first zone.

NO NEW INSTRUCTIONS AS TO U. S. ATTITUDE IN DALMATIAN FIGHT

WASHINGTON, Nov. 25.—No new instructions have been sent to Rear Admiral Andrews at Spalato regarding the attitude he is to take in the event of an effort by the D'Annunzio forces to expand their control over Dalmatian territory, Secretary Daniels said today.

Under Secretary Frank L. Polk of the state department, head of the Am-

erican peace delegation at Paris, conferred yesterday in London with Rear Admiral Knapp, commanding all American naval forces in European waters, regarding the situation on the eastern shore of the Adriatic, where Andrews commands American ships assigned to the patrol of a part of the Dalmatian coast under an agreement reached in Paris.

Reports that D'Annunzio contemplated a raid on Spalato, the American naval base, led to the London conference but Mr. Daniels indicated that the officials on the spot had not recommended any action in anticipation of such a raid.

Dream of Attack Results in a Man Killing His Wife

NEWARK, N. J., Nov. 25.—James Sapienza, concrete block manufacturer, of Irvington, shot and killed his wife in bed early yesterday, but the murder charge against him may be dropped.

"Sapienza said he dreamed he saw two men coming through the window and that they were taking his little son," said Police Lieutenant Godfrey today, who examined the manufacturer after he had been arrested.

"He said he dreamed he reached under his pillow to get his revolver and that he was suddenly awakened by the noise of a shot. He found the revolver in his hand and it was smoking."

"I am convinced this man is telling the truth for this reason: The bullet that killed his wife went through the pillow before it lodged in her head, behind the left ear. Sapienza slept on the left side of the bed and his wife on the right."

PRESIDENT OF SOVIET AT RIAZAN, RUSSIA, IS SHOT BY AUTHORITIES

RIAZAN, RUSSIA, Oct. 27.—M. Bakromoff, the president of the Soviet here, who raised a "local fund" for the purchase of entente imperialist statements, has been shot by the extraordinary commission for combating counter-revolution, for misappropriating funds intended for spreading Bolshevik ideas.

According to a newspaper report, Bakromoff read a detailed report to the Riazan Soviet declaring that he had bought Premier Clemenceau of France for 150,000 rubles, President Wilson for 300,000 rubles and the Berlin foreign office for 50,000 rubles.

COLLIN COUNTY BANK IS ROBBED OF \$10,000

MURPHY, TEX., Nov. 25.—The Guaranty State Bank of Murphy was entered early today and several thousand dollars worth of Liberty Bonds and a small amount of cash stolen.

The robbers cut their way into the bank through the strong of a brick vault with chisels and hammers, but they did not break into the safe.

S. W. Sibley, president of the bank, said the amount stolen was not known until a check of funds was made but that it probably would not exceed \$10,000.

The robbers cut telephone wires leading into the town. Sheriff Ed Blankenship of Collin county, who is investigating, said the robbery appeared to be the work of amateurs.

NEED ADDITIONAL HOTEL FACILITIES STRESSED BY REID

CHAMBER OF COMMERCE DIRECTOR SAYS NEW HOTEL WILL NOT FILL NEED. DIRECTORS TAKE NO ACTION

All Possible Speed in Completing New Hotel is Urged to Relieve Situation.

Need of an additional hotel in Wichita Falls, one which will have a capacity of 400 to 500 rooms, and represent an investment of in the neighborhood of \$2,000,000, with a prospect of more definite action being taken, was brought out before the Chamber of Commerce directors at their Tuesday morning meeting by C. W. Reid.

President hotel facilities in Wichita Falls will be far from adequate even after the new hotel is completed, said Mr. Reid. "In fact the new hotel, which will have a capacity of only 218 rooms, would hardly suffice for the people in the city who would be glad to live at a hotel for the year round. As for taking care of the transients who seek accommodations here, it will do little more than a drop in a bucket. "I am asking no definite action at this time. I merely wished to bring the matter before this body in order that they may be thinking the matter over and preparing for definite action later.

"I understand that R. M. Waggoner had planned to build a new office building on the old Ward corner, but had given the plan over for the present at least. It might be possible that some arrangement might be made with him for the construction of a large hotel on that corner. "This matter is one of vital importance to our town. The present lack of hotel accommodations, and the living accommodations which go with such an institution, make people who are not anchored here hate our town, and we are going to find it difficult to make friends for the town until we make arrangements for providing these facilities. Mr. Reid's views on the shortage of hotel accommodations were warmly supported by the other directors in attendance, some of whom mentioned that all speed should be employed in rushing the hotel now under construction to a finish. Others however brought out the fact that all possible speed was now being employed on the hotel, although several made the statement that this had not been the case in the past.

"No such association was found to exist when we reached Kansas City," was the report to N. Henderson, secretary, by a representative of the Chamber of Commerce to a convention of the National Air Line Association, whose purpose is reported to be the establishment of aerial commercial routes over the country. "So we chloroformed the cat and came home," Mr. Henderson stated, concluding his report. In the absence of objections, Judge Huff, president, ruled that the body was in approval of the action of Mr. Henderson and

The community market matter was presented to the directors by Judge R. E. Huff, president, acting at the request of Mayor Marlow.

COLD WAVE COMING HARDLY HOPED GAS SUPPLY IS ADEQUATE

Wichita Falls fuel supply will be given a severer test with the next twenty-four hours than it has yet received, according to weather forecasts received by the Times Tuesday morning. These indicate a drop in temperature to below twenty degrees above zero. It is practically certain that the gas supply will be inadequate. There is but little coal in the city. A number of citizens have laid in a supply of wood to help out the gas when the pressure gets low.

J. A. MILLER FIRES BULLET INTO BRAIN WHILE DESPONDENT

MECHANIC ENDS LIFE IN PRESENCE OF WIFE AT HOME ON FIFTEENTH STREET. COMPLAINED FEELING BADLY

Went into Room, Drew Automatic and Fired—Death Resulted Within An Hour.

J. A. Miller, 37 years old, a mechanic residing at 801 Fifteenth street, ended his life shortly after 7 o'clock Monday afternoon by firing a bullet from an automatic revolver into his brain. The tragedy occurred at the family residence and in the presence of Miller's wife and also his sister-in-law, Justice of the Peace C. J. Arrington, who held the inquest, stated that Miller came to his death as the result of bullet wounds self-inflicted. Justice Arrington said Tuesday that he was convinced that Miller took his life in a fit of despondency which lead to temporary insanity.

Mrs. Miller told Justice Arrington that her husband came home from his work Monday afternoon complaining of feeling bad. Mrs. Miller asked her husband to go to the theatre but he declined, saying as he left the room that he wanted to be alone a few minutes. He had just entered an adjoining room and was still in the presence of his wife and sister-in-law when he drew his automatic pistol and fired. Miller never regained consciousness and died within an hour. Miller is survived by his wife and two children, Joe, about 11 years old and Ann Gwendolyn, eight years old. Miller came here about three years ago from Clarendon. He has worked as a mechanic since locating here. The body is being held by the O. W. Hines Undertaking company pending the arrival of relatives from Virginia. Funeral arrangements will be announced later.

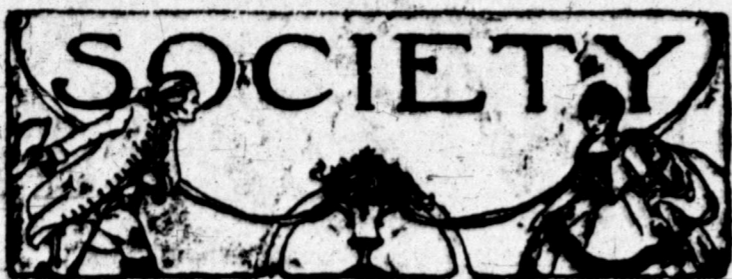

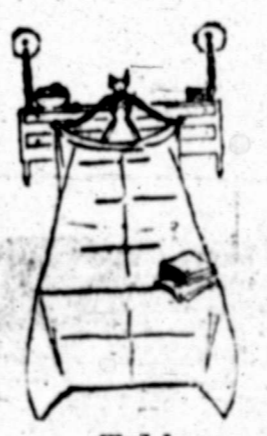
