



Church, in a communica-tion to the National Geographic Society, of a people whose women were fronounced the most beautiful in the South Seas, whose dances were the most joyous, whose taitooing was a fine art, and whose island home was a shirter Eden before the white man

To describe the dainty, graceful Marquesanne as she unquestionably was will. I fear, lay me open to the charge of exaggeration," writes Mr.

Difficult to Exaggerate.

"When women possess beautiful, luxuriant hair, fine eyes, perfect teath, a slender, graceful form, a skin of velvet texture and unblemished surface, and these physical attractions are combined with a vivacity of spirit and becomes diff. action, exaggeration becomes diffi-cult; and unless all chroniclers of the islands have for several centuries agreed to deceive the world, such was the Marquesanne; and so she is today when sickness has not diminished her

"I doubt seriously if a more care free or contented maiden ever existed, filer domestic duties were light and agreeable. Outside on the stone platform was an assortment of bowls, crudely carved by the men in their intervals from warfare. Frequent Massage.

I have mentioned the use of coco oil by the Marquesans. Probably no race ever attained a greater skill in the art of massage certainly none ever practiced it more constantly. The oil was obtained by filling large wooden bowls with the meat of broken cocoamits and placing them in the sun. Into the oil thus drawn the intensely fragrant blossoms of pus or the seeds of the spicy, aromatic fimely were thrown, acenting it with a delightful perfume.

Men and women alike were dafly massaged with this scented oil, every mascle being gently manipulated with a fatil seldom found in a modern masseuse. Usually two or three hours were required for the operation. At its conclusion the skin was like velvet to ixture, without a trace of oiliness. They wasted their hair in a similar minner, and the wonderful, luxuriant treases were probably due to the attention given them in the user of cocoais and massage.

Single Delly Meal.

Beyond the preparation of the single daily meal, her massage, and such uspa or mat making as desire or necessity prompted, the life of the Marquesanne was devoted entirely to pleasure. The quiet bays and tumbling streams made ideal bathing places and warrior and maiden alike were finost amphibious. Even the bables were taught to swim before they could wilk alone.

"The marriage of the Marquesan malden to the youth of her choice was an interesting ceremony. A home for their occupation was built by their triends, and the various necessities for connubial bliss placed therein.

"The maiden was taken in charge by several young matrons, to be massaged with perfumed oils and her hair and body decorated with wreaths and garlands of flowers. The youth was consigned to the ministrations of two olden women, who rendered him a similar service, besides smoking him thoroughly with the fumes of sandal wood. At the appointed time the scented and garlanded pair were escorted by the village to their fae, or but, where the king with much ceremony declared them tapu for two weeks.

Camele Transport Freight. "The merchandise of Persia is practically carried on the backs of camels, mules, and donkeys, a slow and expensive mode of transport, and the traveler usually rides through the country following the tracks made by the passage of caravans during the centuries.

"The Persian is of Aryan stock, and has the same words as ourselves for father, mother, brother, and daughter (pidar, madar, bradar, and dukhtar), and the construction of his language is like that of English.

"He is a handsome, well-built man, with regular features and fine black eyes, his complexion being no darker than that of an Italian. In manner he is most courtee he is quick, alert, fond of conversation and discussion, and has rightly been called the Frenchman of the East. Mehammedan Country.

"Persia has been a Mohammedan country from the time of its conquest by the Arabs, in 641; but some thousands of Zorostrians, the old firewarshippers, still remain in the land, and have been much persecuted.

"Many Persians have no home life in the usual sense of the word. A Persian house is divided into the bi-roon, or men's apartments and the anderson, or part consecrated to the women. A strong door, set in a high blank wall, gives entrance to a narrow passage that leads into a square courtyard on which open several rooms. 





# ESCAPE OF GENERAL HARBORD OF U. S. MISSION TO ARMENIA

While fraught with extreme danger, the members of the party were neither robbed, stripped of their elothes and turned adrift to make the best of their way to some friendly city, or even killed as happens to other caravans, because of the magic name of America.

lt was the mind of Shamil Beg, Chieftain of the nomad band entrenched against the Armenians at the village of Kulp, which saved the lesser members of the Mission from the customary fate of captured caravans. Shamil Beg came to the knowledge of the mission members after this fashion. For three weeks they had been traveling from Constantinople, intent on really seeing the lands of Asia Minor as these lands have probably not yet been seen by outsiders. They had come up from dusty Aleppo by train across the north strip of They had come up from dusty Aleppo by train across the north strip of the shimmering Mesopotamian Desert, until reaching Mardin, the magnificient stone city set upon a mountain. There the seven automobiles of the party had been taken off the flat cars of the Bagdad railway and after countless adventures with impassable roads, bridging the unbridged Euphrates and the Tigris, climbing and descending the Taurus range of mountains which gradually climb thrice their height to the plateaus of Ararat, the party crossed the Turkish frontier into Russian Asia Minor, or Armenia as is now called parts of the country.

# LAND OWNERS HERE PREPARE TO FIGHT OKLAHOMA'S CLAIM

PRADY TO DEFEND TITLE

ta Falls Atterneys Collecting vidence to Cambat Expected Move of Oklahoma.

Wichita county laid owners are preparing to tight Oklahoma's attempt to put the land and the producing wells in the Waggoner extension in the hands of a federal receiver, and to this end Judge A. H. Carrigan, Judge W. W. Ward and Orville Bullington, representing landowners of this section, and holders of land under the Texas survey of excess lands will go to Washington, with additional data, next week.

"Unless immediate action is taken, tooks as if this entire section down to the bluffs will be in the hands of a federal receiver," said Judge A. H. Carrigan Wednesday morning. "We are preparing to take this action, the irdividual property owners to cooperate with the attorney general of Texas. The suit for receiverthip has not yet been filed, but from correspondence received Tuesday. I am convinced that the publication will be filed immediately."

Advices from Oklahoma City are to the effect that the suit will be held up until a survey is made by government geologists and engineers. Herbert M Peck, special assistant U. S. attorney in the case, and U. S. Attorney John A. Fain have just returned to Oklahoma City after a conference at Washington with the department

of justice.

Just what land will be claimed by the United States government for the Indians is not known, nor is the exact boundary of the Oklahoma claim made public, though it is believed it ull: follow the lines of the 1919 survey, which the majority of the off maps of the Waggoner pool and extensions show, including hundreds of acres of the J. B. Evans, Lillis Morgen. C. T. Taylor and Fowler lands, on which some of the biggest wells in the Waggoner pool are located.


